In conversation with Tushar Khan

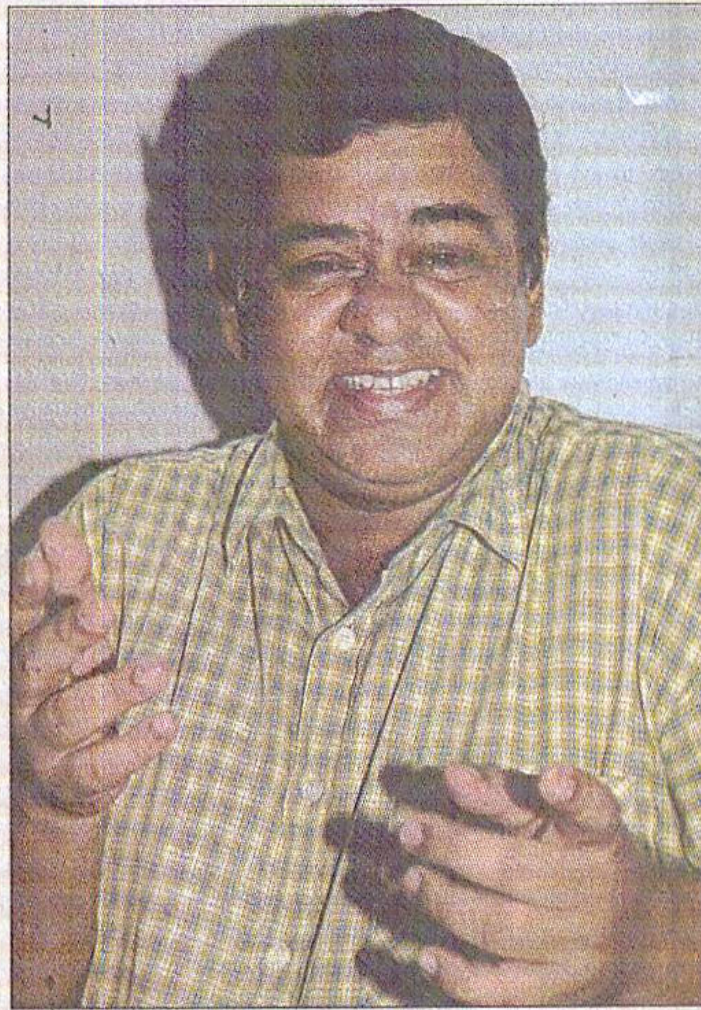

POPULAR actor Tushar Khan has been working mostly in television at present. Four serials featuring the actor are on air now -- *Dolls House*, *Amader Nurul Huda*, *Syed Barir Bou* and *Chor Kuthuri*. Several others are set to air soon.

Tushar has been involved with the theatre troupe Aranyak Natya Dal for nearly 25 years. Since 1983, he has acted in many stage and street plays. On stage, he has worked mostly as a substitute actor until Aranyak Natya Dal's latest production *Uppurwala*. The actor is a member of the regular cast in *Uppurwala*.

"I work with Aranyak with the same passion and enthusiasm as I did in the beginning. It's true I've become busier with TV plays but that doesn't interfere with my work in theatre," he says.

"While one has to accomplish his/her own designated responsibilities, it is the teamwork that is most important for a theatrical



Tushar attained popularity mainly for his comic roles in TV plays during the late '90s. Today, however, he performs in different types of roles with equal flair.

Some of the actor's much-loved roles include Abdullah in *Itish*, a contractor in *Obobahika*, a police officer in the street play *Neela* and an impostor who pretends to be a freedom fighter in *Ferari Nishan*. Among the characters in TV plays Jamal in *Hikotha* and his roles in *Shilpi*, *Shundori* and *Bondhon* are his favourites. "Variation fascinates me. Any character that can engage an artist becomes his/her favourite," he says.

