

SECOND PHASE OF FLOODS

'Strengthen govt-NGO coordination to rehabilitate victims'

The second phase of floods has posed new challenges for the government and the development partners in their efforts to rehabilitate the flood-affected people, experts at a workshop said yesterday.

They also stressed the need to strengthen coordination among the government and non-government organisations in order to tackle the challenges.

Bangladesh Disaster Preparedness Centre (BDPC), Comprehensive Disaster Management Programme (CDMP) and Oxfam-GB organised the workshop on 'Flood recovery 2007: The way forward' at Brac Inn Centre in the city.

Food and Disaster Management Adviser Tapan Chowdhury said the government had distributed housing grants among the affected people after the first flood, but the fresh floods have again put these people at risk.

These people, being victims of

the floods for the second time, might have used the housing grants for other purposes instead of rebuilding their houses, he said.

Agriculture and Environment Adviser CS Karim said the fields turned green after the first floods, but crops were damaged again due to fresh floods.

The government has now taken steps to increase Boro yields to offset crop losses, he added.

He said the country needs 29 lakh tons of fertiliser, whereas the capacity of domestic production is only 14 or 15 lakh tons. Rest of the amount is to be imported, he said and called for efficient use of fertiliser.

CDMP Chief Technical Adviser Ian Rector said significant breaching of flood embankments and silting of river systems contributed to the extent of flooding. Water Development Board should critically analyse the reasons why so many embankments developed breaches, he said.

Effective management of flood in Bangladesh requires not only

national, but also regional solutions, he said and called for more effective early warning system through which people at community level can get the message of flood and take safe shelter.

Directorate of Relief and Rehabilitation Director General Sadaruddin Ahmed, Department of Agricultural Extension Director General Shamsul Alam, Bangladesh Krishi Bank General Manager Jafor M Sayeed, Oxfam-GB Programme Manager Farid Hasan Ahmed, UNDP Programme Manager Tarik-ul-Islam and BDPC Director Muhammad Saidur Rahman also spoke at the workshop presided by Food and Disaster Management Ministry Joint Secretary Mohsena Ferdous.

Two workshops earlier organised by BDPC at Gaibandha and Faridpur identified lack of coordination in relief distribution between the government and non-government agencies and shortage of relief materials and skilled volunteers as obstacles to rehabilitating flood victims.

Implement tripartite contract to remove workers' dissatisfaction

Leaders of different garment workers' associations yesterday demanded the government to take necessary measures for removing dissatisfaction of the garment workers in the light of tripartite contract.

They also demanded payment of arrear salary and bonus of the workers before the Eid festival.

Central leaders of Gono Sanghati Andolok in a statement urged the government to implement the minimum wage in every garment factory.

Condemning the mentality of the owners to arrest the workers over trifles, they said it would destroy garment industry.

President of Jago Bangladesh Garments Sramik Federation Barahane Sultan said whenever the garment workers raise their voice to realise their legal demand, the owners try to bypass the issue terming it as foreign conspiracy.

"If they could not show any evidence in this regard, they should be punished," he added.

2 lakh affected with cancer every year Say experts

There are about 40 lakh cancer patients in the country and two lakh more are afflicted with the disease every year, Chairman of Oncology Club Prof Dr ABMF Karim said yesterday.

Dr Karim, also adviser and former president of Saarc Federation of Oncologists, was addressing a press conference at the Jatiya Press Club in the city.

Federation of Anti-Cancer Activists of Bangladesh (FACAB), an umbrella organisation of 45 small organisations working on cancer awareness in Bangladesh, organised the press conference.

Prof Dr ABMF Karim said the number of cancer patients in Bangladesh would reach 20 million within the next 20 years if the current trend continues.

He said use of tobacco, taking 'jarda' with betel-leaf and lack of balanced diet and regular labour (especially for the rich community) are the main causes of cancer. "These causes are basically found in the developing countries."

The noted cancer specialist stressed the need for creating awareness among people and underscored producing adequate number of specialists in the country to cope with the rising incidence of cancer.

"There are only 98 cancer experts in the country and most of them are radiation oncologists. Minimum 200 new cancer experts, including medical oncologists, oncology surgeons and radiation oncologists, are needed every year," he said.

Director of Bangladesh Cancer Hospital and Welfare Home Prof Dr MA Hai, senior journalist Ataus Samad and Col (retd) Modasser Hossain Khan also spoke on the occasion.

Prof Dr MA Hai suggested consulting doctors to diagnose possible cancer if they feel anything unusual in throat, coughing and voice change and also experience problem of degeneration and change in food intake for more than two weeks.

Oncology Club and FACAB will organise a workshop titled 'International Socio-Scientific Conference on Cancer (Clinical Oncology)' for Saarc Region on January 4-7, 2008 in the city.

The workshop is likely to emphasise on launching preventive programmes such as vaccination for cervical cancer on selective population groups, organisers said.

Delay in implementing 6th wage board condemned

Leaders of Dhaka Union of Journalists (DUJ) yesterday condemned delay in implementing the 6th wage board.

The leaders at an executive committee meeting yesterday said though the government had solved problems of different quarters, including the owners of print media, it is quite indifferent to take necessary steps in providing due payments to the journalists, says a press release.

