## ICL ropes in Lara

Brian Lara has become the first big-name signing for the Indian Cricket League (ICL), which announced on Monday that it has also contracted former Indian all-rounder Madan Lal to coach its Delhi team and Balwinder Singh Sandhu as director of academies.

Lara, who retired from international cricket after the World Cup earlier this year, said he looked forward to playing with promising youngsters and to captaining one of the teams.

"You can't keep me too far from cricket and hence I return to the game in this exciting new avatar," Lara said in a statement issued by the Essel Group, promoters of the ICL.

Rajesh Chauhan and Pranob Roy, former players who had also served as selectors, were roped in as talent scouts for the league. They joined Kapil Dev, Kiran More and Sandeep Patil on the ICL roster.

The Board for Control of Cricket in India (BCCI) had not given its official sanction to the ICL, and had, in a controversial decision, barred current India players and former players on its payroll from associating with it.

Lara's joining the ICL had first been reported in May and at the time the names of Shane Warne and Glenn McGrath, had also been linked with the league.

Lal, who was a part of India's World Cup-winning team captained by Kapil Dev, said his role as a coach included inculcating character in the team and creating a "brand of cricket which possesses killer instinct".

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## Coach states the obvious

Even for an optimistic man like Bangladesh interim coach Shaun Williams it was hard to find any positives from the Tiger's five-wicket defeat in the second one-day of the three-match series at the R Premadasa Stadium yesterday.

But yet he managed.

"It was disappointing and again we need to find a way to bat better. You need to give credit to their bowlers. They are doing exceptionally well. We are not playing as well as we need to. We are struggling to cope with the bounce and the Sri Lankan fast bowlers are really exposing that," said the Australian, who always loves to find positives and whose side is on the brink of another embarrassing series whitewash.

"If we are to move forward as a batting side we need to come out with a way to overcome it. The only way to do that is when you go back home you need to have pitches prepared in a way that prepares us better to face the bouncing ball. Even in the Test matches the extra bounce was the major problem," the frustrated coach observed.

The Sri Lanka skipper Mahela Jayawardene and man of the match Sanath Jayasuriya also echoed the Bangladesh coach's sentiment that batting was not so easy in this surface.

"The ball was not coming on in that well in this wicket especially in

the wicket was not easy for batting but still I never thought of getting four wickets today," said the most capped one-day player, who is the only player has 12,000 runs and 300 wickets in ODIs. The dashing left-hander also struggled during his 39-ball 24-run innings.

"It's tough to get 300 wickets and score over 12,000 runs. Its hard work and a lot of sacrifices in your career. It's not easy because I am not a wicket-taking bowler what I always try to check the runs for my team. Somebody who wants to

Bangladesh, who suffered a seven-wicket defeat to India on Sunday, were all out for 204 in 48.4 overs after elicting to bat.

Skinner Hasan made second highest 32 off 47 balls with one boundary and later captured three wickets for 20 runs while lower-order batsman Tapash Ghosh hammered 27 off 20 balls including two fours and a six before grabbing 2-21.

Ashraful Aziz contributed highest for the Bangladesh U-19s, scoring 35 off 77 balls with three fours.

Mithun Ali scored a quickfire 19-ball 27 with six fours while Nasir Hossain made 21 and Hamidul Islam 18.

In reply, the Sri Lanka U-19s skittled out for 161 in 45.2 overs with Lokuge making 36, Thirumanne 31 and Priyanjan 29.

Nasir grabbed 2-26 and Rubel 2-27.

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## Bad light holds up hosts

Bad light threatened to give India a dramatic reprieve in the first Test as England's bid for victory was halted with them needing just one more wicket to go 1-0 up in the three-match series at Lord's.

India, when the gathering gloom forced an early tea on the fifth and final day here Monday, were 282 for nine -- still needing a further 98 to reach an imposing victory target of 380.

Mahendra Singh Dhoni was 76 not out and last man Shanthakumar Sreesanth four not out.

Soon after the umpires brought the players off the field, the square was fully covered and hopes of any more play were in the balance.

India, chasing what would be the fourth highest fourth innings winning total in Test history were to achieve it, started the second session on 207 for five, with VVS Laxman 29 not out and Dhoni, who'd survived a couple of scares, 28 not out.

The pair, India's last recognised batsmen, had come together following the loss of two quick wickets that left the tourists struggling at 145 for five.

But a stand worth 86 was ended when debutant quick Chris Tremlett bowled Laxman for 39 as he stayed on the backfoot to a full-length delivery.

England, who had reduced India to 231 for six, now found themselves as much in a race against the deteriorating weather, with the light fading and rain falling elsewhere in London, as the remainder of India's batsmen.

They took the new ball as soon as it became available after 80 overs, with India 241 for six.

And three overs later left-arm quick Ryan Sidebottom dismissed Anil Kumble for three with the 14th
