Road accidents kill 37 in 5 days

At least 37 people were killed and some 150 were injured in road accidents in the capital and elsewhere in the country in the last four days.

Ferdous Hossain Chowdhury Robin, a student of Tejgaon College, was killed when a bus rammed into his private car near Khilgaon overbridge at about 3:00pm on Monday. His brother Romel, who was driving the car, was injured.

Reshma Akhter, a student of Govt Bangla College, Mirpur died as a CNG-run three-wheeler hit her on Mirpur Road the same day, while one Selim was killed in a road accident in the city on October 12.

An unidentified man, 28, died and two others were injured when a private car ran over some people

waiting in front of Zia International Airport at around 3:00pm on Sunday, while another unidentified man, 60, was killed as a private car hit him when he was crossing the road at West Agargaon in the city.

Mohammad Shipon, 15, was killed in a road accident on Dhaka-Dhahar road on October 12, while an unidentified man, 45, was killed in another road accident at Basabo on October 13.

Eight-year old Masum died in an accident in sadar upazila of Narayanganj, while another unidentified man, 30, was run over by a bus at Jatrabari in the capital on October 13.

Our staff correspondent from Bogra reports: Two day-labourers were killed when the truck carrying them overturned at Purail of Adamdighi upazila in Bogra Monday morning.

3 killed, 30 hurt as train derails in Ctg

Delayed former prime minister Sheikh Hasina was allowed to speak with her children over phone yesterday on the occasion of Eid -- for the first time since her arrest on July 15.

In the afternoon, Hasina called her US expatriate daughter Saima Wazed Putul in Florida and later in the evening, she called her son Sajeeb Wazed Joy in Washington, DC, said Maj Shamsul Haider Siddiqui, Deputy Inspector General (DIG), Prisons, while speaking with The Daily Star.

Maj Siddiqui said, "She [Hasina] spoke for five minutes with her daughter over telephone in the afternoon and in the evening, she spoke with her son for the same duration of time."

Earlier, when Sheikh Hasina made formal requests to the government for allowing her to make phone calls to her children overseas, the jail authorities maintained that the jail code does not permit such privilege for her.

Locals and railway staffs rushed to the spot and recovered the dead body of Gias. The other two bodies were buried beneath the compartments. They were recovered that afternoon when two rescue trains from Pahartali and Akhaura

removed the derailed compartments. The injured had primary treatment at the local health complex.

The train, with a capacity of around 850 passengers, was actually carrying 1,186 passengers, said Chittagong Railway Station Manager ATM Golam Mostafa. It was the day before Eid and people were heading home.

The incident did not disrupt train services that much, as there were two tracks there, said Mostafa.

Officials in the railway department preferring anonymity said the accident could have occurred due to technical glitches in the derailed compartments.

The train, however, resumed its journey around 10:00am with seven compartments, leaving behind four compartments at Bartakia station, sources said.

Lalshak price slumps to Tk 20 a maund!

Farmers in Bogra who sold *lalshak* (red amaranth) at Tk 600 a maund (around 37 kg) during the Ramadan did not find any customer yesterday to sell it at Tk 20 a maund.

Prices of other vegetables have also gone down to a great extent in Bogra's largest wholesale vegetable market at Mahasthan.

Mokhlesur Rahman, a 60-year-old farmer, was found unhappy yesterday at the market as he did not find any customer to buy *lalshak* at Tk 20 a maund till 1:00pm though he sold it at Tk 600 during the Ramadan.

Moslem Uddin, 80, another farmer, was also waiting for customers to buy maund of *lalshak* till 1:30pm.

"I've sold this vegetable at Tk 500 (a maund) in the middle of Ramadan. I have heard that the price has fallen...but it was beyond

After Eid vacation, government offices, banks and newspaper offices reopened yesterday.


Attendance in the government offices was remarkably thin as many officials and employees were enjoying one-day optional holiday.

Kokil textile mill closed indefinitely



6 murdered in 5 days in city

Six persons including a listed criminal were killed in the capital in the last five days.

Of them, five were killed allegedly by muggers while listed criminal Ashraful Haque Niloy was suspected to have been gunned down by his accomplices.

The five victims included Hashmat Ali Sheikh, 50, Abdul Karim, 23, Mohammad Suman, 21, Mohammad Jewel, 25, and an unidentified young man.

Jewel and the unidentified person were said to be poisoned by 'Auggan Party' elements.

Police recovered the bullet-riddled body of Niloy, 35, from Lalmaia on Sunday night.

Hashmat, a tailor from Mirpur, was brought to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) with marks of injury in his chest and abdomen. Doctors declared him dead.

His nephew told reporters at the DMCH that he was returning home from a local market in the early hours of Sunday. Some people

Convicted JMB man held in Bogra

A sentenced local commander of the Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB), Waliullah alias Abdul Hamid, was arrested at Dairai Tarafasat village in Bogra's Gabtoli Upazila on Monday.

Bogra Detective Branch of Police (DB) arrested the Gabtoli unit chief of the terror outfit who was given a 10-year jail sentence in 2005 for possessing sulphuric acid, used for making bombs.

Police said Waliullah has at least four cases against him, including one for robbery at local Brac office, which he confessed to having committed.

He told police that JMB operatives had orders from Abdul Awal, the executive son-in-law of JMB chief Shaikh Abdur Rahman, to kill 'anti-Islamic forces' -- especially judges, journalists, police, Rab and army men -- adding that JMB activists are still out to implement their ideology.

Waliullah, however, said his duty was to reach out to the people with the invitation of the terror outfit.

Waliullah also admitted to having trained JMB rookies at Gabtoli Talata Upazila School and said Bogra district unit commander Mamun can make bombs and use AK-47 rifles.

Row over preparations for Benazir's return

A row erupted yesterday over preparations for Benazir Bhutto's return this week after supporters plastered billboards and posters throughout Karachi of the former Pakistani leader.

Benazir is set to land in her Karachi powerbase on Thursday after spending eight years in self-imposed exile in Dubai and London, having fled to avoid corruption charges arising from her two terms in power.

Thousands of followers from her Pakistan People's Party (PPP) have geared the port city of 12 million for her homecoming, lining major roads with billboards, posters and flags of the former premier.

Some posters read "A New Hope" for Pakistan.

But Arbab Ghulam Rahim, chief minister of Sindh province, ordered late Monday their removal from public property, prompting supporters to stand guard on Tuesday, fearing police will move in.

"We are soldiers of Benazir Bhutto. We are peaceful and are making peaceful arrangements for our leader's reception," said party worker Mohammad Nazir.

Al Gore, UN share Nobel Peace Prize

American trio win Economics Prize

The White House sent its congratulations on the important recognition for Gore's work, but stressed there would be no change in the US administration's environmental policies.

The 2007 prize was jointly awarded to Gore and the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) -- a US body of about 3,000 experts which has highlighted the human role in steadily mounting global temperatures.

The Norwegian Nobel committee cited the recipients for their work "to build up and disseminate greater knowledge about man-made climate change, and to lay the foundations for the measures

needed to combat the threat."

The countries had "expressed the idea that peaceful nuclear activities must be allowed," Gore said in a news conference.

"Russia is the only country helping Iran to construct a nuclear power station for peaceful ends," Gore added, referring to the still unfinished project to build Iran's first nuclear energy plant in Bushehr.
