





## Did U Know?

## BCB forms 2 more sub-committees

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) formed two more sub-committees in its working committee meeting yesterday.

A three-member committee comprising Gazi Ashraf Hossain Lipu, chairman of the cricket operations committee, coach Jalal Ahmed Chowdhury and Lt Col M Abdul Latif Khan (retired), chairman of development committee, has been formed to evaluate the national team's performance in Sri Lanka tour and the ICC World Twenty20 Championship in South Africa.

A steering committee has been formed with chairmen of tournament, cricket operations, ground and facilities, umpires and media committees to look after the coming national cricket league and other issues.

"We feel it is important to evaluate the past performance for a better future," said media committee chairman Ahmed Sajjadul Alam Bobbi.

The Tigers had a disastrous tour in Sri Lanka, losing all three Tests and as many one-day internationals badly, in June-July while returned from South Africa with a mixed bag, having qualified to the second group stage after beating the West Indies. The second stage, however, was poor.

# 400 up for Sachin

## Fifth Indo-Aussie ODI today

When Sachin Tendulkar makes his 400th one-day appearance today against Australia, he will realise fan expectations have not changed since his first match in 1989.

Millions of his supporters still want him to showcase the flair and flamboyance which has seen him dominate and demoralise rival attacks during an illustrious 18-year career.

But Tendulkar is ageing and injuries have taken a toll on his body since he made his one-day debut in Pakistan at the age of 16. He may not be as devastating now as he was a decade ago, but still remains a solid bet.

Chief selector Dilip Vengsarkar was quick to warn senior batsmen when they underperformed in the initial matches against Australia, saying they could not take their places for granted.

The 34-year-old Tendulkar refused to react to those comments.

"Performance, not age, should be the criterion. I don't wish to join in any debate, but what I've said is what I believe in," he told the Kolkata-based Telegraph newspaper on Wednesday.

Under-pressure Tendulkar, who had made 0, 16 and 43 in the first three games, responded like a champion with a solid 79 to help India to an eight-run win in the fourth game in Chandigarh on Monday.

He said his approach will remain the same in Thursday's landmark match, which his team must win to level the series 2-2.

"It feels nice. I'm soon also going to complete 18 years of international cricket. It's been a long journey and I have fond memories. I feel honoured that I've been able to play for the country for so many years," he said.

"It will be a special day, but I intend treating it like any other match. It's not that I'm going to get carried away."

Tendulkar, who will become only the second batsman after Sri Lankan Sanath Jayasuriya to figure in 400 one-day internationals, said

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# Smith puts SA in control

Graeme Smith hit a brilliant half-century to put South Africa in a commanding position against Pakistan in the second and final Test here at the Gaddafi Stadium on Wednesday.

Smith's unbeaten 75 and Jacques Kallis's 37 in a second innings score of 154-2 gave South Africa an overall lead of 305 when bad light stopped play on the third day.

The tourists dismissed Pakistan for 206 in their first innings.

Smith, whose team has not won a series in the subcontinent since 2000, hit 11 boundaries in his 233-knock to guide his team into a winning position.

Pakistan, bidding to level the two-match series, saw their main

hope Inzamamul Haq falter in his final Test, scoring just 14 when the team looked to him to avert a large South African lead.

South African spinner Paul Harris said his team looked good to clinch the series after winning the first Test in Karachi by 160 runs.

"We are confident about our position in the Test. It is not an easy pitch to bat as it is definitely deteriorating and up and down for both spinners and seamers," he said.


Pakistan's chances of getting quick wickets when South Africa returned to bat were dented by an elbow injury to spearhead bowler Mohammad Asif.

Asif, who bowled 34 overs in the first innings, managed just four in the second before walking off.

"Asif was in pain in his elbow and he will have a MRI (scan) on Thursday to assess his injury," said team manager Talat Ali.

It left Pakistan, who entered the

# Ex-keepers praise Dhoni

It's often said that the wicketkeeper sets the standards of fielding for a team. If that is true, then this Indian team should do well in the coming years for Mahendra Singh Dhoni's glove work has been outstanding in recent times. It's premature to suggest that the elevation to captaincy may have played a part in this, from someone who was seen as a batsman who could keep wickets adequately, Dhoni has grown into a force behind the stumps.

In Baroda, a city that has produced two of the best Indian wicketkeepers of the recent past, there was rich conversation about glove work, especially in the light of Dhoni winning the Man-of-the-Match award in the fourth one-day in Chandigarh. "Looking at his percentage of taking catches it's better than any of the other keepers we have had recently," Kiran More,

one of the former Indian wicketkeepers from Baroda, told Cricinfo. "He doesn't miss when the chances come his way. He's really good at assessing situations and his temperament is fantastic. He doesn't look good in the conventional sense in that he's not a stylish wicketkeeper but his temperament under pressure sets him apart."

