

## WEALTH STATEMENT Hasina's lawyers free to meet her

UNB, Dhaka

Lawyers of detained Awami League (AL) President Sheikh Hasina can meet her whenever necessary for preparing her wealth statement sought by the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC).

"The lawyers of the former prime minister can meet her for preparing the replies to the notice issued by the ACC seeking her wealth statement," DIG (prisons) Major Shamsuddin Haider told reporters yesterday.

On Tuesday, the ACC served notices on Hasina and BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia, asking them to submit their wealth statements within seven working days.

Responding to a query, Major Haider said the relatives of the AL chief can meet her once a week as per the rules.

Meanwhile, jail sources said a television set has been supplied to the sub-jail from Hasina's residence.

## Govt criticised for filing case against Hasina on old issue

The Awami League (AL) yesterday strongly criticised the caretaker government for its handling of issues of crime and corruption.

"The caretaker government has filed a case against Sheikh Hasina based on an incident that occurred eight years ago but it is not taking any step to run the trial of those who were behind the grenade attack on Hasina and other leaders on August 21, 2004," AL Presidium Member Motia Chowdhury said.

# DU teachers protest treatment of 2 ex-PMs

## Wear black badge, will boycott classes today; BCL calls for student strike

Dhaka University (DU) teachers yesterday taught classes wearing black ribbons in protest at the arrest of Awami League (AL) President Sheikh Hasina and the harassment of BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia, as part of their two-day demonstrations which end today with a half-day work abstention.

The demonstration was the first

protest by the teachers of the country's highest academic institution against the current caretaker government's actions, which had come to power in January and soon declared a state of emergency banning all protests against its actions.

The DU teachers will observe the five-hour work abstention till 1:00pm today protesting the treatment of the two ex-premiers of the

country by the military backed caretaker government, however all examinations will be out of the purview of the protest.

The teachers are also protesting the curbing of citizens' rights in the name of the state of emergency, and demanding resignation of Law Adviser Mainul Hossain accusing him of breaching the oath of office

## Rangs claims its building absolutely legal

The authorities of the much talked about Rangs building in the capital yesterday claimed that the building was constructed with proper approval from the authorities concerned and the land was 'not illegally occupied'.

Terming the building 'absolutely legal', they however said the government has the right to acquire any land including the one that has the Rangs building on it by compensating the owners for the acquisition, but it will be unacceptable if it demolishes the building by terming it illegal.

Hinting at a group of businessmen, whom the building authorities accuse of being 'behind the conspiracy' against the Rangs

## Electoral Roll Ordinance okayed

The Council of Advisers has approved in principle the Electoral Roll (Amendment) Ordinance 2007 that gives authority of formulating rules and regulations to the Election Commission (EC).

Chaired by Chief Adviser Fakhruddin Ahmed, the council at its regular weekly meeting yesterday gave the approval to the draft ordinance seeking amendment to the Electoral Roll Ordinance of 1982.

Under the amendment, Upazila Parishad has been included in the definition of the local bodies, which was absent in the earlier ordinance. It also incorporated application of computerised database by the

# Political will must to sustain anti-graft drive

## Roundtable asks govt to ensure transparency, due process of law

The government must ensure transparency and due process of law in the ongoing crackdown on corruption to make certain its success while political will of the future governments is required to guarantee its sustenance, said discussants at a roundtable on corruption yesterday.

The caretaker government should also review its policies as public confidence in the crackdown

on corruption dipped recently, said the speakers who were participating in daily Prothom Alo roundtable titled "Effective steps to curb corruption" at Hotel Sheraton in the capital.

Anti-corruption Commission (ACC) Chairman Lt Gen (retd) Hasan Mashud Chowdhury said the anti-corruption drive will not be sustainable without the political will of the next elected government.

"The opportunity of this period has to be taken so that another person, party or government cannot

destroy or corrupt the system when an opportunity arises," he said, adding, "We have to block the way to the past."

He also said despite some "grey" areas in the relationship between the ACC and the National Coordination Committee against corruption and crime, there are no legal ambiguities in their operational boundaries.

"Some errors may occur as this is an experiment but it is serving

## BNP reformists unsure about council by Aug

The BNP council that the pro-reform leaders had planned to hold by August for bringing changes in the party constitution now seems uncertain in view of the changed situation following the arrest of Awami League President Sheikh Hasina.

"It will take time to hold the council but the preparation is going on," Mofazzal Karim, adviser to BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia, told the reporters after meeting party Secretary General Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan at his Gulshan residence yesterday.

They have to take the consent of the party chairperson as well as the government to hold the council, he said.

"Everything will take place according to the party constitution," he said when asked what they will do if the chairperson does not give her consent for council.

After the arrest of Sheikh Hasina, many district level BNP leaders expressed their concern to the pro-reform central leaders about the party's future as they fear that Khaleda Zia might also be arrested soon, sources said.

