

# Robinho fires for Brazil

## Mexico in quarterfinals

Robinho scored a hattrick as Brazil kept their Copa America hopes alive with a 3-0 victory over Chile in Maturin on Sunday evening.

After losing their opening game to Mexico, Dunga's side bounced back to the Real Madrid star, but only made sure of the points late in the game.

The Brazilians took the lead after 35 minutes when Miguel Rizzo was adjudged to have fouled Robinho in the box and the striker despatched the resulting penalty past Claudio Bravo despite the goalkeeper's best efforts.

The 52,000-capacity stadium, built in less than one year, was ruled fit to stage the games even though it was clearly not ready.

The area around the arena was a sea of mud strewn with building materials and piles of debris. Inside, dust covered the seats and more debris was piled into corners.

Despite the result, Brazil were far from convincing for most of the game and spared by poor Chilean finishing in the second half.

Brazil struggled to find a way through Chile's packed defence early on and Robinho, apart from a couple of trademark steppovers, saw little of the ball.

Chile wasted opportunities to equalise and were not helped by the fact coach Nelson Acosta was forced to replace injured duo Rodrigo Melendez and Rizzo, while Brazil midfielder Elano was also forced out of the contest.

However, Brazil wrapped up the

game on 83 minutes when Vagner Love fed Robinho and the 23-year-old clinically beat Bravo.

Four minutes later, Robinho eluded three Chile defenders to complete his treble and draw level with Paraguay's Roque Santa Cruz as the tournament's top-scorer.

Both sides finish their Group B campaigns on Wednesday in Puerto La Cruz as Brazil meet Ecuador and Chile play Mexico.

Nery Castillo and Omar Bravo were on target as Mexico qualified for the quarterfinals of the Copa America thanks to a 2-1 win over Ecuador.

After opening their Group B account with an unexpected 2-0 victory over Brazil, Hugo Sanchez's side proved too strong for the Ecuadorians and booked their place in the last eight.

Castillo took advantage of some ordinary defending to open the scoring after 21 minutes with his second of the tournament.

Ecuador went in search of an equaliser but found it hard to break down a determined Mexican rear-guard despite controlling the majority of possession.

# Federer the exception

Four-time champion Roger Federer could afford to relax and watch the pretenders to his Wimbledon throne play catch-up on Monday as All England Club chiefs hoped for an end to the torrential rain which played havoc with the first week.

Top seed Federer was handed a free pass to the quarter-finals when fourth round opponent Tommy Haas pulled out with a stomach injury.

In stark contrast, second seed Rafael Nadal has yet to play his

third round match after his scheduled clash with Sweden's Robin Soderling was one of the matches which was washed away in Saturday's deluge.

Federer won't play again until Wednesday while the Spaniard, the runner-up to the world number one last year, faces the prospect of three matches in three days.

Women's top seed Justine Henin, who has yet to win a Wimbledon title, opens Centre Court action with a fourth round clash against experienced Swiss Patty Schnyder.

Play on the two main show courts was brought forward by two hours on Monday in an effort to clear the backlog after Saturday's rain -- but the weather frustrated

organisers once more with showers forcing players to kick their heels in the locker rooms for over an hour.

Only two matches were completed in the 75 minutes of action seen on Saturday -- and the washout cost tournament organisers an estimated one million pounds (two million dollars) in ticket refunds.

Also in action on Monday are former women's champions Venus and Serena Williams while, in the men's event, 2002 winner Lleyton Hewitt takes on Guillermo Canas in his delayed third round match.

Meanwhile, security was stepped up around Wimbledon in the wake of the attempted car bomb attacks in Glasgow and London.

### DANONE NATIONS CUP Bangladesh win Fair Play trophy

Bangladesh won the "Best Fair Play Team" trophy in Danone Nations Cup 2007 which concluded in Lyon, France on Sunday.

### Police quiz Wiltord

French international striker Sylvain Wiltord was briefly questioned by police on Monday in connection with a road-traffic violation, police said.

The 33-year-old player was detained by Lyon road traffic police, but was later released after being questioned and he returned to the training ground.

A Lyon official told AFP that the player had been caught speeding in a car several times and had failed to respond to police charges.

The L'Equipe website said that several months ago Wiltord was clocked driving at 135 kilometres an hour in a 50 kilometres an hour traffic zone.

The 33-year-old player has been in dispute with Lyon, the reigning French champions, over disciplinary matters for the last few months and his future at the club had been in doubt.

The former Arsenal striker appeared before a Lyon disciplinary committee on May 14 to answer charges that he had broken club rules.

# Venus's date with Maria

Triple champion Venus Williams set up a potentially explosive Wimbledon fourth round showdown with

Maria Sharapova on Monday as women's tennis unveiled a new teenage talent.

Former triple champion Williams won the last four games of her third round clash with Akiko Morigami of Japan to move into the fourth round with a 6-2, 3-6, 7-5 win.

But the American had to battle hard on the dreaded Court Two.

Morigami, who converted just four of 23 break points, had the chance to serve out the match in the eighth game of the final set in a tie which had been suspended from Saturday because of the rain.

