

Voicing opinions on poverty and inequality

Concert at Rabindra Sarobar

ON the occasion of the International Day for the Eradication of Poverty, a grand musical concert was held at the Rabindra Sarobar open stage, Dhanmondi Lake on October 17. Titled "Stand up, speak out against poverty and inequality", the concert featured popular bands and musicians -- Ornab, Fakir Alamgir, Sumon and his band Aarthohin, Bappa Majumder with Dolchhut, Artcell, Black, Bangla, Boge & the Ektara all stars, Nemesis, and Renaissance. Upcoming band NASH-Talso performed at the concert.

The programme was organised by CAMPE (Campaign for Popular Education), secretariat of PFM (People's Forum on Millennium Development Goals) -- an organisation of civil society members working in Bangladesh on behalf of GCAP (Global Call to Action Against Poverty). The event was supported by GCAP and UNIC (United Nations Information Centre), Dhaka.

The United Nations General Assembly in resolution 47/196 of December 22, 1992, declared October 17 as the International Day for the Eradication of Poverty. It invited inter-

governmental organisations to support efforts in devoting the day to presenting and promoting activities on the eradication of poverty, as appropriate in the national context.

The programme was an initiative to generate awareness against poverty. In 2006, GCAP adopted October 17 as a White Band Day and 23.5 million people in 87 countries joined the call "Stand Up Against Poverty" in the largest coordinated mobilisation of people. However, the turnout this year is expected to be 50 million from more than 150 countries setting yet another record.

The concert was the first major treat for rock music aficionados right after the Eid and the Rabindra Sarobar venue was abuzz.


There were regular intervals and during the breaks rockstars appealed to the audience to take a stance against poverty and inequality. None of the bands charged their regular remuneration.

Speaking at the occasion Ornab said, "Poverty alleviation is not an easy task, it requires a worldwide effort. Everyone will have to come forward and help in any way he/she can. Everyone will have to play a role."




Nemesis performs at the concert

won't get us anywhere but it can certainly pull in and mobilise masses, specifically young people. And that's what's important. To win over poverty a long-term effort is needed. Public awareness can play a key role."

"When I was informed of the show I knew I'd have to be there," said Sumon of Aarthohin. "To combat poverty a united stand of people from all walks of life is necessary. I appeal to everyone to come forward and do whatever they can according to their ability. No matter how big or small it may be, every effort is important," he added.

Veteran musician Azam Khan and artiste Fahmida Nabi; officials from UNIC Dhaka and UNESCO, Bangladesh attended the event to express their solidarity to the cause.

Also video footages containing special messages from Fazle Hasan Abed (Founder and Chairperson of BRAC), Aly Zaker, Sara Zaker, Mehreen, Hyder Hossain and other celebrities and civil society members were screened at the concert. Event Solutions was in charge of event management.

A pioneering Bengali Muslim filmmaker


Tribute to Obaidul Haque

Veteran journalist Obaidul Haque was one of the pioneers among Bengali Muslims. He was the first Bengali Muslim to direct and produce a feature film prior to the Partition. He had been involved with the film industry as a director, producer, lyricist, playwright, film critic and film society activist.

Obaidul Haque's fondness for cinema developed through relentless movie-going in his youth. By 1945, the fondness became an obsession and he was off to Calcutta with 14,000 rupees in cash hoping to make a film based on a script written by him. Though he was confronted with obstacles -- his lack of experience in the details of filmmaking and the communal tension, he gradually succeeded in his endeavour and thus his first film *Dukkhe Jader Jibon Gora* was released.

Dukkhe Jader Jibon Gora, follows the ups and downs of a Hindu family during the famine in 1943. It was the first intervention by a Muslim filmmaker into the pre-Partition Bengal's highly distinguished film industry based in Calcutta that virtually excluded Bengali Muslims. Fathel Lohani, credited as 'Kiran Kumar', acted in the film and Abdul Ahad was the music director. Sukumar Das Gupta was to direct the film. After completing 14 percent of the film, he abandoned his job because of a dispute between him and Haque. The rest of the film was completed by Haque himself.

At that time, due to the mounting communal tension he was obliged to assume a 'Hindu name' -- Himadri Chowdhury -- included in the credits. *Dukkhe Jader Jibon Gora* was released in Calcutta on December 20, 1946. According to Alamgir Kabir the Calcutta-based distributor took full advantage of the volatile political atmosphere and managed to exploit Haque without paying him anything. Haque's personal investment in



the project amounted to over 50,000 rupees.

Reflecting on the film Alamgir Kabir wrote, "I feel that *Dukkhe Jader Jibon Gora* was not only a bold attempt but also a tremendously risky venture. Had it not been for family affluence of the director, the 'adventure' could have proved ruinous.

But, then again, taking risks has always been the way with the pioneers."

Obaidul Haque also established a film distribution house named 'Standard Films' and was a member of Bongyo Chalachittra Samity. He took initiatives to make a number of films in both Bangla and Hindi but the situation forced him to withdraw from the projects

as the communal harmony was once again dismantled by the killing of Mahatma Gandhi. Haque returned to Dhaka.

In this part of Bengal, Haque directed *Dui Diganto*, *Azan* and *Ontorongo* are film adaptations of his stories. Haque continued his contribution to cinema in different roles -- as a member of National Film Award Committee, Censor Board, film grants and through film society activities.

Obaidul Haque passed away at his Banani residence on October 13 at the age of 96.

