

London seminar critical of Hasina's arrest

Speakers at a seminar in London on the human rights situation in Bangladesh yesterday criticised in general the use of emergency powers, saying that the practice undermines the rule of law.

Expressing concern at custodial tortures, they said some detainees were wrongfully arrested and subjected to ill treatment by law enforcers.

International Bangladesh Foundation organised the seminar at the Houses of Lords with Lord Avebury in the chair. Members of the British Parliament (MP) and the European Parliament (MEP), peers of the House of Lords, and representatives of Commonwealth

Mass hysteria affects 28 in 4 districts

Twenty-eight more students across the country fainted with convulsion during school hours, raising the number of 'mass hysteria' victims to 207 in last two weeks.

In the cases reported from Narayanganj, Sherpur, Pabna and Dhaka, the victims of 'mass psychogenic illness' are adolescent female students who felt headache, nausea, convulsion, pain in the chest and abdomen and difficulty in breathing.

Seventeen students of Amgaon Dabiruddin Bhuiyan High School went unconscious on Tuesday and Wednesday, our Narayanganj correspondent reports.

A medical team from Sonargaon Health Complex visited the school to treat the affected children who were later admitted to different hospitals.

In Sherpur Government Girls' High School, a student of class nine started feeling dizzy at about 8:00am yesterday.

MADHYAPARA GRANITE MINING

Company at mercy of rock trading syndicate

The Madhyapara Granite Mining Company Ltd (MGMCL) is undergoing a severe financial crisis as around 1,00,000 tonnes of granite worth Tk 11.9 crore remain unsold at the mine due to lack of buyers.

The extracted rocks are piled in and around the MGMCL complex and the authorities concerned are struggling to find space for storing them. Earlier, at least 30.90 lakh tonnes of rock, extracted between 2001 and 2006 on trial basis, were sold very cheaply just to raise funds for its survival.

The government stopped the Annual Development Programme (ADP) backing for the mine since January plunging it into a monetary

crisis. Considering the severe financial predicament, the authorities of the mine sought Tk 20 crore loan from the government early January to resume rock extraction but the government granted only Tk 5 crore.

According to mining officials concerned, the 1,00,000 tonnes of rock remain unsold as a rock trading syndicate, with government officials' connivance, prefer to import rocks, buying them at hefty \$34 per tonne, since it leaves room for corruption. Illegal rock extraction in Panchagarh and Lalmonirhat are also affecting MGMCL's sale, they said.

They said the mine has been extracting around 800 to 1000 tonnes of rock every day since its

parent company Petrobangla took over on May 25 this year from Namnam, the company that built the mine, with 99 percent of the project completed.

MGMCL officials said Bangladesh has an annual demand for 40.5 to 60.5 lakh tonnes of rock. Bangladesh Roads and Highways, Water Development Board (WDB), Bangladesh Railway, Local Government, Bangladesh Public Works Department and engineering departments have a collective demand that is 60 percent of the national demand.

Unplanned and illegal extraction of rocks like in Panchagarh and Lalmonirhat, posing a great ecological threat to the areas, meet 15

Myanmar minister arrives today to ink road deal

Myanmar Construction Minister Maj Gen Saw Tun arrives in Dhaka today to seal the deal on constructing the 25-km road connecting Bangladesh and Myanmar.

He is expected to sign the agreement with communications adviser Maj Gen (retd) MAMatin tomorrow.

The road will stretch from 2 kilometres inside Bangladesh at Gundhom and will extend 23 kilometres inside Myanmar to Tongoru. Bangladesh will provide Tk 141 crore for construction of the road.

The road-link is expected to pave the way for Bangladesh to subsequently link up with Asian Highway through Thailand, Malaysia, and Singapore.

Tk 10cr fund allocated for rehabilitated floating people

The government has allocated Tk 10 crore as revolving fund for floating people rehabilitated under the land ministry's Adarsha Gram Project-2 for financing income-generating schemes for them.

An official announcement yesterday said the money will be disbursed among the poor people through Bangladesh Rural Development Board (BRDB) as micro-credit.

The decision was disclosed at a meeting arranged for review of progress of the projects being implemented under the Annual Development Programme (ADP) of the fiscal year 2006-2007.

Land, Information and Law Adviser Mainul Hossain presided over the meeting, which noted that a total of Tk 25.68 crore was allocated for seven ADP projects.

Out of the total, Tk 23.02 crore was released until June 2007 and Tk 20.73 crore of the released money has been spent. The progress rate of the projects is 81 percent.

The Adviser directed the officials concerned to complete the projects within the timeline.

Jakarta keen to import RMG, medicines

First JEC meeting ends in Dhaka

Bangladesh and Indonesia concluded their first Joint Economic Commission (JEC) meeting yesterday, where Indonesia showed interest in importing pharmaceuticals and ready made garments, among other goods, to improve bilateral trade with Bangladesh, which currently stands at a paltry Tk 509 crore per year.

The JEC, meeting three years after its inception in 2004, decided to recover the lost ground by expediting the implementation of the 1998 Agreement on Promotion and Protection of Investment, and agreed on joint ventures in fertiliser and textile sectors.

The JEC meeting shows an effort to revive the government's 'look east' policy, which has been flagging since the initial pronouncement

ments made by the immediate past government, foreign ministry sources said. The next JEC meeting is scheduled to be held in Jakarta in 2008.

