

Physical assault constitutes 77.9pc of total violence against women

Reveals study

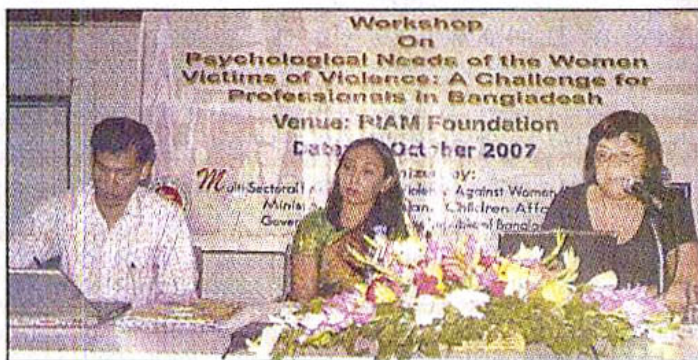

Physical assault constitutes 77.9 percent while rape constitutes 18.1 percent of the total violence against women (VAW), revealed a study yesterday.

The study also revealed that 91 percent of the victims are in need of clinical intervention while 81.4 percent require depression level intervention to remove their anxiety symptoms.

The study was placed at a workshop titled 'Psychological needs of the women victims of violence: A challenge for professionals in Bangladesh' organised by the Multi-sectoral Programme on Violence Against Women (MSP-VAW) of the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs.

The study was conducted jointly by Farah Deeba and Kamruzzaman Mojumder, clinical psychologists and consultants of MSP-VAW, on 275 victims who attended the one-

stop crisis centre (OCC) at the six divisional medical college and hospitals across the country during the last two months.

"It is shocking to know that even pregnancy or disability does not

prevent the perpetrators from torturing the women as the study revealed that 12.9 percent victims were pregnant and 2.2 percent had some sort of disability," said Farah while presenting the study.

She termed the lack of adequate professional resources in this sector a major barrier to support the victims to get back to their normal life.

Presenting a paper titled 'Preparing for challenge-Support to victims of violence' MSP-VAW Senior Adviser Dr Karen Ellen Spannow held the patriarchal family and social norms responsible for the repression on women.

She suggested for stopping violence against the children at first within the family to stop violence against women.

Dr Karen also asked for developing relevant public services for women to increase their confidence level so that they can resist violence against them.

Speaking on the occasion, MSP-VAW Project Director Dr Abul Hossain referred to the limitation of government resources and asked for the collaboration of NGOs at the grassroots level.

Kidnapped trader found dead in Khulna

Body of an electronics goods trader, kidnapped on Tuesday from Khulna court premises, was recovered inside a brickfield at Peroli Ferry Ghat under Digholia upazila in Khulna district yesterday.

Police said Biku Molla, 32, was kidnapped when he went to the court in connection with a case of which he was one of the accused.

Investigation is going on to arrest murderers but none lodged any FIR till filing of this report.

7 kathas of land recovered in Ctg

A mobile court in the port city yesterday recovered around seven kathas of land worth Tk two crore through demolishing different illegal structures, including offices of two labour organisations.

The court conducted by Chittagong Port Authority (CPA) Magistrate Muhammad Munir Chowdhury led the drive at New Mooring area of Chittagong Port, sources said.

During the two and a half an hour long drive the court bulldozed 6 illegal structures, including offices of Chittagong Port Workers' Union and Chittagong Port Merchant Workers' Union built on around 5000 square feet area.

Sources in the mobile court said the two unions have been functioning their activities through erecting offices at the commercially important area owned by the port for the last 5 years posing threat to the security of the nearby MPB Jetty.

Bureaucrats always against separation of judiciary

Says Hannan Shah

Brig (Retd) Hannan Shah, adviser to BNP chairperson, yesterday said bureaucrats always frustrated the moves of the previous governments to separate judiciary from the executive.

Talking to journalists at Sona Masjid he said the previous governments had faced obstruction from administrative officers. They also raised objection when the present government is going to implement it from November 1. Certain changes are being made under pressure.

Hannan Shah came here to offer special prayers at the graveyard of his close comrade Shahid freedom fighter Major Nazmul Haq.

He said the present government has completely failed to check spiraling price of essentials. This has frustrated expectation of the people from the government.

Replying to a question on 1/11, the BNP leader said certain political parties had indulged in anarchy leading to loss of lives and destruction of public and private property. Under the prevailing situation the president had no alternative to declare emergency in the country.

Asked about the steps to secure release of chairperson Khaleda Zia in case legal battle failed Shah said, "It is premature to say."

Earlier, he was quoted to have

said BNP would opt for political measures if the legal battle failed to secure release of Khaleda who had been thrown behind the bars on corruption charges.

Shah reiterated the demand for reopening the BNP office. "If not for us, let it open for the so-called reformers in the party. People will see how long they can sit there."

