

Property of ex-MP Mirza Azam to be attached

COURT CORRESPONDENT

A Dhaka court yesterday ordered attachment of property of former Awami League (AL) lawmaker Mirza Azam and a businessman in a graft case.

The same court, meantime, directed the authorities to publish summons in two national Bangla dailies asking Harris Chowdhury, Orion Group Chairman Obaidul Karim and Sharin Islam Tuhin, nephew of Khaleda Zia, to turn themselves in by December 10 in two cases that were filed for bribery and tax evasion.

AZAM CASE

Judge Mohammad Azizul Haque at Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court passed the attachment order after receiving police reports on arrest warrants the court issued against Azam and Mohammad Ali Khokon, a proprietor director of Metro Spinning Ltd, on November 27.

The High Court earlier stayed the trial proceedings against another accused in the case, Shawkat Ali, also a proprietor director of the spinning mill. The HC also granted him bail until submission of police report on his arrest warrant.

Investigation Officer Mohammad Monaim Hossain, who is also an assistant director at Anti-Corruption Commission, submitted charge sheet against the three men to Dhaka's chief metropolitan magistrate's court on November 20, showing 23 people as prosecution witnesses.

A Rab team recovered a Lexus sport utility vehicle on March 9 from the residence of Shawkat Ali on road No. 113 at Gulshan-2 in the city. The law enforcers later discovered that Azam, also the general secretary of Awami Juba League, was the original owner of the luxury vehicle.

Sub-Inspector Shawkat Kabir of Rab laid a case with Gulshan Police Station against Azam and the two others the following day.

The complainant said Azam, a corruption suspect on an AGC list, imported the tax-free Lexus on March 25, 2003 and sold it to Shawkat, preparing fake documents.

HARRIS-OBAIDUL

The same court ordered the authorities to publish summons in newspapers after receiving reports on the arrest warrants and attachment orders it issued against Harris Chowdhury and Obaidul Karim in a bribery case that was filed for gross anomalies in Gulistan-Jatrabari flyover contract.

Former BNP lawmaker Ashraf Hossain and Harris's brother-in-law Masud Ahmed and his driver Abdus Salam are also accused in the case and are now behind bars.

The investigation officer submitted charge sheet against the five to chief metropolitan magistrate's court on November 14, showing 27 people as prosecution witnesses.

The charge sheet mentioned that an Infiniti sport utility vehicle was imported duty-free using Ashraf's privilege as a lawmaker through the documents of the vehicle bore Karim's address.

Karim paid around Tk 50 lakh for the SUV while its market value was much higher, said the charge sheet adding that the Orion chairman bribed Harris with the vehicle in order to get work order for the Jatrabari-Gulistan flyover.

The charge sheet said Ashraf, for financial gains, breached his affidavit by transferring the car to Karim.

The court also ordered the authorities to publish summons against Tuhin in newspapers after receiving report on the property-attachment order it earlier issued against him.

On November 25, Deputy Commissioner (Taxes) Golam Kabir at National Board of Revenue filed the case against him for allegedly evading Tk 8.18 lakh in tax between 1998 and 2007 and concealing Tk 3.29 crore in his wealth information submitted to the revenue board.

The court later issued arrest warrant against him, asking him to appear before the court on November 29. Tuhin, however, failed to comply, prompting the court to attach his property.

Israel to build homes in east Jerusalem

Israel said yesterday it is seeking bids to build more than 300 new homes in a disputed east Jerusalem neighborhood, drawing Palestinian condemnations that the move is undermining the newly revived peace talks held last week in Annapolis, Md.

A Housing Ministry spokesman said 307 units would be built in Har Homa, a Jewish neighborhood in east Jerusalem.

Israel captured the eastern part of the city in the 1967 Mideast war and annexed the area. The Palestinians claim east Jerusalem as the capital of a future state.

Palestinian negotiator Saeb Erekat said he sent an urgent message to Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, asking her to block the project from moving forward.

"This is undermining Annapolis," he said, referring to the U.S.-hosted summit, where Israel and the Palestinians relaunched peace talks.

The two sides agreed to base their peace talks on the U.S.-backed "road map," a peace plan that calls on Israel to halt all settlement construction.

The Palestinians consider any construction in the West Bank and east Jerusalem to be settlement activity. Israel says the settlement freeze does not apply to Jerusalem.