But it was not long ago that Dhoni was struggling in England, especially in the early part of the tour having to contend with the considerable movement after the ball crossed the batsman. The other Baroda wicketkeeper, Nayan Mongia, points out that it was a flaw in technique that caused Dhoni problems in England. "He struggled in England because his technique was not right. He was half-squatting and so could not always gather the ball," said Mongia. "When keeping to the pacers, he dives around to collect the ball. If there's one area in which

he's staying low and moving with the ball. Hence, his mistakes have come down considerably."

More too concedes that Dhoni struggled in England, but says that was only to be expected. "In England people criticised him but you should understand that wicketkeepers always struggle there," said More. "To his credit Dhoni's concentration level is very high. He has improved a lot. Look at one-and-a-half years ago and now, he is at his hand position. He picks things up quickly."

Mongia, who was an expert at keeping wickets on rank turners and even under prepared pitches like Anil Kumble and Harbhajan Singh made the ball explode out of the rough, says Dhoni will be tested fully in such conditions. "It is always difficult to keep in India because the ball keeps low. But Dhoni is high on confidence and that is helping him do well," said Mongia. "When keeping to the pacers, he dives around to collect the ball. If there's one area in which

## PROBE REPORT DONE Tests needed to conclude findings

The inquiry committee formed by the National Sports Council (NSC) to investigate the press box collapse at the Bangabandhu National Stadium once again visited the site of crash yesterday.

The NSC late on Tuesday had added two more members to the committee headed by its director planning and development Abdur Rahman.

All the five members including the new inclusions, Bangladesh Olympic Association representative Anisur Rahman Dipu and Lt Col Monir from the Army Engineering Core inspected the spot.

It was learned that their report has been already handed over to the NSC despite yesterday being a public holiday.

The report is expected to be handed over to NSC chairman and Chief of Army Staff General Moeen U Ahmed today.

However, to conclude the findings, the committee will need the lab test reports of the construction materials that will be submitted to the Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (BUET).

With the Eid vacation already being started, the lab tests might be done when the institute opens.

"We have identified the places we need to run tests and we would be able to determine why the accident happened as soon as the reports are in hand," said Lt Col Monir to reporters. "We will do our best to find out the cause of the accident."

It was also learned that the probe body will recommend to the NSC to co-opt a member from the BUET in the committee.

The roof of the press box collapsed during a rainstorm on Monday night just hours after the end of Bangladesh's 2010 World Cup pre-qualifier against Tajikistan.

"We have to test the strength of the MS pipe that held the roof, whether it was made according to design or not," said inquiry committee head Abdur Rahman.

"However, without getting the results, we cannot make any further comments," he added.

# England need 212

Kumar Sangakkara scored a gritty half-century to help Sri Lanka post a respectable 211-9 in the fourth one-day international here on Wednesday.

The 29-year-old left-hander broke a prolonged poor run of 15 oves to top score with 69 off 102 balls and bail out the home team which was struggling at 20-3 after electing to bat first in the day-night game.

Sangakkara also shared a crucial 126-run partnership with Chamara Silva (67) for the fourth wicket in the face of some disciplined bowling by the visitors.

Paceman Ryan Sidebottom was the pick of the bowlers with figures of 3-27 while James Anderson (3-

33) and Stuart Broad (2-54) also impressed in a game which Sri Lanka must win if they are to square the five-match series 2-2.

The Sri Lankans got off to a disastrous start, losing their openers cheaply for the second time in a row in the series.

Upul Tharanga was dismissed again by left-arm paceman Sidebottom when he had him caught by Owais Shah for four.

Sanath Jayasuriya, playing in his record 402nd one-day, fumbled around for 22 balls before hoing out to Kevin Pietersen off Anderson.

The Lancashire man soon dealt another blow to the home team when he sent back Mahela Jayawardene for a duck, the skipper slapping one to third-man fielder Broad.

Sangakkara and Silva then batted sensibly to put the innings back on rails.

The wicketkeeper-batsman reached his 41st ODI fifty with a single off Bopara while Silva also followed suit before falling to Broad for a 101-ball 67, inclusive of four fours.

Silva tried to uppercut a wide bouncer only for Bopara to take a fine running catch near the third man boundary.

Sangakkara fell to the same combination with Bopara this time taking the catch near the square-leg fence. His 102-ball innings included four fours.

After Sangakkara's dismissal in the 42nd over, the Sri Lankans kept losing wickets at regular intervals, with only Tillakaratne Dilshan (17) and Jayasuriya (16) offering some resistance.

The last match of the series will be played at the same venue on Saturday.