Tushar had been regular in movies up until 1998. After a long seclusion, he recently made a comeback in movies, though according to him, "the range of work has become limited." He has appeared in over 50 films. His performances in movies such as *Bikkhobh*, *Ajker Protibad*, *Wrong Number*, *Hridoyer Kotha*, *Taka*, *Shubha*, *Khude Joddha* and others have been widely appreciated.

Tushar believes artists need to be socially aware and sensitive enough to respond to different causes. "Artists have the power to influence many. They need to be honest and empathetic. At least considering the love they receive from the people, they should always think of giving back to the society."

"Acting is my passion. I consider myself fortunate that I can satiate my creative yearning through my profession and am not forced to do anything that I might not enjoy," he says.

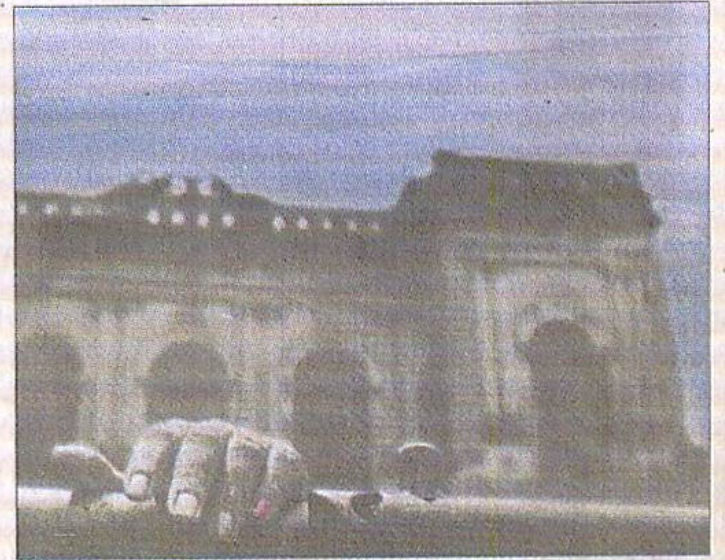

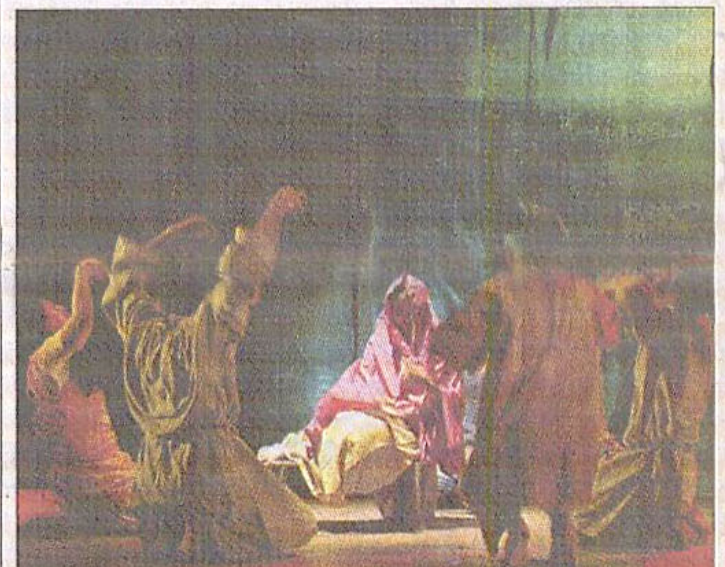
mance. Nirjhor has utilised his actors with remarkable competence.

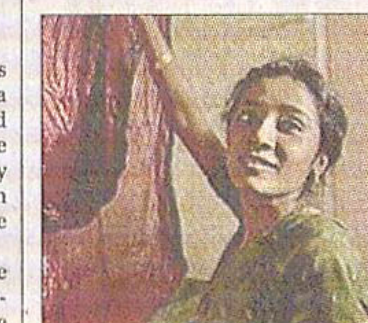

Brick Lane's Tannishtha gets BIFA nomination

Tannishtha Chatterjee's impressive performance as a young Bangladeshi immigrant in Sarah Gavron's critically acclaimed *Brick Lane* has earned the young actress a best actress nomination and Gavron a best director at the 10th edition of the British Independent Film Awards.