The Tech Museum Awards recognise 25 laureates in five categories: education, equality, environment, economic development and health.

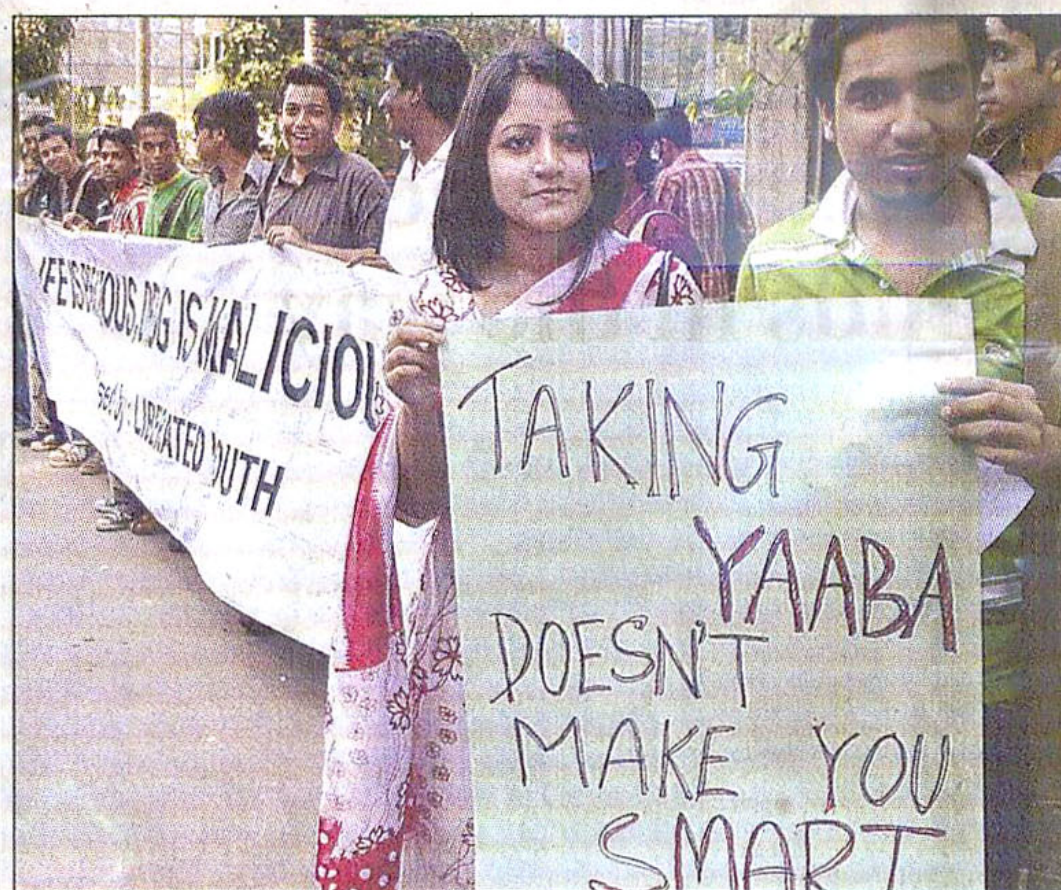

CLIMATE CHANGE

Need for raising coping capacity of vulnerable people stressed

Speakers at the launching of the preparatory phase of a project yesterday underscored the need for raising the coping capacity of the most vulnerable people side by side cutting down risks and hazards in a planned and integrated manner.

The government project titled 'Community-based adaptation to climate change through coastal afforestation' is funded by GEF-UNDP-LDC.

The \$3.5 million preparatory project, officials said, would address climate hazards as the key, and would be limited to coastal areas exposed to climate changes while this National Adaptation Plan of Action (NAPA) follow-up programme

would help demonstrate viable climate change adaptation approaches.

UNDP Regional Technical Adviser Gernot Laganda, UNDP/GEF Global Technical Adviser Pradeep Kurukulasurya, UNDP Sustainable Development Adviser Dr Aminul Islam, DOE Director Mohammad Rezauddin, Prof KAB Sajjadur Rasheed of Dhaka University, Mamunul Haque Khan of UNDP, Kamaluddin of climate cell and Mukhesur Rahman from the project prep team addressed the opening session chaired by Joint Secretary of Ministry of Environment and Forests Rabinranath Roy Chowdhury.

Earlier, recognising the fact that Bangladesh would be the

one of the most vulnerable and worst affected countries to climate change, NAPA suggested 15 priority adaptation measures to address adverse climate events in the country and community-based adaptation is one of those 15 intervention areas.

Speakers also suggested climate resilient livelihood options to be developed and promoted among the target communities while climate change risks be integrated into the community level planning and implementation of interventions.

They also asked to raise resilience of coastal population, settlements and ecosystems in areas exposed to coastal hazards.
