## Restore residential nature of Khilgaon

**Speakers urge govt**

Speakers at a consultation meeting yesterday called on the government to take steps to restore the residential nature of Khilgaon area in the city by demolishing illegal structures in the area.

They also urged the government to free Chowdhurypara Children's Park from illegal occupation and to cancel the housing project for government officials in the area.

They also called for taking appropriate measures to improve the services of Dhaka City Corporation (DCC), Wasa (Water and Sewerage Authorities), Desa (Dhaka Electric Supply Authority), Titas Gas and Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) in the area.

Khilgaon Samajik Sangstha and Bangladesh Paribesh Andolon (Bapa) jointly organised the meeting on the environment of Khilgaon residential area at the National Press Club.

Speaking as the chief guest, Bapa President Prof Muzaffer Ahmad said the problems of Khilgaon residential area are similar to the problems in all other areas in the capital.

The authorities should take up a comprehensive plan to develop urban areas, he said, adding that Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakha

had many plans but those could not be implemented due to political reasons in the past.

"I do not think Rajuk can effectively carry out development initiatives in the city and at the same time play the role of a regulating body," he said. "There should be two separate entities for performing these two functions," he added.

Talking about DCC, he said, "DCC has 90 wards. All its wards should be regrouped to form 40 individual and

autonomous municipalities and the DCC would only play the coordinating role."

He also criticised the unplanned construction of high-rise buildings in the city.

President of Khilgaon Samajik Sangstha Monir Hossain Khan, General Secretary Md Hafizur Rahman Moina, Prof Anu Muhammad, Sharif Jamil, Mahidul Huq Khan and Fakir Alamgir also spoke.

Factory owner fined Tk 2 lakh, jailed for one yr

A mobile court in the port city yesterday sentenced a factory owner to one year's imprisonment and fined Tk two lakh for producing and marketing adulterated ghee and butter oil.

Sources said the court led by Chittagong Port Authority (CPA) Magistrate Mohammad Munir Chowdhury in a raid in Foy's Lake area under Khulshi on October 11 seized around 5 metric tons of adulterated ghee and butter oil at Kohinoor Command and Mamun Company.

Following the raid, the court sent some samples of the seized ghee and butter oil to Bangladesh Standard Testing Institute (BSTI) for laboratory test.

BSTI test report on Monday revealed that Iodine and par-oxide were found above the tolerable limit in both the items while the melting points were also found harmful for human health, sources said.

Meanwhile, the owner of the factory Emdadul Hoque and its manager Moniruzzaman were arrested yesterday when they surrendered before the court.

During primary interrogation Emdadul said that more than 200 tons of adulterated ghee and butter oil were produced in his factory in the last three years to supply those to different areas of Chittagong, Sylhet, Hill Tracts, Barisal and Khulna.

The court fined Emdadul and Moniruzzaman Tk 2 lakh and Tk 1 lakh respectively.

They were also sentenced to one year's and six month's of imprisonment respectively.

The court also ordered BSTI authorities to cancel the license of the factory and take necessary steps for banning the sale and distribution of its products.

## Call to overcome barriers hindering women's dev

A two-day Commonwealth Asia Colloquium on Gender, Culture and Law began in the city yesterday to find out interlinks among customary practices in different cultures, gender perceptions and related laws of different countries and to adapt the good practices.

Organised by the Commonwealth Secretariat in collaboration with the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs, the colloquium also aims at providing insight on women's claim on resources and rights under the law and customs, which are often mediated by social or cultural norms and beliefs.

Caretaker Government Adviser Geeteara Safiya Choudhury for-

mally inaugurated the colloquium which is being participated by representatives from India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Malaysia, Singapore, Brunei, Maldives and Indonesia.

Geeteara said women have a very big role to play and strict law sometimes could be helpful to protect their rights.

But here laws are often confined to papers, she said hoping that this forum will provide some guidelines to deal with the challenges in this area.


