## BANGLADESH-TAJIKISTAN WC PRE-QUALIFIER TODAY Draw would suffice

Memories of their worst home defeat ever will haunt the Bangladesh footballers when they host Tajikistan in the first leg of the 2010 World Cup pre-qualifier at the Bangabandhu National Stadium today.

Bangladesh lost by identical margins of 2-0 to Tajikistan in both their 2006 World Cup pre-qualifiers but the Central Asians were on top form last year, thrashing the home side 6-1 in the inaugural AFC Challenge Cup at the same venue in Dhaka.

With Indian coach Syed Nayeemuddin ignoring senior players and going for a number of newcomers -- who have had a rather colourless past in top flight of domestic football -- in his experimental side, another disaster might loom ahead for the underprepared side.

And naturally, the Bangladesh think-tank could not encourage on the eve of the match, which will be telecast live by ATN Bangla. Fans will not need to buy tickets for the game.

New Bangladesh captain Hassan Al Mamun, however, said at a press conference at the BFF Bhaban yesterday that his side will not go into the field bothering about the previous results.

"It's a different match. So everything is new for both teams. It's true we haven't had the best of preparations but we are here to fight," said Hassan who did not play in Bangladesh's previous game against Tajikistan after being ruled for the entire Challenge Cup due to injury.

"We have not played any significant practice match. So, we got little chance to correct our mistakes and have the right combination," said the right fullback, who returned to the full national side after a long lay-off.

The physically strong Tajiks'

would have the edge and under these circumstances, a draw would be a good result."

Nayeemuddin once again reminded of the lack of preparation matches and said that the expectation should be high of this team.

"Tajikistan are tough opponents as they are better in technique and physical conditions. But we are mentally prepared. We have a solid defence and ready to give our best effort," the 60-year-old Indian told.

The Tajiks have brought only five players of the side that lifted the Challenge Cup and fans of

## Uthappa denies discord

India-Australia 4th ODI today

Batsman Robin Uthappa denied reports Sunday of a rift between veteran and junior members of India's cricket team after the chief selector made a pitch for the inclusion of more youngsters.

Didip Vengsarkar had put the senior players on notice Saturday, saying there were young players on the fringe who were racing to make it onto the team and make their places count.

Uthappa, himself a talented 21-year-old, denied Vengsarkar's comments had caused any problems ahead of the fourth match of the one-day series with Australia, which the home team is trailing 2-0.

"There is absolutely nothing like a senior versus junior thing in the team. It's all in the media. Everyone is enjoying themselves in the dressing room and it's amazing to be part of this team," he told reporters.

Uthappa also said Gautam Gambhir was doubtful for the fourth one-day here on Monday after he sustained a groin injury during practice.

Gambhir slipped while batting in the nets and had to be rushed to the hospital for a scan.

Former skipper Sourav Ganguly, who was not part of the team that was dubbed at Kochi and Hyderabad, could take Gambhir's place in the squad.

Ganguly is believed to have recovered from a hamstring injury that he picked up during fielding in

the first one-day at Bangalore, which was abandoned due to rain.

Uthappa also admitted that the team's intensity had dropped amidst the euphoria over the triumph in the inaugural Twenty20 World Championship in South Africa last month.

"All of us were a bit knackered after the Twenty20 victory. It was difficult to shift gears and our intensity level dropped," he said.

Meanwhile, Uthappa said that Shanthakumaran Sreesanth, who was at his belligerent best in the first two one-dayers against Australia before going uncannily quiet in the third match, mellowed down due to criticism of his volatile temper.

"You guys have mellowed him



Khaled Mashud promised that his side will continue its spirited effort in the National Cricket League this year, no matter what happened in a practice match before the tournament starts from October 19.

Last year's runners-up Rajshahi both their warm-up games against GP-BCB National Cricket Academy team when they went down by 20 runs in the second match at the Rajshahi Divisional Stadium yesterday.

## Malik hopes to win

'Inzamam's Test' from today

Pakistan captain Shoaib Malik is confident the return of Inzamamul Haq and Mohammad Yousuf will spur Pakistan to victory over South Africa in the second Test that starts here on Monday.

The key batsmen pulled out of the first Test, which Pakistan went on to lose by 160 runs to go 1-0 down in the two-match series.

Malik said his team would be bolstered by the return of Yousuf and the talismanic Inzamam, who will be playing his last Test after announcing his retirement from Test cricket.

"A big player has returned to the Pakistan team and his return has boosted confidence in the camp," said Malik of Inzamam, who resigned as captain in March following Pakistan's humiliating first-round exit from the World Cup.

"Inzamam is not distraction but an encouragement," he said.

"Both he and Yousuf will strengthen our middle order and we are determined to give it our best shot as we have learnt from the mistakes of the first Test," said Malik, whose team dropped three crucial catches in Karachi.

Yousuf pulled out of the first Test at the last minute due to lack of match fitness while Inzamam was unavailable.

Malik singled out as a target South Africa's Jacques Kallis, who made a masterly 155 and followed it up with an unbeaten 100 in the second innings in the first Test.
