


Mixed day for Bangladesh U-12s

Bangladesh held defending champions Reunion Island 0-0 in their opening match of Group B on the inaugural day of the Danone Nations Cup in Lyon, France yesterday.

Bangladesh, who then lost 1-0 to Morocco in their second match in the three-day under-12 competition, were pitted against Bulgaria and Portugal last night, according to BFF online.

Bangladesh are among eight new entries including Chile, Cameroon, Saudi Arabia, Namibia, Hungary, Kenya and Uruguay in the meet of 40 countries, who are split into eight groups.

Reunion Island also won the second edition of the tournament in 2001 while other winners are hosts France, Argentina, South Africa, Spain and Russia.

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Learning the hard way

The early finish in the first Test of the three-match series gave Bangladesh team an additional day off. But the team management had arranged a video session for the players to evaluate their performances of the match held at the Sinhalese Sports Club.

Sri Lanka won the match by an innings and 234 runs on the fourth morning, throwing a lot of questions to the Tigers ahead of the second Test which starts on July 3 at the P Sara Stadium here.

The realisation of everyone, however, is that video sessions will not find solutions for the disappointing show. The problem is rather deep-rooted and here the preparation for the longer version game for our players has to be evaluated.

Test cricket is not a grooming ground rather it is usually the stage for seasoned players although there can be exceptions made for those with special talent.

However, there is no denying the fact that without a proper first-class structure and experience of tough

grind in domestic first class games it is very difficult to survive at Test level.

Left-handed middle order batsman Shakib Al Hasan is discovering this reality the hard way. The 20-year old from Magura has made an impressive start to his one-day career and boasts a healthy average of 43.80 in 31 matches.

His one-day success has been so eye-catching that the selectors just had to bring him to the Test fold at the first opportunity. But after just three Tests the youngster now knows it will be a long and hard road ahead.

"I am still finding my feet but what I could understand is that Test cricket is much more tougher than one-day cricket," said Shakib while talking about his brief Test experience, where he has made 96 runs in five innings.

It is natural for someone like Shakib to be in this situation and to adapt to the temperament of the five-day game. Before coming into the Test fray he had played only 13 first class games.

"I'm not sure whether it would have been more helpful for me if I had played more four-day games before playing Test cricket. I think a

lot of our senior players also did not play that many first-class games and you will not mind too many with 30 or more first class games behind them. I believe there is a lack of competitiveness in our first-class cricket which makes it difficult for cricketers to maintain intensity," he explained.

In the current squad, opener Javed Omar with 42 has appeared in the highest number of first class matches.

"Actually I am learning from every passing game. What I have learnt is that shot selection is of paramount importance in Test matches. One should also be technically skilled enough and that helps in handling the pressure," said Shakib.

Shakib's tendency to flash outside the off-stump, which he gets by with in the shorter-version game, has landed him in trouble in Tests.

"I have to learn how to leave the ball otherwise opponent teams would work on this weakness. This had happened in the second innings against Malinga (Lasith)," admitted the young man.

Henin, Krajicek move on

Security up at the All England Club

Anna Chakvetadze suffered a final set meltdown as the eighth seed crashed out of Wimbledon against Michaella Krajicek on Friday.

Chakvetadze, 20, has admitted she often struggles to keep her composure during key moments and she was unable to stay cool as Dutch teenager Krajicek won their third round match 7-6 (8/6), 6-7 (5/7), 6-2.

The Russian wept on court after allowing Agnes Szavay to take a set off her at the French Open this year and that volatile temperament failed her again against Krajicek, the sister of former Wimbledon champion Richard.

Chakvetadze's talent has never been in question and she has enjoyed a meteoric rise to a career high seventh in the world rankings on the back of quarterfinals appearances at the Australian and French Opens this year.

But, after winning a tense second set tie-break to level the match against Krajicek, she let a position of dominance slip away.

The Muscovite couldn't maintain her poise when it came to the crunch. She lost concentration and, with the tears welling up once more, was broken at the start of the deciding set.

Chakvetadze was growing increasingly frustrated and when she failed to convert a break point in the seventh game, Krajicek served out her impressive victory.

Justine Henin's bid to win Wimbledon for the first time remained on course as she advanced to the fourth round with a

crushing victory over Elena Vesnina.

The world number one eased past the unseeded Russian, winning 6-1, 6-3, and now faces either 15th seed Patty Schnyder or Ukraine's Alona Bondarenko for a place in the quarterfinals.

Wimbledon is the last unconquered frontier for Henin. The Belgian has savoured Grand Slam glory at the French, Australian and US Opens, but success on the grass courts of south-west London has been tantalisingly out of reach.

Henin lost in the 2001 final to Venus Williams and fell at the final hurdle again last year against Amelie Mauresmo.

But the reigning French Open champion has the game to win at the All England Club. She strolled through her first two matches with the minimum fuss and she was in charge immediately against Vesnina.

