

Dulu given 8 years

The other convicts include former president of Jatiyataldi Chhatra Dal (JCD) Natore unit Dewan Shahin, secretary Mostafizur Rahman Shahin, BNP workers Mintu, Ratan, Hazrat, Shafi gunman, Shanti Mastar, Mamun, Razzak, Kuddus, Alamgir, Hafizul, Majibur, Azizul, Jalal, Aziz, Rahim Bux, Golap, Kalu, Kausar, Tofazzal Rajakar and Saiful.

The court acquitted five accused in the case including district Jubo Dal General Secretary Babul Chowdhury, Rupchand, Mohsin, Majnu and Jubayer. ADM Rawnak Mahmud read out order portion of the 53-page judgement amid tight security and in presence of 28 of the 94 accused including Dulu.

JUDGEMENT
In the verdict, Dulu and Atikur were sentenced to five years in prison for arson, one year for causing damage and for looting, one year for rioting with deadly weapons and one year for directly guiding and abetting the crimes.

The other accused were given five years' jail term for arson, one year for damage and for looting, and one year for rioting with deadly weapons. **CASE** Jatiya Chhatra Samaj Natore district unit President Asaduzzaman Shah had filed the case with Naldanga police station (PS) on February 25 accusing 105 people.

On May 3, Officer-in-Charge of Naldanga PS Arman Hossain submitted two charge sheets – one for arson and looting and another under explosives act – accusing 94 people. Later, the charge sheets were sent to the ADM's court and the district judge's court. Charges were framed at the ADM's court on June 27.

Dipjol gets 17 yrs

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defence completed their arguments and the court recorded statements of 10 prosecution witnesses.

On January 15, the joint forces raided the Mirpur house of BNP leader and film actor Dipjol and seized huge illegal firearms and ammunition.

They seized a 22 bore rifle, a 12 bore shotgun, a magazine of 22 bore rifle and 317 rifle bullets from the first floor flat of Dipjol.

Following the seizure, Assistant Sub-Inspector Asaduzzaman of Mirpur Police Station filed an arms case against Dipjol accusing him of possessing arms and bullets illegally.

Dipjol, an accused in 12 more criminal cases including for murder, extortion and abduction, has been absconding since the raid on his house.

Dipjol was a contender for BNP ticket for January 22 parliamentary polls (later cancelled) from Dhaka-11 constituency. Failing to get BNP nomination, he decided to contest the polls as an independent candidate.

WARRANT AGAINST HARRIS
After accepting the charge sheet, Judge Mohammad Azizul Haq of the Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court, Dhaka, issued arrest warrant against Harris, in connection with a graft case.

The investigation officer prayed for issuance of arrest warrant against Harris and ordered attachment of all his properties, as he has been absconding.

The case was filed on March 25, as Harris by abusing power took a private car of National Tea Company and handed it over to Badal, who is now in custody.

SALAHUDDIN CASE
The same court issued arrest warrant against wife and two sons of former BNP lawmaker Salahuddin Ahmed from Demra in the capital in a graft case.

JMB ruled supreme

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They personally controlled police officials including superintendents of police in Rajshahi, Naogaon and Natore for their political and personal interest and prevented those who took initiatives to stop militant activities in the region.

Even the then state minister for home Lutfozzaman Babar left the responsibility of the region's law and order with Aminul's personal whim.

Inspector General of Police (IGP) Nur Mohammad, who was deputy inspector general (DIG) in Rajshahi region in 2004, is one of the witnesses of Aminul's defiance of the existing legal and administrative systems to establish his control over the region.

The IGP told The Daily Star last month, "I talked to the home minister twice or thrice on this matter, but he kept on pushing me towards Aminul Haque. When I talked to district minister Aminul Haque, he said, 'Do not talk on this matter. You do not need to pursue this matter. This has come from the highest level. From the prime minister to Tarique Rahman, everyone knows about it.'"

