



## Mahbub Anam's sixth death anniversary today

Today is the sixth death anniversary of eminent journalist and author Mahbub Anam, former editor of the now-defunct Bangladesh Times, says a press release.

In a distinguished career as a journalist, he also served as a senior executive of the then Pakistan Observer, senior vice-president of Bangladesh Editors' Council and was actively involved with Bangladesh Sangbad Patrika Parishad, Bangladesh Press Council and Bangladesh Sangbad Sangstha Porichalona Board.

For his contribution to journalism, he received Swadhinata Padak, Shere-Bangla Gold Medal, Moulana Akram Khan Gold Medal, Kaloddhani Padak and Tribhuj Gold Medal.

Besides, during his long and successful professional career, Mahbub Anam also served as the general manager of Jamuna Oil Company and director of Bangladesh Petroleum Corporation.

He was actively involved in politics from his student life. In addition to being the general secretary of Salimullah Muslim Hall of Dhaka University in 1954-55, he was appointed acting publication secretary of the Jukt Front on behalf of the Awami League in 1954.

Mahbub Anam actively took part in the Language Movement in 1952. He was jailed several times for his role in the movement as general secretary of Tamaddun Majlis, Mymensingh unit, joint secretary of Rashtraresha Sangram Parishad and general secretary of Salimullah Muslim Hall.

In recognition of his contribution to the Language Movement, he was awarded 'Bhasha Andoloner Bir Sainik Padak' by President Ziaur Rahman and Matrihasha Padak (posthumously) by Tamaddun Majlis.

Mahbub Anam authored a number of books on the cultural and political identity of Bangladesh, including 'Amra Bangladeshi Amra Bangali' and 'Itihaser Shikriti Banam Bikriti'. He also served as the president of Nattyamancha Bangladesh and Bangladesh Sahitya Sangskrit Kendra and was actively involved with Bangladesh Film Censor Board and Bangladesh Public Library Special Committee.

He was the second son of eminent litterateur, journalist and politician late Abul Mansur Ahmad and elder brother of Mahfuz Anam, editor and publisher of The Daily Star and publisher of the Prothom Alo.

On the occasion of his death anniversary, fateha will be offered at his grave at Banani and Qurankhwani and milad mahfil will be held at his Dhamondi residence in the city.

## Promote cross-border mobility to check human trafficking

### Speakers tell seminar

Restrictions on cross-border mobility for workers should be relaxed to prevent human trafficking, speakers said at a seminar yesterday.

Terminating human trafficking a 'commercial issue', former adviser to the caretaker government and Executive Director of Ain O Salish Kendra Advocate Sultana Kamal said, 'Trafficking now has become a worldwide phenomenon which is driven by globalisation. If the labour market were flexible, women and children would not have been victimised in such a massive scale.'

In her keynote speech, Sayeda Fayeza Mamta, director of the organisation, depicted the grievances of the trafficked women and

cacy meeting at national level on prevention of human trafficking and reducing violence against women' as the chief guest. Mukti Nari-O-Shishu Unnayan Sangstha organised the advocacy meeting at National Press Club in the city with its Executive Director Mamta Rumi in the chair.

The organisation, an NGO that is based in Kushtia, Meherpur and Chuadanga, runs a shelter home for the rehabilitation of trafficked women and has built a network with other organisations for legal aid.

In her keynote speech, Sayeda Fayeza Mamta, director of the organisation, depicted the grievances of the trafficked women and

children and insisted on punitive actions against the criminals.

Citing the examples of ASEAN and EU countries where cross-border mobility has significantly increased, Advocate Sultana Kamal laid emphasis on regional advocacy in South Asia.

'Poverty remains the major driving force behind women and children trafficking and these segments of the community are sometimes lured by small criminal rings or organised gangs of traffickers,' she said.

Participants from different NGOs pointed out a number of reasons behind human trafficking. The list was topped by negligence

or leniency of the law enforcers to the traffickers.

