

16 lakh become victims of hip fracture a year

Doctors tell seminar

Osteoporosis is a bone disease that endangers people's life silently as there is no specific symptom of the disease, said the doctors at a seminar yesterday.

They said around 16 lakh people are becoming victims of hip fracture every year and people who are above 30 years including women are the main sufferers of fracture.

Instead of taking the disease seriously, they take it as an accident due to lack of knowledge and awareness in this regard, said the doctors. They said the main reason

behind the fracture is frail bone and it occurs due to lack of calcium, magnesium, zinc, protein, vitamin D and K and other proteins.

The seminar was organised by the New Zealand Dairy Products Ltd to mark the World Osteoporosis Day at Spectra Convention Centre in the city.

Dr Samina Chowdhury, professor of the Institute of Child and Mother Health, presented a keynote paper at the seminar.

Prof Shahela Khatun of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University, Prof Rawshan Ara Begum of Holy Family Red

Crescent Medical College and Hospital and Rheumatology and Medicine Specialist Dr Muhammad Nazrul Islam also spoke on the occasion.

Later, Prof Shahela and S A Mallick, managing director of New Zealand Dairy Products Ltd, jointly inaugurated the manufacturing of Anlin milk in the country by unveiling its pack.

The milk packets weighing 400 gram and 900 gram will be available in the markets from now on, said the organisers.

Prior to the seminar, a procession was brought out.

CU REOPENS TOMORROW Students asked to carry ID cards to avoid stern action

Chittagong University (CU) authorities have asked all the residential and non-residential students of the university to carry identity cards with them during their stay on the campus when the university reopens tomorrow.

Patrol teams of police, Rapid Action Battalion (Rab), and the university would stay at different spots on the campus and students failing to show ID cards would have to face stern action, they said.

Those who are allotted in the dormitories and got temporary permission from the authorities would get chance to enter the dormitories on condition of showing ID cards.

The decisions were taken at a follow-up meeting of the university authorities with the civil administration, intelligence, Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) and police departments aiming to establish a congenial atmosphere on the campus.

CU Vice Chancellor Prof Dr M Badiul Alam presided over the meeting held at his office yesterday morning.

The authorities also directed the owners of cottages and privately owned rented hostels around the campus, to provide the photo and details of students and others dwellers.

Rab and police teams may conduct drives anywhere on the campus, including dormitories, cottages and shuttle trains to avert any untoward incidents, said the meetings sources.

Chittagong Divisional Commissioner Hossain Jamil, Chittagong Metropolitan Police (CMP) Commissioner Mainur Rahman Chowdhury, representatives from DGI, Rab, Police and the university syndicate members were present in the meeting.

The university was closed following a government order to shut down all public universities on August 22. The classes will resume on Wednesday.

The dormitories were scheduled to be opened on Tuesday but in a meeting on September 27, the authorities decided to open the dormitories on Monday.

Masked criminals attack UNO's house in Ruma

Launch social movement for cornea donation

President urges conscious sections of society

President Iajuddin Ahmed called upon the conscious sections of society to come forward to launch social movement in favour of cornea donation among the mass people for restoring sight of the blind.

"Eye professionals, community opinion leaders and people from all sections of society, including religious leaders, can play important roles in building mass awareness about cornea donation," he said.

The president was addressing the inaugural ceremony of an international Eye Bank Symposium in the city yesterday.

Health Secretary AKM Zafarullah Khan attended the programme as the special guest while President of the International Agencies for Prevention of Blindness (IAPB) Dr GN Rao presented the keynote paper.

Country Director of ORBIS International Dr Abu Raihan and General Secretary of Sandhani National Eye Donation Society Prof Abul Kalam Azad were present.

The president thanked ORBIS International for providing technical and financial support to local organisations and institutions in establishing eye-care facilities, which will play vital roles in reducing blindness in the country.

He said although the ultimate treatment of corneal transplant may help in restoring vision in many corneal patients, it is more important to prevent corneal diseases that lead to blindness.

"I think the organisers would consider these aspects of blindness prevention as well," he said.

