

Ex-commerce adviser Bulu sued for extortion

A case was filed against former commerce adviser Barkat Ullah Bulu and eight of his acolytes in Noakhali on Monday night for alleged extortion.

Kamal Pasha, a former member of Nateshwar Union Parishad (UP) in Noakhali's Sonaimuri upazila, filed the case with the local police station.

The other accused in the case are Nateshwar UP chairman Nurul Amin Swapan, Sakayet Ullah Saku, Shah Jalal, Farid Ahmed, Ripon, Tipu, Babul and Fakira.

Pasha in his first information report (FIR) complained that Swapan on instructions from Bulu demanded that he give them four metric tons of wheat out of 11 metric tons allocated for reconstruction work of the Ghosonkata-Laxmipur road in 2002.

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Conjoined twins born

A pair of female conjoined babies were born at a clinic in Nawabganj upazila of Dhaka district early yesterday.

Hashu Begum, 30, gave birth to the twins, who are joined at the chest and abdomen, through a Caesarean at Nawabganj Clinic General Hospital and Diagnostic Centre.

The twins were later shifted to Dhaka Medical College and Hospital (DMCH) and were being treated under Syed Mahmudur Rahman, associate professor of the DMCH paediatrics department.

DMCH paediatricians said the condition of the twins is quite sound and it seems that they may survive in this way.

Syed Mahmudur Rahman said if they do not go for surgery for separation, the conjoined babies could survive.

The twins weigh five kilograms and have separate heads, legs and hands. However, it is yet to be examined if their heart, liver, kidney and other internal organs are

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Dhaka keen to join Shanghai cooperation body as observer

Bangladesh has expressed its interest to join the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) as an observer.

The organisation is comprised of four central Asian states and Russia and China.

Iran, Mongolia, India and Pakistan are its observers.

Foreign Adviser Iftekhar Ahmed Chowdhury, now in Russia, expressed the interest in an interview with "Russia Today" television show, the Russian counterpart of BBC's "Hard Talk", in Moscow on Monday night.

Currently, there is a moratorium on the expansion of the number of SCO's observers, but the foreign adviser said he has received an assurance from Russian authorities that they will support Bangladesh as soon as the moratorium is lifted.

"We've excellent bilateral relations with each of the SCO member-states. We can make a huge contribution to this organisation in political and economic terms," he said.

BARAPUKURIA COAL MINE

Toxic gas leak leads to partial shutdown

Emission of serious toxic carbon monoxide (CO) gas has forced the Barapukuria Coal Mining Company Ltd (BCMCL) in Dinajpur to reseal yesterday mining area that was only reopened two weeks ago after being closed for nearly two years.

As a result, the target coal production of the mine has once again dropped to half. Consequently, the mine will once again fail to provide enough coal to run the Barapukuria 250MW coal-fired power plant adjacent to the mine site.

The daily coal production target of the mine is 3,000 metric tons (mt), of which the power plant

requires about 2,400mt. A set of mining equipment worth \$ 5.5 million has also been stuck inside the 1,100 feet deep sealed area of Phase 1110, a competent source at the BCMCL said. The mine will continue to produce coal from another phase using another set of equipment.

"We have been noticing an alarming rise of carbon monoxide emission for the last two days. We had been extracting the coal amid high risk. But the level of emission today has become too dangerous for any human being to work in," said a source.

In early October 2005, to avert a disaster caused by emission of toxic gases as well as a threat of

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US denies N Korea off terror list

North Korea remains on a list of states that sponsor terrorism, a senior US diplomat said Tuesday, dismissing North Korean claims that Washington decided to remove the designation.

"No, they haven't been taken off the terrorism list," Assistant Secretary of State Christopher Hill told Japanese reporters as he arrived in Australia's business capital for a meeting of Pacific Rim nations. A State Department press officer separately confirmed the remarks.

Hill's comments were the first US denial since North Korea's Foreign Ministry, in a statement carried Monday by the country's official news agency, said that Washington decided to scotch the terror designation and with it related economic sanctions. The North Korean statement said the change came in a weekend meeting between Hill and his counterpart in Geneva.

Under a deal reached in February after years of tortuous negotiations, North Korea agreed to relinquish its nuclear programs, including one that has produced bomb material. In return, Washington agreed to open talks

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

Progress in Dubai talks on Benazir-Musharraf deal

Sharif vows to oust military ruler by Oct 15

Negotiators trying to thrash out a power-sharing deal between Pakistan President Pervez Musharraf and self-exiled former premier Benazir Bhutto made some progress on Tuesday, her party said.

At a meeting in Dubai they focused on US ally Musharraf's powers over the Pakistani parliament and on forthcoming presidential and general elections, Pakistan People's Party spokesman Farhatullah Babar said.

Talks held in London last week between the two-time prime minister and military ruler Musharraf's aides ended in deadlock, with Benazir saying that she would fly home ahead of general elections due by early next year.

"Discussions were held on some unresolved issues relating to the powers of the president and parliament and to arrangements on the holding of elections," Babar told AFP.

"There was some progress on holding free and fair elections," Babar added. "The dialogue will

Boat capsizes in Brahmaputra; 20 missing

At least 20 passengers went missing after a boat capsized in Brahmaputra River near Melandah upazila yesterday morning.

Locals said the mechanized boat sailed for Shyampur with around 100 passengers from Kazalihai in Melandah and sank in the river at about 11am due to bad weather.

All but 20 of the passengers swam ashore.

Local people salvaged the sunken boat but could not trace the missing people till filing of the report at about 2pm.

The search for the missing people was on but it was being hampered due to huge waves.

2 held for killing girl

Police arrested two people yesterday for killing the three-year girl Sadia in her residence at Hajaribagh in the capital on Monday.

The two arrestees-- Shahinur Begum, Sadia's stepmother, and Shahinur's lover Abul Quashem-- were arrested after Shahinur confessed that they chopped the minor girl to death, sources said.

Police said Sadia was killed as she witnessed illicit activities between her stepmother and Quashem, who was arrested from the city's Dhanmondi area in the early hours yesterday.

Liakat Ali, sub-inspector of Hajaribagh Police Station, quoting Shahinur said Quashem entered the house after Sadia's father went to office at around 10:00am on Monday.

Thousands marooned as fresh flood grips Sylhet

Part of Bogra dam washed away

Several thousand people in Zakiganj, Beanibazar and Golapganj upazilas of Sylhet were left marooned as fresh areas of these upazilas went under water in the past two days following a rise in the water level of the rivers Surma and Kushiyara.

Meanwhile, around 120 metres of a flood control dam by the river Jamuna at Sariakandi in Bogra

was washed away yesterday panicking several lakh people of the eastern part of the district.

Quoting the locals, our staff correspondent from Sylhet reports that villages in four unions of Zakiganj were submerged by the floodwaters.

Kushiyara was flowing 150cm above danger level at Amolshid, while the Surma was flowing 101cm above danger level at Amolshid border, the originating

point of the two rivers, Water Development Board officials said.

Onrush of water from the hilly regions of India triggered by torrential rains caused the rise in the water level of the rivers, sources said.

The flood situation in the district is also likely to deteriorate further in the next two days, as Surma is likely to rise by 7cm in Sylhet and by 2cm in Sunamganj,

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


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
