## Bangladesh eves leave for ACC tournament

UNB, Dhaka

An 18-member Bangladesh women's cricket team left for Bangkok yesterday on way to Malaysia where they will participate in the first ever ACC Women's Cricket Tournament from July 11. Tazkia Akter is leading the Bangladeshi eves, who are expected to play two limited-overs preparation matches in the Thailand capital on July 6 and 7.

The team, including four officials, will leave Bangkok for Malaysian city of Johor Baru on July 9.

Bangladesh are placed in Group B with United Arab Emirates, Singapore and China while Group A comprises Hong Kong, Nepal, Thailand and hosts Malaysia.

Bangladesh will play UAE on the opening day, Singapore on July 13 and China on July 15.

The semi-finals are scheduled for July 17 and the final on July 18.

## Mahela sceptic

When all the praises showered on Mohammad Ashraful at the end of the second Test for his brilliant unbeaten hundred, Sri Lankan skipper Mahela Jayawardene however reminded everybody that despite that the match was finished within three days.

"Ashraful's unbeaten 129 was the best knock under the conditions but Bangladesh were not under pressure then. They probably knew the outcome and Ashraful just played himself in. But you don't forget that the match finished within three days. Don't you think there is need for more competitiveness in Test cricket?" responded Jayawardene in his own way after his Bangladesh counterpart took the limelight.

He was also critical over the position of Mohammad Ashraful who batted at number six.

"The thing is Ashraful batted at number six. When you do that the side is gone and I must say the best player should be batting up in the order and take more responsibilities. But the credit should go to Ashraful and the other guys."

Not surprised by Bangladesh's fightback in second innings of the both games, he said, "We knew they have the talent. Even in the first Test's second innings their top order batted really well. It was for us to create pressure and opportunities. When we do that we get wickets but sometimes when we don't get those half chances going our way and not creating opportunities you have to be patient and wait for it to happen," he said.

Despite the comfortable series victory he said that they are always trying to improve in every game and looking forward to the third and final Test.

"If you are not put under pressure it's quite easy for us to take things easy. But if we focus on us improving ourselves challenging individually to be better cricketers, we will always push ourselves to

## Ash on an Ash day

On his day Mohammad Ashraful is as good as any batsman in the world. And there was no exception yesterday when the pocket-sized dynamo struck his fourth Test hundred on the third day of the second Test against Sri Lanka at the P Sara Stadium.

Ashraful on song is a delight for cricketers and spectators alike. His unbeaten 129, though in a lost cause, was certainly something to behold. However, the problem is that it has rarely happened during the talented right-hander's six-year career. After a duck in the first innings, Ashraful with this brilliant innings also answered back to the critics who believe that Bangladesh are an ugly sister in the elite Test family.

True, Bangladesh still crashed to a heavy defeat of an innings and 90 runs, but his effort in company with young wicketkeeper Mushfiqur Rahim, who put on a record 191 runs for the sixth wicket with his captain, gave the evidence that Bangladesh can make the five-day game meaningful.

Understandably the new

Bangladesh skipper was not a happy man at the end following his side's huge defeat but he said that his team at least gained something before the third and final Test at Kandy from July 11.

"As a batsman I might be happy but as a captain it is not a day for me to cheer. My partnership with Mushfiqur just gave the impression that we have the ability to play better cricket in the longer-version," said Ashraful, who was tremendously under pressure to deliver in his first assignment as skipper.

The 22-year-old became the first Bangladeshi batsman to score four Test hundreds, three against Sri Lanka, but he said that it could have been much better.

"It should have been more than four. I am not satisfied with the number. I'm now hungry for more because I believe that I have got the quality to contribute more for my country," said Ashraful, who also holds the record of the highest individual score by a Bangladeshi (158 not out India at Chittagong).

"I was desperately looking for a big score to silence the critics who thought captaincy put a burden on me as a batsman," he said.

Ashraful also informed that he always loved to play the Lankan bowlers and that's why he scored

maximum hundreds including his maiden one on Test debut at the Sinhalese Sports Club ground in 2001.

"I love their bowling. I can easily pick Murali. Besides, they create a lot of noises all around which gave me special inspiration to do something better. I played a couple of bad shots today otherwise I felt like could do everything I wanted to do," said the stylish batsman, who scored 114 and 136 against Sri Lanka before yesterday's success.

He also urged the millions of fans to keep faith on the team.

"We have been trying our best to play the Test cricket as it should be played. We have failed at times but I request everybody to be patient because it is impossible to do anything overnight. We need some time to get the reward of our hard work," he hoped.

"It could have been fantastic had we pushed the game into the fourth day. I think Mushfiqur's dismissal spoiled everything but I must praise his effort. What a fantastic knock it was! The way he played was not so common in our cricket and he just took the pressure off me. My intention was not

## India given lone warm-up game in Australia

India will play just one practice game before the first match of a four-Test cricket series against Australia starting December 26 here.