"I have told Aminul several times that you are the local minister and I am the DIG. I cannot allow this to go on. He asserted again saying this matter has the approval of the prime minister and Tarique Rahman," the IGP said.

Bangla Bhai swung into action in certain upazilas of Rajshahi, Naogaon and Natore after outlaws,

popularly known as Sarbahara, killed four persons--relatives, close political aides and cadres of the patrons--in five months from November 2003.

In November 2003, operatives of the outlawed Purba Banglar Communist Party killed BNP's Bagmara upazila president Abdul Hamid Moru in Rajshahi city. Gunmen killed Dulu's nephew Sabbir Ahmed Gamma in Natore's Naldanga upazila in February 2004.

Under cover of outlaw cleansing, the BNP bigwigs in the North actually intended to stamp their political supremacy over Rajshahi, Natore and Naogaon regions. They effectively used the militants to destroy their political opponents, ensuring BNP's dominance in the long run.

Following the execution of six JMB militants including Abdur Rahman and Bangla Bhai, a few victims of Bangla Bhai had filed several cases since March this year, accusing Aminul, Dulu, Nadim and many other JMB goons.

The case against Aminul was the first to have been disposed of as its verdict was given yesterday while other cases are awaiting disposal.

Among the JMB patrons four are now in different jails in different cases. They are Tarique Rahman, Babar, Dulu and Minu.

Circular

In this context, the NGO Affairs Bureau under the Chief Adviser's Office yesterday issued a new circular, signed by AKM Humayun Kabir, assistant director of the Bureau, cancelling the circular until further notice.

The Bureau directors held a meeting yesterday after an NGO delegation discussed the matter with the Director General (DG) of the Bureau M Alimushshan, sources said.

They said the delegation, led by chairman of Federation of NGOs in Bangladesh (FNB) Muhammad Ibrahim, expressed its grave concern over the issue and put forward some reasons that would lead to serious problems in implementing their ongoing and future programmes for the poor and disadvantaged.

The delegation emphasised proper monitoring of NGO programmes by the Bureau and the need for indicators of success or impact rather than distinguishing the programmes based on 'visible' and 'invisible.' They called upon the Bureau to take measures for immediate postponement and ultimate withdrawal of the circular.

The DG assured them saying no ongoing project would be affected and the matter would be given immediate consideration, the sources said.

The US president described Bangladesh as a role model among "moderate and tolerant Muslim nations," saying that the country has demonstrated its unflinching commitment to democracy by organising innumerable elections.

Appreciating current reform programme of the caretaker government, Bush said he supports the anti-graft drive and initiatives to realise tax.

Receiving the letter of credence from Ambassador Humayun Kabir, the US president said both Bangladesh and USA have strong faith in democratic values and are committed to work jointly for mutual economic development and combating terrorism.

He assured cooperation as the ambassador sought duty- and quota-free access of Bangladesh products to the US market.

Bush praised the Bangladesh government's steps to build the country's economy on a strong base as well as its efforts to alleviate poverty. He also assured the ambassador of continued US support to Bangladesh's economic development.

Ambassador Humayun Kabir extended warm felicitations and wishes to President Bush on behalf of the president, the chief adviser and the people of Bangladesh.

JMB torture victim Fazlur Rahman had lodged the case on March 30 with Bagmara Police Station. The poor farmer of Hasanpur village in the upazila was abducted, tortured and forced to pay ransom for his release from the militants in April 2004.

Sub-Inspector Mukhtar Hossain submitted the charge sheet of the case on April 23.

JUDGE'S EXPLANATION FOR THE VERDICT

Briefing the court before announcing the verdict, Judge Rezaul said it is well known that Bagmara was the centre of JMB's rise and there was a torture camp at the Hamirkutsa house of accused Korban Ali's father Ramjan Kaya who is widely known as a Razakar (collaborator of the Pakistan armed forces) during the Liberation War of 1971.

