# Clark's quiet climb

Twenty20 bowler. He doesn't have a searing yorker or mischievous changes of pace and relies on plugging away to extract his victims, seemingly not the best tactic when a bowler has just four overs up his sleeve. But Clark's 4 for 20 against Sri Lanka has propelled him to the top of the World Twenty20 wicket-taking list and kept Australia in the tournament.

Typically it has been done without any fuss or fanfare, the same way he regularly troubled England during the Ashes after suggestions he was the weak link. However, despite making a fine combination in Tests Clark's bowling was thought too similar to Glenn McGrath for them to both make the World Cup squad. It was only when Brett Lee pulled out that Clark earned a late call, and then played one match in the eight-week tournament.

With McGrath now part of Australia's past rather than present a space has opened up for Clark and he has grabbed the chance to impress. He also has fond memories of bowling in South Africa after his first Test tour in 2005/06 where he took 20 wickets at 15 in three matches, including nine at Cape Town, although Twenty20 has proved a new challenge. "I'm trying to bowl more variation than I have done in the past," he said. "I did a lot of that with Hampshire in England, but there's no great secret to it."

In Tests, Clark is used to nagging away outside off stump, preying on the batsman's patience in

the way McGrath made himself the world's best. In the longer form bowlers can create wickets over an extended spell but Twenty20 doesn't allow that luxury. Up to the end of this match, there had been two slip catches during the tournament, so is a bowler purely waiting for a batsman to give his innings away rather than using his skill?

"It does appear to be the way it is happening," said Clark, but he still believes there is scope for the bowler to play his own role. "There's a bit of both, you get guys out by bowling well and building as much pressure as possible and making them do something that will force them to hit the ball in the air."

Of Clark's four wickets against Sri Lanka, two were caught at point from flashing shots (one a stunning effort by Michael Clarke) another taken at third man and one, Tillakaratne Dilshan, trying to sweep through fine leg. Though the end results may not be the traditional way to collect wickets, the Australians have shown that the basic bowling attributes remain the same.

Brett Lee has been hostile with the new ball, which again swung for him, Nathan Bracken has varied his pace and Mitchell Johnson has gone hard into the pitch and generated extra bounce. Throw in Clark's back-of-length accuracy and it has formed a potent attack, especially when bowling first. "The bowlers have been fantastic all the way through," said stand-in captain Adam Gilchrist, "they probably did a lot more bowling leading into the tournament than we did work as batsmen."

Their performance enabled Australia, for the second time in the

tournament, to secure a must-win match following the group-stage victory over England on the same ground. "It would have been more humiliating to go out in the first round. At least we got through to the Super Eight stage," said Gilchrist after being asked whether this match had more pressure than the England game. "We rise in these occasions and are experienced in the big games. The guys rallied really well even though we didn't have our captain (Ricky Ponting) out there."

This was another example of Australia, despite having misgivings over the tournament, still turning on the power when it mattered. Gilchrist, who earlier in the week continued to cast doubt on Australia's commitment to Twenty20, said the team's thinking is changing.

"As a team that has dominated the other two forms for a long while it could be easy for us to come into this feeling as though we are owed something, that it isn't right that teams are being brought closer to us who we believe aren't as skillful."

"Maybe we had that mindset at the start of the tour, you'd have to ask each player individually, but it was identified in my mind and it certainly isn't the case. You are never owed anything in this game. It's (Twenty20) a very real part of cricket and I think we have made that adjustment."

Australia have shown their mettle when it comes to crunch matches and there are now potentially two knockout games remaining. Regardless of how much they accept the format, you wouldn't bet against them lifting the trophy.

my family, I understand perfectly well," he said.

"As such when I reacted, it was the wrong reaction but sometimes even rational and normal people can make mistakes."

UEFA said the sanctions were for "improper conduct".

Both Scolari and Dragutinovic can appeal the decision but must do so within three days of the receipt of the written grounds for the decision.

Scolari will now be sidelined from Portugal's upcoming matches in Azerbaijan and Kazakhstan in October, and at home against Armenia and Finland in November.

Before and during the match, he will not be allowed to go in the team dressing-room, the tunnel, or the technical zone, or on the pitch. In addition, he will not be allowed to communicate with his team.

Portugal sit third in qualifying group A four points adrift of Poland and two behind Finland, both of whom have played one game more than Scolari's side.

# Toss remains key

That one of the teams that fought out the World Cup final last year had to be eliminated before the semifinals here wasn't a tragedy. Australia and Sri Lanka had been worthy finalists in West Indies but they haven't been half as dominant here. Australia were surprised by Zimbabwe and outplayed by Pakistan, Sri Lanka were routed by Pakistan and struggled to put up a score against Bangladesh.

