According to the Budget in Brief publication, in the final budget for 2007-08 the government has changed the non-development expenditure that had been proposed.

The MTBF in its global economic forecast says inflationary pressure in the upcoming year might get even more intense. It, however, projects downward inflation trends in the domestic economy.

According to the mid-term framework, inflation will come down to 5 percent in 2009-10 from the existing 7 percent.

In the MTBF, the government has set three-year revenue earnings plan to meet the budgetary expenditure.

A target of 15.8 percent revenue growth has been set for the 2007-08 F.Y. For 2008-09, the growth is set at 15.6 percent or Tk 66,260 crore while it is 13.56 percent or Tk 75,250 crore for 2009-10.

To perk up revenues in the coming fiscal years, the government will withdraw tax holiday and tax exemption provisions. The MTBF observes that such provision creates room for tax evasion.

In the framework, the government also hints at reforming the taxation sector. It says the government will introduce strong monitoring system for the field level taxmen. Besides, systems of uniform tax identification number and full self-assessment system for the taxpayers will be introduced to make the taxation procedure more transparent.

On the expenditure side, the government has already brought 14 ministries under the MTBF. It also has allocations projected for the ministries in the next three years.

There will be some other measures to bring more transparency in expenditure. The government will soon launch a web-based integrated budget and accounts system (IBAS) where information about the allocation and expenditure will be available.

The MTBF noted that high remittance inflow has been one of the major reasons for higher inflation.

Besides, it says, political and market instability, hassles and lack

of infrastructure for maintaining the supply chain, and inflationary expectation account for higher inflation.

The government increased its non-development expenditure in the final budget for the fiscal 2007-08 although the overall size of the budget remains unchanged.

In the final budget, Tk 52,900 crore proposed for non-development expenditure rose to Tk 52928 crore.

The alert came ahead of the second anniversary of the July 7, 2005 attacks in London that killed 56 people, including four Islamist suicide bombers.

Britain has been on the second highest level of security alert — "severe" — since the British Islamist extremist bombers detonated homemade bombs on three Underground trains and a bus two years ago.

Two of the bombers justified the actions because of Britain's involvement in Iraq, where three British soldiers were killed in a roadside bomb attack Thursday.

The domestic intelligence service MI5 said a "severe" threat level means there is a "serious and sustained threat from international terrorism to the UK and UK interests overseas", particularly from al-Qaeda.

But an intelligence source quoted by the Press Association said "all options" were being considered, including dissident Irish republican groups opposed to the Northern Irish peace process.

European governments have been on increased anti-terrorist alert in recent months. Asked about the London bomb, French President Nicolas Sarkozy said that "the alert level in France is high".

Republican who supported the measure, had warned that if the vote did not succeed, "the bill is dead" with a tense political climate looming in the run-up to the 2008 presidential elections.

His ally on the issue, veteran Democratic Senator Edward Kennedy said that immigration reform was inevitable, though it might take years.

"We will be back. This issue is not going away. This is really a part of a whole march for progress for our nation and the country," he said.

The measure had staggered in the Senate for weeks, and in the end, the breadth of the package appeared to contribute to its demise.

Conservatives opposed it because they said it did not do enough to seal US borders to illegal immigrants, while Democrats from conservative districts also found it difficult to support the bill, and some fretted at the terms of its "low wage" guest worker program.

The measure would have granted an eventual path to legal status to some 12 million illegal immigrants.

It would have replaced the current family-dominated immigration system with a merit-based points

deadliest month for US forces in Iraq since November 2004.

At least 3,576 members of the US military have died since the beginning of the Iraq war in March 2003, according to an Associated Press count. The figure includes seven military civilians. At least 2,936 died as a result of hostile action, according to the military's numbers.

Earlier US forces killed three people they described as militants and detained more than two dozen in a series of raids across Iraq on Friday targeting al-Qaeda networks.

The military said troops killed the three militants, one of whom was wearing a suicide vest, in a raid near the former rebel town of Fallujah in the western Sunni Anbar province.