"Incidents of lynching people were almost open and common during the tenure of the previous [BNP-led four-party] alliance government and through such incidents the JMB militants not only took the law in their hands, but they expressed their no-confidence on the law of the land," the judge said.

"What the JMB militants had done in the areas on the plea of cleansing Sarbahara communist outlaws were no different from the deeds of these outlaws," he added.

About former minister Aminul and BNP leader Shish, the judge said the accused persons were influential in their areas and the militants continued their brutalities following direct and indirect patronisation of these two persons.

Referring to several verses of the holy Quran and Hadith, the judge said Islam is a moderate religion and it does not support any such torture and force on people to abide by the religion.

Executed JMB operations commander Siddiqui Islam Bangla Bhai had said in his statement that Shish Muhammad used to visit him and executed JMB chief Abdur Rahman in Bagmara during their "anti-outlaw" operations.

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The WB report provided eight specific policies for making the transition to the MIC status. These include reducing the maximum tariff rate to 15 percent by FY10 and discontinuing the protective use of value-added tax (VAT) by FY09.

The report also recommended immediate hike in power and gas prices to at least cover all operating cost, which would be part of the automatic pricing formula that is already under government consideration.

Internationally reputed transaction advisers for procurement and empowered utility managers to effectively collect payments, were suggested by the report for strengthening governance in power sector.

The WB also suggested privatising national commercial banks and handing over Chittagong-port management to experienced private contractors to better facilitate finance and trade.

Xian Zhu, however, cautioned, "If a broad consensus is reached, authorities and the people of Bangladesh would need to be mindful that some of the associated reforms will not be painless."

Azizul also said that the political implications from rising inflation also pose a challenge, as it hurts fixed income groups by cutting into their savings. He, however, added that growing consumption and an increase in inflation suggests that people's combined income have increased in the past months.

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followers remain," said Fazlur, a JMB torture victim. He now lives at his in-law's house in Bogra.

"The militants have handicapped me, not only physically but also financially as I had to either sell or lease out all my properties for my treatment," he added. "Still, I cannot sleep properly due to pains in my body," he said adding that he needs more money for treatment. Fazlur, a farmer from Bagmara, took treatment for almost two years after JMB second-in-command Siddiqui Islam Bangla Bhai and his men tortured him.

Fazlur lodged the case on March 30 this year with Bagmara Police Station, Rajshahi. Sub-inspector Mukhtar Hossain submitted the charge sheet of the case on April 23 accusing 27 people including former BNP minister Aminul Haque and the verdict of the case was delivered yesterday. Fazlur said he filed the case of his own accord hoping to get justice as he was encouraged by the deeds of the present caretaker government.

A Rajshahi court yesterday handed down the jail sentence of 31 years and six months to 25 people including BNP leader and former minister Barrister Aminul Haque for financing and abetting JMB militants.

The second court of Additional Sessions Judge also fined each of the convicts Tk 25,000, in default, they would have to suffer three more years behind bars.

Bangla Bhai himself and Jagrata Muslim Janata Bangladesh (JMJB) militants kidnapped him on April 20, 2004 and took him to their torture camp, set up at the Hamir Keochha house of Ramzan Kaya, who the locals claim to be a Liberation War collaborator.

Upashahar Housing Estate in Rajshahi city and Shish, also chairman of Mundumala municipality, gave the militants money, the statement said.

REACTIONS AT COURT
Hearing the judgment, JMB's Bagmara adviser Lutfar started shouting, "I do not honour the verdict...it is partial."

Other accused present in the dock and their relatives in and outside the court burst into tears.

"My husband is Fazlu's [the plaintiff] cousin and he was implicated in the case out of jealousy and rivalry over land. He was never linked with militants," Kajal Rekha, wife of convict Nazrul, said.

Public Prosecutor Ekrumul Haque said, "The JMB came into being, flourished and continued criminal activities with the finance and assistance of barrister Aminul Islam, Shish Muhammad other ruling party men of the BNP-Jamaat alliance. So, the judgment is appropriate."

