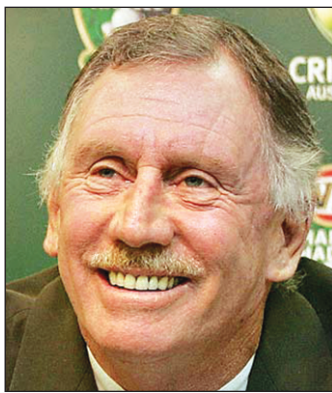

Pakistan finish off with Kenya

Pakistan beat Kenya by eight wickets to end the hosts miserable run in the four-nation Twenty20 international tournament at the Nairobi Gymkhana club here on Tuesday.

Only three Kenyan batsmen reached double figures after the Pakistan pace and spin attack flayed their batting line-up before they were bundled out for a humiliating 93 after winning the toss.

David Obuya hit Shoaib Akhtar for four in the second ball of the first over but the Pakistani pacer had the last laugh when he removed the opener and his partner Jimmy Kamande with only seven runs on the board.

The introduction of spin accelerated Kenya's steady decline with experienced Younis Khan playing a match-winning role by snapping up three wickets for 18 in a mean 3.4 overs per ball.

Abdur Rehman added two more wickets including the scalp of stand-in captain Thomas Odoyo for five and Tony Suji for four to reduce the hosts to 35-5.

Pakistan skipper Shoaib Malik led from the front and despite losing Mohammed Hafeez pushed his team for reach the target at 93 for two with 36 balls remaining.

Pakistan finished their matches unbeaten which augurs well for their new coach Geoff Lawson ahead of this month's inaugural Twenty20 World championships in South Africa.

"We have had excellent preparations for the world championships in very good conditions," said the former Australian pace bowler. "We are pleased with our results."

Lawson said he decided to introduce spinners in the match against Kenya just in case they will be needed to play the main role in the South African conditions that are likely to favour spin.

No place for Alfaz

BFF names 33 for residential camp

Alfaz Ahmed's return from retirement was short-lived as the veteran striker was dropped from the national team's preparatory camp for two tournaments this year and the World Cup pre-qualifiers.

The Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) yesterday called 33 footballers to join camp for this October's World Cup home and away pre-qualifiers against Tajikistan, the Grand Royal Cup in Myanmar where the Under-23 team will participate in November and the SAFF Championship in December.

Alfaz, who had announced his retirement from international football after the Asia Cup qualifiers in 2006, joined the camp for the Nehru Cup – which concluded in India last month – when he was picked by new coach Syed Nayeemuddin.

Alfaz, the fulcrum of the country's SAF Games (1999) and SAFF Championship (2003) winning teams, did not get a chance in the starting line-up of the first two games in the Nehru Cup in New Delhi but got back into the first eleven in the latter matches after the Bangladesh striking duo failed to deliver the goods.

Bangladesh scored just one goal in four matches and Indian coach Nayeemuddin, whose vacation has yet to be ended, kept his first choice striking pair of Emily and Robin in addition of Moni and rookie Rony Islam.

The BFF finalised the team after yesterday's teleconference among its acting general secretary Manzoor Hossain Malu, Hasanuzzaman Babloo who was coach of the Merdeka Cup side, assistant coach Golam Jilani and Nayeemuddin, who is now in Kolkata to obtain visa to return to

Bangladesh.

"We discussed for a long time and Nayeemuddin took reports of the Merdeka Cup before finalising the list," said Malu yesterday.

The team will leave Dhaka tomorrow for Cox's Bazar to have a monthlong residential camp in the tourist resort.

"We are sending three coaches and a physio with the team, which will stay at the Diamond Rest House. It is very close to the Cox's Bazar Stadium where the team will train for one month," informed Malu.

The general secretary of Cox's

Bazar DSA will co-ordinate the camp, to be run by Nayeem, Babloo and Jilani.

Although the squad include 33 members, goalkeeper Aminul Haque, who missed an entire season due to injury, will join unofficially.

"No doubt he is the number one goalkeeper of the country but Nayeem was reluctant as he did not see him play throughout the season. However, as the general secretary of the federation, I have used my power to take him to the camp," added Malu.

Aminul has recovered from injury

and has been training for long.

