

Lalbagh does it in style

Lalbagh came from behind to beat Gazirhot 3-2 in the Third Division Football League at the Outer Stadium yesterday.

Dhoni's no to bowl-out

Indian captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni wants the bowl-out rule abolished despite defeating archrivals Pakistan in the Twenty20 world championships.

"I don't want to see a cricket match decided on a bowl-out," he said. "The team plays so hard to get a result and it should always be decided on the field."

India and Pakistan were involved in a bowl-out at the Kingsmead on Friday night after the archrivals played a heart-stopping tie.

With Pakistan needing one run to overtake India's 141-9, Misbah-ul Haq was run out off the last ball of the innings to leave his team on 141-7.

In the bowl-out, Pakistan's Yasir Arafat, Umar Gul and Shahid Afridi failed to hit the stumps at the other end.

Indian bowlers Virender Sehwag, Harbhajan Singh and Robin Uthappa hit the wicket each time to give their team a 3-0 win.

"It really amuses you, winning a cricket match 3-0," said Dhoni. "It doesn't happen every time, but it is in the record books now."

"I can tell my friends, when I was captain my team won 3-0."

Both Pakistan and India qualified for the Super Eights round after ousting Scotland from the race.

The narrow loss continued Pakistan's jinx of having never beaten India in a World Cup or world championship match, and Dhoni hoped his team will continue the trend.

"We might have to play them again in this tournament but, if we do,

we would like to keep that record going," the Indian captain said.

"I never take pressure, whether it's India-Pakistan or any other game. As for my players when they responded well. They were determined. They were focused. The intensity was good."

"I don't want to see a cricket match decided on a bowl-out," he said. "The team plays so hard to get a result and it should always be decided on the field."

Pakistan appeared on course to victory when they restricted India to 141-9 after captain Shoaib Malik had won the toss and elected to field in overcast conditions.

But India hit back to reduce Pakistan to 103-6 in the 18th over, leaving the batting side needing a challenging 39 to win off the remaining 14 balls in the low-scoring match.

The seventh-wicket pair of Yasir Arafat and Misbah swung the game Pakistan's way by adding 38 off the next 13 balls, but failed to complete the crucial winning run.

Misbah, who made 53 off 35 balls, patted the last ball from Shanthakumaran Sreesanth and ran but failed to beat the throw from the infield to the bowler, who broke the wickets.

Left-arm seamer Irfan Pathan, returning to the Indian team after nine months, took 2-20 in his four overs.

For Pakistan, seamer Mohammad Asif returned the second-best figures in Twenty20 cricket to restrict India to 141-9 in the first session.

Asif used the heavy conditions to wreck India's top order with 4-18, second behind New Zealander Mark Gillespie's 4-7 against Kenya earlier in the week.

Jayasuriya jolts Kiwis

Sanath Jayasurya hit a second successive half-century as Sri Lanka warmed up for the next round of the ICC World Twenty20 Championship with a seven-wicket romp over New Zealand here on Saturday.

The veteran left-hander, who made 88 of 44 balls against Kenya on Friday, blasted 61 off 44 as Sri Lanka surpassed Kiwis 164-7 with seven balls to spare at the Wanderers.

Jayasurya, the eldest player in the 12-nation event aged 38, gave his team a flying start by posting 82 for the first wicket with Upul Tharanga (37) off only 45 balls.

Jayasurya, who hit six boundaries and three sixes, fell in the 18th over with just seven needed for victory and was named man-of-the-match for the second day in a row.

Sri Lanka captain Mahela Jayawardene followed his 65 against Kenya with 35 not out off 18 balls with four boundaries and a six.

It was the perfect practice match for Sri Lanka, who begin their Super Eights campaign against Asian rivals Pakistan here on Monday.

New Zealand, who have also qualified for the next round from Group C at the expense of Kenya, clash with India at the same venue on Sunday.

Earlier, New Zealand's innings revolved around Ross Taylor's 62 off 44 balls after captain Daniel Vettori won the toss and elected to take first strike.