Professor Ishrat Shamim, chairman, Centre for Women and Children, said, 'Things are clearly moving ahead'. She apprised the discussants of the monitoring cell in home ministry and police headquarters, who are keeping records of trafficking. She also cited some irregularities in documentation and said that the number of missing children is almost equal to the number of children who were trafficked.

Besides, she stressed on strengthening the monitoring and follow-ups involving village police and community since examples were not few where the trafficked women turn 'traffickers'.

Aroma Dutta, executive director of Prip Trust, said human trafficking got institutionalised in border areas because of people's lack of access to resources. She insisted on addressing the issue of 'organ trade' too.

Executive Editor of the daily Janakantha Borhanuddin Ahmed underscored the need for concerted efforts of the organisations that are working with the same motive and asked the bodies concerned to look into the matters relating to physically and mentally challenged women and children.

Taslimur Rahman, executive director, Bangladesh Legal Aid and Services Trust (BLAST), and Mohammad Kabir Hossain, secretary, Bangladesh Institute of Labour Studies, also spoke on the occasion.

## New fertiliser distribution system from next season

Agriculture Adviser Dr C S Karim yesterday said the government is to introduce a new fertiliser distribution system from next season stretching the network to union level.

"Fertiliser will be distributed directly from unions... and for transparency in fertiliser management, registers would be maintained at dealers' shops and farmers would be given cards," he said while addressing a meeting at the conference room of Rajshahi Deputy Commissioner in the afternoon.

He asked officials concerned especially in the district administrations and agriculture to supervise and monitor the entire system with utmost

'Fresh dealers will be appointed from among the locals at union level so that a dealer can have both the opportunities, to serve his neighbours as well as to have business,' he added.

Dr Karim, also a nuclear scientist, informed that steps towards introducing the new system are already complete and necessary instructions were given after series of surveys and researches.

He asked officials concerned especially in the district administrations and agriculture to supervise and monitor the entire system with utmost

dedication to make it a success.

"Buffer stocks will be built up in old districts for helping those areas that are yet to have buffer godowns," he added.

The adviser asked the officials to enforce their highest power given by the law of the land to prevent smuggling of agricultural inputs, adulterated fertilisers and pesticides.

About reaching Tk 750 crore subsidies on diesel, he said those farmers, who are using diesel-run irrigation machines, would be given the subsidy directly through cards.

These cards will be distributed among the farmers in open meetings at union councils after proper scrutiny by union parishad members, chairmen, block supervisors and upazila administration, he added.

Dr Karim called for training and motivation of farmers for balanced use of fertilisers.

He instructed officials to empower farmers by ensuring their direct access to markets.

"Introduce farmers' markets at every district to fight middlemen who are eating up their benefits," he added.

He also gave order for taking all measures to control prices of essentials during the Ramadan.

Rajshahi Divisional Commissioner Mohammad Shahiful Alam chaired the meeting which was attended by Agriculture Secretary M Abdul Aziz and Director General of agricultural extension department (DAE) Abdul Barai.

Deputy commissioners, DAE deputy directors and forest officials from 16 northern districts were present at the meeting.

## Qureshi for placing six nat'l leaders' portraits at govt & private offices

### New party to emerge in Dec likely

Initiator of a new political party Dr Ferdous Ahmed Qureshi yesterday called for placing portraits of six national leaders at all government and private offices to inspire new generations to contribute to nation-building activities.

Addressing a press conference at the daily Desh Bangla office at Segunbagicha in the city, Qureshi described Sher-e-Bangla AK Fazlul Haque, Hossain Shahid, Shuhrawardy, Moulana Abdul Hamid Khan, Bhashani, Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Rahman, president Ziaur Rahman and Gen (retd) Ataul Gani Osmani as national leaders and the symbol of 'national unity'.

Qureshi said he has been working to form a new political party since the last one and a half months and would finish the task in phases.