Although press reports suggested that Sujon, country's top defender, was on the verge of his return to the national team, it was learned that his recovery from injury was not good enough for him to play even humbly for half an hour.

Muktijoddha's holding midfielder Maruf and Badda Jagarani midfielder Nasir are the new inclusions while Mohammed Rony, Akram, GM Mamun, Mamun Khan and Liton were ignored after not playing in the Nehru Cup or the Merdeka Cup.

The other noted omission was former international Parvez Babu while impressive rightback Ibnul Siraji once again failed to win the heart of the coaching panel despite Bangladesh showed incompetence at the right side of the backline in the Nehru Cup.

Bangladesh face Korea today

Bangladesh will be put to the test in their final Pool B match of the Asia Cup hockey today in Chennai when they meet a battling South Korea.

Two-time champions Korea are level with China on seven points with only India ensuring a place in the semifinals from the group.

With China facing a lowly Sri Lanka also today in the South Indian city, the semifinal aspirants will look for goals against their inferior opponents from South Asia in a bid to finish behind the hosts.

Bangladesh, who have lost by an identical margin of 6-0 to both China and India, have confirmed play-offs for the 5th-8th places with wins against Thailand (13-0) and Sri Lanka (3-2).

BCB establish CCDM

Five league coordinators were appointed for the different tiers of cricket in Dhaka, it was decided yesterday.

At a meeting of Cricket Committee of Dhaka Metropolis (CCDM), it was also announced that the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) have constituted the Gazi Ashraf Hossain Lipu-led committee. The other members of this are Feroz Ahmad (co-chairman), Anwar Hossain (vice-chairman), a designated post for the Deputy Commissioner of Police (Mirpur Zone), Abid Hossain (member secretary) and Tariqul Islam Tito (member).

At the same meeting, the five coordinators for the upcoming 2007-08 season were named. They are: MA Kabir (Premier League), Md. Abu Selim Babla (First Division), Jobair Kabir Chowdhury Nipu (Second Division), Amin Khan (Third Division) and Humayun Kabir Ripon (Third Division Qualifying).

Mohidur Rahman Miraj will play the role of coordinator for the pending Third Division Qualifying for 2006-07 season.

Meanwhile, the CCDM has asked representatives from Brothers Union, City Club and Indira Road to attend a meeting at its Bangabandhu National Stadium office on Friday. The meeting is in connection with the relegation league of the previous season.

Ponting still uncertain

Australia are hopeful that Ricky Ponting will fly to South Africa by Sunday, ahead of Australia's opening ICC World Twenty20 match against Zimbabwe on Wednesday. However, even if he meets that timeframe – and that is no certainty – he will miss both Australia's warm-up games against South Africa and New Zealand on Sunday.

Adam Gilchrist, the acting captain in Ponting's absence, was unsure when Ponting would arrive but was confident he would play some part in the two-week event. "We're just waiting to see with Ricky," Gilchrist told the Australian after the squad arrived in South Africa.

Shah, Wright power hosts

Owais Shah hit his maiden one-day international century and enjoyed spirited support from debutant Luke Wright as England made 316-6 in the sixth one-day international at the Brit Oval here Wednesday.

England had looked in trouble at 137-5 when Kevin Pietersen became the second of three runs outs in the innings, but were saved by a century partnership between Shah and Wright.

Dimitri Mascarenhas then smacked the final five balls of the innings for six, as England hit 114 from the final 10 overs.

The recovery helped deflect the attention from the controversial run out of Paul Collingwood, which had threatened to overshadow the day.

The England captain was short of his ground when dismissed to leave England 83-4, but the circumstances of his dismissal raised further questions as to the use of technology in the game.

Dinesh Karthik, on the field as a substitute after being left out for

Robin Uthappa, picked up Kevin Pietersen's prod into the off side and threw to Mahendra Singh Dhoni who whipped off the balls.

India appealed, and umpire Peter Hartley, standing in his first ODI, initially seemed to give Collingwood not out. A replay on the big screen, though, showed him to be out by about six inches.

brated, Hartley hastily called for a judgement from third umpire Ian Gould, who gave Collingwood out.

After a cursory word to the umpires Collingwood, to his credit, left the field without fuss, but there was no doubt that the decision had been influenced by the replay being shown and the reaction to it.