Williams's clash with Sharapova will be a repeat of their 2005 semi-final when the American relieved the defending champion of her title.

By the time the 23rd seed had wrapped up her third round encounter, top seed Justine Henin was already back in the locker room having secured her

quarterfinal place by brushing aside Switzerland's Patty Schnyder 6-2, 6-2.

The world number one, bidding to win the only Grand Slam title to have eluded her, will face either Serena Williams or Daniela Hantuchova for a place in the semifinals.

"I was surprised the match was so quick," said Henin after her 56-minute Centre Court outing.

"They were very tough conditions with the wind in the court. But I am doing my job perfectly and I concentrate on fighting hard for every point."

Austria's 16-year-old Tamira Paszek shocked Russian 12th seed Elena Dementieva, a quarterfinalist last year, 3-6, 6-2, 6-3, to reach the fourth round on her Wimbledon debut.

The teenager had lost the first set when play was halted on Saturday.

Paszek, coached by Larri Passos who took Gustavo Kuerten to three French Open titles, now faces former US Open winner Svetlana Kuznetsova for a place in the last eight.

Fifth seed Kuznetsova saw off Agnieszka Radwanska of Poland 6-2, 6-3 and Czech 14th seed Nicole Vaidisova defeated Victoria

Azarenka of Belarus 6-4, 6-2.

Vaidisova meets defending champion Amelie Mauresmo for a quarterfinal spot while Russian 11th seed Nadia Petrova, who saw off Spain's Virginia Ruano-Pascual 6-3, 7-6 (7/3), goes on to face French Open finalist Ana Ivanovic.

The Serbian sixth seed made sure of her place in the last 16 by beating Aravane Rezaei of France 6-3, 6-2.

Serena Williams was 1-1 with Hantuchova in the first set of their fourth round tie when heavy rain, which has plagued the championships, returned to send the players off court.

Later Monday, if the rain relents, Serbian third seed Jelena Jankovic faces France's Marion Bartoli in the fourth round with the winner to face either Michaela Krajicek or Laura Granville for a semifinal place.

Meanwhile, security was stepped up around Wimbledon in the wake of the attempted car bomb attacks in Glasgow and London with even the players unable to drive into the grounds.

A police helicopter hovered above the venue in south-west London while all entrances were protected by a series of vehicle-blocking concrete slabs to foil similar attacks.

# Money doesn't lure Tamira

Sixteen-year-old Tamira Paszek marked her debut Wimbledon on Monday by reaching the fourth round but insisted that the 100,000 dollars she has already pocketed means nothing.

Paszek stunned Russian 12th seed Elena Dementieva 3-6, 6-2, 6-3 to set up a quarterfinal clash with another Russian Svetlana Kuznetsova and guarantee the biggest pay cheque of her young career.

"I don't play for the money," said the American. "I play for the love of the game. It's so much fun for me. I have enough time to make money. I need to develop my game and keep working hard on myself. If that improves, the money will be there later on."

Paszek, the world number 54, is getting used to causing shocks.

When she won the 2006 Portoroz tournament, she became the seventh youngest champion of all time and the lowest-ranked champion at 259.

In the run-up to the Wimbledon, she pushed former champion Maria Sharapova to three sets in the Birmingham event to give Dementieva notice of her ability.

# Arsenal sign Da Silva

Arsenal have signed striker Eduardo da Silva on a four-year deal from Croatian side Dinamo Zagreb to boost their strike-force following the transfer of Thierry Henry to Real Madrid.

The fee was believed to be around six million pounds (8.8 million euros).

The 24-year-old was born in Brazil, but having moved to Europe at the age of 15, he took Croatian nationality in 2002.

Da Silva scored the first competitive goal at Emirates Stadium when the Gunners beat Dinamo during last season's Champions League third qualifying round in late August.

He has also scored seven goals in 12 appearances for Croatia - including one against England during the 2-0 Euro 2008 qualifier victory in Zagreb last October.

Manager Arsene Wenger had been keen to recruit a proven goalscorer, with Newcastle duo Obafemi Martins and Michael Owen reported to be on his shopping list.

However, the Gunners boss is now likely to turn his attentions to defensive cover following the signing of da Silva, who finished the Croatian season as their top scorer with a record 34 goals.

# Robben Real-bound

Dutch winger Arjen Robben is to quit Premiership giants Chelsea for Real Madrid, who will shell out 20 million euros (26 million dollars) on the wily, Spanish media said Monday.

"Green light for Robben," trumpeted AS sports daily, quoting chairman Ramon Calderon as saying that "we need a director of the orchestra."

AS said at the weekend that Liga champions Real had struck an agreement in London with Robben's father and agent, and were waiting only on Chelsea's acceptance.

Robben is currently in negotiations with Chelsea over a contract extension until 2012 but has not always been in favour with the club's Portuguese coach Jose Mourinho, who AS said has now reconciled himself to the transfer.

AS said Mourinho would replace Robben, 23, with France midfielder Florent Malouda, who is widely expected to quit French champions Fabregas.