Many pro-reforms leaders of BNP also refrained from their regular visit to the party secretary general's residence in last few days. Some of them are of the view that it would not be possible to hold the party council in the presence of Khaleda Zia.

Most members of the party's

## 50 injured as train derails in Chandpur

At least 50 passengers were injured when Chandpur-bound intercity Meghna Express from Chittagong derailed near Shahraiti Railway Station on Friday night.

Railway sources said nine compartments of the express train, carrying about 500 passengers in 14 compartments, went off the track at 10:00pm, halting train services on Chandpur-Laksham-Chittagong route for nearly 14 hours.

However, train communications on the route resumed at noon yesterday.

A railway official said the passengers were injured as they scrambled to get out of the train.



## Pratibha elected India's first female president

India elected Pratibha Patil as the country's first female president yesterday in a vote seen as a victory for the hundreds of millions of Indian women who contend with widespread discrimination.

Patil received 65.82 percent of the votes cast by national lawmakers and state legislators, said Election Commission head PDT Achary. She had been widely expected to win.

Patil, the 72-year-old candidate of the governing Congress party and its political allies, defeated incumbent Vice President Bhairon Singh Shekhawat, the candidate of the opposition Bharatiya Janata Party.

"I am grateful to the people of India, to all the men and women of

## Adviser slams NCBs for 'harassing' clients

Finance Adviser Mirza Azizul Islam yesterday blasted the nationalised commercial banks (NCBs) for grilling clients about sources of the deposited money.

"Even today I hear complaints that when a person goes to a commercial bank, particularly to an NCB, with a hundred thousand taka deposit into the bank he is questioned for an hour about where he got the money from," Azizul said.

"It's not your business to inquire into the sources of a client's money. You are no NBR [National Board of Revenue] or central bank or Anti-Corruption Commission, and neither are you the national task force," he said.

The adviser was addressing a seminar on 'Janata Bank: Changing Corporate Culture' at the city's Brac Centre Inn.

He observed that many of the problems that the NCBs now face have been caused or worsened by political interference in management, in portfolio choices and even in day-to-day running of the banks.

Aziz said ministers in the past would use the banks as sources of money for their political and business interests.

Besides, he said, political affilia-

tions of the CBAs (central bargaining agents) adversely affect the bank officials' efficiency and integrity.

Lack of service orientation is one of the maladies, he said adding that the NCBs have not been able to do justice to optimising the stakeholders' value, and perhaps the value of many has rather been neglected, if not completely ignored.

Performance of the bank officials has not been up to the mark. Many officials could be accused of professional incompetence and moral turpitude.

He said, "Unless we can do something to solve this sort of problem, I am afraid, a mere change in organisational structure will not be adequate to change the corporate culture of the NCBs."

According to the finance adviser, the present caretaker government has committed itself to seeing these banks function independently and completely.

The policy-based loans that once used to have negative impacts on the operation of nationalised commercial banks have been drastically reduced, he said adding, "The finance ministry does not

## College girl Nawshin committed suicide

Finds autopsy report

An autopsy revealed that Sadia Nawshin, a student from Vigarunnisa Noon School and College, found dead inside her residence at Moghbazar on Wednesday, had committed suicide.

Nawshin had passed the SSC this year with GPA-5.

Her autopsy report submitted yesterday morning stated that there was no sign of attack or injury to the body and the cause of death was suicide, forensic department sources said.

Police could not make any headway in the investigation without details of the victim and the prime suspect, victim's maternal uncle, as the victim's parents are still not available for questioning.

Nawshin's parents left for their village home in Pirojpur on Thursday for her burial.

Police have been conducting raids at possible hideouts in the capital to capture the prime accused in the case -- Zahidul Haque Rintu, Nawshin's uncle.

The other accused in the case,

## Bangladeshi made chief of an Ivory Coast village

The Bangladeshi forces of the UN Peace Keeping Mission have won the love and trust of the people of Ivory Coast so much that the people of a village have made a Bangladeshi army officer their honorary chief.

According to the local tradition, the village chief is the most honourable person and the guardian of a village. Villagers accept the chief's decisions as the final word and implement those without any hesitation.

Contingent Commander Bangladesh Battalion-4 (Banbat-4) Lt Col Md Jahangir Talukder was given the honour in Lazarekro village in December

last year. His battalion is posted in Yamaoussoukro, the administrative capital of the Peace Mission's East Sector.

On July 15, a Bangladeshi Peace Mission delegation of 18 that included some journalists from Bangladesh visited the village. The Lazarekro villagers on that day honoured the head of the delegation Brig Gen Rafiqul Islam as the "village king".

The villagers felt that Rafiqul should be honoured as a king as he was superior to their "village chief" Jahangir.

A village chief is so powerful in Ivory Coast that villagers usually not even talk with foreigners without his permission. If the central government wants to do
