Smith out of first T20 tie

Graeme Smith, the South Africa captain, has backed out of the first Twenty20 against West Indies, as well as Makhaya Ntini's benefit match, on medical advice. In Smith's absence, Shaun Pollock has been named captain for the Twenty20 on December 16 in Port Elizabeth.

"The decision has been taken purely on medical grounds," said Mickey Arthur, South Africa's coach. "His doctors feel that rest and recuperation is the way for him to go and they have recommended that he takes three weeks off. They are confident that he will be ready for the first Test against West Indies starting on December 26."

Morne van Wyk will fill Smith's absence at the top of the order.

The benefit match, also against West Indies, takes place at East London's Buffalo Park ground on December 14. The second Twenty20 will be played on January 18, after the three-Test series.

Symonds would love to skipper

Michael Clarke may be the natural heir to Australian captain Ricky Ponting but belligerent all-rounder Andrew Symonds revealed he too cherishes the ambition of leading the side, even if it's just in the one-dayers.

Symonds reckons Clarke stood the best chance to succeed Ponting when it comes to Test captaincy but feels he has matured a lot over the years and can lead the side in one-dayers.

"It's great to see Michael Clarke's rise in Australian cricket. But when I do sit down and think about it I would also love the chance to captain my country," Symonds wrote in 'Sunday Herald Sun'.

"I think he'll (Clarke) be the ideal successor to Ricky Ponting as captain of the Test side - although I joked with him recently that if I were skipper, there'd be no diamond earrings in my team."

"Behind the banter, I thought about my personal development, my status within the Australian side and the longer-term goals I'd like to achieve," Symonds said.

Rafa focused

Chelsea missing Drogba

Avram Grant reckons Chelsea are braced for a testing spell without leading scorer Didier Drogba after his side laboured to a 2-0 win over Sunderland.

The Ivory Coast international has undergone surgery on a long-standing knee injury and, while the extent of his lay-off remains uncertain, he is expected to be out until January at the earliest.

Saturday's result at Stamford Bridge may have suggested Chelsea have little to fear in Drogba's absence but the reality is rather different.

Victory against a wretchedly unambitious Sunderland was virtually assured as soon as Andriy Shevchenko headed in Salomon Kalou's precise cross in the 25th minute but, for long periods, Chelsea looked decidedly uninspired.

Without Drogba as their focal point, there was a lack of focus to many of their attacks and, despite his goal, Shevchenko possesses neither the mobility nor the muscle to terrorise the Premier League's elitesides.

With meetings against two of the division's in-form teams - Arsenal and Blackburn - and a League Cup quarter-final encounter

with Liverpool looming large, Grant has every right to be anxious.

"It will not be easy but I did not come to this club for an easy life," he said after a win which left Chelsea three points behind leaders Arsenal.

"We didn't want Didier to be injured but, if you can say this about an operation, it looks quite good at the moment."

"We need to wait and see how long-term it is. We want him to feel well and for his knee to be okay. If he can play in (next month's) African Nations Cup then he will play but his health is the most important thing."

"I never want one of my players to have an operation but sometimes there is nothing you can do. He had a problem and we decided to wait a few days, but he locked his knee again on Friday so we had to get him to have an operation."

"It will not be easy but we have good strikers at this club - not just Shevchenko, who scored a good goal, but also Claudio Pizarro. Then we also have Kalou who is doing well."

Grant has to look on the bright side, but his pitch-side demeanour told a different story.

"Chelsea's lethargic second-half performance prompted the Israeli to repeatedly bellow reprimands to his players and against more polished opponents than Sunderland his team might have suffered for

such an approach.

Instead, the Wearsiders - for all their effort - hardly threatened and Chelsea were able to enjoy a stress-free final 15 minutes when Lampard converted the penalty awarded for Danny Higginbotham's tug on Alex's jersey.

Sunderland's misery was made complete in the dying moments when Liam Miller was sent-off after a clash with Pizarro, although visiting manager Roy Keane said Chelsea's players had helped spark the confrontation by over-reacting to Miller's initial foul on John Terry.

"Liam should not have raised his hands but the initial foul was not bad."

"Judging by the reactions of Terry and Pizarro, you clearly cannot tackle the England captain."

"They made a big issue out of it and had a go at Liam but there was nothing malicious about it. Now Liam will miss three games which will hurt us."

Sunderland remain mired in relegation trouble and Keane admits he will have to wield the chequebook when the transfer window reopens in January.

"We certainly have to try and strengthen the squad," said the former Manchester United captain.

"We're hopeful but identifying and signing the right players is easier said than done."

Marseille warm-up for Reds

Marseille warmed up for Tuesday's do-or-die Champions League clash against Liverpool with a 2-0 win over Monaco in the French championship on Saturday.

