

Chained 'drug addicts'rescued, 2 clinics sealed in Khulna

A mobile court led by metropolitan magistrate Atiqul Haque yesterday sealed two clinics in Khulna city for treatment of drug addicts as they were being run without government approval.

The clinics are Drishti Clinie at Moilapotaundir and Sneho Clinic at Nirala.

The mobile court arrested owner of Drishti Clinice and rescued 20 drug addicts who were found tied up with iron chains there. This clinic is situated at.

The drug addicts found claimed in the two clinics were handed over to their guardians under supervision of police.

Leader of AL front held with arms in Barisal

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) yesterday arrested Azizur Rahman Shahin, convener of Barisal city Sechchasebak League and his associate Md. Hanif Howladar from Rupatali area of the city and recovered a pipe gun from their possession.

Sources in RAB-8 said, acting on a tip-off, law enforcers cordoned Rupatali grid sub-station area where they were holed up. Sensing, Rab presence, they tried to flee with a motorcycle but were caught after a chase.

RAB sources claimed that Shahin and Hanif were toll collectors and face accusations of terrorizing others.

Prepare CHT voter lists as per peace accord

Political, civil society leaders in hill dists demand

Indigenous and Bangali political leaders in Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT) belonging to different parties have demanded preparation of voter list in the three hill districts according to provisions of the CHT peace accord.

Signed in 1977, the accord provides for enrolment only of 'permanent residents' of the hills in any voter list.

The leaders opposed preparation of voter list by enrolling all eligible voters in CHT.

Sources said the Election Commission (EC) is planning to prepare voter lists in the CHT as per the Constitution, which allows enrolling all eligible voters.

The Daily Star Correspondents in Rangaamati and Khagrachhari talked to indigenous and Bangali political leaders on the issue. They said preparation of voter list by ignoring the CHT peace accord would be breach of trust with the people of CHT. The CHT peace treaty was signed between the then Awami League government and Parbatya Chattagram Jana

Sanghati Samity (PCJSS) which spearheaded the insurgency.

Some top leaders of PCJSS seeking anonymity said the peace treaty ended three decades of insurgency by ethnic people and established peace in the hills.

They said people in CHT have been demanding full implementation of the peace accord for consolidation of peace and development of the three hill districts but the two governments since signing of the accord did little in that direction. Preparation of the voter list by avoiding provisions of the peace accord would create a 'fresh source of tension' in the hills, the PCJSS leaders said.

The peace accord provides for preparation of voter list with only Bangali and indigenous people who are permanent residents of Rangamati, Bandarban and Khagrachhari hill districts for holding national and local body elections, they said.

District Awami League secretary Md. Selim Chowdhury said, "We demand full implementation of peace accord. Everything including preparation of electoral roll should be done as per provision of the accord".

He said peace in the hills is becoming fragile day by day as because the peace accord is yet to be implemented fully.

Civil society leader Nirmalendu Tripura said the peace accord was signed considering CHT as a special region, different from other areas of the country. The Election Commission should not ignore the peace accord, he said.

Dr. Nilukumar Tangchangya, a top leader of PCJSS and member of CHT Regional Council, said, "All people in CHT want proper implementation of CHT peace accord. There are some options in the Constitution also for welfare of ethnic people. So, government should follow it," Nilukumar added.

PCJSS leader Sadhuram Tripura in Bandarban said preparation of voter list by ignoring the peace accord would mean its violation, which will hurt the sentiment of permanent residents and spoil peace in hills.

Secretary of Upajatiya Samajik Forum Sukumar Dewan said the caretaker government should respect the peace accord as it was signed by a former government.

Bandarban district Awami

League president Prashannakumar Tangchangya said the caretaker government has taken some steps which have been appreciated by all sections of people.

When contacted, a high official at Khagrachhari district election office said, they would prepare the new voter list according to the Article 121 of the Constitution, which says, "There shall be one electoral roll for each constituency for the purposes of elections to parliament, and no special electoral roll shall be prepared so as to classify electors according to religion, race, caste or sex".

PCJSS leaders said Article 17 of Khagrachhari Parbataya Zilla Parishad Ain (act) also provides for enrolling only permanent residents in the voter list.

Kayas Mong, a PCJSS leader and Regional Council member from Bandarban said, "We heard about Election Commission (EC) decision. Neither the government nor the Election Commission (EC) talked to us in this regard".

