

# Eid releases: Dhaliwood predicts profit

After a decade of slumped trade, the film industry in Bangladesh is expecting a pick-up this coming Eid. People in the mainstream film industry, otherwise known as 'Dhaliwood', are hopeful to reset cinema as one of the major sources of mass entertainment during the Eid festivity.

"After the recent massive drive taken by Film Censor Board against violent and vulgar film, most of the movies that got approval from Bangladesh Film Producers and Distributors Association (BFPDA) for the Eid are either romantic or family drama. Only a few action movies will be released," said BFPDA President Nasiruddin Dilu.

The office secretary of BFPDA, Mahbubul Islam, informed that 15 films have received approval from BFPDA for Eid release. The movies include *Moner Shathey Juddho*, *Kaiha Dao Shathi Hobey*, *Meye Shakhi*, *Astrodhari Rana*, *Premier Badha*, *Priyo Shathi*, *Danob Shantan*, *Rakto Chosha*, *Osman*, *Tomar Jonyo Morte Pari*, *Maa Amar Swargo*, *Kopal*, *Bullet*, *Aha* and *Ekon Shongey Chhilo*. The most noticeable 'change' is the title of the movies, as compared to that of the movies of past years.

The last two movies of the above list are Impress tele-film productions. *Aha*, directed by Enamul Karim Nirjhar, will be released in one theatre and *Ekon Shongey Chhilo* will be aired on Channel-i. "Of the rest, eight or nine movies will be eventually released in over 700 theatres across the country. Others will be released later," said Mahbubul.

Directed by Ahmed Nasir, *Moner Shathey Juddho*, a romantic film, features Manna, Purnima and

Bapparaj in the lead roles. The movie is expected to be a blockbuster and will simultaneously run in 35 theatres. Another expected Eid blockbuster is Sohanur Rahman Suhani's film, *Katha Dao Shathi Hobey*. The cast includes Shakib Khan, Opu Biswas, Ahmed Sharif and Misha Sawdagar.

Like other prominent members of Dhaliwood, a film industry worth Tk 100 crores, filmmaker Sohanur Rahman Sohan also expects profits from his film. Sohan said, "Shakib-Opu will emerge as a popular duo through my movie. I've made 35 prints of the film and getting enormous response from the theatre agents."

Sohan further claimed that right now the movie industry is going through a potential 'new

era'. During the last few months only the decent, entertaining films with family values have done profitable business. Women are the major viewers of this genre. It indicates that women are coming back to theatre. As the women do not go alone to the movies, feature films that can attract them become blockbusters. We see a good numbers of films targeting the female audience on the list of potential Eid releases and we can hope for good returns," he said.

Actor Shakib Khan is in four other movies -- *Tomar Jonyo Morte Pari*, *Kopal*, *Maa Amar Swargo*, *Danob Shantan* -- which are also set to be released on or around Eid.

After many years, noted actress

Babita is playing a central role in the movie *Maa Amar Swargo*, directed by Zakir Hossain Raju. Babita plays the title role of the 'mother' in the film. Popular duo Shabnur-Riaz is the highlight of *Meye Shakhi*, directed by Malek Biswas. Model Sadya in her debut film *Tomar Jonyo Morte Pari*, directed by Safi Iqbal, may emerge as a promising actor. In the film she is paired with Shakib. Shabnur-Shakib duo is featured in *Kopal* directed by Hasibul Islam Mizan. Uttam Akash's romantic action film *Danob Shantan* stars Shakib, Poppy and Omar Sanii in the major roles.

*Osman* directed by M.B. Manik, Nilu Shimul's film *Astrodhari Rana*, Nirjanan Biswas' movie *Rakto Chosha* and *Bullet* directed by Ahmed Ali Mondol are the action movies set to release on the occasion of Eid, running at a few theatres in the district towns and remote areas.

Nasiruddin Dilu is hopeful that the Bangladeshi film industry will see better days, provided piracy is strongly controlled and the environment of movie theatres improved.