The visitors will play a three-day game against Victoria, from December 20 at the St Kilda Cricket Ground, to warm-up for the first Test, Cricket Australia said in a statement yesterday.

The three-day match is the only chance the Indians will get to adapt to local conditions before the traditional Boxing Day Test.

The Indians will round out the Test series with matches in Sydney, Perth and Adelaide from January 2 to 24.

In between the Sydney and Perth Test, India will play a three-day match against an Australian Capital Territory Invitational XI at Manuka Oval in Canberra from January 10.

The two teams will then clash in the Commonwealth Bank ODI tri-series, also involving Sri Lanka, from February 3.

Rahul Dravid's men will take on the hosts in the series-opener at the Gabba.

Prior to the Test series against India, Australia will face Sri Lanka

## Shiv ton suffices WI

Shivnarine Chanderpaul's unbeaten century set up West Indies' 61-run win against England in the second one-day international (ODI) at Edgbaston here Wednesday.

Left-hander Chanderpaul, batting at No 3, made 116 not out in a total of 278 for five after West Indies, who levelled the three-match series at 1-1, lost the toss.

England set 279 to win, were bowled out for 217 with four overs to spare. Fast bowler Ravi Rampaul led the attack with four for 41.

Chanderpaul had moved up from No 5 after top-scoring for the West Indies with 53 not out during their 79-run defeat in Sunday's series opener at Lord's.

Together with Marlon Samuels, dropped on 14 by Paul Collingwood, the England captain, off his own bowling on his way to 77, Chanderpaul put on 175 for the third wicket in 34 overs.

"I thought it paid off, moving him up the order," West Indies captain Chris Gayle told reporters after stumps.

"He batted right throughout the innings, it was tremendous. That

partnership between him and Marlon really put us back in the game."

Collingwood added of Chanderpaul: "He's been very hard to dislodge all the way through this trip."

"He seems to like English conditions. Give him a lot of credit, he's produced an excellent performance again."

However, England appeared to have weakened their bowling significantly by omitting Monty Panesar. This left them without a frontline spin bowler (Panesar's replacement Michael Yardy was given just six overs) which meant their attack lacked both variety and control.

England were 30 for two inside seven overs after Alastair Cook holed out to mid-off against Daren Powell and Ian Bell, on his Warwickshire home ground, was lbw to Rampaul although the ball appeared to be going over the top.

Matt Prior and Kevin Pietersen played some typically aggressive shots as England reached fifty.

But when dangerous Pietersen was out for nine, bowled middle-stump by Rampaul as he aimed legside, England were 64 for three.

Prior completed a 71 ball-fifty, his first at this level, with one six and three fours.

But two balls later, on 52, he

chipped Daren Powell to Devon Smith, running round from mid-wicket in gathering gloom.

Eight balls afterwards England were 117 for five. Collingwood, who'd just avoided a Fidel Edwards bouncer the previous delivery, was lbw for one to a full-length ball from the quick in an intelligent piece of bowling.

Owais Shah and Yardy shared a stand of 54 without threatening the run-rate before the latter pulled Dwayne Bravo to Dwayne Smith at deep square leg.

And the game was up for England when, five balls later, 171 for six became 172 for seven after Shah, on 45, edged a pull off Rampaul to wicket-keeper Denesh Ramdin.

Earlier, Chanderpaul's hundred was only his seventh in 219 ODIs.

The 32-year-old Guyanese had been a thorn in England's side during the hosts 3-0 Test series success, averaging 148.66, and this was another example of his ability to pace an innings after he took 10 balls to get off the mark.

In all he faced 122 balls with three sixes and 10 fours.

But Chanderpaul was unable to field after straining a right ankle ligament.

## Russel fluff again

Sheikh Russel's slim title hope was further dented yesterday when they slumped to their third consecutive draw in the B. League, sharing points with Arambagh in a scoreless draw at the Bangabandhu National Stadium.

## Miandad's advice to PCB

Former Pakistan skipper Javed Miandad has suggested that Pakistan Cricket Board should utilise money for strengthening the grassroots level cricket rather than wasting it on hiring foreign coaches.

"If your base is strong, things will automatically improve in our cricket set-up. There is no shortage of talent at all. Australia is number one because their base is strong and they have never depended on foreign coaches."

"They have opted to strengthen their own coaching system in the country. Why can not we do the same," Miandad told PTI.

Miandad, who played 124 tests, said if foreign coaches were indeed a sure shot recipe for success than Day Whatmore would have achieved wonders with the Bangladesh cricket team.

"He was with them (Bangladesh) for more than four years