The win, their fifth of the season, also eased Marseille's relegation fears.

Central defender Julien Rodriguez, in the 53rd minute, and skipper Lorik Cana (70), both scored headed goals as Marseille moved up to 11th in the table ahead of Saturday's later matches.

A win on Tuesday will put Marseille into the knockout rounds of the Champions League.

Coach Eric Gerets praised the support his team received on Saturday and said their backing will prove crucial at the Stade Velodrome against Liverpool.

"There's been a change in the

behaviour of our fans," said Gerets.

"I'm pleasantly surprised by the support we had throughout the 90 minutes. On Tuesday, against Liverpool, we will need even a little more."

Meanwhile, six-time champions Lyon, who travel to Rangers on Wednesday in another must-win Champions League clash, slumped to a 1-0 defeat at Caen.

The loss cut their lead to four points with second-place Nancy unable to take full advantage by playing to a dull 0-0 draw at Valenciennes.

With one eye on the tricky trip to Glasgow, Lyon coach Alain Perrin put vital players Juninho, Sydney Govou and Karim Benzema on the bench and handed Nadir Belhadj, Abdul Kader Keita and Milan Baros starting places.

Caen took full advantage of the champions' uncertainty with Yoan Gouffran scoring the only goal of the game after 17 minutes after a misunderstanding between Sebastien Squillaci and Cleber Anderson.

Juninho, Govou and Benzema were all introduced into the action late in the game but were unable to prevent Lyon from slipping to their fourth defeat of the season.

"We wanted a different result to boost our confidence ahead of the game in Glasgow. It will be even more difficult context there," said Perrin.

Juninho said that Lyon had great respect for Rangers who won the first meeting between the two sides 3-0 at Stade Gerland.

"There's no feeling of revenge," said the Brazilian.

"Nothing's changed. Rangers are the favourites."

Meanwhile, Le Mans leapt into third place with a 3-1 win at Lens and are now four points behind Nancy.

Bottom club Metz, with just one win all season, were 2-0 losers at sixth-placed Saint-Etienne and are 11 points from safety.

On Sunday, third-placed Bordeaux travel to Nice, while floundering PSG desperately need a result at relegation rivals Auxerre.

Ronaldo doubtful

An injury-plagued Ronaldo is looking increasingly doubtful for AC Milan's Club World Cup campaign in Japan, but his teammates are trying to keep his spirits up, fellow Brazilian ace Kaka says.

The 31-year-old has missed every training session with the squad since the European Champions League winners arrived Thursday, a week before their first match in the annual tournament of continental champions.

"What annoys him is that since he does not play he feels he's a bit out of the squad," Kaka said on Milan's website.

"It's for this reason that in this training camp in Japan we talk to him a lot, because we want him to feel inside the team."

Ronaldo has featured in just one match this season, when he started against Cagliari two weeks ago on his return from a thigh injury -- only to pick up a knock to his left calf.

"Now we don't know how long he will be out for, even though we did not lose our hopes in seeing him on the pitch in this World Cup, but when we talk to him, and we often do, we never talk about injuries," said 25-year-old playmaker Kaka.

"The calf is still hurting him, but the doctors will think about this as he is making a lot of treatments and applications with them during this training camp," he added.

Kaka pointed out that Ronaldo has "gone through more difficult moments than this one," pointing to his two-year layoff with a knee injury until he came back to help Brazil win the 2002 World Cup in Japan.

Ronaldo scored twice in Brazil's 2-0 win over Germany in the 2002 final at the Yokohama International Stadium, which is also the venue of this year's Club World Cup final.

"I hope that he returns as soon as possible and plays those game sequences in which he hopes," added Kaka, who won France's prestigious Ballon d'Or award for best player of the year just a week ago.

Milan will face either Asian champions Urawa Reds of Japan or runners-up Sepahan of Iran in the semi-finals on Thursday at the Yokohama stadium. Urawa and Sepahan clash at Toyota on Monday.

Milan and Boca Juniors of Argentina, who beat the Italian side in the 2003 Intercontinental Cup final, are taking a bye into the semi-finals.

Milan's possible showdown with Boca is being widely labelled as a chance to take revenge, but it's not a sentiment Kaka shares.

Cacau out until 2008

Defending Bundesliga champion's VfB Stuttgart will be without their striker Cacau until next year after the Brazilian injured his shoulder in Saturday's 3-1 win over VfL Wolfsburg.

Cacau scored his third goal of the season for Stuttgart in the 48th minute, but had to be substituted ten minutes later and will have an operation next week to repair shoulder ligaments.

It is unclear at this stage whether the striker will be back in action when the Bundesliga resumes on February 1. Stuttgart's win over Wolfsburg leaves them eighth in the league.

