



## Justice Abu Sayeed's death anniversary today

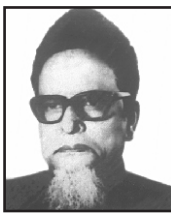
Today is the 19th death anniversary of former president Justice Abu Sayeed Chowdhury, says a press release.

In 1971 Justice Chowdhury played a very significant role in mobilising world opinion in favour of the War of Liberation. Later, he led a Bangladesh delegation to the United Nations (UN) and he was head of Bangladesh Missions in London and New York.

## Dead whale to be sent to Nat'l Science, Tech Museum

CCC, district administration and Chittagong Metropolitan Police (CMP) took measures to preserve the rare mammal till it is sent to Dhaka.

# Dhaka committed to peace, development

## Says foreign adviser

Foreign Affairs Adviser Iftekhar A Chowdhury yesterday said the ongoing reforms of the government are aimed at institutionalising Bangladesh's pluralist spirit and 'communal harmony'.

Iftekhar, who is now in Manila, was speaking at a meeting between the foreign ministers attending the ongoing Asean Regional Forum (ARF) and Philippines President Gloria Arroyo at the Malacanang Presidential Palace, according to a foreign ministry press release from Manila.

He said, "Bangladesh is committed to peace and development and is

pleased to join the ARF at a time when the dawn of the Asian Century is breaking out across the global horizon."

"As all are aware, Bangladesh today is undergoing great changes. Reforms are in motion, setting up institutions that would sustain the pluralist spirit and urges of the Bangladeshi people for a long time to come," said the foreign adviser, who is heading the Bangladeshi delegation attending the ARF for the first time.

"At home and abroad we are a mainstream and moderate voice encouraging bridge-building across faiths and communities; we take great

pride in the communal harmony that pervades our society," he said.

Citing the recent gift of Gautam Buddha's hair relics to Sri Lanka, Iftekhar said it was given "not because we wanted to be seen as generous, but because we wanted to share our heritage with the Sri Lankan Buddhists".

Lauding the Philippines for its measures to encourage 'communal harmony' between its Christian and Muslim communities, he said Bangladesh would support and welcome the Philippines as an 'observer' in the Organisation of Islamic Conference.

### MASS PSYCHOGENIC ILLNESS

## 89 more students fall sick

Some 89 students and a headmaster fell sick during outbreaks of mass psychogenic illness (MPI), also known as mass hysteria, in different parts of the country yesterday.

Our Narayanganj correspondent reports: The headmaster and 25 students of Kamrangir Char Government Primary School were affected by mass hysteria.

A student of the school fainted after looking at a syringe. As the news spread, others, including the headmaster, started to fall sick.

Later, the syringe was examined, but nothing harmful was found.

Our Rajshahi correspondent adds: About 50 students of Durgapur Hoza Government Primary School fell victim to MPI.

They underwent treatment at Durgapur Upazila Health Complex.

In Munshiganj, the authorities of Hashara Kali High School declared the school closed for a few days after 14 students fell sick in an outbreak of MPI, our correspondent reports.

Mass hysteria has continued to break out at schools in different parts of the country for the last few days, causing panic among the students.

The experts said an outbreak of mass psychogenic illness is a time of anxiety and worry. The illness is aggravated by malnutrition, tension and lack of tolerance. The victims are mostly students aged between 13 and 25.

The experts also assured that the illness has no long-term effects on the victims and there is nothing to worry about.

### \$2.5m DFID aid

#### for flood victims

Responding to the current floods in Bangladesh, the UK has given \$2.5 million of immediate aid, providing food, water, shelter and medicines for 50,000 people in the ten worst-affected districts and special assistance through the Chars Livelihoods Programme (CLP), says a press release.

The UK's Department for International Development (DFID) is supporting the government's ongoing relief work, channelling \$1.8 million aid through UNDP.

The UK has also authorised DFID's own Chars Livelihoods Programme (CLP) to offer further reliefs in their operation areas in five districts in the northern region - Jamalpur, Sirajganj, Bogra, Gaibandha, Kurigram. Up to \$1 million will be spent for this worst hit region by CLP.

