Indian External Affairs Minister (EAM) Pranab Mukherjee is scheduled to arrive here this morning on a daylong visit for a first hand assessment of the devastation wrought by Cyclone Sidr.

His visit also aims to convey the Indian people's solidarity with the people of Bangladesh in their hour of need, said an official of the High Commission of India in Dhaka.

"In the aftermath of the severe cyclone in Bangladesh on November 15, 2007, which had caused heavy loss of lives and widespread destruction in coastal areas, India has readily come to the

Dhaka to press
for increased
climate change
adaptation fund

Bangladesh will stress the need for increasing the climate change adaptation fund at the Climate Change Conference on the Indonesian island of Bali.

A 24-member official delegation comprising government and non-government organisation (NGO) officials will participate in the 12-day-long conference starting from tomorrow, said Environment and Forest Adviser Dr CS Karim while speaking at a press conference at the ministry's auditorium yesterday.

The delegation will explain how developing countries like Bangladesh have been suffering due to climate change, he said.

Relief and disaster management Secretary Ayub Miah last night told BBC Bangla Service that the programme would start as soon as the list is ready.

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SLOW GROWTH OF INVESTMENTS

30pc fall in capital machinery import in first quarter

Import of capital machinery fell by 30 percent in the first quarter of the current fiscal year due to slow growth of both local and foreign investments.

Economists say uncertainty in political field and economic sector prompted the business community to keep away from new investments.

Officials of the central bank however anticipate that the government's recent initiatives for restoring confidence of the businessmen will help both local and foreign investments get momentum in the second quarter.

According to Bangladesh Bank

(BB) statistics, capital machinery worth \$366 million was imported during July-September period this year while it was \$402 million during the corresponding period in last fiscal year.

In total, L/C (letter of credit) opening for machinery import increased by 0.49 percent in the first quarter. But in case of machinery for big industries including textile, jute, garment, and pharmaceuticals, L/C opening and import decreased during the period.

Import of raw materials however went up by 18 percent with edible oil and oil seeds being half of the total.

Commercial bank officials think that imports of capital machinery

decreased due to slow investment growth.

BB statistics show industrial credit disbursement was not satisfactory in the first quarter of this fiscal despite having huge liquidity in the banking system.

The disbursement saw nine percent growth during this period as against 28 percent during the corresponding period of last year. The amount of excess liquidity in the banking system remained Tk 13,129 crore till the end of August this year.

Bangladesh received \$132 million Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) in July-August this year, 3.64 percent less than the amount of

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

Taslima Begum, who maintains her four-member family selling rice cakes in the slum, donated two maxis, a new sari and some old baby clothes.

"I felt so bad when I saw the state of the coastal people on the television, especially women and children who now have nothing to eat and no clothes to wear during winter," she told The Daily Star.

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Cry for baby food, warm clothes in Patuakhali

The cyclone survivors of Patuakhali are suffering from severe crises of baby food and warm clothes as about two lakh families are passing their days under the open sky here.

Lack of food and warm clothes have already exposed around 20,000 children of the district to cold related diseases like pneumonia, typhoid, and fever.

As the decomposed carcasses of animals, perished in the cyclone, have begun to pollute the water bodies in the area, skin diseases and diarrhoea are also spreading.

Meanwhile, several thousand relatives of the survivors still remain missing, 15 days into the cyclone making landfall on the southern coast of the country. Some of the relatives of the missing were seen searching for the bodies of their loved ones on river banks.

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REPEATED SNAPPING OF SUBMARINE CABLE

BTTB in a fix over fixing backup optical fibre line

Despite its urgency, Bangladesh Telegraph and Telephone Board (BTTB) is unable to have a backup optical fibre line for its submarine cable as one option is too costly and the other -- 'free of cost' -- is being resisted by the telecom regulatory authorities arbitrarily.

Having this backup line has become a priority issue for the BTTB due to repeated snapping of the original line between Dhaka and Cox's Bazar by miscreants. Each disruption deprives the BTTB of at least \$70,000 revenue per hour. The cable serves as the backbone of the nation's Internet and overseas call connectivity.

The backup line will be used only when the main line is disconnected for some reasons, and thus uninterrupted telecom and Internet communications will be ensured.

But Bangladesh Telecom Regulatory Commission (BTRC) earlier this month had asked the BTTB not to sign a deal with Bangla Phone saying that this company has violated contractual terms, and legal action is being taken against it.

The BTRC appears to have taken a hostile stance on Bangla Phone from May staying the company violated its contractual terms by installing optical fibre lines "outside" its licensed area. But Bangla Phone is saying installation of the lines was its contractual obligation and that all these were done following approval by the BTRC. Till date, the BTRC has not changed its stance, and will not explain why

The government yesterday began sending artefacts to France for an exhibition in Paris.


At least 10 out of 23 boxes of around 200 relics collected from three museums were shipped in the first phase. The rest will be flown soon, said sources.
