Dark clouds overhead and an expectedly muddy ground after daylong showers gave the Bangabandhu National Stadium a gloomy look but the conditions could not spoil Abahani's championship party as they lifted the inaugural professional football league title yesterday.

Zahid Hasan Emily and Awudu Ibrahim found the mark either side of halftime as the sky-blues blanked Sheikh Russel 2-0 to ensure the B. League trophy with a match in hand.

Abahani, however, will have to wait to lay their hands on the new trophy as the Bangladesh Football Federation is expected to crown the champions on August 6 in grandeurs.

It was the Dhaka heavyweights' first major domestic success after a six-year drought, which saw their worst run ever after winning the first version of the National Football League in 2000 and the Dhaka Premier League next year.

With 13 wins in 19 outings, Abahani, who play Mukti Joddha in their last match on Monday, took an unassailable lead in the 11-team table with 44 points.

It also dashed the slim title hopes of their archrivals Mohammedan, who now settle for runners-up with 39 points with one match remaining against Arambagh on August 1, the concluding day of the league.

Russel, who drew their first leg match against Abahani 0-0, stuck to 32 points with a hope of a third.

place finish. They had three Moroccan players on the unplayable pitch but without the steel of captain Bourid in the backline and his fellow Moroccan Younes' unplayable front, were reduced to mediocore.

The credit, however, should go to the rival midfield, which probably produced their best game of the season under the leadership of Arif Khan Joy. The holding midfielder and Abahani captain not only killed Russel moves but also generated a series of attacks for Ujjal, Abul and Abdullah Parvez who supplied regularly for striking duo Emily and Ibrahim to put constant pressure on the opposition.

Ibrahim fired a low drive wide and Emily was denied by Russel rightback Aminul in the first ten minutes but the sky-blues really threatened to score when Ibrahim got behind the opposition backline after 16 minutes. However, the Ghanaian forward, who came dangerously close, was dispossessed by an onrushing Zia and the waterlogged strip.

Emily then headed a chip by Ujjal just wide after hard work by Ibrahim and Abul, who failed to keep the ball on target minutes later.

Ibrahim, Parvez and Emily again frustrated the 5,000-strong Abahani fans fluffing opportunities on one-on-one before the latter broke the deadlock in the first half stoppage time.

Emily, whose constant rushing unsettled the rival defence throughout the first half, met a superb centre by leftback Mintu to put a glancing header past Zia from 15 yards for his 12th league goal.

Four minutes after resumption, Abahani sealed the victory with their first attack of the second session. It was Abul who created the chance with exquisite skill, dodging past two defenders outside the area before releasing Ibrahim free at the left side and the Ghanaian completed the job hammering in a low drive for his sixth goal.



Mali greets Twenty20

New International Cricket Council supremo Ray Mali hailed Twenty20 as the game of the future Thursday at the official launch for September's inaugural world championships in South Africa.

With dwindling crowd numbers for both Test match and one-day internationals, the ICC is placing huge stock on the first ever championships for a shorter version of the game that Mali said would capture everyone's imagination.

"Without any doubt this is a great concept, it is a game of the future," Mali said at a glitzy launch party in Johannesburg.

"Within the next five to 10 years, every South African will be playing this kind of game," added Mali, who has recently succeeded the late Percy Sonn.

Dancers and a laser show at the launch provided a taste of the high-octane atmosphere that can be

expected in Durban, Johannesburg and Cape Town when the three cities play host to the 12 teams playing in the tournament.

Mali said he was looking forward to the event with a mixture of pride and excitement, knowing South Africa -- one of the pioneers of the game -- would do a great job of showcasing the game in the best possible light.

"And excitement because the event marks a first for cricket -- the first time this format of the game will have been played on a truly global scale."

South African skipper Graeme Smith said Twenty20 was a hit with players who had managed to rack up previously unimaginable scores.

"T20 cricket has helped the game move with modern times, its broken moulds -- even in terms of our own thinking, and targets that seemed impossible are now possible," said Smith whose big-hitting style is perfectly suited to the game.

"I think I have lost more patience since I've started playing Twenty20," he admitted.