Additional PP Nurul Islam said, "Minister Aminul was responsible for the district and its law and order. He came to learn about the rise and criminal activities of the JMB through various newspaper and media reports. But, he did not take any action against the criminals."

"Aminul's silence [about the militants' activities] corroborated the depositions of witnesses and it is proved that he was one of the abettors and conspirators," he said, adding, "Aminul and other politicians directly and indirectly financed and patronised the JMB and they instigated the militants to collect tolls for their smooth operation."

The additional PP said four prosecution witnesses told the court that they saw the militants talking with former minister Aminul over mobile phone and that the militants boasted before them of having links with the minister and his men.

Lawyers Hamidul Haque, Mansur Rahman, Ankur Sen and Abul Kalam moved for the defence. They said the case was false and filed with an ulterior motive to harass personal and political rivals taking advantage of the changed political atmosphere.

They said the prosecution side did not come up with enough witnesses and evidence. Moreover, they could not show any material evidence against the accused persons.

Bangladesh's food insecurity would increase if the WB-suggested policy of crop-diversification towards high-yield crops is followed, he added.

Former finance adviser Akbar Ali Khan observed that the WB focuses on traditional issues, but Bangladesh needs policies towards creating jobs.

Although remittance from Bangladeshi expatriates exceeds foreign assistance in the country, the report has not looked into ways to link up expatriates in generating economic growth, he added.

He said under the banner of GO-NGO development initiatives several thousand crore taka have been spent but hardly any socio-economic development was achieved. Criminal activities could not be uprooted for this, he added.

The regional commander said the government has waged a war against the corrupt people. In this regard, operation Alor Sondhan has completed investigation into various irregularities. Those found guilty would be brought to justice immediately, he added.

He said a number of documents have been seized from different government institutions including the Chittagong Hill Tracts Zila Parishad, Local Government and Engineering Department (LGED), forestry department and hospitals.

He said during the last 12 months from July, 2006 to June this year, 1.50 lakh cubic feet of wood has been seized at different parts of Bandarban. Only in Naikhanghari upazila, over 99,000 cubic feet of wood was seized.

He ruled out the possibility of deterioration of law and order situation, as the operation aimed at curbing corruption would also form a social resistance committee to eliminate "terrorism".

Citing Ali Kadam upazila as an example, where locals built their own security system with security forces' approval, he said, "It is not possible to absolutely uproot criminal activities without the participation of locals and that is why we are thinking about giving Gada Bonduk [primitive firearms] to them."

"The workers, if come back willingly, will not face any problems, but if they are caught, they will be forced to return," he said.

The ambassador said that Korea has decided to hire 4,000 workers from Bangladesh initially, but the size of the workers will be increased in the years to come.

Korean Labour Ministry's Deputy Director Hwang Hyo-Jung in her presentation said that the migration cost under the EPS system will be around \$700 to \$800, but it will be finalised in consultation with both the countries.

"This time, the workers can go to Korea only through BOESL, and nobody should communicate with any other private recruiting agencies," she said.

Those interested to go to South Korea will have to undergo a Korean language proficiency test, which will be conducted in Bangladesh by the Korean labour ministry, Ministry of Expatriates' Welfare and Overseas Employment Secretary Abdul Matin Chowdhury said.

Only those who will pass the test will be included in the roster, he said adding that the workers will then have to fill in a form with detailed information about them and desired salaries. Only the workers selected by the South Korean employers will be sent.

South Korea will hire workers for sectors like agriculture, construction, fisheries and other services, he said adding that they cannot say exactly how many workers South Korea will take.

Meanwhile, in the 24 hours ending at 6:00pm yesterday, the Met Office recorded 200 millimetres of rain in Sunamganj, 180mms at Loreragarh, 126.6mms at Durgapur, 124.5mms in Mymensingh, 80mms in Sylhet, 71mms at Kanaighat, 65mms at Jaraijanjail of Netrakona, 61mms at Nakuagaon, 55mms at Bhairab Bazar and 28mms in Pabna.