Jacob Oram remained unbeaten on 33 off 19 balls as the Kiwis hit 46 runs in the last five overs.

Dilhara Fernando claimed 2-40, but left-arm bowler Gayan Wijekoon was hammered for 50 runs in his four overs to allow New Zealand to set a 8.5-run target.

New Zealand lost openers Brendon McCullum and Lou Vincent to fast bowler Fernando by the sixth over with the total at 25.

Taylor and Peter Fulton revived the innings by smashing 70 runs off 37 balls for the third wicket to lift the Kiwis to 95 for two.

Sri Lanka hit back with three wickets in the space of seven runs as Fulton holed out against Wijekoon, Scott Styris was trapped leg-before by Jayasurya and Craig McMillan ran himself out.

Oram helped Taylor add 51 off 36 balls for the sixth wicket.

Academy sees no headway

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) is awaiting the lease of their 'home of cricket' from the National Sports Council (NSC) to start work of the two-storeyed building for the much-needed Grameenphone National Cricket Academy (NCA).

Chairman of the BCB's game development committee Lt Col M Abdul Latif Khan (retd) had announced last month that they would start work by mid-September but said yesterday that it is still held back because they haven't received confirmation to have the Mirpur Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium on lease for a certain period of time.

"We could not start it by mid-September because we are yet to get the lease of the stadium for thirty years but hopefully it will be finalised this month. We will float the tender within a week once the formalities are completed. We desperately need the full-fledged academy," Latif admitted.

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Pakistan forgot about it

Shoaib Malik has admitted Pakistan had been unaware that their match against India would be decided on the basis of a bowl-out in case of a tie.

"When the match ended in a tie, only then we came to know that this (bowl-out) would happen," he said at the post-match press conference. "I just told my bowlers not to take pressure and try and hit the wickets but they were not successful."

When Misbah-ul-Haq was run out off the last ball with the scores level, some confusion prevailed among the players with regard to the result of the match. The bowl-out followed, which India won 3-0.

"The match ended in a tie, so none of my players should be blamed (for losing)," Malik said. "He also dismissed the notion that Pakistan would have been better served using the big-hitting Shahid Afridi higher up in the order. "We needed one of the last two balls. Anyway he's more useful to us after 12 overs."

Meanwhile, Mahendra Singh Dhoni said he doesn't want to see

matches ending in a bowl-out though the concept helped him win his first international match as captain.

"I won't want to see a cricket match decided on a bowl-out," Dhoni said. "The team plays so hard to get a result and it should always be decided on the field."

Dhoni wasn't expecting the match to end with a football scoreline of 3-0. "It really amuses you. Winning a cricket match 3-0, it doesn't happen every time," he said. "But it is in the record books now. I can tell my friends, when I was captain my team won 3-0."

The choice of using three slow bowlers for the bowl-out, including two part-timers, Dhoni said, was made based on the players' performance at bowl-outs during team practice. "Whatever they (the bowlers) did, they were picked for that. They had practised a lot for such an eventuality," he said. "Actually, Rohit Sharma is the best when it comes to bowl-out, he has a 100% record -- but since he was not playing we had to rely on the other specialists."

Asked what advice he gave Dhoni said he doesn't want to see

match, Dhoni said, "I told him to be free, and control his mind. He's like a computer, he just has to bowl one ball but he might be thinking of bowling 100 different deliveries."

Dhoni said he was pleased that India kept up their record of never losing to Pakistan in a World Cup match. "We might have to play them again in this tournament but, if we do, we would like to keep that record going."

As for the pressure of a match against archrivals Pakistan, he said, "I never take pressure whether it's India-Pakistan or any other game."

He also had words of praise for his teammates' performance in the crunch match. "As for my players they responded well. They were determined. They were focused. The intensity was good."

Dhoni praised his bowlers for defending a low total. "We needed a good start with the ball. The bowlers kept getting wickets at regular intervals. In the end, they managed to push the run-rate up to 12 per over and that is not easy." He also