Though the price has been hiked several hundred times since the last 12 years, the journalists are forced to do with the same amount of salary. In spite of informing the issue to the higher authorities, it is yet to see any sign of solution, they added.

The meeting was presided over by DUJ President Altaf Mahmud while DUJ General Secretary Omar Faruque, former general secretary Shah Alamgir, Vice President Abdul Kalam and Joint Secretary Shabnam Mahmud also spoke at the meeting.

The speakers also condemned retrenching of journalists and employees of the daily Ittefaq. They also demanded an end to the irregularities and discrimination in Bangladesh Sangbad Sangstha (BSS) on the issue of discharging and re-recruitment of the employees.

Their demands also include payment of the arrears and bonus to the newsmen before 15th Ramadan and payment of the due salaries of The Independent newsmen.

The leaders also expressed grave concern over the issue of not implementing 40 percent dearness allowance at the daily Jugantor, Janakantha, Bhoror Kagoj, Manabjami and Amader Somoy.

Excluding around 50 dailies from the media list without prior announcement would create further crisis in the newspaper industry, they added.

People should unite behind govt for timely polls

Says British envoy

British High Commissioner Anwar Choudhury yesterday said one of the biggest challenges facing Bangladesh is to prevent political events and uncertainty from distracting the Election Commission (EC) holding general elections by the end of 2008.

The people of Bangladesh need to unite behind the government to ensure that the EC continues its rapid speed in undertaking electoral reforms to hold the polls by 2008-end or a little earlier, he added.

"The road for Bangladesh is bumpy... But every time there is a bump, it should be taken as a call for everyone to ensure that the roadmap to elections is not disturbed," the British envoy told reporters at an Iftar party at his residence, celebrating the efforts of the development partners in support of the 'Preparation of Electoral Roll with Photographs (PERP) project.

Britain contributed 10 million pounds to the 44 million pound UNDP-coordinated PERP project.

Speaking at the Iftar party, Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) ATM Shamsul Huda said that although he would cautiously hope for elections by 2008-end few months ago, progress made by the EC in overcoming difficulties allows him to say "We will surely hold elections by the end of 2008, if not earlier."

Anwar Choudhury said the donor community is assured by CEC's declaration as they gain hope from the 'double-speed' progress of voter registration

projects in Rajshahi and Savar, the involvement of grassroots people and the use of advanced technology.

Political parties should also ensure that the elections are held in time by engaging in dialogue and working together, he said.

Expatriate citizen seeks security of her family

A Bangladeshi-born American citizen in a press conference yesterday sought justice and urged the authorities to ensure her family's security.

Speaking at the National Press Club in the city yesterday, Laili Begum alleged that when she along with her daughter Lipi Akther came to Bangladesh last year, ABM Asaduzzaman married Lipi in November. Since then he has been demanding huge dowry.

Yielding to Asaduzzaman's demand, she gave him \$8000 in cash the day after her daughter's marriage. They also gave her daughter and son in law 17 tols gold ornaments.

After few days Laili's family came to know that Asaduzzaman's family provided false information before the marriage took place.

When Laili and her daughter went to USA for a few days, Asaduzzaman snapped all connections with them and few months later they resumed connections and started making demand for dowry

anew.

In such a stage when Laili's eldest daughter filed a case with Sabujbagh Police Station, Laili alleged that Asaduzzaman managed a major of Rab-3 and started threatening them with false cases and of crossfire.

Against this backdrop, she came back to Bangladesh and filed a case against Asaduzzaman under Women and Children Repression Act.

Laili also said that when she went to Rab-3 office, other Rab officials humiliated and threatened them so that they do not go for any legal action. Asaduzzaman also threatened her family members in Dhaka over phone, Laili added.

Laili added that her family is aggrieved and sought justice under law, but it is an irony that her family members are now feeling insecure every moment.

Laili read out a written statement at the press conference while her son Muhammad Jewel was also present.

GP comes to aid of six acid survivors

Grameenphone (GP), a leading mobile phone operator, has provided employment to six acid survivors with a view to making them self-reliant.

The acid survivors, who have been supported by the Acid Survivors' Foundation (ASF), will also be provided with adequate training to help them develop necessary skills to take on their new responsibilities in the company, said Grameenphone officials at a press meet at a city hotel yesterday.

The six acid survivors are Fazilatun Nesa, Mansura Khatun, Rezul Karim, Lulu Mansura, Serajul Huq and Afrozah Akhtar.

Speaking as the chief guest, Canadian High Commissioner Barbara Richardson said that although many developments have been made in the country, women continue to be subject of discrimination and violence such as acid attack due to unequal social, political and legal status.

The acid victims should get encouragement not only from the family but also from all levels in society, she said.

Bangladesh has one of the highest numbers of incidents related to acid violence and acid burns. These incidents constitute nine percent of total burn injuries and about 47 percent of victims of acid violence are women while men and children account for 26 and 27 percent respectively.

As part of the corporate social responsibilities, Grameenphone has extended its support to the ASF in the rehabilitation of acid victims by providing employment opportunities, said Grameenphone Managing Director Eric Aas.

He also said it is important to rehabilitate these acid survivors and provide them with vocational training and job opportunities so that they may become economically independent and able to contribute to the national economy.

Lulu Mansura urged the corporate houses to come forward to help them live a healthy and normal life.

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
