

## Davydenko slams 'boring' Wimbledon

Nikolay Davydenko has joined his Russian Davis Cup teammate Marat Safin in criticising the way Wimbledon is run.

"Wimbledon is the world's most boring tournament," Davydenko told the Sovietsky Sport newspaper.

"There's hardly anything to do apart from tennis. You constantly find yourself yawning, there's no entertainment here."

The world number four has never found himself at ease on the slick grass courts at the All England Club, failing to progress beyond the second round in his five previous visits to London.

"We're staying in the city centre, so it's a bit better," said the Russian, who has made his breakthrough this year, coming from two sets down to beat Australia's Chris Guccione and reach the last 32 for the first time.

"If we rented a house near Wimbledon it would have been a total bore. There's absolutely nothing to do besides tennis."

Former world number one Safin was also highly critical of Wimbledon, complaining about the food prices and the security before he was knocked out by defending champion Roger Federer in the third round on Friday.

**Palermo close in on Miccoli**

Juventus-owned Fabrizio Miccoli could be unveiled as a Palermo player as early as Monday morning, according to reports.

The Sicilians have been tracking the 'pocket striker' for several weeks and newspapers suggest his transfer is ready to be completed.

Former Perugia and Fiorentina starlet Miccoli has spent the last two seasons on loan in Portugal with Benfica.

He made it clear he wanted a return to the peninsula, but after an initial interest in bringing him back to Juve, it seems Palermo promised a first team place.

It is claimed that the Rosanero have sealed an agreement worth just under £3.5m to take Miccoli to Sicily.

He will replace David Di Michele, who is expected to sign for Parma over the course of the summer.

Palermo are also said to be in advanced negotiations to hand defender Christian Terlizzi over to their local rivals Catania.

Franco Brienza is also in talks to make the move across Sicily to the Etnei.

**Hammers swoop for Faubert**

West Ham are set to sign rising French star Julien Faubert after his club Bordeaux issued him with an ultimatum, his agent said Sunday.

Faubert had been angling for a move to Rangers in Scotland but after the Ibrox giants failed to meet Bordeaux's asking price, the French outfit told Faubert to join West Ham, whether he likes it or not.

His agent Philippe Sol said West Ham had made a significantly higher bid for the 23-year-old French international, who can play in midfield or defence.

"He was given an ultimatum by Bordeaux: West Ham or nowhere," Sol told the Sunday Herald.

"They were no longer interested in talking with Rangers and after everything that went on with Julian last week there really wasn't a way back for him at Bordeaux."

## Raikkonen leads Ferrari one-two

**F**1 Kimi Raikkonen breathed some much-needed life into his world championship challenge by winning the French Grand Prix, heading a Ferrari one-two.

The 27-year-old Finn, who had not won since the opening round of the championship in Australia in March, started third but beat Britain's Lewis Hamilton off the line and then tailed his teammate Felipe Massa for the opening two points of the race.

But a series of lightning-fast laps just before his final pit-stop saw Raikkonen leap ahead of the Brazilian, who lost time in heavy traffic, and the pair then reeled off the rest of the laps, finishing 2.4 seconds apart at the finish.

Raikkonen's victory was his second since joining Ferrari and the 11th of his career and Ferrari's whitewash was their first since seven-time world champion Michael Schumacher retired from the sport at the end of last year.

Championship leader Hamilton,

who dropped to third at the start, pressured Raikkonen for the opening section of the race, but lost his chance of challenging the Finn when McLaren switched him onto a three-stop strategy.

The tactical gamble did nothing for his race but did not harm it either as he completed the podium – continuing his record of having never finished outside the top three in his short career and increasing his championship lead from ten points to 14.

The most exciting part of his race came on lap 37 as Robert Kubica passed him at Estoril as Hamilton exited the pits for the second time. The 22-year-old Rookie kept his foot in though and seized the place back at the Adelaide hairpin – the next corner.

Kubica, on his first race back after his horror crash in Canada, looked good on his way to fourth, but the main battles took place behind him and mostly involved Fernando Alonso.

After a McLaren gearbox problem in qualifying limited the world champion to tenth on the grid, Alonso started on the softer of the

two kinds of Bridgestone tyre on offer, hoping to charge up through the field early on.

He moved up to seventh on lap two, scything inside Nico Rosberg's Williams, but then became stuck behind Nick Heidfeld's BMW Sauber, briefly going by into the Lycee only to run wide and surrender the place.

A gamble to pit him early did not pay off and he lost a place to Giancarlo Fisichella's Renault at the first round of pit-stops, forcing him to make a do-or-die move on the Italian at Adelaide, which only came off at the third time of asking.

He quickly latched back onto Heidfeld's tail and produced one of the moves of the season to get by, nosing ahead at the 130 mph Imola sweep, forcing the German to cede the position or crash.

Fifth, or even fourth, looked to be Alonso's for the taking, but two off-track excursions after his final stop lost him all the time he had previously made up and allowed Heidfeld and Fisichella back past to fifth and sixth.