*Premier Badha* directed by Zafar Al Maman and *Priyo Shathi* directed by G. Sarkar, also set to run at theatres in remote areas.

Another aspect of this year's Eid film market is the decrease in the number of new releases. Last year 19 films were approved for Eid release. Explaining the reason behind the decline in numbers, Nasiruddin Dilu said, "As FDC has stopped giving services in credit, a producer now needs more readily available cash to make a film. Only the big investors are producing films. Moreover, after Film Censor Board's strong move against vulgarity, mediocre directors are not making films."

Moreover, sources related to the industry informed that this year the producers and distributors hope to do business without much hassle, as no politically backed syndicate will meddle in the Eid releases, like previous years.

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## Celebrities on Eid Chitchat with Banna Mirza

Eid brings in a festive air. After a month of fasting, everyone tries to make this occasion a little more special. How do celebrities celebrate the occasion? What do they think of this day? A familiar face on the small screen, Bonya Mirza, shares her thoughts.

"When I was a child, Eid meant freedom to me. I grew up in a conservative family and there were lots of dos and don'ts for the children. I was never allowed to go anywhere or play around. But on Eid, there was no restriction. It was three days of unlimited fun," says Bonya.

Growing up in a small town in Kushtia, Bonya had the opportunity to enjoy the community-based culture. "I think, every festival attains its proper mood when it becomes universal. In this regard, I truly enjoy the Bengali New Year. On Eid, the whole community becomes one big family. That is one of the things I cherished. My childhood memories of Eid consist of fond experiences shared with others. Waking up early in the morning, putting on brand new cloths, I would go visit almost every house in our pauri and play with the children. When the day ended, I felt like crying thinking why must all good things end abruptly? Now living in an apartment complex, I miss those days. People in the metro areas hardly bother about their neighbours. It's frustrating," she says.

"We waited eagerly for Eid because it was only time of the years when we made new clothes. Now as my profession demands new clothes often, I don't specifically wait for Eid to shop." A trait inherited from her family, Bonya Mirza thinks a lot about the prevailing social injustice and inequality. "Eid is a time for celebration but shouldn't everyone be entitled to it? People are struggling to cope with the ongoing price hike; the recent disastrous flood has left so many homeless. Is a grand celebration really the right thing to do? I think a better way to celebrate Eid would be donating some of the money, intended for buying expensive new clothes and other items, to the people who desperately need our help. Then it would be a universal celebration."



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The sensitive actress also expresses her concern about the fishermen who did not come back after the recent storms in the Bay of Bengal. "What will these families do this Eid? But I know life goes on. Even a rickshaw-puller will celebrate Eid in his own way. My mother will definitely cook some special dishes and I will spend the day with my family."

## Album review

### "Panjabiwala": Habib goes back to basics



With Eid-ul-Fitr just around the corner, the music market is abuzz with new releases. One of the major releases-- Habib's *Panjabiwala*.

After last year's *Shono*, a mediecre collection du jour of mostly TV commercial jingle-like *adhnunik* songs, Habib has gone back to basics in his new album. *Panjabiwala*, a Laser Vision presentation, highlights the genre Habib popularised with his initial albums -- *Krishna* and *Maya*. Sylheti folk songs rearranged by Habib became a craze and catapulted the talented musician to fame. The new album also features three songs that can be considered 'Sufistic' and an *adhnunik* song written by S.A. Haque Aleek and composed by Habib.

This album is also a launch pad for upcoming artiste Shireen. The artiste has mentioned Shefali Ghosh as her muse and her devotion to the 'queen of regional songs' becomes apparent throughout the album.

The title song *Panjabiwala* (written and composed by Abdul Gafur Ali) perhaps captures that unadulterated, raw folk appeal that defined Ghosh's style. As Shireen sings *Roshik telkajwala, oi laal kurtawala...* one is reminded of the

*je ne sais quo* that made *Sampannawala* work. It's a feel good song and has all the potential to be a chart-topper.

*Moner-o baganey* (written and composed by Abdul Gafur Ali) is more of a ballad. If the first song is a celebration of naive infatuation, the

this song delineates the yearning to be loved.

