

Khaleda's lawyers prepare to start legal battle

Counsels of detained BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia are preparing to start a legal battle at the High Court to free her by challenging the legality of her detention.

They will also file a bail petition as an immediate measure to free Khaleda.

A number of lawyers yesterday held a meeting with the BNP's newly appointed Secretary General Khandaker Delwar Hossain to discuss strategy and work plan to free their detained chairperson.

"Lawyers have been asked to decide the next course of action to start the legal fight to free the chairperson," Delwar Hossain told reporters.

A number of lawyers led by former deputy attorney general advocate Halal Uddin Mollah yesterday went to the special jail on the parliament building complex to collect Khaleda's signature on

Iajuddin to continue as president

Says Mainul

Law Adviser Mainul Hosein yesterday said though the tenure of President Iajuddin Ahmed ends on September 5, he will stay until the election of his successor.

The adviser made the remark when reporters approached him for a government view about the unprecedented situation.

"As per the constitution, Iajuddin's tenure as president ends on September 5. The constitution also says that he will have to continue until the election of his successor," said Mainul.

Citing speculations that Iajuddin would be replaced, the adviser categorically said the present caretaker government would never violate the constitution.

"It is the politicians who have violated the constitution. But the caretaker government will do its work as per the constitution," said Mainul.

2 DU teachers sent to jail after remand

The two detained Dhaka University (DU) teachers arrested on charges of breaching the emergency power rules were sent to jail yesterday having spent 11 days in police custody.

They were also shown arrested in another case filed with Ramna Police Station for vandalising public and private properties and obstructing police from performing duties at Shantinagar, Malibagh and Mouchak in the capital on August 22.

On completion of a four-day remand, Ramna police produced the two teachers-- General Secretary of Dhaka University Teachers' Association Prof Anwar

Fight for control intensifies in BNP

Bhuiyan calls meeting of leaders today; Delwar also in touch with grassroots

Rival factions of BNP, led by its expelled and newly appointed secretaries general, are now engaged in a battle over control of the party at all levels.

Expelled Secretary General Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan yesterday called upon the party's central and district level leaders and its former lawmakers to attend a meeting scheduled to be held today in his Gulshan residence. Sources said the meeting has been called to finalise a strategy for ensuring the Bhuiyan faction's control over the

party. Meanwhile, newly appointed Secretary General Khandaker Delwar Hossain has also started contacting leaders of different levels to garner their support for now detained chairperson of the party at all levels.

"Mannan Bhuiyan has no post in the party, he is not even in the party anymore...so he cannot call any meeting using the party's name," Delwar told The Daily Star yesterday.

According to the Bhuiyan faction's plan, its de facto chief, Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan, will hold a series

Both factions want EC to invite them

Both the factions in the BNP now have their eyes on the Election Commission's (EC) invitation for the talks on electoral reforms since the call is likely to stamp the recipient as the mainstream at this point in time.

Leaders loyal to detained Chairperson Khaleda Zia plan to inform the EC about the latest changes in the party's line-up. In a letter, they would also request the

commission to correspond with the newly appointed secretary general for any official purpose.

"We will take legal measures if the Election Commission sends the invitation meant for the BNP to its expelled secretary general," Rizvi Ahmed, assistant office secretary of the party, told The Daily Star after meeting Secretary General Khandaker Delwar Hossain.

On the other hand, those united in favour of expelled secretary general Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan

have initiated measures to prove themselves as the mainline of the party by marshalling leaders and workers down to the grassroots level.

They think getting the EC's invitation will amount to being recognised as the real BNP now.

"We represent the original BNP. We hope the commission will send the invitation for us to join the dialogue since most of the leaders and workers are with us and we



CA, army chief sit today with business leaders

At a high profile meeting with the country's top private sector stakeholders today, the government high-ups will listen to the business community, especially about their 'wariness' to run business under the current situation.

Chief Adviser Fakhruddin Ahmed, Army Chief General Momen U Ahmed and Finance Adviser Mirza Azizul Islam, among others, will attend the meeting at Radisson Water Garden Hotel in the capital.

The government arranged the meeting against the backdrop of the business community's earlier claim that they feel lack of confidence in running business smoothly due to different measures taken by the government.

After a meeting with the visiting IMF (International Monetary Fund) delegation at the secretariat, the finance adviser yesterday briefed the journalists about today's meeting with the business community.

"We want to know whether the business people lack confidence in running business under the current situation. Then the govern-

ment can take corrective measures if necessary," he said.

He however said the macroeconomic indicators in last seven months do not reflect a 'lack of confidence' that the businessmen and media are saying about.

Aziz said most of the macroeconomic indicators including export, import, remittance, and credit to private sector are on the right track.

He admitted that the growth of working capital has come down to 15 per cent this fiscal year (FY) from 18 per cent of the previous FY.

Import of essential commodities including rice, wheat, crude oil and pulses increased in 2006-07, he said, adding that 7.14 lakh tonnes of rice, 17.52 lakh tonnes of wheat, 10.53 lakh tonnes of crude oil and 4.25 lakh tonnes of pulse were imported in FY 2006-07.

"But we don't have any proper system to coordinate between supply and demand which results in high inflation. Local production did not increase following the growing demand of consumers," he said.

"Increase in per capita income is one of the reasons behind the



Intel to give ICT education to students of Bangladesh

Chairman announces

Intel Corporation Chairman Dr Craig Barrett yesterday announced introduction of its Intel World Ahead Programme aiming at providing information and communication technology (ICT) education and its access to the general population across the country.

"We are excited about bringing in our global experience to Bangladesh," Barrett said at a news conference in the city during his brief visit to the capital. The World Ahead Programme, which Intel has been running worldwide for many years now, will be implemented jointly with Grameen Solution in collaboration with the government.

Dr Barrett noted that ICT brings four impacts on the society -- education, economic development, healthcare, and e-governance. "I visit 30 countries each year and all of those countries

share the same vision of a future where ICT would play its due role," said Barrett, who also chairs the United Nations Global Alliance for ICT and Development.

To attain the impacts, the Intel programme aims at improving four basic foundations ensuring access to information and communication technology (ICT), Internet connectivity, development of the content of local education, and training teachers in using the technology in educating children.

"Education is vital in developing a skilled workforce," Barrett said adding that Intel has committed to donate about 1,000 computers to schools over the next three years. Intel will work with the government to implement the programme and will donate enough personal computers (PCs) next year to set up a PC lab in all 64 districts of the country.

Dr Craig Barrett pointed out that

After scrutinising the case docket and other relevant documents, Metropolitan Magistrate KM Rubul Amin will pass the order on the issue.

On July 24, Officer-in-Charge Obaidul Haq of Gulshan Police Station, also the investigation officer of the case, submitted the charge sheet to the Court of Chief Metropolitan Magistrate against Hasina, Rehana and Selim. A total



Ex-MP Fazlul Haque Milon arrested

Former BNP lawmaker AKM Fazlul Haque Milon was arrested on corruption charges in the capital's Gulshan area early yesterday, a highly-placed Rab official said.

Twin suicide bombings in Pakistan kill 25

Suicide bombers attacked an army bus and a commercial district in a city near the Pakistani capital on Tuesday, killing at least 25 people, the army and police said.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility for the explosions, which injured dozens and deepened the sense of crisis in Pakistan amid political uncertainty ahead of elections. Officials suggested the bombings were the work of Islamic militants, possibly in response to Pakistani military operations near the Afghan border.

The first explosion devastated the bus early Tuesday morning as it travelled through a high-security area of Rawalpindi, a garrison city just south of Islamabad and the