PCJSS central leader and Regional Council Member Rupayon Dewan said, we have right to demand a voter list as per the peace accord.

Vow to resist violence against women, children

Over 800 people at a mass rally held at Alipur bazaar, a remote area in Sadar upazila yesterday, vowed to resist violence against women from society

The unique rally was represented by civil society members, teachers, farmers, businessmen and students. They also expressed their solidarity with the campaign against violence on women and children.

Later, a discussion on 'Creating Mass Awareness against Violence against Women and Children' was held at Alipur bazaar. Jointly organised by Centre for Women and Children (CWC), a Dhaka based NGO, and Biswas Foundation, a local NGO, the programme was financed by Australian High Commission.

Biswas Foundation Director Abdur Rahman was in the chair while Sadar Upazila Nirbahi Officer (UNO) H M Abdul Karim was present as chief guest.

Speakers urged all to come forward to eradicate all forms of violence against women and children.

They said that police officials

usually do not file cases as they are ignorant about laws relating to violence against children and women. As a result, the victims are being deprived of justice, they said. They also alleged that members of the law enforcement agencies do not investigate cases properly in exchange of bribe.

Mere enactment of law won't protect women and children from violence, they said adding incidents of such violence are increasing sharply due to this phenomenon. They said repression on women and children starts within family. So, it should be resisted in family by changing attitudes and values of family members, they said.

They called upon all irrespective of male and female members of the family to come forward to resist violence against women and children.

They urged the government and NGOs to work unitedly for welfare of women and children.

Interns call off strike at DMCH

Intern doctors at Dinajpur Medical College Hospital (DMCH) called off their strike yesterday following assurance by authorities to meet their two-point demand.

About 40 interns at DMCH went on strike Wednesday night after one of their colleagues was assaulted by outsiders.

Hospital sources said seven patients died and at least 300 others left the hospital during the strike.

After the strike was withdrawn, DMCH Superintendent and Dinajpur Civil Surgeon Dr. Azizur Rahman filed a case with local police station in connection with the assault of an intern doctor. But none was named as accused. None was arrested.

The interns' demands include arrest and punishment of the attackers.

On the night of June 26, relatives of a patient had hot exchange of words with intern doctor Dipankar Chakravarti at the hospital centring examination of the patient.

On the following evening, when Dipankar was going out of the hospital, he was beaten by relatives of the patient, triggering a strike by all interns.

Indigenous people demand separate land commission

Santal revolution day observed

Indigenous people, at a press conference held at Rajshahi Public Library auditorium in Rajshahi yesterday, demanded of the government a separate land commission for them.

Adivashi Unnayan Sangatha (AUS), an NGO, organised the press conference to mark the 152nd anniversary of Santal Hul (revolution).

AUS executive director Bhagabat Tudu read out a written statement on the occasion. He announced a three-day programme for Kakonhat and Rajshahi city.

The programmes included discussion, colourful rally, placing of wreath at the graves of Santal heroes, arrow throwing competition and drama depicting the life and culture of indigenous people.

The first day programme began at Kakonhat Sundurpur

village in Rajshahi yesterday with a vow to establish rights of indigenous people.

AUS will also award 'Sidhu-Kanu Award' after the names of two brothers, Sidhu and Kanu, who spearheaded the Santal Hul. The award giving ceremony will be held at 'Padma Mancho' in Rajshahi city on Monday.

At the press conference, the AUS executive director put forward various demands of indigenous people for an end to persecution on ethnic minorities so that they can ensure their right to practice their religion, language and culture independently.

AUS urged all the indigenous people of northern region to hold the programmes unitedly and peacefully.

Santal rebellion, the first ever uprising against the British colonial rule in 1855 and 1856, was an outburst of year-long neglect to the indigenous community.

One more jute worker dies

Sultana Kazi, 52, a worker of laid-off state-owned Crescent Jute Mill (CJM) died of stroke Friday night while under treatment in Khulna Medical College Hospital (KMCH).

He was admitted to the hospital on Thursday. The body was sent to Chakhar in Banaripara upazila in Barisal district for burial. He left behind his wife and four daughters.

According to his wife, authorities of Crescent Jute Mill did not pay his arrear wages and other dues amounting over Tk six lakh despite repeated appeals for treatment.

With Sultan Kazi, the number of workers of government jute who died in recent days rose to seven.

BSF abducts one in Satkhira
