CA urges Bhutanese envoy

UNB, Dhaka

Chief Adviser Fakhruddin Ahmed yesterday said Bangladesh and Bhutan should make all-out efforts to tap all potentials to the mutual benefit of the two South Asian countries.

He said this when newly appointed Bhutanese Ambassador

Tshering Dorji made a courtesy call on him at the Chief Adviser's Office.

Exploring surplus hydroelectricity in Bhutan for the benefit of both the countries was also discussed.

The chief adviser said Bangladesh attached importance to its relations with Bhutan and noted that "trade is an important composition in improving bilateral ties".

He also emphasised people-to-people contact for expansion of the bilaterals.

The new Bhutanese envoy said Bhutan also gives importance to its relationship with Bangladesh and assured that he would work during his tenure to improve further the bilateral relations, particularly in trade and commerce.

The chief adviser appreciated the achievements of the 4th King of Bhutan and hoped that the leadership of the 5th King would also carry forward tasks in similar dynamism.

The envoy said the Bhutanese King, despite having tremendous support of the people, is introducing democracy in the country.

Ambassador Tshering Dorji appreciated the achievements of the present caretaker government of Bangladesh, specially its drive against corruption and steps to strengthen democracy and good governance.

The chief adviser apprised the envoy of measures undertaken by his government, saying "Everything is being done for holding a free, fair and credible election for giving a sustainable shape to democracy in the country."

BBC programme on climate change from today

The British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC) launches a month-long programme titled 'Nodipathay Bangladesh' (Bangladesh by the river) today to explore the impacts of climate change on the country and its people.

Chartering a boat, the BBC team will tour major rivers, specially those in the southern part of the country, and will broadcast different issues about the climate change including voice of rural people to global audience.

This was at a press conference held at the chartered boat of BBC at the Paglaughat in Narayanganj yesterday.

Nazes Afroz, executive editor of South Asian desk, and Sabir Mustafa, head of Bangla Service, spoke at the press conference which was conducted by Masud Hasan Khan, senior producer of BBC Bangla Service.

The speakers said a team of BBC journalists on radio, on television and online will travel more than 200 miles along the Padma, Meghna, Jamuna and other rivers and the BBC will broadcast personal stories, views and features of local communities from the boat every Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 7:30pm.

For the first time in its history, the BBC is going to broadcast and telecast news, features and documentaries in 17 languages including Arabic, Azeri, Bangla, Brazilian, Burmese, Chinese, Hindi, English, Indonesian, Pashto, Persian, Romanian, Russian, Somali, Spanish, Swahili and Urdu about the climate change and its effect on the people of Bangladesh, they added.

Nazes Afroz said it is an effort to reach the thoughts and voices of people who are vulnerable to climate change, to global audience.

Sabir Mustafa said beside covering and raising the debate of climate change issue, it will provide them with an unique chance to cover lifestyle and culture of Bangladeshi people from the grassroots level.

With a bunch of local and foreign staffs of BBC on board, the boat started its journey from Paglaughat yesterday and would broadcast its first programme from Chandpur this evening.

While visiting different places, the BBC would arrange four Bangladeshi Sanglap programme from Bholia, Mongla, Sirajganj and Rajbari engaging the local people.



Train weavers to protect traditional Benarasi sari

Speakers tell workshop

Speakers at a workshop yesterday stressed the need for providing training to Benarasi weaving community in modern design and marketing to keep the traditional Benarasi sari alive.

The two-day workshop on a project titled 'Strengthening skill of the weavers in techniques, design and marketing for sustainable development with a gender perspective' was organised by Women for Women, a research study group, in cooperation with UNESCO Dhaka at Al-Fuad Community Centre in Mirpur Section 6, says a press release.

Speaking at the inaugural session, Dr Mahmuda Islam, president of Women for Women, said the workshop is aimed to find out the present situation of Benarasi weavers and how to improve their condition.

"By means of strengthening the skills of the weavers and enabling them to market their products efficiently, this project seeks to promote the country's indigenous art and crafts," said Hassan A

Keynan, officer-in-charge of UNESCO, who was present on the occasion as special guest.

space, low income, ever-declining demand and huge inflow of Indian saris, the weaver community in Mirpur is facing the greatest ever challenge.


As such, this traditional craft, which has become a part of Bangladeshi cultural heritage, needs patronisation for its survival and flourishing further.

He mentioned that the government has already decided to shift the Benarasi Palli on a 40-acre land at Bhasanteek where more than 900 members of the community would be provided with living and working space.

But unfortunately a case has kept the implementation of the project pending for years, he added.

A low has formed over southwest Bay and adjoining southeast Bay in the morning and intensified into a well-marked low over the same area at about 3:00pm yesterday.

Maritime ports of Chittagong, Cox's Bazar and Mongla have been advised to hoist distinct cautionary signal number one.

All fishing-boats and trawlers over the North Bay and deep sea must come close to the coast and proceed with caution till further notice.


Recently selected 10 partner organisations have started mobilising the affected rickshaw-pullers and assessing their training needs.