In the same raid troops detained 16 militants for their alleged ties to a "top al-Qaeda in Iraq leader", while in the same province near the town of Karmah, another raid led to arrest of four more militants, the military said.

In a third operation south of Baghdad, troops searched a building to arrest a close aide of a militant known for orchestrating vehicle bombings in the capital, capturing the suspect and two other militants.

A fourth raid resulted in the arrest of another aide of a leader of al-Qaeda in the region of Tarmiyah, near Baghdad, the military said.

And in Mosul, two more suspects were detained in a raid targeting a top leader of al-Qaeda operating in the disputed oil-rich city of Kirkuk in northern Iraq.

"We're continuing to target the top of the terrorist network, as well as the operatives who carry out their murderous actions," said Lieutenant Colonel Christopher Garver of the US military in the statement.

In other developments, Iraqi police said a bomb exploded under an oil pipeline south of Baghdad on Friday, spilling crude oil and sparking a huge fire.

The explosives were planted under a stretch of pipeline in the Mowehlah area of Haswa, a town 50km south of the Iraqi capital, a police officer said on condition of anonymity because he was not authorised to release the information.

The pipeline transmits crude oil from Iraq's southern oil fields to the Dora refinery in Baghdad.

The blast ignited a huge fire around 5 am, the officer said. By midday, firefighters were still struggling to extinguish the flames, which were fuelled by a continuing leak of oil from the pipeline, he said. Workers also were looking for a way to temporarily cut off the oil flow, until a repair could be made, the officer added.

belongings including 3,000 Dirham (equivalent to around Tk 28,000) and her passport after getting her drink water mixed with sedative at Satrasta in the capital.

Moyna had saved the money during her 14-month stay in Dubai.

Finding Moyna lying unconscious by a road in Satrasta, police took her to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) yesterday morning, police posted at the hospital said.

As her husband, working at a decorator's at their village home of Rikabi Bazar in Munshiganj Sadar, found it hard to maintain their six-member family, Moyna went to Dubai spending Tk 60,000 with the hope of bringing solvency.

She could barely send back the amount she had spent for going to Dubai.

However, overwork along with torture made Moyna's life miserable in a foreign country.

The wife of her employer slapped or struck her with whatever she found on trifling grounds like delay in serving a glass of water.

"I had to go to bed at midnight and get up at 3:00am every day. If I fell asleep during work she [wife of her master] would beat me severely," Moyna told The Daily Star as she regained her consciousness yesterday afternoon.

She had to work for 21 hours a day as she worked in a 16-member family as a domestic help, she said, adding that her employer has sent her back

A string of cases are in the offing against Khaleda too, a highly placed source in the administration said.

The cases will be disposed of before the councils and the two if found guilty will not be able to participate in the national councils, a senior BNP leader, who claimed to have been keeping close contact with the government policymakers, told The Daily Star.

Khaleda will be automatically disqualified from holding or contesting the post of chairperson according to the BNP constitution.

The AL constitution does not have any such provision, but the pro-reforms leaders on several occasions said that they would not bear the responsibility if Hasina ends up being convicted of extortion.

A number of pro-reforms leaders from both the parties have told The Daily Star that their plan for freeing parties from dynastic leaderships hinges on whether the two would make it to the councils or not.

They believe the government's legal actions against Khaleda and Hasina will help them amend the party constitutions to get rid of the two who have been at the helm for years.

According to both party constitutions, grassroots level leaders make up the majority of the councillors and both Khaleda and Hasina believe they will still vote for them, sources close to the former prime

leader of the party, if convicted by a court for any unlawful activity, will be expelled from the organisation, the AL reformists said.

"If anyone is proven guilty by a court for any unlawful activity, that person will not be eligible to hold any party post or any governmental post," Mukul Bose told The Daily Star.

If anyone is convicted of a crime by a court while in a party post, that person will lose the post and the membership of the party permanently, according to the amended AL reform proposal.

