

Moeen calls for concerted efforts to build nation

UNB, Noakhali

Army Chief General Moeen U Ahmed yesterday called for a national unity to build Bangladesh as a prosperous nation.

"Now our responsibility is to build a sovereign and prosperous Bangladesh through concerted efforts," he said while laying the foundation stone of Bir Sreshtha Shaheed Ruhul Amin Library and Memorial Museum at Bagpanchara village in Sonaimuri upazila in the afternoon.

Speaking at a civic gathering at a local school ground on the occasion, the army chief said the freedom fighters had joined the War

Move to extend proposed road to Myanmar up to China

Deal with Yangon likely next week

Dhaka, during Myanmar Deputy Foreign Minister U Kyaw Thu's visit next week, will push Myanmar to consider jointly approaching China to sponsor a feasibility study for extending the proposed Bangladesh-Myanmar road link-up to the Chinese city of Kunming.

A deal may be signed in this regard during a possible visit later next week of the Myanmar Construction Minister Maj Gen Sun Tun, which would kick-start

further connectivity agreements including the establishment of direct air-links.

The new 23km road linking Bangladesh and Myanmar will connect Gundum in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh and Bolibazar, Myanmar.

Bangladesh will also ask Myanmar to import more products including pharmaceuticals, livestock and food items.

An expansion of Bangladesh-Myanmar trade would also see a quick agreement on "Avoidance of

Double Taxation," a draft of which has already been finalised but would not be signed during this trip, said a highly-placed source in the foreign ministry.

Yangon, replaced in 2005 by the new capital Naypyidaw, holds special links with Dhaka, as Myanmar is the only other country, apart from India, to share land boundary with Bangladesh.

Myanmar will also be approached to take up Bangladesh's case to link up with

Another suicide attack kills 4 in Pakistan

Musharraf holds crisis talks amid violence

Pakistan's embattled President Pervez Musharraf Friday convened a crisis meeting over an upsurge in Islamist violence as another suicide attack killed at least four people near the Afghan border.

The latest blast in a week of violence that has claimed more than 200 lives came as the United States ramped up pressure on Musharraf to hunt down al-Qaeda and Taliban militants -- and threatened to go it alone if he fails to do so.

Musharraf, under pressure from all sides, also faced a court decision key to his political future, with a panel due to rule on his battle against the chief judge he ousted in March, who has since become a pro-democracy icon.

The latest suicide attack hit the tribal area of North Waziristan, as government officials and Pashtun elders met in a secret location to salvage a ceasefire accord that pro-Taliban militants there scrapped this week.

"A suicide attack on a paramilitary checkpoint in North Waziristan

killed four people -- three civilians and one soldier," chief military spokesman Major General Waheed Arshad told AFP. A pro-gang battle broke out after the blast.

Musharraf has vowed to hunt down al-Qaeda and Taliban fighters allegedly hiding in Pakistan's rugged areas on the Afghan frontier, according to the United States and Nato forces in war-torn Afghanistan.

The military ruler -- who sparked Islamist rage by ordering troops to storm a pro-Taliban

Rejoinder, our reply

Power Development Board (PDB) issued a rejoinder to The Daily Star news headlined "Faulty power plant to restart without power up system" published on July 10.

The PDB said it was not clear what the newspaper meant by "faulty power plant" because the plant has one emergency diesel generator in good condition at Haripur power station.

Provision was kept for a new diesel generating set for starting gas booster compressor for grid failure time to raise the gas pressure, the rejoinder said, adding that the PDB proposed dropping this generator considering several realistic factors.

"When there will be a grid failure, power plants near Haripur Power Plant will also trip, so gas pressure would be raised up and Gas Booster Compressor would not be needed to start up."

Therefore there will be no need for the emergency diesel generator, it said.

Besides, during blackouts in recent past, "black" startups were

US chapter of BNP hires lobbyists

The US chapter of BNP hired law firm Pillsbury Winthrop Shaw Pittman to manage a range of communications intended to promote democratic elections and a democratic government in Bangladesh, according to a news available on the website of Ted McKenna, PR Week, USA.

Under a 12-month \$400,000 contract that began on May 30, Pillsbury or companies under its direction may, among other things, lobby members of the US Congress and their staffs, international institutions, the media and other "concerned persons" in the US or elsewhere, according to a recent filing with the US Justice Department.

5 US, British soldiers killed in Iraq

Insurgents killed three British troops and two American soldiers in a separate attacks in southern and central Iraq, coalition officials said yesterday.

Several British soldiers were also wounded in the Thursday mortar attack on their base at the airport in the southern city of Basra, the British military said. The two Americans were also killed in separate attacks Thursday in the Baghdad area, the US said.

The British deaths bring the number of British soldiers killed in the Iraq war to 162. The much larger American force has lost at least 3,630 service members, according to an Associated Press count.

US and British officials hope that stepped up military operations around Baghdad will give Iraqi leaders the chance to reach power-sharing agreements to establish a long-term peace in this country.

On Thursday, Sunni legislators returned to parliament after a five-week boycott, raising hopes the assembly can make progress on

legislation demanded by Washington before the lawmakers take a month's break in August.

The 44 members of the Iraqi Accordance Front attended Thursday's parliament session after striking a deal with the Shias and Kurds to reinstate the Sunni speaker, Mahmoud al-Mashhadani, who was ousted by the Shia-dominated assembly last month for erratic behaviour.

Under a face-saving formula, al-Mashhadani is expected to resign after presiding over a few sessions.

One official said al-Mashhadani was to step down Wednesday or parliament will force him out.

Korean sues chairman of Korean company

Implicates Huda, Sigma

A Korean national has filed a case against former communications minister Nazmul Huda, his wife Sigma Huda and two others including chairman of a Korean company and an associate of a law firm headed by Sigma.

The accused Korean is Bo-Sun Park, chairman of TaeHung Packaging BD Ltd at Joydevpur in Gazipur and the other is Monir Hossain Kajol of law firm Chancery Chamber. The case was filed with Motijheel Police Station on Thursday night.

In the case statement, complainant Ms Ok-Kyung Oh said she was managing director of TaeHung Packaging BD Ltd and also owned its shares worth \$3.70 lakh. Backed by some powerful corrupt persons in Bangladesh, Bo-Sun Park made

all attempts to misappropriate her shares and oust her from the management of the company and also from Bangladesh.

The complainant also said Bo-Sun Park prepared a false resignation letter by forging her signature and submitted it to the office of the Registrar of Joint Stock Companies and Firms (JSCF) in 2004. As she filed an application against this move, the registrar called all concerned to his office and fixed different dates for hearing with June 30, 2005, being the last one.

The complainant said she appeared in person and Monir Hossain appeared for Bo-Sun Park on June 30 at the office of the registrar. Kajol gave her his mobile phone and requested her to speak with a caller.

BCL call to abstain from classes

Bangladesh Chhatra League, demanding Awami League chief Sheikh Hasina's immediate release, called on students across the country to refrain from attending classes and taking examinations tomorrow (Sunday), even though it is illegal to do so during the state of emergency.

In a press release yesterday, Chhatra League president Mahmud Hasan Ripon and acting general secretary Shahinur Rahman Tutul said they would also hold demonstrations at district level on Tuesday and at upazila level on Thursday.

Ripon said they would go for tougher programmes if the government did not meet their demands immediately.

The Chhatra League programme coincides with Dhaka University Teachers Association's (Duta) half-day work-abstention programme from Sunday. Duta on Thursday declared the programme demanding the
