

Tuku, family indicted for graft

Detained former state minister for power Iqbal Hassan Mahmood Tuku along with his family was indicted yesterday by a special judge's court for corruption.

The court fixed July 23 for commencing their trial on charge of possessing ill-gotten wealth.

On March 21, the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) filed the case accusing Tuku along with his wife, son and daughter of amassing wealth worth over Tk 4.96 crore, "disproportionate to their known sources of income".

The detained family members of Tuku — his wife Romana Hassan Mahmood, son Abed

Hassan Mahmood and daughter Sarah Hassan Mahmood were brought before the court amid tight security.

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BB's monetary policy to help check inflation

Says IMF suggesting energy price adjustments

The International Monetary Fund (IMF) yesterday welcomed the Bangladesh Bank's contractionary monetary policy that has taken a lot of flak at home, and said it will help rein in inflation.

It also suggested that the country should adjust the fuel and energy prices to those at the international level on a regular basis.

Jonathan C Dunn, the IMF resident representative, said they had advised Bangladesh on several occasions to take tighter monetary measures. He added, "Now we are encouraged to see that the central bank has adopted an appropriate

Motijheel.

Dunn noted that regular price adjustment to the international market is very significant for Bangladesh. The prices of gas, petroleum and electricity should be adjusted consistently so that the economy can be placed beyond losses.

About the Centre for Policy Dialogue's (CPD) views that the current monetary policy won't be favourable for the economy and that the BB has accepted it following the Fund's recommendations, he said it is very surprising because the IMF's activities are spelled out in its board documents.

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Declining to term the policy strict, he said it should rather be described as cautious.

Asked if the Bretton Woods institution has pressured the government into taking the policy, he said, "The government is a sovereign entity. And our role is to give best advice to the governments where we [the IMF] operate."

He made the observations speaking to journalists at a question-answer session on recent macroeconomic developments, the June 22 IMF board meeting and other issues. The briefing was held at the Fund's office in the Bangladesh Bank Main Building at

Mass hysteria affects 7 more students

Seven more students of Adiabad Islamia High School and College in Raipura upazila of Narsingdi fainted yesterday, raising the number of 'mass hysteria' victims at the institution to 84 since Wednesday, local journalists said.

"It is a type of psychological problem called mass hysteria. It usually affects the young and females and spreads among those who are staying at the same place," Principal of Dhaka Medical College and Hospital (DMCH) and Prof of Medicine MA Foyez said, adding that it usually spreads by seeing or hearing from close quarters.

"The children will be cured soon. It is not an incident of infection and there is nothing to be panicked," said Prof Foyez who is supervising the treatment.

Bin Laden praises martyrdom in video

al-Qaeda's fugitive chief Osama bin Laden, who has not been heard from for more than a year, appeared in an undated videotape posted on the Internet yesterday, in which he praises martyrdom. "The happy (person) is the one chosen by Allah to be a martyr," Bin Laden said in a short clip which was included in a videotape titled "Winds of Martydom", and carried by the Washington-based SITE Intelligence Group.

SITE said the footage was old, but did not give an estimated date.

The images showed the Western world's most wanted man, wearing an Afghan-style hat, military fatigues and a greying beard.

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Costliest power plant starts July 23

Country's costliest power project—the \$120 million 70 megawatt (MW) third phase Mymensingh Power Plant of the Rural Power Company Ltd (RPCL)—will start commercial operation from July 23.

Along with the previous two 70MW simple cycle units, this plant will be German company Siemens will produce 210MW power. Siemens was awarded this project on an unsolicited negotiation in 2005 with the aim to complete it within that year.

Against load shedding of around 2000MW, this 70MW project is being viewed as a speck of sand. But at the same time, this is one of the very few projects to have suc-

cessfully come into operation in the last six years.

The project is three to four times costlier than similar sized power projects of the Power Development Board (PDB). It took US company AES only \$170 million for the Meghnaghat 450MW combined cycle plant.

The installation of the third phase will convert the power plant into a combined cycle plant—from its existing gas-fired simple cycle one. This means the third unit will not need any additional gas supplies; it would use the steam generated by the two old power units to generate power.

It had begun test operations from May and has so far performed well. "Sometimes if the gas flow

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pressure declines, the overall performance of all the units the plant is affected. Otherwise the third unit's test performance is successful," said a RPCL high official.

Energy ministry Adviser Tapan Chowdhury will inaugurate the plant that would be operated and maintained by Siemens for the next two years. The RPCL will then take charge of Operation and Maintenance (O&M).

The cost of this plant has been very high because of corruption by the previous management of the RPCL that was dominated by one Captain Reza, chief of Lahmeyer International Palli Power Service (LIPPS) that took all the past O&M

18 killed in series of attacks in Iraq

Eighteen people were killed in attacks across Iraq yesterday, including at least four civilians who died when a car bomb exploded in central Baghdad, security officials said.

The Baghdad car bombing, which took place in the mixed Jardiyah neighbourhood near the city centre, injured another 15

people, according to security officials who said the toll would probably rise.

Meanwhile in the northern Iraqi Kurdish region gunmen killed seven Iraqi border guards and a civilian in an ambush on the Iranian frontier near Penjwin, a security official said.

"At 9:00 am (0500 GMT) one of our patrols came under attack from