He termed the Eye Bank a strong social movement and said, "Accordingly, people at all levels can play an important role in establishing and running eye bank, too."

He expressed his satisfaction as Sandhani National Eye Donation Society has established a modern and high-standard eye bank in the country with the support from ORBIS International.

He hoped that this experience and success would inspire others to establish more eye banks in Bangladesh as well as in other countries.

The president said access to eye-health information and education needs to be expanded for all in order to preserve and save sight for those who are suffering from avoidable blindness. Media, both electronic and print, can play very effective role in this regard.

He also stressed the need for reduction of sight restoration by corneal transplant through taking appropriate measures that include public health education and early treatment of eye diseases and infection.

Valuables worth over Tk 50 lakh gutted in Motijheel bldg fire

Valuables worth over Tk 50 lakh were gutted in a fire at a commercial building in Motijheel in the city yesterday.

The fire also left five people, including two firefighters, injured.

The injured firemen were identified as Afzal Hossain and Nurul Islam but the identities of the three injured shop employees could not be known immediately.

Eight warehouses of as many local stationary shops, housed on the third floor of the five-storied building, were completely gutted in the fire.

Electronics goods kept at a warehouse at an adjacent building were also gutted partially.

The central stationary department of Janata Bank, housed on the ground and first floors of the building, were safe.

Locals informed fire brigade officials soon after they found smoke emitting from the third floor of the building at around 9:00am.

Fire brigade officials said 13 firefighting units rushed to the spot on receiving the information.

However, they said it took more time to douse the fire as all doors and windows of the building were closed since it was a weekly holiday yesterday.

Following the incident, members of law enforcing agencies, including army personnel also rushed in and cordoned off the building.

The fire in the commercial hub spread panic among the businessmen in the nearby buildings.

Fire brigade officials also said that the fire spread rapidly as the godowns contained flammable chemicals.

Fire brigade officials could not identify the reason behind the fire.

Turn visually impaired people into human resources

Speakers say at discussion

Speakers at a discussion yesterday reiterated the need for building awareness about the use of white cane by visually impaired people to ensure their safe movement.

They also called for adequate supply of necessary equipments for blind people to help turn them into manpower.

The discussion was organised jointly by the Ministry of Social Welfare, National Foundation for the Development of Disabled Persons and National Forum of Organisations Working with the Disabled (NFOWD) at the auditorium of the Directorate of Social Services marking the World White Cane Safety Day.

In his welcome address, AHM Noman Khan, general secretary of NFOWD, said the celebration of the Day across the world symbolises a common platform for people with all forms of disabilities along with visually impaired to raise voice for their rights.

He urged all to extend their helping hands in ensuring adequate supply of equipments like braille books, special educational institutes, white canes and reservation of seats in public vehicles.

He congratulated the young people with disabilities who earned laurels through their outstanding performances at the special Olympic held in China recently.

In his keynote paper, Monsur Ahmed Chowdhury, NFOWD chairman of Policy and Legal Affairs Committee, explained the background of the Day.

He said leaders of the International Federation of the Blind organised an international conference for the first time in 1969 in Colombo, Sri Lanka where different proposals were adopted regarding social development, education, training, and safe move-

ment of the blind people.

One of the proposals was to observe the World White Cane Safety Day every year on October 15 to promote awareness about the basic needs of people with visual impairment, he added.

The Ministry of Social Welfare has been observing the Day since 1996 in association with the NFOWD.

Hafizul Islam Mia, director general of social services director-

ate, laid emphasis on raising awareness about the use of white cane.

He also called for comprehensive approach for the overall development of people with disability.

Social Welfare Secretary MA Hai Howlader, Bangladesh Blind Mission Visual Trainer-cum-Braille-in-charge Fahima Khatun and NFOWD Assistant General Secretary M Khalilur Rahman also took part in the discussion pre-

sided over by NFOWD President Khandaker Zahurul Alam.

A total of 200 white canes were handed over to 12 member organisations of the Directorate of Social Services, University of Dhaka and NFOWD for distributing among the blind students and persons on the occasion.

On account of Eid-ul-Fitr vacation, the World White Cane Safety Day was not observed on the due date.