Our correspondent from Pabna reports: Nagbari-Aricha ferry service stopped after the flood waters washed away the pontoons at the Nagbari end, said officials at the Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA).

Four villages at Bera upazila and low laying areas at Shujanagar upazila went under water. Meanwhile, flood waters in Raipur village of Shujanagar have begun to recede.

Our correspondent from Sirajganj reports: Some 60 metres of Brahmaputra Flood Control Embankment at Khokshabari and 30 metres on Sirajganj-Kazipur Road broke off due to strong currents yesterday morning. The cave-ins led to road link between Sirajganj and Sonamukhi.

Around 100 metres of the embankment at Rani Gram intersection near the town by the Jamuna remains at risk of being swept away, but as of last evening the authorities have yet to take any step to that end.

More than 20 villages in Belkuchi, Sirajganj sadar, Shahzadpur and Chowhaly upazila headquarters and Kazipur municipality have gone under water, forcing some 500 weaving factories and 40 educational institutions to be closed.

Miseries of those marooned in their houses for the last few days continued to be compounded. Many are passing days in the open air.

Our staff correspondent from Bogra reports: The Jamuna at Dhunat upazila burst its banks and inundated at least four to five villages while at Dighankandi village, over 50 families had to take refuge

Iraq football fans

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who were hit by a roadside blast while patrolling south of Baghdad, according to security and medical officials.

Lieutenant Hamza al-Waeli of the Hilla Police told AFP that five members of a police task force were killed and two wounded by a roadside booby-trap near al-Dagharah, 120km south of the capital.

Dr Ali Al-Timimi of the Hilla Surgical Hospital confirmed that medics had received the bodies of five policemen and treated two who had been wounded.

Another five security force members were killed while conducting a joint raid against an alleged al-Qaeda stronghold just west of executed dictator Saddam Hussein's hometown of Tikrit in northern Iraq, security officials said.

Two policemen and three Iraqi army soldiers were killed in the raid, including an army major, according to an Iraqi army officer in Tikrit who asked not to be identified. Another army officer was wounded in the fighting.

Iraq is in the grip of a series of overlapping civil conflicts between rival religious and political factions, while a violent insurgency is fighting to undermine the US-backed government and its attempts to restore order.

Afghan, US forces

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number wounded. Sixteen Taliban compounds, three enemy motorcycles and five enemy trucks were destroyed as well," the statement said.

One coalition soldier suffered a broken hand during the battle, while there were no civilian casualties, it added.

The ultra-Islamic Taliban launched a bloody insurgency after they were toppled from power by US-led forces and Afghan warlords following the 9/11 attacks. Thousands of people have died since then.

The Taliban were not immediately available to comment on the official casualty figures.

Helmand has seen some of the most bitter fighting, particularly in rebel-infested Musa Qala district, near the scene of the latest battle, where the coalition says 160 militants have been killed since Sunday.

The province produces most of Afghanistan's opium, the source of the heroin that reportedly funds much of the Taliban's operations.

The fighting erupted on Wednesday night after Taliban militants attacked a joint US-led and Afghan National Army patrol.

"During the course of the battle, the insurgents attacked from 16 separate compounds using heavy machineguns, rocket-propelled grenades and small arms weapons," said the statement.

The troops called in air support, and coalition planes dropped two bombs on the buildings judged to contain the most insurgents. Secondary blasts suggested there was a large cache of explosives inside, it said.

During the battle insurgents continually reinforced their fighters using a system of wadis, or riverbeds, linking the area of the fighting to nearby Musa Qala, it added.

The coalition said intelligence suggested there was a heavy concentration of Taliban in Musa Qala and that the insurgents would stay "stay and

In the first information report (FIR) filed with Dhanmondi Police Station, Faiaz complained that the same accused persons took Tk 1 crore in bribe from Al-Amin Construction Company Ltd sometime between February 20 and February 23, 2002