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"It can't be easy for him to say he's not going to tour with England because I know he's desperate to get out there and play," Vaughan told reporters at England's National Performance Centre on Thursday, where his side trained indoors with a rain-soaked Trent Bridge unfit for practice.

Eng struggle in rain-hit 2nd Test

England were 94-3 at tea on the opening day of the rain-hit second Test at Trent Bridge on Friday after being put into bat by Indian captain Rahul Dravid.

Zaheer Khan did the early damage, utilising the damp conditions to tempt Andrew Strauss (4) and Michael Vaughan (9) into edges to first slip.

India also captured the prized wicket of Kevin Pietersen for only 13 as England slipped to 47-3 at one stage.

Pietersen had initially been fortunate to get an edge onto pad to prevent an lbw.

But in the next over he was beaten by one shaping back in from left-arm paceman RP Singh that trapped him in front.

Alastair Cook (35) and Paul Collingwood (25) repaired some of the damage with an unbroken 47-run partnership for the fourth wicket.

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U-19 CRICKET Bangladesh face India in final today

Bangladesh under-19 cricket team take on their Indian counterparts in the final of the tri-nation tournament at the Colts Cricket Club ground in Colombo today.

India finished top of the table with eight points while Bangladesh, who beat hosts Sri Lanka in a group match, were soundly beaten twice by India U-19s, last of which was by the margin of 129 runs on Thursday.

India piled up 264-9 despite spinner Nasir Hossain's four-wicket haul. Rain forced Bangladesh to chase a revised target of 212 in 29 overs and they were restricted to 82-7 with Tapash Ghosh scoring 29.

Bangladesh, who split points with Sri Lanka after their first match was washed out, crashed to India by 97 runs earlier, before beating the home side by 43 runs in the second round robin game.

Cruciani, who left shortly before the mid-season break in the competition.

They were top-of-the-table when Cruciani, also a former Bangladesh national coach, departed but the sky-blues slipped to third place at the end of the first leg following their only defeat in the league so far: a 2-1 upset by visiting Khulna Abahani, which eventually was the Argentinian's last match in charge.

Cruciani shaped the team well. But he gave priority on having one of his three Argentine recruits up front. But (Hernan) Caporaso could not deliver goals. In defence, (Mariano) Caporaso was outstanding and probably the best foreign player we have had in recent times," said Amalesh after the triumph at the Bangabandhu National Stadium.

"We began to field more local players and the finishing got better after Cruciani, preferred a three-man attack. We switched to 4-4-2 to strengthen the midfield," said the former national midfielder, who began his coaching career in the late 70s as a playing member of the sky-blues.

Amalesh, who also had to take over from Russian coach Yuri in the middle of the 2001 Premiership on road to title, did a similar job this time using only one foreigner in the latter part of the league.

The three Argentines were unavailable in the second leg and the replacements were not good enough to compete with the locals, who got better match by match to stretch their unbeaten run to 11 games under Amalesh's guidance.

Despite winning a title after a long gap, Abahani's celebrations were repressed.

"We are happy but can't enjoy this success much as our Chief Patron (Sheikh Hasina) is in jail," said captain Arif Khan Joy, who had earlier announced his retirement from domestic football after this season for political ambition.

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Get back, says Vaughan

England captain Michael Vaughan believes Marcus Trescothick may have salvaged some chance of playing international cricket again by making himself unavailable for the whole of the team's 2007-08 tour programme.

Trescothick, who a fortnight ago was included in England's provisional squad for the inaugural World Twenty20 in South Africa, withdrew Wednesday saying he'd yet to fully overcome the effects of a stress-related illness that has kept him out of international cricket for nearly a year.

Vaughan, speaking on the eve of England's second Test against India at Trent Bridge, said opening batsman Trescothick, 31, was right not to come back if he didn't feel completely ready, as a premature return "could be the end of him".

"It can't be easy for him to say he's not going to tour with England because I know he's desperate to get out there and play," Vaughan told reporters at England's National Performance Centre on Thursday, where his side trained indoors with a rain-soaked Trent Bridge unfit for practice.

"I think by making this decision it could give him a chance of playing again. The last thing I wanted was for him to come out and play too soon because I thought that could be the end of him."

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