"Israel makes a clear distinction between the West Bank and Jerusalem," said Mark Regev, spokesman for Prime Minister Ehud Olmert. "Israel has never made a commitment to limit our sovereignty in Jerusalem. Implementation of the first phase of the road map does not apply to Jerusalem."

Meanwhile, Israel's defense minister said it is time to "kill those who carry out attacks" against Israelis, but said he was holding off on a wide-scale invasion of the Gaza Strip for now.

In a rare interview, Defense Minister Ehud Barak also rejected calls from some members of his Labor Party to talk to Gaza's Islamic Hamas rulers, telling Army Radio that Israeli troops had killed 27 Gaza militants in the past 10 days and would continue to aggressively chase down those operating under Hamas' watch.

"I do not agree with the assessment that the time has come to talk to the Hamas. Now is the time to kill those who carry out attacks and those firing Qassams (rockets) and mortars," Barak said.

Early Tuesday, an Israeli airstrike on a Hamas police post in central Gaza killed three militants and wounded a fourth, Hamas and Palestinian medical officials said. The army confirmed the attack.

Barak, a former military chief, has repeatedly hinted that Israel was on the verge of invading Gaza to stop the nearly daily rocket fire at towns in southern Israel.

Analysts have speculated that Barak wanted to wait until the conclusion of the Annapolis conference. But when asked about the army's plans, Barak ruled out an immediate broad operation.

"The moment has not arrived yet and I hope that it does not arrive, but it is true that we are preparing and need to prepare for a wide range of possibilities," he said. "Every day that passes, we get closer to a wide-scale operation in Gaza, but we are not eager for it."

Hamas, an Islamic militant group committed to Israel's destruction, took control of Gaza in June after overthrowing the rival Fatah forces of moderate Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas.

Israel has tried to bolster Abbas, who now rules from the West Bank, and isolate Hamas. But Israeli airstrikes and pinpoint ground operations have failed to halt the rocket and mortar fire from Gaza, which have severely disrupted life in southern Israel. While smaller groups have fired most of the rockets, Israel holds Hamas responsible for the attacks.

Delwar also requested Saifur to speak with detained party chief Khaleda regarding the proposal as he would accept any decision taken by her.

Earlier, following the BNP standing committee meeting on October 29 held at Saifur Rahman's Gulshan residence, Delwar alleged that he had been threatened with death by a certain quarter if he did not attend the meeting. He also claimed that he was forcefully ousted from the post of secretary general of BNP.

The primary assessment around Tk 1,020 crore. Leaves have been stripped from trees and most of the larger trees have either been blown down or have lost many branches while some were just wiped away by the tidal surge. Most of the structures including offices and quarters of the forest officials also have been destroyed.

On Friday, Marc Patry, programme specialist for natural heritage at Unesco World Heritage Centre (WHC) in Paris, made a day-long inspection of a few badly hit spots by boat, to assess the impact of Sidr on the Sundarbans.

Patry also met Manoj Basnyat, country Director of UNDP Bangladesh, and Stefan Frowein, ambassador of the European Commission in Bangladesh yesterday, apprising them of the devastation and requesting their engagement in the rehabilitation process of the Sundarbans.

"Though alleviating human sufferings caused by the cyclone is naturally the top priority for international support, the salvation of the Sundarbans is also of great importance as several lakh people depend on the forest resources for their livelihood. This is the message I tried to get across during my meeting with the multilateral and bilateral donors," said Patry in a news release issued from Unesco Dhaka yesterday.

The WHC fund is meant for re-establishing the forest department's management capacity of the Sundarbans. The forest department which manages the Sundarbans world heritage site, through 97 stations and about 1,100 strong staff, has lost most of its infrastructure and communication equipment in the cyclone.

The Sundarbans are not just a natural heritage site worth conservation for the benefit of mankind, but thousands of people earn their livelihood through fishing in the waters inside the forest and by collecting honey. Patry pointed out, according to the news release.

latest in a series formed during the state of emergency.

Formation of the party was announced and its draft constitution released at a crowded press conference at a city hotel.

Meanwhile, the constitutions of BNP and Jatiya Party, formed by military rulers Ziaur Rahman and HM Ershad, are now being criticised severely due to absolute power of party chief to control party activities without regard for intra-party democratic practices.

Ibrahim said, "The full committee of this party will be announced within four to five weeks. We will make preparations to contest the next parliamentary election."

