




Did U Know?

Venus Williams of the United States started playing tennis at age 4, and was coached mostly by her father Richard Williams. She turned pro at 14.



 Reefat, Amin win in 7th round

Grand Master Reefat Bin Sattar shared the third position with 15 other players after end of the 7th round of the Commonwealth Chess Championships in Delhi on Friday.

Fellow Bangladeshi GMs Abdullah Al Rakib and Niaz Mursheed followed on five points while FIDE Master Khondokar Aminul Islam IWM Rani Hamid had 4.5 and three points respectively.

In the 7th round Reefat beat Dilip Das of India to raise his collection to 5.5 points.

The Bangladeshi men were all playing against local opponents with Rakib losing to IM Himanshu Sharma, who maintained solo lead with 6.5 points.

Niaz drew with GM Abhijit Kunte, Amin beat Pritam Singh while Rani Hamid defeated Australia's Rebecca Harris.
