REHABILITATION OF DISPLACED PEOPLE

New pricing policy for acquired land on cards

A proposed policy, which will bring changes in the Acquisition and Requisition of Immoveable Property Ordinance, 1982, now recommends "joint verification" of the assets of the persons affected.

"All project related asset losses will be compensated at full market value which is equivalent to the replacement value for the acquired assets," says the draft of the proposed policy.

The proposed policy on involuntary resettlement, the first at the

national level, is expected to minimise the problems of the people displaced by development work and riverbank erosion.

"The main objective of the proposed policy is to safeguard the rights of the project affected households/persons...to minimise the impacts of displacement on them and ensure that their lives are restored, or improved." Joint Secretary of the land ministry Pius D Costa told The Daily Star.

Trial train to carry Bangladesh team for talks on regular train service

A 14-member Bangladesh delegation leaves for Kolkata today to discuss some unresolved issues about the launching of regular rail service between Dhaka and Kolkata.

The trial train Moitree Express will start from Dhaka Cantonment Station at 7:00am carrying the delegation for Chittpur Station in Kolkata.

The delegation expects to finalise the date for the official launching of the train service during its two-day meeting starting from tomorrow.

Additional Secretary for Communications ATKM Ismail will

lead the team comprising high officials from home, communications and foreign ministries. Twenty-one more officials would assist the team.

During the talks on July 10-11 in Dhaka, the authorities concerned from both India and Bangladesh claimed some 'success' and expressed hope that the train service would kick off before the Ramadan.

AE Ahmed, additional secretary of Indian home ministry, who led the 32-member team to Dhaka, is expected to sit again with its Bangladesh counterpart in Kolkata.

Musharraf talks power sharing deal with Benazir in UAE

AP, Islamabad

Pakistani President Gen Pervez Musharraf held secret talks with opposition leader and former prime minister Benazir Bhutto about a possible power sharing deal, media reported yesterday.

The meeting, held Friday in the Gulf emirate of Abu Dhabi, lasted about one hour and ended without an agreement, Pakistani newspapers and television networks reported.

Official spokesmen for Musharraf and Benazir Bhutto said they had no information on any meeting.

"I am not in a position to confirm or deny the development," said Farhatullah Babar, Benazir Bhutto's spokesman in Pakistan.

The plans face constitutional hurdles, weakening the hand of Musharraf, an army general who seized power in 1999 and who is a key US ally in the fight against terrorism.

Musharraf has recently been