He went on, "We want politics of reconciliation, coordination and cooperation on such matters which have divided the people. We want politics of change. We have to move forward by introducing accountability and transparency in politics."

Bangladesh Welfare Party is based on five principles -- nationalism, democracy, social justice, economic development and humanism. Everybody -- except war criminals, people who had opposed the Liberation War, and corrupt ones -- are welcome to the party, said Ibrahim, a veteran freedom fighter.

Responding to a query, he said his party would never compromise with war criminals and corrupt people.

The retired general portrayed a gloomy picture of country's present political situation saying it is hampering desired development of the country.

"The months of October, November and December of 2006 were very crucial in our national life... The nation was passing through a very difficult situation because of confrontational politics of the major parties," he said.

"To save the nation, the people and the armed forces had to take a joint decision. And they implemented the decision on the 11th of the first month of 2007... That is why I feel that 'one-eleven' has given us an opportunity to re-start life," Ibrahim observed.

Ibrahim, who was retired following the chaotic situation in the army in 1996, said many former military and civil high officials and freedom fighters have contacted him to join the new party.

"No secret accords have been signed with leaders of any political parties over joining his party," he said replying to questions.

Ibrahim pointed out that the new party has no intention of being rivals of major parties like Awami League, BNP and Jatiya Party. "We want to be complementary to them. And we hope that the big parties would also consider us as complementary to them in building a prosperous Bangladesh," he asserted.

The agriculture ministry, Bangladesh Bank and NGOs will take a coordinated rehabilitation programme for equitable distribution of funds among the Sidr victims.

The sources said the ministry has already prepared a policy for distribution and management of assistance.

One of the draft rehabilitation programmes says the government will provide financial support to farmers for cultivation of 3.35 lakh hectares of land. "It will need Tk 371 crore," added a source.

To implement the second programme, Tk 266 crore will be needed to provide support for cultivation of 2.27 lakh hectares of land.

The third programme requires Tk 204 crore for supports to farmers for cultivation of 1.72 lakh hectares of land. As per the fourth programme, the government will provide support for cultivation on 1.3 lakh hectare of land at the cost of Tk 156 crore.

According to the government plan, each farmer of badly affected four districts -- Barguna, Patuakhali, Bagerhat and Pirojpur -- will get financial support for cultivation on a maximum of three bighas of land.

The rehabilitation programmes also say each farmer of 25 cyclone-hit districts will get support for cultivation of paddy and other crops on highest one bigha of land.

Besides, the farmers will get support for cultivation of vegetables on highest three decimals of land.

Farmers will also get Tk 1,389 against per bigha for cultivation of high yielding variety of Boro paddy, while Tk 1,916 will be provided for cultivation of hybrid type of Boro.

The ministry sources said the farmers will get Tk 1,331 and Tk 2,138 per bigha for cultivation of

educational institutions.

The latest UN assessments identified food, shelter and cash as the highest priority areas for immediate assistance, while sanitation, drinking water, electricity, livelihood assistance and early recovery are urgently needed.

The UN Central Emergency Response Fund has disbursed a total of \$14.7 million, as part of a broader \$143 million contributed by international donors towards relief and recovery activities.

NEW PARTIES A number of new political parties were floated since imposition of the state of emergency on January 11, suspending the ninth parliamentary election scheduled for January 22.

Ferdous Ahmad Quairishi floated Progressive Democratic Party (PDP) on July 21 despite the ban on all political activities. Munir Hossain floated an organisation titled 'Solidarity' in September. Tahmidul Islam and Abdus Sattar Bhuiyan floated Bangladesh Ganoshokti Party last month.

Jatiya Party leader Sheikh Shahid Hossain floated a new party, National Peoples Party in July. TM Saikhul Islam and Advocate Azharul Islam launched a party named 'Public Party' last month. Nirdaliya Jana Andolon, formed in 2004, started its operation afresh last month. Maj Gen (retd) ALM Fazlur Rahman is convener and chief adviser of this party.

The agriculture ministry in its estimation has found that six lakh tonnes of Aman paddy has been damaged in the recent cyclone. The total loss of Aman paddy in the current year is about 1.4 lakh tonnes due to floods and the cyclone.

The government officials said at least 31 lakh tonnes of rice will have to be imported to meet local demand, while the last year's import was 24 lakh tonnes.