Flying start for Argentina

Hernan Crespo struck twice while Pablo Aimar and Carlos Tevez added late goals as hot favourites Argentina began their Copa America campaign with a 4-1 win against a youthful United States 4-1 here Thursday night.

Back in the Copa America after 12 years, USA could only watch the two-time world champions fly by in the second half.

Eddie Johnson put the US ahead with a penalty kick in the ninth minute, but Crespo scored in the 11th and 64th minutes for fifth-ranked Argentina, who increasingly outplayed the Americans as the game progressed.

Aimar connected in the 78th

minute and Tevez scored in the 85th, six minutes after entering.

"We came down here to win. We didn't come here to walk around with our tail between our legs and hope for the best," said defender Jimmy Conrad, one of the few regulars to play for the Americans.

"Ultimately, win or lose, it's a great learning experience for our team, and I think our programme will become better because of it."

With Diego Maradona looking on in a national team jersey, Crespo raised his national team goals total to 34, matching the former captain's career total.

"For me it's a great honour to equal the number of goals by Diego," Crespo said.

The loss was the first for the United States since a 2-1 defeat to Ghana on June 22 last year in Germany, which eliminated the

Americans from the World Cup. They had been 10-0-1 under Bob Bradley, who coached his first road game since replacing Bruce Arena as coach late last year.

"We put a lot of effort into the first 60 minutes, and I think when Argentina raised the level over the last 30 minutes, we weren't able to match that," Bradley said.

Kasey Keller made his 101st international appearance, moving ahead of Tony Meola for the record among US goalkeepers, but he was overwhelmed in the second half as his defence tired.

"At times, we didn't do a good enough job holding the ball," Bradley said. "We just started trying to beat their defence with one pass."

Van Wyk rescues SA

Morne van Wyk's career-best innings and a late rally from Mark Boucher helped South Africa reach 226 for six against India in the second one-day international at Stormont here Friday.

28-year-old van Wyk struck 82 while wicketkeeper-batsman Boucher followed up with a run-a-ball 55 not out as the Proteas scored 60 runs in the last 10 overs.

India's part-time spinner Yuvraj Singh took three for 36 after some fine new-ball bowling from fellow left-armers Zaheer Khan and RP Singh.

The Proteas had been in trouble at seven for two and 46 for three after losing the toss in seam-friendly conditions.

But a fourth-wicket stand of 85

between van Wyk, picked in place of injured captain Graeme Smith, and youngster Jean-Paul Duminy (40) repaired some of the early damage after the experienced duo of Jacques Kallis and Herschelle Gibbs fell cheaply.

It wasn't until the fourth over, with a RP Singh wide; that South Africa had their first runs but, next ball, and India had their first wicket.

Van Wyk set off for a single but stopped with non-striker AB de Villiers well down the pitch. The bowler Singh reacting quickly, gathered the ball and threw to the non-striker's end where Dravid took off the balls and de Villiers, ruled not to have grounded his bat by third umpire Aleem Dar, was out for naught.

Kallis, who'd made 91 not out in the Proteas' four-wicket win in the opening fixture of this three-match series on Tuesday, scored the first

run off the bat in the fifth over with an unconvincing inside edge.

But, on two, the South Africa captain dragged a full-length delivery from RP Singh onto his stumps.

Khan was replaced by 18-year-old debutant Ishant Sharma, who only arrived in Belfast on Wednesday. The young fast bowler who hails from Delhi tired towards the end of a seven over spell costing 38 runs.

It was Khan who captured the prized wicket of Gibbs when the batsman drove his third ball back powerfully off the backfoot straight to Dinesh Karthik at cover.

Young legspinner Piyush Chawla, who impressed with figures of three for 47 in the first ODI, saw Van Wyk loft him for the first six of the innings in his second over.

Smiths make WI smile

West Indies put their tour blues behind them as they outperformed England in every department to win by 15 runs in the first of two back-to-back Twenty20 internationals at a packed Oval.

Two Smiths -- Devon the batsman and Dwayne the bowler -- finally gave the tourists something to smile about, even if the Man-of-the-Match award went to Paul Collingwood for his 79 in a losing cause.

Winning the toss and batting on a perfect pitch, West Indies smashed 208 for 7 thanks to a blistering 61 from 34 balls from Devon Smith and a 26-ball half-century from Marlon Samuels that included one of the biggest hits ever seen at The Oval. And with the ball they didn't allow England to move out of second gear until it was too late -- Dwayne Smith reducing the tempo to perfection with 3 for 24. It was hard to believe that England were the side with heaps of Twenty20 know-how and West Indies were the novices.

England were behind the eight-ball at the half-time pause-for-breath. Poor bowling had let West Indies off the leash and allowed them to climb, for once, into the box seat, and they took full advantage. England started too slowly but Twenty20 is like a one-lap Formula One race -- get behind and there's no time to catch up.

There were moments of excitement for the 23,000 capacity crowd as the evening gloom descended. Matt Prior briefly looked dangerous, but their best hope was snuffed out when Kevin Pietersen was well beaten by a throw from third man to what appeared the safe non-striker's end.