Acting UK DFID Country Representative Sarah Sanyahumbi said, "We are keenly aware of the need for urgent action in bringing help for the many gravely affected by flooding. As a long-standing friend of the Bangladeshi people, the UK seeks to continue its partnership with the Government of Bangladesh, and to make sure that assistance reaches those who are most in need."

Bangladesh's Comprehensive Disaster Management Programme, jointly funded by the UK and UNDP, has been established to improve Bangladesh's capacity to manage natural disasters like floods significantly.

During the 2004 floods, UK assistance to the relief operation totalled \$29 million. Every year, the UK contributes \$120 million through DFID in support of Bangladesh's development programmes, making it the largest bilateral partner.

## Concern over laid-off jute mills, workers

Various socio-political organisations have expressed grave concern over the fate of the laid-off workers of the four state-owned jute mills that blew their final whistle at midnight on July 31 and their families.

In a joint statement, Karmojibi Nari (KN) President Shirin Akhter and General Secretary Sharmeen Kabir alleged that the nation's economy would be hit hard if jute mill workers kept losing their jobs and this would further increase the rate of unemployment in the country.

They urged the government to make arrangements to employ the laid-off workers and to ensure proper education facilities for their children.

In a different statement, Labour Employment Right President Moshleh Uddin Moshu alleged that the state-owned jute mills and their laid-off workers are facing a huge crisis because of the ill-conceived policies of the government.

The mill workers are paying the ultimate price for the reform policies introduced by the government, the statement added.

Moshu called on the government and the concerned authorities to pay up the arrears of the laid-off workers and thereby bring an end to the untoward situation.

## Alleged robber lynched

An alleged robber was lynched at Arai Hazar in the district on Tuesday, police sources said.

The deceased was identified as Arafat, 28.

The police said the incident took place when a gang of robbers numbering seven to eight was taking preparation for committing a robbery on the Arai Hazar road.

Locals caught one of the robbers and beat him to death.

# Flood kills 38, affect 46 lakh in 36 dists

## Adviser tells press briefing

The stretch of areas inundated by flooding could be reduced to a great extent if the administration would have repaired the vulnerable parts of embankments and bridges in time, said Food and Disaster Management Adviser Tapan Chowdhury yesterday.

"Areas of inundation could be reduced to a great extent provided that the administration had prior knowledge of vulnerability of the embankments and bridges and acted in time," he said at a press briefing at his ministry conference room.

Referring to his visit to flood-affected Kurigram and Sirajganj districts along with Chief Adviser Dr Fakhruddin Ahmed, the adviser said damaged flood embankments and bridges let the vast areas of these districts to be submerged.

He said around 46 lakh people have been affected in 36 districts where 38 people have so far died in the current flooding.

The flood has caused damages to crops of around 600,000 acres of land, 3370km of roads fully and 8144km partly, 44km of embankments fully and 363km partly, 82 educational institutions fully and 1766 partly, 14 bridges and culverts fully and 178 partly, he added.

Replying to a question, the adviser said the overall flood situation is not so worst right now that a state of 'national disaster' should be declared.

Asked if the political parties could launch relief operation for flood-victims, the adviser said anyone can come to the aid of affected people, but "I cannot say for sure if the political parties can take part in relief operations using their banners. There has been no decision yet in this regard."

Tapan said he does not feel that the government should appeal to political parties to come to the aid of the flood victims.

help each other individually or collectively. No separate appeal is needed for political parties," he added.

The government has enough food reserve and these are being distributed as per the requirements of flood-affected areas, he said, adding, "The finance adviser has assured that he would allocate required amount of money to mitigate the sufferings of the affected people."

Tapan said the government has a reserve of over 10 lakh tonnes of food grains apart from importing more food grains.

"We are also taking preparations in advance to supply sufficient amount of seeds and fertilisers to help farmers in preparing seedbeds with the recession of flood waters,"

he added.

Asked about government's initiative to supply water purifiers in the affected areas, the adviser said, "We do not have mobile water treatment plants, but we are distributing water purifying tablets. We already gave away over 89,000 tablets."