The loss of Collingwood, coming just four runs after Ian Bell, left England having to rebuild for a second time, after they had lost both openers cheaply.

Zaheer Khan had Alastair Cook caught behind without scoring off the second ball of the day, and Matt Prior followed for 6 in the fourth over of the day, lbw to Ajit Agarkar to leave England 20 for 2.

Bell, continuing the fine form he has shown through this series, made 49 from 59 balls, in partnership with Kevin Pietersen before he was bowled in attempting to slog-sweep Piyush Chawla.

Pietersen himself got his highest score of the series so far, progressing sedately to 53 from 83 balls – an innings that included just four fours – before he too was run out after an ugly mix up with Owais Shah left both batsmen at the same end.

Henin sends Williams packing

Scrap that Venus vs. Serena matchup at the U.S. Open. Cancel that Rafa

vs Roger rematch, too.

The tournament took a sharp twist Tuesday night -- and early Wednesday -- when a pair of fan favorites at Flushing Meadows got chased.

First, it was Serena Williams. Top-seeded Justine Henin beat her for the third straight time in a Grand Slam quarterfinal, making it look easy at the end in a 7-6 (3), 6-1 victory.

"I got to go back and study and figure out how to beat her. That's it. Bottom line," Williams said.

Next up for Henin might be Serena's sister, Venus Williams plays No. 3 Jelena Jankovic in the quarters Wednesday night, and the winner gets Henin in the semis.

Henin will have a rooting interest: She's 1-7 against Venus, 7-0 against Jankovic.

"Every match is a final for me now," Henin said. "If I have to play Venus, it will be a good challenge for me to play both sisters in the same tournament."

A lot of tennis fans were looking forward to seeing Rafael Nadal and Roger Federer meet in a third straight

Grand Slam final. Won't happen now -- 15th-seeded David Ferrer upset the second-seeded Nadal 6-7 (3), 6-4, 7-6 (4), 6-2 in a fourth-round match that ended at 1:50 a.m.

"Sure there is disappointment for me, but that's tennis," Nadal said.

The lower deck at Arthur Ashe Stadium was mostly filled when Nadal's shot sailed long at 1:50 a.m. It came close to the latest ending at the U.S. Open -- back in 1993, Mats Wilander finished off Mikael Pernfors at 2:26 a.m.

And it capped a full, fun day that also saw a player lose a point when a spare tennis ball fell out of his pocket, another complaint about the Jumbotrons and one of the wildest outbursts in Open history.

Trying for his fourth straight Open title, Federer was to play No. 5 Andy Roddick on Wednesday night.

Earlier Tuesday, No. 3 Novak Djokovic reached the Open quarterfinals for the first time by beating No. 23 Juan Monaco 7-5, 7-6 (2), 6-7 (6), 6-1.

After his win, Djokovic talked about the Nadal-Federer history.

"Tennis needs this rivalry," he said. "But on the other hand, the people are not paying attention to the other players. I'm one of those players in that smaller group behind which is trying to break that. Break it through and make this group of two a

little bit bigger."

Monaco was serving in the third-set tiebreaker when a yellow ball he'd put away in case of a fault slipped out of his pocket. It was the second time in the match that happened, and he immediately stopped playing and yelled.

"I went nuts! I was cursing at me. I was yelling at my pants," Monaco said. "Right away I knew I lost that point. It's very weird."

At 20, Djokovic is the youngest player left in the men's draw. He'll next face the oldest man remaining, 31-year-old Carlos Moya.

The 17th-seeded Moya defeated Ernests Gulbis 7-5, 6-2, 6-7 (5), 6-4, closing the match by winning a net duel with a backhand, cross-court volley.

"Still beating these young guys," Moya said. "I feel like, 20 years old." In another match, No. 20 Juan Ignacio Chela beat Stanislas Wawrinka 4-6, 6-2, 7-6 (6), 1-6, 6-4. Wawrinka had been 8-0 in five-set matches in Slam competition, and saved his best shots for after points were played -- he smashed two rackets.

Nadal's loss included a scene rarely seen: the always energetic Spaniard wincing and dropping to the court. That happened right in front of his family's box late in the

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