Behind Alonso the final point

## Venezuela create history Uruguay turn it around

Hosts Venezuela secured only their second ever win in the Copa America with a 2-0 victory over ten-man Peru, while Uruguay came back strongly in the tournament with a 1-0 win over Bolivia.

Second-half goals from Alejandro Cichero and substitute Daniel Arismendi were enough to give hosts Venezuela the points in a stormy encounter.

The game burst into life after just 14 minutes when Pedro Garcia was sent off for an alleged elbowing on Giancarlos Maldonado.

Peru held on until half-time but Venezuela broke the deadlock four minutes after the restart with Cichero heading home from a corner.

Peru almost caught Venezuela cold seconds later when Paolo Guerrero burst through on goal only to hit his shot against the post.

Peru had strong penalty claims waved away just past the hour mark when Hector Gonzalez appeared to trip Claudio Pizarro inside the box.

Venezuela were reduced to ten

men 12 minutes from time when Ricardo Paez was dismissed for a second bookable offence after a heavy tackle by Pablo Garcia.

The home side made the game safe a minute later when Arismendi beat a defender and fired in a shot from the edge of the box.

The game ended on a sour note with scuffles breaking out between both sets of players after some showboating from Venezuela's Cichero.

Vicente Sanchez's second-half goal was enough to give Uruguay a vital win as they bounced back from their opening defeat to Peru.

Both sets of players appeared to struggle in the rain-soaked conditions as both sides were guilty of giving away possession all too easily on numerous occasions.

Bolivia suffered a blow on 28

minutes when Ronald Garcia was forced off through injury after a second bookable offence after a heavy tackle by Pablo Garcia.

The best chance of the first half came right on the stroke of half-time when Uruguay caught Bolivia with a rapid counter attack as Cristian Rodriguez burst clear on goal, but goalkeeper Sergio Galarza was quickly off his line to block Rodriguez getting a shot in on goal.

Bolivia had a half chance three minutes after the restart when Ronald Raldes got on the end of a corner from Moreno only to flash his effort wide of the target.

Uruguay had strong penalty claims turned down on 53 minutes when Rodriguez went down in the box under a challenge from Raldes.

Uruguay broke the deadlock on 58 minutes with Vicente Sanchez

scoring from close-range.

Diego Perez got down right and crossed into the box for Diego Forlan who touched the ball goalwards where Sanchez was on hand to poke the ball home from six yards out.

The goal lifted Uruguay and Forlan tried his luck with an ambitious shot from fully 35 yards after spotting Galarza off his line, but the goalkeeper got back to smother the striker's effort.

Bolivia almost grabbed an equaliser in the dying seconds when Sacha Lima fired in a fierce shot from the edge of the box which Fabian Carini superbly tipped round the post.

Carini came to Uruguay's rescue again right at the death when he was quickly off his line to block Gualberto Mojica's close-range effort.

The world number two won her last match against Williams, on the hard courts in Miami this year, but admits that victory will count for nothing if they meet again at Wimbledon.

"I felt like at that stage in my career I wasn't really ready," Sharapova said.

"She played really good tennis and I didn't think that I was capable of playing the same tennis for two or three sets. I was down in the first, then when I got back my level really dropped.

"It wasn't so much a wake-up call. I've always known there was so much room for improvement physically for me, but it was also the intensity level of putting two games together, breaking her and keeping that intensity after you break your opponent, being smart about things.

"Sometimes I felt like I was going for a little too much when I didn't have to. Against someone like her, you don't get away with it as much. That's something that I've

never really underestimated her as an opponent. She's a champion. She's achieved many things, won many Grand Slams. You know that when you go out against her, you always have to be at your best."

If Sharapova does face Williams, she will hope the shoulder and hamstring injuries that have troubled her for several weeks have receded.

She revealed she needs lengthy treatment every day to keep her in

## Federer gets Haas bye

Four-time champion Roger Federer of Switzerland was on Sunday handed a bye to the quarterfinals of Wimbledon when fourth-round opponent Tommy Haas was forced to pull out through injury.

Haas, the 13th seed, suffered a torn abdominal muscle in his fourth set victory over Russian Dmitry Tursunov in the third round at the All England Club.

World number one Federer will play the winner of the match between Spain's Juan Carlos Ferrero and Serb Janko Tipsarevic in the last eight as he bids for a fifth straight Wimbledon title, equaling the modern-day record of Bjorn Borg.

"I felt it in my previous match," Haas explained.

"I'm just going to go home now and get this thing under control. I will follow the rest of the tournament on TV."

"I wish I could have been on Centre Court but it's not to be. The way I was playing I think I'm one of the guys who could have been dangerous for Roger. It would have been a nice opportunity."

This was Haas' first tournament since retiring in the opening round of the Masters Series event in Rome in May with a shoulder injury.

The 29-year-old has been plagued by injury problems, missing Wimbledon in 2002 and the whole of 2003 with shoulder injuries.
