Despite a court order, Tejgaon police yesterday refused to register a sedition case against two top Jamaat-e-Islami leaders and a former Islami Bank chairman for their anti-liberation activities, saying they did not have necessary government sanction.

"Sanction of the government is required prior to register a sedition case. But it [Tejgaon Police Station] did not get the sanction yet," the officer-in-charge (OC) of the police station told a metropolitan magistrate's court.

The OC sent back the case to the Court of Chief Metropolitan Magistrate seeking directives about the next course of action in such a situation.

## MISSION INSTITUTIONAL CORRUPTION ACC targets grafts in service sector

Plans to recommend govt remedial measures

Public service oriented institutions in government and private sectors will be the prime target of the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) at the beginning of its new dimensional drive against institutional graft set to start this month.

The commission will not only investigate alleged corruption and irregularities of the organisations

but also recommend that the government take remedial measures to check institutional corruption.

ACC sources say they are working to prepare a list of organisations providing public service as well as having allegations of gross corruption and misdeeds against them.

The anti-graft watchdog is not going to reveal names of these organisations now, but will take legal actions based on its findings

through investigations.

Explaining the basis of the commission's selection of organisation for investigation, Col Hanif Iqbal, director general (administration), told The Daily Star, "Negative public perception would be considered to choose the institutions."

## ILLEGAL VOIP BUSINESS GP-supplied equipment seized from house of AccessTel owner

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) yesterday raided the head office of Grameenphone after it "found out Grameenphone's involvement" in providing illegal VoIP (voice over internet protocol) equipment to an Internet service provider (ISP).

Rab officials said Grameenphone supplied VoIP switches to AccessTel, which was running illegal VoIP business using the switches. Rab personnel claimed they seized VoIP equipment worth Tk 50 lakh from the house of AccessTel owner on Road-105 of Gulshan-2 in the city yesterday.

Grameenphone authorities last night said "some additional irregularities were found" regarding Grameenphone providing special services to illegal VoIP operators.

Lt Khandaker Al Moin of Rab's intelligence wing told The Daily Star last night, "Earlier, we raided the Grameenphone office and found that customers used Grameenphone's SIMs [subscriber identity module] to run VoIP businesses."

He said at that time Grameenphone denied they were involved in the act. "Now we have found evidence of Grameenphone's direct involvement," Moin said.

Major Shamsuzzoha, who was leading the drive, told reporters at the Grameenphone head office last night that they have seized technical data showing Grameenphone's involvement in the act.

He said earlier Grameenphone gave them some information but during the raid they became sure

## GP CEO admits 'additional irregularities'

Grameenphone CEO Anders Jensen in a statement last night said some additional irregularities have been found relating to Grameenphone providing special service to illegal VoIP operators.

"An investigation is ongoing and Grameenphone is fully cooperating with the law enforcement agencies in this regard," said the statement issued after seizure of VoIP equipment from the house of the owner of another company, AccessTel.

"I have been completely taken by surprise by this latest development as all of this happened before I started my tenure as CEO. Apparently not all information was given to me. I was assured by the relevant people in the company that all VoIP-related issues were already cleared," said Jensen.

"We are trying to get to the bottom of this whole affair and I can assure that stern measures will be taken against anyone involved within Grameenphone," he added.

## Govt halves rice import estimate Says 14, not 31, lakh tonnes rice to be purchased

Shifting from its earlier estimate, the government yesterday came up with a fresh calculation, saying import of 14.20 lakh tonnes of rice, and not 31 lakh tonnes, is needed to meet the domestic deficit due to crop damage in floods and cyclone.

On Saturday, the agriculture ministry at a press conference in presence of the adviser said 31 lakh tonnes of rice have to be imported from the international market in the current fiscal year.

But within five days, the agriculture and food advisers at a joint press briefing yesterday reduced the import requirement to 14.20 lakh tonnes.

Agriculture Adviser CS Karim and Food Adviser Tapan Chowdhury neither pointed out any specific reason for such a huge reduction, nor did they admit the previous estimate was wrong.

The agriculture and food ministries jointly organised the press briefing to update food grain production, import and distribution situation in the country this fiscal year.

"Import requirement changes every day and that is why we can say the latest figure is also correct," Karim said.