He said the new party would be declared from a national convention, which is likely to be held in December once the ban on indoor politics is lifted.

He also expressed the hope that around 45,000 councilors would join the convention.

Qureshi said the new party would nominate candidates in all the 300 parliamentary constituencies.

Former minister Kazi Firoz Rashid Chowdhury, former state minister Abul Hasan Chowdhury, former lawmaker Tazul Islam, Moulana Sakhat Hossain, Col (retd) HMA Gaffar, Kamruzzaman Zafar and Abu Sayeed Khokon were present at the press conference.

According to the case filed with Tejgaon Police Station on June 26, Huda called Wahidur Rahman Azad, a contractor of the Roads and Highways (R&H) Department, to BSEHR (Bangladesh Society for Enforcement of Human Rights) office in February 2003 and demanded Tk 10 lakh in cash.

Huda also gave an alternative to Azad, asking him to construct a conference room for the organisation.

Azad said he agreed to build the conference room due to continuous pressure from Huda and it cost him Tk 5.5 lakh.

On completion of the work in three months, Azad demanded the money he spent for the work from Huda, Sigma and Alena.

They threatened to create problem in getting his payments from the R&H department if he demanded the money, alleged the plaintiff.

Huda is a member of the national committee of the BSEHR, Sigma is its secretary general and Alena Khan is its executive director.

According to the first information report (FIR) of another case filed with Shahbagh Police Station on the same date, Huda and his wife gave the plaintiff a verbal instruction to construct a boundary wall and a one-storey building for the BSEHR on College Road.

Later, Azad got a work order through a letter signed by Alena Khan on July 7, 2005 and completed the work at a cost of Tk 41.26 lakh.

In the case, Alena alleged that Aman demanded Tk 2 crore for winning him the work of

## A fascinating way of taking children closer to nature

The cheers of hundreds of children in the small auditorium of Viqarunnisa Noon School in the city yesterday drowned the hi-tech surround sound as they swayed to the captivating music of a snake charmer on the stage.

Born and brought up in the urban concrete jungle of the capital, most of these five to 10-year-old children had no previous experience of watching mystical dance of a female snake charmer.

So it was a little surprise that they were so mesmerised by the dance of a snake charmer right in front of them.

Everyday, they get up in the morning with the harsh jingle of crows and do not hear the sweet jingles of Doel or cuckoo in a calm and quiet dawn. They never know that frogs shout all the night at waterlogged lands after heavy rains.

In a bid to provide the little students with information about animals helping maintain nature's balance, Manimal Team, a production of Yes Media Presentation, launched a campaign with the help of living animals.

Similar shows will also be arranged at 100 schools in the city.

The team led by Sohel Hossain held colourful presentations on tortoise, fog, snake, earthworm, house lizard, mouse, cat and other neglected animals.

"All these neglected animals are constantly making our lives easy. We are afraid of them and often turn our nose up at them, but most

of us do not care about their contributions to maintaining balance in nature," said a team member.

"We are so cruel to them that we even do not think of them even for once before smashing them under our shoes and by doing this we become ungrateful. If we can only look at them with little sympathy and try to love them that do not deserve much effort, we can show our humanity and by doing this we can help maintain balance in our own planet," said Sohel.

"I love this show. My parents take me to village in Bogra in every vacation so that I can run in the field and come across the nature. I have seen these animals in the village, but never thought that I could see them here," said Taslima Jannat Rimi, a class four student.

Noted artiste Shampa Reza, adviser to Yes Media Presentation, said in this urban society, children live in a concrete jungle from where the nature is far away. They are living without having any touch of nature and green. Day by day, they are becoming robotic and gloomy minded, she added.

"I tell the children that we should take lesson even from an ant or a snake. Against the backdrop of current volatile situation prevailing across the world and in our country, we should think who is better, man or these neglected animals," said Shampa.

"I also tell all parents to teach their children, who are the next generation, to love the nature," she added.