The film is based on Monica Ali's critically acclaimed 2003 novel where Chatterjee plays Ali's protagonist, Nazneen, who is married off at the age of 17 to a middle-aged Bangladeshi expat Chanu (Satish Kaushik).

Also in the running for best actress are Judi Dench (*Notes on a Scandal*), Anne Hathaway (*Becoming Jane*), Sophia Myles (*Hallam Foe*) and Kierston Wareing (*It's a Free World...*).

The nominations announced at London's Haymarket hotel include Anton Corbijn's biopic *Control* with 10 nominations,

And When Did You Last See Your Father?, *Hallam Foe* and *Eastern Promises*.

The nominations were decided by a jury comprising actors Hayley Atwell, Archie Panjabi, Kathy Burke, Tony Curran, Chiwetel Ejiofor and Matthew Macfadyen; directors Annie Griffin, Menhaj Huda, Neil Marshall and Peter Webber; London Film Festival artistic director Sandra Hebron; producer Mark Herbert; cinematographer Brian Tufano; distributor Will Clarke; and musician Nitin Sawhney.

The awards ceremony will take place on November 28 at the Roundhouse in London.

"The Namesake": A contender at this year's Oscars

Acclaimed Indian American director Mira Nair's latest film *The Namesake*, which has earned a great commercial success and critical appreciation in India, the United States and several other countries, will be running for this year's Oscars.

Based on Jhumpa Lahiri's critically acclaimed novel about a Bengali immigrant family in the US, torn between modernity and tradition, the film, stars Irrfan Khan and Tabu in the lead roles. Tabu and Nair as well as the film's script-

writer Sooni Taraporewala have left for Los Angeles for the mandatory promo of the film, produced by Fox Searchlight.

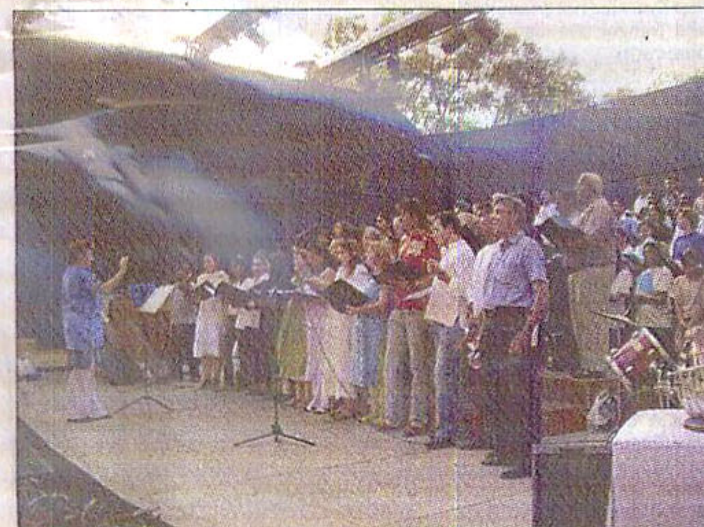
The Namesake also elicited a good response in Poland where people are used to watching films by greats like Andrzej Wajda, Roman Polanski and Krzysztof Zanussi.

In the overseas market, Nair's movie had made it to the North American Top 20 in only its second week and broke the 10-year opening week box office record at the Paris Theatre in New York City by grossing US \$101,929 in its first

seven days after it was released there in March.

In the film, national award winning actress Tabu plays the role of an ageing Bengali woman, a role which was offered first to Bollywood star Rani Mukherjee and then to Konkona Sen Sharma, both of whom turned it down.

Earlier, Mira Nair's *Salam Bombay*, a film about the street children in India's commercial capital, had made it to the Oscar nomination finals but failed to win the top honour by the Academy of Motion Pictures Science and Arts.