He said the relief so far allocated by the food and disaster management ministry includes 9200 metric tonnes of rice as GR, Tk 2 crore in cash as GR, Tk 1.25 crore as house grants, and Tk 50 lakh for rescue operations.

The adviser said the European Union has declared an assistance of \$2 million for flood victims and the government has welcomed it.

# BNP cadres grab land of Hindu families in Munshiganj

## Allege victims

Local BNP cadres grabbed the lands and other properties of 50 Hindu families at Louhajang in Munshiganj and forced them out of their houses about two months ago, the victims alleged yesterday.

"The BNP cadres first grabbed our lands and set up a madrasa for girls there. We could not protest in fear of further attack and repression. Finally, they ousted us from our homes. Now we have no shelter and are passing our days like homeless people," said Kulbhushan Kangsha Banik, one of the victims, at a press conference at the National Press Club in the city.

He also alleged that the cadres have taken signatures of the victims on false land deeds at gunpoint before ousting them from their homes two months ago.

Kulbhushan said the BNP cadres had been torturing the families

for the last several years.

"We could not celebrate our religious festivals peacefully. The cadres demolished our temple and puja mandap. They beat us when we tried to save our temple," he said.

Rashmoni Kangsha Banik, another victim, said they had informed the Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) of the situation, but to no avail.

"The cadres once set fire to my seven-year-old daughter and they also beat me when I tried to extinguish the fire," said Maya Rani Kangsha Banik.

"Two months ago, the BNP cadres beat me and my husband before ousting us from our house. They will kill us if we try to go back to our home," she said.

Basudeb Kangsha Banik, Gouranga Kangsha Banik and Gopal Chandra Saha were also present at the press conference.

## Declare Bangabandhu as Father of the Nation

### Demand civil society members

Members of the civil society yesterday demanded that the government immediately declare Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman as Father of the Nation and execute the verdict of the Bangabandhu Murder Case.

The demand came at a human chain in front of Bangabandhu Memorial Museum at Dhanmondi Road no 32 in the city.

The human chain was formed at about 7:00am on the very first day of August, 'the mourning month', marking the 32nd death anniversary of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman who was assassinated along with most of his family members in a military coup on August 15, 1975.

The organisers, mostly cultural activists and poets placed a wreath at the portrait of Bangabandhu there and observed a minute's silence.

Poet Nirmalendu Goon, Prof AAMS Arefin Siddique, Prof Shamsuzzaman Khan, Golam Kuddus, Anwara Syed Haque, Salauddin Badal, Aslam Sani, Rabindra Gop, Afzal Hossain, Shahadat Hossain Nipu, Bulbul Mahalanabis, Ayat Ali Patwari, Sheikh Abdul Kader also took part in the human chain.

## 12 extra-judicial killings in July

### Says Odhikar report

Twelve people were killed by law enforcement agencies in the country last month, says a report on extra-judicial killings by Odhikar, a human rights organisation.

Of them, police allegedly killed eight people and four others were killed by Rapid Action Battalion (Rab).

Ten people were killed in 'crossfire', six by police and four by Rab.

Four people died in jail custody. Thirty women and girls were raped during the period. Of them 13 were women and 17 were girls.

Of the 13 women, three were killed, and of the 17 girls, three were killed after rape.

A total of 12 people, seven women, three men and two children, were the victims of acid-related violence.

Meanwhile, Indian Border Security Force (BSF) killed eight Bangladeshi nationals and injured 11 others in July. Besides seven Bangladeshis were abducted by the BSF.

The report of Odhikar was prepared on the basis of stories published in eleven daily newspapers.

Meanwhile, Bangladesh Nari Progoti Sangha, a women's rights organisation, said 179 incidents of women's repression occurred in the country in July.

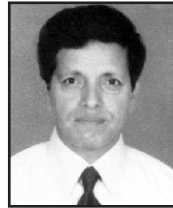
A total of 61 women were killed, 30 raped, four abducted and two were victims of acid violence.

According to Bangladesh Mahila Parishad, 409 women were the victims of repression during the period.

Of them 72 women were raped, nine were killed after rape and 13 women were victims of acid violence.

Thirteen women were killed for dowry, it added.