*Shikhaia piriti* (written and composed by Karim Amit Uddin) delves deep into that feel stirred by the first two songs. Shireen switches to a huskier, melancholy mode and conveys the consequences of falling for someone unattainable.

*Shah jalal Shah Poran* (written and composed by Nurul Alam) is a homage to the legendary Sylheti saints, rendered in the *qawwali* style, engrossed in the true sense of Sufism.

*Na jeney bhul bujho na* (written and composed by Firoz) is perhaps the high point of the album. It's a sultry, hip-hop number that instantly catches on -- potential club music material. Shireen owns the song and makes it sound like it was made for her; Habib proves his skills creating the seamless nuance.

The album wraps up with the duet *Boleto diyechhi hridoy-er kotha*, rendered by Habib and Nancy. It's a quintessential, mushy *adhnunik* song: nothing worth writing home about.

On the whole, the album is a commendable effort by Habib. The album is likely to be one of the Eid bestsellers.

## TV play "Ghorot Ferot" on ATN Bangla tonight



### "Brick Lane" scares off the Prince!

Prince Charles, who chickened out of a royal premiere of the controversial film *Brick Lane* last week, may not know what he missed. But over 300 journalists and trade representatives who watched the film at the Toronto International Film Festival stayed glued till the end.

Journalists (other than those who are reviewing the films) at the film festivals are notorious for walking out of a film in about 20 minutes after it has started if they find it less than compulsively watchable. But that was not the case here. Some were astonished at the high level of performances in the film, especially by Satish Kaushik who plays a Bangladeshi cuckolded husband of a much

younger wife. Sony Pictures Classics which will be distributing the film in America early next year could change the release schedule if it makes a splash in its British release and begin rolling out the film late this year in selected American cities.

The film which will soon be shown at the London Film Festival this month, was bought by Sony over two months ago unseen, solely based on the reputation of Monica Ali's novel of the same name. Sony also had watched how Mira Nair's *The Namesake* slowly but steadily built a reputation across North America grossing about \$14 million. In the United Kingdom, though, it grossed just about \$1 million, a decent but far from spectacular performance.

Hollywood insiders believe that Sony would not have gone anywhere near *Brick Lane* had *The Namesake* failed to ignite the art-house box-office in America and Canada. The latter film, distributed in North America by Fox Searchlight, grossed \$1 million more than Sony's Oscar-winning German import *The Lives of Others*.

But will *Brick Lane* do good business in the United Kingdom? The book was a bestseller there, selling half a million copies and a modest success in America. Its publishers have restocked bookshops across North

America and Canada with the sticker, "Now a Major Motion Picture".


"British audiences are notoriously resistant to films that reflect their multicultural world," the influential trade publication *Screen International* which gave the film quite a glowing review wrote recently after its screening at the Toronto fest.

The reputation of Ali's novel is the film's biggest commercial asset, the review asserted. It added: "Stressing a story of impossible love and the charismatic performance of Tannishtha Chatterjee could provide the ingredients that will translate into a modest special-release."

But followed by a number of controversies including the sudden refusal by the Prince to have a royal premiere for the film could push the British distributor to give it a strong release, perhaps taking it to over 60 screens in a month.

The Royal Film Performance of the film was scheduled for October 29. But the impending protests by Bangladeshi in London angry with the story must have scared the Prince.

When the shooting started in London more than a year ago, several angry Bangladeshi had driven the production company from *Brick Lane* to another location. Though Monica Ali hasn't spoken out as




Scenes from Brick Lane

book had shown their community in poor light, and they were afraid the movie could show them in a worse light. The same people were apparently getting ready to protest the royal showing.

Though Clarence House (the office of Charles) says that the special performance was dropped because of a scheduling conflict, the London newspapers and the trade publication *Variety* think the performance was cancelled for political reasons.

The cancellation of the Royal Film Performance is a real shame," said first-time director Sarah Gavron in a statement. Though Monica Ali hasn't spoken out as