Bog village and some other areas.

They put the blame of mismanagement on relief operators led by Union Parishad Chairman Anwar Hossain and member Fazlul Haque Tuku.

They say relatives of local leaders and their political loyalists are getting more relief materials than those who are relatively poor, and physically and socially weak.

At a gathering of deprived villagers the complaining ones suddenly became tight-lipped as the UP chairman turned up. But some elderly women dared raise their voice.

In response, the UP chairman asked them to "learn" how to receive relief materials. "We have to learn how to get relief," he said when the villagers were already returning home empty-handed.

On the allegations, Anwar termed those absolutely "false" and said they were distributing relief materials properly with the help of army and navy personnel.

The chairman however claimed they need more rice, baby milk, medicines, sanitation materials, tents and warm clothes for distribution.

He also said the affected people should be made to earn their bread instead of keeping them alive on relief.

Sharif told a joint news conference with Benazir late Monday following the talks at her Islamabad home that "in the present circumstances free, fair and transparent elections seem impossible."

He added that he would not be discouraged by the fact that election authorities had rejected his nomination papers earlier on Monday.

Benazir said the charter of demands was a "major confidence-building step" between the two opposition parties.

It was the first meeting between the former rivals, who each had two terms in power between 1988 and 1999, since they both returned home from years in exile to rejoin the political fray here.

However the announcement appears to be something of a compromise between Benazir, who earlier said her party would take part in the polls under protest, and Sharif, who pledged a boycott no matter what.

It will also leave them both space to wriggle out should they decide to forge a separate path, amid reports that both leaders could reach some sort of understanding with the embattled Musharraf.

Under massive international pressure following his declaration of emergency rule, Musharraf has delivered significant concessions to the opposition in recent weeks.

He quit as army chief last week and was sworn in for a second term as a civilian president, ending eight years of military rule after he seized power in a coup in 1999.

National Board of Revenue (NBR) every month on a regular basis.

Over a hundred bank accounts belonging to business organisations and individuals including two former premiers -- Khaleda Zia and Sheikh Hasina -- have been frozen by the NBR for their alleged links with corruption.

The NBR later relaxed restrictions on a few of the accounts upon receiving formal requests from account holders to allow withdrawal of money from the accounts for urgent situations.

unconditionally while two consortiums -- Powertek-Siemens and GE Energy-Summit were pre-qualified with conditions.

The two consortiums have been given 45 days to submit their revised financial statements in compliance with international accounting standards.

YTL Power International Berhad of Malaysia was disqualified for the project due to their non-compliance with pre-qualification criteria.

The Bibiyana power project was conceived only recently. International Finance Corporation (IFC), a member of the World Bank Group, is the main promoter and adviser of the project.

American oil giant Chevron discovered the Bibiyana gas field and started supplying gas from it earlier this year.

However, since Chevron cannot utilise its full gas production capacity from the gas field due to inadequacies in the gas pipeline, IFC started pushing the power project forward and persuaded the government to prioritise this new project over the older ones.

The Power Cell, which is handling the bidding process, had received qualification statements from six companies and consortiums. The bid is expected to take place in the first quarter of next year.

The 450-MW project will be implemented on a build-own-operate basis under a 22-year power purchase agreement.

Badal Saha, a grocer on Sadar Road in Kolapara, said, "After relief distribution began two of my employees -- who used to carry goods from my shop to trolleys -- have stopped turning up. Now I have to hire labourers which also charge me more for their services."

Locals allege that Nachnapara, Ibaria, Ferryghat, College Road and Badurtoli in Kolapara are the places where poor people crowd to seek relief items.

Since road communications have resumed to some extent, the distribution of relief goods such as dry food, food grains, pulses, edible oil, soap, candle, blanket, clothing and utensils have been continuing steadily.

Locals allege that irrespective of whether the cyclone has damaged their homesteads or not, many day-labourers and rickshawpullers from different upazilas of Patuakhali and Barguna are now crowding relief shelters for relief goods.

Labourers from Patuakhali Sadar upazila can be found crowding Char Matibhanga, Titkanda and Fultala.

There were around 500 rickshaws running in and around Kolapara upazila, the number has dropped to less than a 100 now. This has led to a hike in rickshaw fares, the fare from Kolapara bus stand to the UNO office having increased from Tk 8 to Tk 12-15.
