FERRARI LIFT CONSTRUCTORS TITLE

Kimi in command

The 26-year-old Finn started on pole position and took quick command of the race, establishing a comfortable cushion between himself and his Brazilian teammate Felipe Massa before going on to complete a Ferrari one-two.

Ferrari's third one-two of the season means they have secured the constructors' championship.

Fernando Alonso finished third ahead of his McLaren teammate Lewis Hamilton, who now leads the drivers' championship by just two points.

Considering the off-track distractions, third and fourth place was a strong performance from the British team still reeling from their 100 million dollars fine and exclusion from the constructors' championship after Thursday's FIA 'spygate' hearing. Germans Nick Heidfeld and Nico Rosberg finished fifth and sixth for BMW and Williams respectively.

Australian Red Bull driver Mark Webber and Renault's Finn Heikki Kovalainen were the others to score points.

Now that McLaren are out of the constructors' title race Hamilton and Alonso are free to fight amongst themselves for the drivers' title, and that fight began

in earnest at the start of the 14th race of the 17-race season.

Hamilton, starting from fourth, made the quicker start, forcing third-placed Alonso to dart across the track and block his teammate. This, however, did not discourage the 22-year-old rookie who saw a chance to sneak past Alonso on the outside.

Once again the Spaniard slammed the door shut, this time barging Hamilton right off the track.

Though he was able to rejoin the fray without losing a place Hamilton was forced to settle in behind the double world champion and is unlikely to be overly impressed with his aggressive defending.

Up ahead Raikkonen and Massa had made a clean getaway and the Ferrari pair set about establishing a cushion between them and the chasing pack.

Some of the most impressive early racing was done by BMW's Robert Kubica, the Pole started from 15th but soon carved his way into eighth place (he would eventually have to settle for ninth).

Also making early progress was Adrian Sutil who managed to extract maximum pace from the new improved Spyker car. Sutil, the highly-rated German rookie who started from 20th, made up eight places in the first six laps and was soon challenging David Coulthard for 11th place.

Sutil eventually finished 14th

after making a mistake at the Les Combes corner, but the all too brief moments of promise will buoy the Dutch team who are used to running right at the back.

The frontrunners began to come in for their first pit stops on the 16th lap and all four emerged without incident.

Soon after there was a worrying moment for Hamilton but he managed to compose himself after missing the apex of the final corner, and resume his pursuit of Alonso.

The two Ferraris had now established a ten second advantage over the McLarens and with Raikkonen ahead of Massa by a further five seconds; the real race appeared now to be for third and fourth place between the warring teammates in the silver and black cars.

Steadily Alonso eased further ahead of Hamilton and by the time they leaders pitted for the final time his advantage over Hamilton was pushing five seconds.

Raikkonen, Massa and Alonso all stopped soon after the 30 lap mark but Hamilton's strategy kept him out for four extra laps.

It was to no great avail though; the four men at the top of the drivers' standings finished the race in the order they had started it and the championship goes to Asia just that little bit tighter at the top.

Kahn added: "As it is, the 1-1 scoreline is okay. We've seen again that it (league) won't be a stroll, but I've been saying that all along."

Kahn admits to lethargy

Bayern Munich captain Oliver Kahn admitted Sunday that the midweek internationals had left his side under par for their 1-1 draw with Schalke 04 on Saturday's Bundesliga clash.

Bayern striker Luca Toni squandered several first-half chances before Schalke's teenage forward Ivan Rakitic broke the deadlock with a goal before the break.

Only a second-half header by Miroslav Klose saved Bayern's blushes and kept the German giants on top of the Bundesliga by a slender one-point lead.

Several key Bayern players, including German stars Bastian Schweinsteiger, Klose and Marcel Jensen plus Frenchman Franck Ribery, played in their countries mid-week qualifiers for the 2008 European Championships.

And goalkeeper Kahn says the impact was obvious.

"Our build-up was very difficult

because of the international matches," said Kahn.

"It's not ideal, and you probably fall

10 percent below your best."

"I think that was clear in Saturday's draw, although it would have been a very different game if we'd scored in the first half hour."

After splashing out 69 million euros on a summer spending spree to bring the likes of Toni, Klose and Ribery to the Allianz Arena, Bayern had looked like run-away favourites for their 21st crown as German champions.

But although Bayern and Schalke are the only unbeaten teams in the Bundesliga, the Munich side now have only a narrow lead over second-placed Arminia Bielefeld.

Marseille sinking fast

French league champions Lyon closed the gap to just one point on Saturday.

Dindane's 70th-minute penalty handed Lens and their new coach Jean-Pierre Papin their first win of the season.

But Nancy remain top of the standings with 16 points after seven games, one point ahead of Lyon who thrashed tailenders Metz 5-1.

Former French football legend Papin was relaxed and smiling ahead of his first home game at the Felix-Bollaert stadium.

In the job just two weeks, Papin rang the changes by leaving captain Yohann Demont and Nenad

Kovacevic, two key members of the team under his predecessor Guy Roux on the bench, and giving new recruit Kader Mangane his first outing.

"We took three points and topped the leader for the first time. I'm very satisfied and the players are happy.

"Everything will fall into place over the season," said Papin, whose side are fourth from bottom with five points from six matches.

Nancy coach Pablo Correa said:

"We have the impression that we gave them the match, we missed our chances. Our biggest battle was with ourselves."

Lyon, meanwhile, swamped Metz as a first-half hat-trick from Karim Benzema set the tone for the one-sided encounter.

Benzema opened after just four minutes, added his second after 36 minutes and claimed his third two minutes later.

Senegalese striker Babacar Gueye got one back for Metz just

after the break before Hatem Ben Arfa (59) and Juninho (87) added two more for Lyon.

Earlier Marseille were plunged deeper into crisis as Toulouse claimed a resounding 2-1 victory and their first win at the Velodrome in 44 years.

Three days before their Champions League opener against Turkish side Besiktas, Albert Emon's men looked a shadow of the team who finished runners-up behind Lyon last season.

They are sitting 15th with just seven points from eight games, having garnered just two points from four home games this season.

Emon's beleaguered side left the pitch after the first half with the angry whistles of the crowd ringing in their ears after goals from Achille Emana (10) and Johan Elmander (36) gave Toulouse an early advantage.

The hosts woes were compounded when captain Julien Rodriguez was sent off after 66 minutes for fouling Fode Mansare.

Toulouse were also reduced to ten men when Herita Ilunga was sent off nine minutes later for a second yellow card.

Ronald Zubar pulled one back for Marseille in the dying minutes of the game but it was too little too late.

Valenciennes drop from second position to fourth after losing 2-0 at Le Mans, as third-placed Bordeaux were held 1-1 at Lille in a game the highlight of which was the debut of former Dutch star Patrick Kluivert for the hosts.

Saint-Etienne, meanwhile, bounced back from last week's loss to Nancy as an Araujo Ilian double helped them to a 3-0 win over Caen.

Auxerre revival hopes were boosted with a 2-0 win at home against Nice as Strasbourg had to settle for a goalless draw at second-from-bottom Sochaux.

Sunday's big match sees Monaco, who sit in fifth place three points behind Nancy, host Paris St Germain.