The tragedy was that the match was not allowed to be the quarterfinal it could have been. At the best of times, there is a strong element of chance in this form of cricket; with a 10am start, chances are the game will be reduced to a lottery. The Sri Lankan challenge was effectively finished in the first six overs on Thursday.

Much of the credit for this must go to Brett Lee, who bowled a brilliant first over that nailed Sanath Jayasuriya, and then deceived Mahela Jayawardene by holding

the ball back a bit in the next over, but just how much were the Australians helped by the conditions? It's not summer yet in South Africa and mornings in Cape Town, one of the cooler South African cities, are nippy.

Bowlers being in the business is always good for the game and, in a format that gives them little chance, it's always nice when conditions conspire in their favour. In fact cricket has been at its most absorbing in this tournament every time there has been a bit for the bowlers.

But then conditions must be equal, or close to equal, for both teams. Luck with the toss has always been an integral part of the game and captains would sound like sourpusses if they blamed defeats on the toss. In Tests, or even 50-over matches, there is space to accommodate and play around a challenging first hour. In Twenty20, it could mean death because the first hour constitutes three quarters of the innings.

Australia would have perhaps won anyway because they are a champion side that knows to how the raise the game when it matters, but

even they would concede that Sri Lanka were massively disadvantaged this morning.

The shortness of this tournament has been one of its appealing features. The 55-day World Cup in West Indies felt miserably long. In hindsight, though, three games a day might not be such a great idea. To start with, this format -- even for those who adore it -- can be too much of a good thing and, from a playing point of view, forces an early start. Conditions stay more or less the same for the matches that start in the afternoon or the evening but with early starts the unevenness is glaring.

That said, Australia were switched on. Throughout the tournament, their players have given the impression they are yet to buy in to the concept wholeheartedly. Among the reservations, not openly articulated but implied, is that the best teams don't necessarily win this form of the game. Pushed to a corner, though, they responded in a manner that you would expect them to.

winning mentality in players' heads and they go and win things."

Another former Chelsea player, Gavin Peacock, was also worried.

He told BBC Radio Five Live: "I think that half the team will have been affected badly and it's going to be hard to get that team spirit that Jose managed to manufacture."

Former England manager Graham Taylor believes the beginning of the end came when Michael Ballack and Andriy Shevchenko were brought in, reportedly against Mourinho's wishes.

Taylor told BBC Radio Five Live: "Once you take away the authority the manager has in signing players, you're on a slippery slope."

"What I would say about Mourinho is his record is with underachieving players and when Shevchenko and Ballack came in, it disturbed the balance."

"They've never looked as fluid and that's because the manager probably did not himself believe that is the way they should be playing."

Portsmouth manager Harry Redknapp, who worked with Grant at Fratton Park, backed the former director of football to succeed.

Redknapp admitted Mourinho's exit was a shock.

"It was a complete surprise, amazing to me because he's done such a fantastic job at Chelsea in the last few years," he told Sky Sports News.

"It was a massive surprise but I knew Avram had gone there and I thought 'I can see them pushing him into that position', he was the obvious candidate for me."

"They've got a game on Sunday

and I thought someone is going to have to take charge. Avram's there, he's experienced and knows the game, and I felt I could see him stepping in."

"Long term, I'm not sure. I don't know what will happen."

If Grant takes the job long term he will be expected to produce more entertaining football than Mourinho and Redknapp continued: "Avram will want to pick a winning team, that will be the main priority."

"Avram likes to play, and there's no shortage at Chelsea of talented players so I'm sure he'll try to get them to play."

"But Manchester United away, it doesn't come any tougher."

"It's a great chance for him. I'd love to see Avram do well, go in there and be a big success. He's a smashing guy."

Pietersen also made a disappointing 20 against Australia after suggesting that it was the perfect time to inflict a bit of humiliation on England's old enemies.

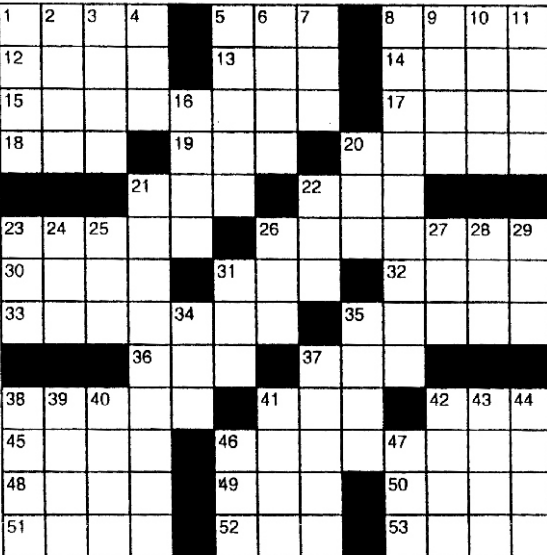
Australia skipper Ricky Ponting had the last laugh, saying England had to walk the walk and not just talk the talk.