Sources said issues like development of human resources and education for citizens have also been included in the amended proposal as part of suggestions for social reforms.

Some other specific proposals including a ban on fundamentalist political parties, rooting out of militancy, implementation of four main principles of the state originally stipulated in the first constitution of the country, and establishment of the principles of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman among other things have been mentioned in the amended proposal, the reformists said.

Representation of religious minorities in both party and state affairs has been suggested in the new proposal, said a pro-reform AL leader.

It has been stated in the new proposal that the treasurer of the party will have to disclose the accounts every three months to the AL central working committee.

Sources said before seeking the final approval of the national council, the reformist leaders will take opinions of different party forums, different professional forums, intellectuals, members of the civil

Explaining the conditions of the railway lines he said, "Rail communication from Pathgram to other parts of the country remains snapped for at least 10 days a month on average due to derailments."

Two officers of Akhaura Railway Junction were suspended yesterday for negligence of duty after four wagons in the rear of a freight train derailed near the junction on Monday, our correspondent from Brahmanbaria reports.

The suspended officers are Assistant Executive Engineer Rafiqul Islam Bari and Senior Sub-assistant Engineer Abdul Matin Mandal.

At around 8:00pm Monday the Chittagong bound freight train from Dhaka derailed snapping rail communication between Dhaka and Chittagong for eight hours.

A probe body headed by Divisional Transport Officer Sarder Shahadat Ali was formed to investigate the accident.

A member of the body on condition of anonymity said the accident occurred due to irregularities in repairing the railway lines that were damaged in an earlier accident and the two engineers suspended were in charge of the repair works.

Source said 30 feet of railway lines were badly damaged in the earlier accident but engineers repaired only 20 feet and okayed the railway lines.

The eight expelled students are: Abdullah Al-Mamun, Sanzida Naima, Faisal Ali, Ujjal Kumar, Rakibul Islam, Shah Newaz Shathil, Amir Sohel and Shapla Rani. The suspended employee of the department is field assistant Masud Rana.

The syndicate also issued a show-cause notice to Masud Rana asking why he should not be fired.

All the eight students are first year honours students of the department who got admitted to the honours course of 2006-07 academic session, campus sources said.

Sources said Masud made arrangements for the eight students' admission to the department even though they failed to qualify in the admission test for first year honours course 2006-07 session. They said Masud gained Tk 2 lakh for getting them admitted there.

Canals being turned

will be too late to do that," said Prof Nazrul Islam, an eminent expert of urban planning.

But the authorities never increased the depths of those canals. Rather they are currently implementing a project of Tk 203 crore to improve the storm sewerage system of the city and to convert more canals into box culverts in the name of development. The project will be completed in 2008, which started in 2002.

Under the project, Wasa already converted an open canal into a box culvert in Khilgaon area.

The officials concerned from Wasa said the length of box culverts in the city under Wasa was 7.69 kilometres in 2003, 7.80 kilometres in 2004, and 8 kilometres in 2005, which is now 10 kilometres.

Besides, Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) also has 4.5 kilometres of box culverts under its supervision.

Experts said box culverts get clogged with rubbish and storm water cannot be drained properly causing inundation during monsoons.

"Open canals are easier to maintain in our country," said Prof Nazrul Islam, who is also a member of the steering committee formed in 2004.

SEVERAL RECOVERY DRIVES WITHOUT RESULT
Following the steering committee report in 2005, the government spent more than Tk 1 crore to recover more than 13 canals that had been encroached upon.

But at that time, the Wasa authorities could not demolish any slum situated by the canals. The World Bank showed its interest to rehabilitate the slum dwellers living by the canals illegally. During the drive the authorities only knocked down some permanent concrete structures but not any makeshift hut, and as soon as the recovery teams left the scene local people encroached upon most of the recovered canals again.

Again in 2007, Wasa made another move to evict the encroachers by the canals but could not remove all illegal structures.
