

DU erupts in violence as army beats students

Removal of army camp demanded, indefinite strike called

Thousands of students at Dhaka University (DU) fought running battles with police last night demanding the removal of an army base from the campus and an apology from the army for the beating up of three students earlier in the afternoon.

More than 50 students and several police were injured in the confrontations in which police fired rubber bullets and tear gas canisters as well as using water cannon and repeated baton charges. Students pelted the police with stones and bricks.

Of the injured, at least 25 students received treatment from Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH).

Students protesting police and army brutality called an indefinite student strike at DU starting today.

The initial cause of the demonstrations was an incident at around 3.30 pm when army personnel mercilessly beat three DU students and humiliated a teacher over a petty dispute concerning comments passed by spectators watching a soccer match at the university's gymnasium ground where an army camp is situated.

The soccer match was between public administration and journalism departments. During a penalty shootout Mehedi Mohammad, a student at the public administration department stood up in front of a group of army personnel, obscuring the army members' view.

Army members allegedly abused

him verbally and asked him to move before beginning to beat Mehedi and his friends.

Mehedi along with Shafiq and Lucas, all MSS students of public administration, and Dipu, a third year student of the same department were taken to DMCH for treatment.

As Mubashsher Munayem, a teacher of public administration tried to stop the incident, army personnel also humiliated him.

In protest students demonstrated against the army action, demanding an apology and the removal of the army camp from the campus. In response police baton charged the students injuring five or six of them.

The home secretary after a meeting of the monitoring cell of home ministry said an accused named Joj Miah already made a confessional statement, and the investigators are now also focusing on finding out whether Islamic militants and Muti Hannan, who had been involved in different other grenade attacks in the country, also had hands behind the deadly August 21 attack.

OMS PROGRAMME
Rice to be sold at Tk 19 a kg in Ramadan

The government has decided to sell rice at Tk 19 per kg through Open Market Sale (OMS) programme during Ramadan in a bid to rein in its price spike during the month of fasting.

Besides, the government started the Vulnerable Group Feeding (VGF) programme in 12 districts from yesterday.

The decision to sell rice through OMS was taken yesterday at an inter-ministerial meeting chaired by Food and Disaster Management Adviser Tapan Chowdhury, held at the finance ministry's conference room.

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AL demands proper probe

Awami League (AL) yesterday demanded proper investigation into the August 21 grenade attack of 2004 on an AL rally and exemplary punishment to those who had 'direct or indirect links' in the onslaught.

"The present caretaker government has taken many initiatives but it has not yet taken any initiative [to punish the perpetrators] for the 21 August grenade attack. We urge them [the government] to take measures in this regard and punish the real culprits," said Zillur Rahman, acting president of the AL, during a press conference at his Gulshan residence.

To observe the day, AL will place wreaths at a temporary memorial in front of the AL headquarters on Bangabandhu Avenue today. It will also arrange special prayers for the

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Govt decides to sell 3 licences for VoIP Auction in October

The government finally declared yesterday that it will sell licences to private operators at an auction in October for running the Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) business.

It has decided to sell licences for three international gateways (IGW) and two interconnect exchanges (ICX) to the highest bidders.

The much-awaited declaration that came at a press briefing at the telecommunications ministry yesterday will mean an end to the government's monopoly over IGW, the mechanism through which international calls are sent and received.

In a written statement, the telecoms authorities announced that

the government has approved the much-awaited International Long Distance Telecommunications Services (ILDTS) Policy, 2007 to liberalise VoIP, also called internet telephony.

Telecommunications Secretary Sheikh Khurshid Alam and Bangladesh Telecommunications Regulatory Commission (BTRC) Chairman Maj Gen (retired) Manzurul Alam were present at the briefing.

Under the ILDTS policy, no foreign companies including the present land and mobile phone operators will be eligible to take part in the bidding for the licences.

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JMB man to die for Jamalpur killing

A Dhaka court yesterday sentenced a Majlis-e-Shura member of the Jamaatul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB), a banned Islamist outfit, to death for killing a Christian youth in Jamalpur four years back.

Judge Mohammad Israfil Hossain of the Speedy Trial Tribunal-4 handed down the sentence in the presence of the convict, Salahuddin alias Salehin, at a packed courtroom.

The court acquitted two other JMB members -- Amir Khan and Sharif Monwar alias Shiplu -- as the charges brought against them were not proved.

Earlier, the prosecution and the defence finished their arguments and the court recorded statements of 14 prosecution witnesses.

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Pabna farmers block highway for fertiliser

Failing to get fertiliser, several thousand aggrieved farmers yesterday blockaded the Pabna-Rajshahi highway at Tebunia in Pabna bringing traffic movement to a halt.

Police and joint forces rushed to the spot and brought the situation under control.

A probe committee has been formed to investigate the incident.

Several thousand farmers from different villages of Maligasa union under Pabna Sadar Upazila thronged Tebunia Bazar yesterday morning for fertiliser. Failing to get fertiliser, the agitating farmers put barricades on the Pabna-Rajshahi highway at Tebunia creating a long gridlock.

On information, Pabna police and joint forces rushed to the scene and brought the situation under control.

Pabna Sadar Upazila Nirbahi Officer (UNO) and other government officials visited the spot. They claimed that there was no crisis of fertiliser in the area. The incident

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ACC targets to get 150 convicted by Dec 2008

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) has set a target to have 150 corrupt people convicted by December 2008 if there is no act of god.

"At the current rate of inquiry, investigation and conviction in lower courts, we'll be able to reach the target of having 150 corrupt people convicted by December 2008 if there is no act of god and the High Court upholds the verdicts," ACC Secretary Mokhles ur Rahman told a questioner at the commission's regular briefing yesterday.

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More floods, fresh fears

Swelling rivers caused inundation of many new areas in the north and south-central parts of the country yesterday while numerous flood victims stayed back in the flood shelters and on embankments fearing more flooding.

patients across the country yesterday. A total of 64,991 people have now been infected with diarrhoea since July 30 and nine died of it.

According to the control room of the Directorate of General Health Services, around 1,012 people were newly infected with respiratory tract infections (RTI), raising the total to 16,060 since July 30. At least 13 died of RTI so far.

The number of patients with skin diseases stood at 16,147 with 1,138 newly infected yesterday while the number of patients with conjunctivitis stood at 3,982 with 313 newly infected.

Since July 30, a total of 518 people drowned and 40 people died of snakebites. The flood-related death toll now stands at 580.

Our correspondent in Gaibandha reports: Water gushing through breaches in different embankments flooded many areas of four upazilas in Gaibandha for the second time.

The Karota at Gobindaganj swelled 14cm yesterday, according to the Water Development Board (WDB).

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Sandbags and bamboos have been placed on a 60-foot stretch of Dohar-Mawa Road at Louhajang after the recent flooding had washed away a large swath of the road.