Parley with a TV star

Her name is Sadia Jahan Prava. 'Prava', in Bangla, means radiance and her name seems to do justice to her appearance. Prava's enthusiastic expressions and infectious smile made the TV commercial (TVC) of Meril beauty soap one of last year's most popular ads. Overnight Prava became a familiar face to millions. Her appearance in the subsequent TVC of Meril Powder (2007) also proved to be a success.

Like many of her contemporaries, Prava has also stepped into acting and some of her plays have been aired already. She received a warm response from the audience for her performance in the single-episode TV play *Je Meghey Brishti Hoy Na*, aired on ATN Bangla. Recently, the up and coming model turned actress talked to *The Daily Star*.

"My first modelling gig was a photo-shoot for the 15th anniversary of *The Daily Star* in 2005. Subsequently I sent some photographs to a modelling agency. After the primary selection, they called me for a screen test the same day (on the last day of my HSC exams). I was selected for the commercial of Meril beauty soap. While shooting, I didn't realise that the commercial would get the kind of response it did. It was like a pleasant shock to



me. However, I don't intend to take up modelling seriously. It is difficult because there are not enough quality TVCs for all of us. I'm more

interested in TV plays."

Prava is currently doing honours in fashion designing at the Santa Maria University. "I plan

to take up fashion designing as my career -- it's really appealing to me. Besides, it can help me in my acting career as well. At least, I'll be able to design my own costumes, if not for others," Prava smilingly says.

Her first TV play titled *Lost Project*, was a production of the Chhabrial group for Channel 1. She did a cameo in ntv's popular drama serial, *Mon-e-Mon-e*. "I'm still in the initial stage of my career and the positive response from the audience is really encouraging. I want to continue. As I don't have formal training, I want to hone my acting skills."

Prava spent her childhood in Shariatpur. Every year, her family celebrates Eid there. "I eagerly wait to meet my grandparents, uncles, aunts and cousins. My cousins and I have a lot of fun together. But the most exciting part is to get the salaami from the elders."

Talking about the differences between celebrating Eid when she was a child and now, Prava refuses to believe that she has really grown up. "I still fight with my cousins, rag for new clothes on Eid and wait for the salaami. I am still a child at heart."

She was on a tight schedule, shooting for several Eid-special plays among which were *Swapnojal*, directed by Diponkar Dipon, *Tona Tunir Golpo* directed by Ashrafi Mithu and more.

Bollywood stars team up against human trafficking

While more and more Bollywood stars are coming forward to espouse social causes like the anti-tobacco and anti female feticide or dowry campaigns, a number of them came together for the first time here recently to highlight a problem that afflicts India, Bangladesh and Nepal in equal measure -- human trafficking.

The occasion was the concluding day of a two-day UN-sponsored South Asian conference on human trafficking which is a major problem confronting the three countries.

Actors John Abraham, Amisha Patel, Kiran Kher, Mita Vashisht, singers Talat Aziz, Usha Uthup, Penaz Masani and film makers Onir and Meghna Gulzar, daughter of writer-lyricist Gulzar -- all lent their weight behind the campaign against human trafficking which has taken into its grip women and children who are enticed with promises of job or marriage abroad.

According to UN estimates, about 150,000 people are trafficked within South Asia every year, making the region second only to South East Asia in human trafficking.

"We must do something to put an end to it," said Abraham. Added Amisha Patel, "it's

disturbing to know that young girls are being lured away from their homes and ending up in brothels. A five-year-old girl is sold as a

prostitute and young boys are ending up as camel jockeys in Arab countries."

Bollywood superstar Preity Zinta was not

personally present but sent a video message saying it was a daunting task to rescue these girls from living hell and restore their dignity. We must bring the perpetrators of human trafficking to justice. To prevent trafficking, it is necessary to promote education and become more vigilant."

Veteran actress Sharmila Tagore in her message said the issue of human trafficking touched the core of lives of women and children and it was a matter of deep concern.

Penaz Masani voiced concern over the fact that 35,000 children and women were brought from Bangladesh and Nepal to India.

Usha Uthup and Penaz sang songs especially composed for child victims of trafficking and dancer Gita Chandran portrayed the plight of a victim through her exquisite dance.

Onir discussed his forthcoming film on human trafficking and Meghna Gulzar talked about her recent documentary on female domestic help.

Given the huge fan following of stars of the entertainment world in the Indian subcontinent, one hopes that people of the region listen to their message and make them more aware of the dangers posed by human trafficking.

Sir Anthony Hopkins sues Merchant Ivory


Whether or not it's accompanied by fava beans and nice Chianti, Anthony Hopkins wants his money. Samson, Inc., a company co-owned by Hopkins, is suing Merchant Ivory Productions for allegedly failing to pay the actor for his services.

Merchant Ivory owes Hopkins \$750,000 for his work in a film called *The City of Your Final Destination*, according to court documents filed last Wednesday in Los Angeles Superior Court. The lawsuit was first reported by celebrity Web site CelebTV.com.


Hopkins signed onto the film last October and was to be paid in full for his performance by January 10, court documents claim.

He is seeking compensatory damages of \$750,000 as well as interest on that amount, attorney fees and "further relief as the (arbitration) panel may deem just and proper."

Telephone and e-mail messages to Merchant Ivory Productions were not returned. Lawyers for Samson, Inc. did not immediately return a phone message. Hopkins' publicist had no comment.