"We have agreed upon some commitments for cooperation. Since Indonesia also produces pharmaceuticals, we would like to explore joint ventures in textile and fertiliser sectors," said the head of the Indonesian delegation also a foreign ministry official, Primo Alui Joelianto, after he had called on Bangladesh Foreign Adviser Iftekhar Chowdhury.

Iftekhar said the JEC meeting is a testament to Bangladesh's effort to strengthen political ties with Indonesia, the largest Muslim-majority country with around 230 million people.

He added that there is a demand in Indonesia for 'halal meat' in

Iran ready for higher-level talks with US over Iraq

Iran yesterday said it was prepared to consider higher-level talks with the United States over Iraq, a day after their ambassadors to Baghdad held a landmark second meeting on Iraqi security.

Foreign Minister Manouchehr Mottaki said Tehran would be willing to consider talking to Washington, its arch-foe for almost three decades, at the level of deputy foreign minister.

"The talks between Iran and the United States over Iraq at the level of deputy foreign minister can be studied," Mottaki said after a cabinet meeting, the state-run IRNA agency reported.

"If America makes an official request in this regard it can be examined," he added.

Storm kills 1, damages hundreds of houses

Violent storms ripped into six districts of the country yesterday, killing a baby and injuring some 100 people.

Besides, several hundred thatched houses were also damaged and thousands of trees uprooted by the storms.

Many people in Noakhali, Brahmanbaria, Jamalpur, Comilla, Chandpur and Laxmipur left homeless by the tornados were forced to live under open sky in utter distress, reports received in Dhaka said.

UNB reported that an eight-month-old boy named Nazim died in a house collapse near Karimbazar in Hatia and over 50 thatched houses were damaged and many trees were uprooted by storm that hit villages in Chatkhil and Hatia upazilas in Noakhali.

Chatkhil Upazila Nirbahi Officer Abul Khayer said that the fierce storm swept through Parkot,

Manikpur, Islampur, Murial, Badarkati and Mema villages of the upazila at about 3:00am.

A correspondent from Comilla said that more than 50 people, including women and children, were injured and 200 thatched houses and several schools and mosques were damaged by the storm in the district. Besides, hundreds of trees were uprooted.

The storm swept Sholapukuria, Mochagara, Jatrapur and Bhabanipur villages of Muradnagar upazila at 7:00am damaging over 150 houses and injuring 30 people, the report further said. The building of Mochagara High School in the upazila was damaged seriously.

The storm at the villages of Manohorganj left over 30 thatched houses damaged and 15 people injured, while it damaged 25 houses and left 6 people injured at Daudkandi.

Rocket attack kills eight in Pakistan

Islamic militants fired a barrage of rockets into a city in northwest Pakistan early yesterday, killing at least eight civilians and injuring 41 amid a wave of violence sweeping the country.

The attack close to the Afghan border was the latest in Pakistan since the army stormed a pro-Taliban mosque in the capital Islamabad earlier this month, and came a day after a top Taliban militant blew himself up.

Four houses were destroyed in the rocket attack on Bannu, a town on the fringes of restive North Waziristan tribal zone, where the United States says Osama Bin Laden's Al-Qaeda network has set up safe havens.

"The dead included one woman and seven other civilians," local police officer Mohammad Ghulam told AFP, adding that seven policemen were among the injured.

Five rockets landed within 30

minutes soon after midnight, causing loud explosions that spread panic in the town. "Police have sealed all entry and exit points and also tightened security in the town," Ghulam said.

In a separate attack, two unidentified gunmen shot dead a Taliban commander outside his home in the frontier crossing town of Chaman in Pakistan's southwest, police and Taliban sources said.

Qari Naimatullah, who was teaching at an Islamic school, was an associate of the governor of Afghanistan's Khost province during the 1996-2001 Taliban regime. Police said they did not know the motive for the killing.

A day earlier one of Pakistan's top militant commanders, one-legged pro-Taliban rebel Abdullah Mehsud, blew himself up to avoid arrest when he was cornered by security forces in another southwestern town.

Bangladeshi cops not falling behind

Play major role in rebuilding Ivory Coast

Apart from the defence contingents, Bangladesh Police forces have also made long-standing contributions to the United Nations peacekeeping missions around the globe.

Bangladesh Army stepped into the family of "Blue Helmet" by participating in the UNIIOMOG (Iran-Iraq) in 1988 with 15 military observers. Bangladesh Navy and Bangladesh Air Force joined in the UN Peacekeeping Operations (UNPKO) in 1993. Bangladesh Police followed the armed forces in 1989.

Since then, the police have been taking part in the UN peacekeeping missions in different countries including Namibia, Angola, Haiti, former Yugoslavia, Eastern

Slovenia, Bosnia, Kosovo, Sierra Leone, Cambodia, East Timor, Liberia, Sudan, Congo and Ivory Coast.

Current strength of police in different missions is 779. Among them, 250 police personnel are now working in Ivory Coast in two Formed Police Units (FPU).

The Formed Police Unit (FPU) is a comparatively new concept in the field of peacekeeping that was first introduced in Kosovo in 1999. It means a force in between military and civilian police component to meet the complex security challenges of the post-conflict societies.

After the successful experiment in Kosovo the demand for FPUs in different peacekeeping missions is increasing day by day. The peacekeeping contributing countries
