

JSD, Ganotantri Party to ask EC to ban Jamaat from polls

Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal (JSD-Inu) and Ganotantri Party will ask the Election Commission (EC) to disqualify Jamaat-e-Islami and other religion based parties from contesting the polls.

The leaders of JSD and Ganotantri Party at a meeting yesterday also decided that they would ask the EC not to register these parties, which had opposed the country's Liberation War.

The other proposals of the parties include taking stern steps against loan defaulters, war criminals and terrorists so that they cannot participate in the next general elections.

HC declares Mintoo's detention under SPA illegal

UNB, Dhaka

The High Court yesterday declared illegal the detention of ex-FBCCI president Abdul Awal Mintoo under the Special Powers Act (SPA).

A two-member bench, headed by Justice Shah Abu Nayeem Mominur Rahman, passed the order upon a petition.

The court also ordered the government to release Mintoo forthwith, if he is not wanted in any other criminal cases.

Earlier on August 7, the High Court, upon a habeas corpus petition filed by his son, had declared illegal the detention of Mintoo under the Emergency Power Rules (EPR) and granted him bail. It had also stayed the operation of pre-emptive detention order under the SPA.

Top defaulters slow to repay NCB loans

Recovery of defaulted loans of nationalised commercial Banks (NCBs) from the top 20 defaulters slightly rose to 15 percent of the target in the first six months of the current year while that from others stood at 51 percent.

Besides, loan disbursement of the NCBs declined by 0.42 percent during the period.

The central bank on Monday shared the NCBs' six-month financial review with their top officials. It suggested boosting loan disbursement to private sector especially agriculture sector.

According to central bank data, the four NCBs realised only Tk

39.29 crore from top 20 defaulters during January to June against the target of Tk 255.2 crore this year. And Tk 481.98 crore was realised from other defaulters during the same period with this year's target being Tk 946 crore.

Sonali Bank, the largest NCB, managed to recover Tk 3.29 crore from top 20 defaulters in the first six months, which is only 1.77 percent of the year's target of Tk 169.4 crore.

Agrani Bank could recover Tk 1.16 crore against the target of Tk 19.8 crore and Rupali Bank Tk 1.94 crore against the target of Tk 38.5 crore.

Commonwealth asks Musharraf to quit army

Pak govt warns of "extreme decisions" if opposition quits parliament

Commonwealth chief Don McKinnon yesterday urged President Pervez Musharraf to keep his promise to quit as army chief, as the opposition stepped up efforts to thwart the Pakistani ruler's re-election.

Musharraf said through his lawyer on Tuesday that he would step down as head of the army, but only if he wins a new five-year term

as president in a parliamentary ballot due in the coming weeks. McKinnon, in Pakistan on a three-day visit, held talks with Musharraf on political developments including the presidential poll and general elections expected by early 2008, a Commonwealth statement said.

"The secretary general reiterated the Commonwealth's position with respect to the president's statement.

5 cops held for robbing a man of Tk 2 lakh

Govt ups prices of fertiliser

On the eve of Irrigation season, the government has raised prices of triple super phosphate (TSP) and potash around Tk 3 per kilogram, which many said would add to the farmers' sufferings.

Sources at the agriculture ministry said the prices of TSP and potash have been raised following a request from Bangladesh Fertiliser Association (BFA), the price of a sack of 50kg TSP has been set at Tk 1,009.09 and the price of potash of the same amount has been set at Tk 905.65 from Tk 774.55.