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promotion to the Premier League, added: "It's not fair to say we won a game but it was on a dodgy penalty."

Sulley Muntari's spectacular double sealed Portsmouth's first win at Villa Park for 37 years after Craig Gardner's own goal.

Gareth Barry's penalty for Villa couldn't prevent Pompey going 11 games unbeaten in the league.

"He's got a great left-foot and they were two fantastic finishes," Portsmouth manager Harry Redknapp said of Muntari's goals.

At Goodison Park, Nigeria's Yakubu opened the scoring in the 51st minute after Australia midfielder Tim Cahill's volley was blocked by Fulham keeper Antti Niemi.

He then headed in from a flick-on by Phil Jagielka and completed his treble in the 79th minute.

"What we have wanted from him is what he has given his other clubs, Portsmouth and Middlesbrough. He has scored goals - and he has an excellent record at that," Everton manager David Moyes said of Yakubu.

At St James's, Birmingham went ahead when Cameron Jerome exploited defensive weakness before Obafemi Martins, fouled by Mathew Sadler in the box, equalised with a 37th minute penalty.

Senegal defender Beye completed the comeback in the 90th minute when he headed in an Emre free-kick.

Duisburg hold Bayern

Bayern Munich boss Ottmar Hitzfeld regretted his side's desire to "play pretty" rather than picking up the three points which would

have guaranteed them top spot in the Bundesliga at Christmas.

Despite dominating both possession and territory, Bayern were held to a surprise 0-0 home draw by ten-man Duisburg on Saturday, but stayed top of the league after second-placed Werder Bremen stumbled 4-3 at Hanover.

Bayern's star-studded attack including midfielder Franck Ribery plus strikers Miroslav Klose and Luca Toni - summer signings worth 49 million euros (71.8 million US dollars) - could not break down the guests' defence which has leaked 25 goals already this season.

Even though they had striker Mohammadou Idrissou sent off nine minutes from time, the draw

moved Duisburg up to 16th in the league - third from bottom - and means Bayern now have a two-point lead at the top.

Despite captain Oliver Kahn's pre-match insistence Bayern had to dominate Duisburg to prove their mettle as Bundesliga winners, the home side was stuttering after winning just two games in the last seven.

"We showed no passion, we wanted to win the game by playing pretty stuff," said Hitzfeld.

"Naturally, I'm disappointed with the result, we wanted to win and make sure of first place over Christmas."

"But it's our own fault. We found it very difficult, especially after we again failed to take our early chances."

"Duisburg grew in confidence and solidity at the back."

"They defended well with ten men, we couldn't find any gaps, and we never found the spark to prise them open."

"At the end of the day we lacked precision, there were too many misplaced passes."

"I wasn't happy with the first half."

"We showed no passion, we wanted to win the game by playing pretty stuff."

"We were too static, there wasn't enough movement, and our body language gave off all the wrong signals."

"The second half was OK. We got up and at them in the second half, there was a lot more passion about us."

"We tried everything, we put them under a lot more pressure, there was much more action in the box, but we failed to take our chances."

"Duisburg deserved their point, we have to grit our teeth and wave goodbye to two points."

Bayern have just two games left before the Bundesliga begins its winter break.

Their final league game of 2007 sees them take on Hertha Berlin in the German capital on Saturday at the Olympic Stadium and then play Greek side Aris Salonika in the UEFA Cup on December 19 at the Allianz Arena in a group game.

Etoile stun Pachuca

Etoile Sahel coach Bertrand Marchand said good organisation was key to his young Tunisian side beating Mexico's Pachuca 1-0 Sunday in Japan.

He admitted that was an upset at the Club World Cup in Japan.

"We have a lot of young players under 25. That is what we are different from Pachuca," the Frenchman said after Etoile's opening match in the tournament of continental champions.

"Pachuca were the stronger side but we firmly blocked them. I had

wished that we would go on with our collective, organised play -- and we did so."

African champions Etoile fielded eight players under the age of 25, compared to Pachuca's four.

And at times the Mexican side's experience showed, with statistics showing they had 64 percent of possession and more goalscoring opportunities.

"Our ball possession was low and we were outshone technically. But we played compact and steady football," Marchand said. "A stronger side does not always win in football."

Midfielder Moussa Narry's 85th-minute goal gave Etoile the narrowest of wins and a semi-final clash on Wednesday against Boca

Juniors of Argentina.

Italy's AC Milan are seeded on the other half of the tournament draw and will play the winners of Monday's match between Asian champions Urawa Reds of Japan and Sepahan of Iran.

"I'm really happy that we can stay in Japan for one more week," Marchand said.

"I'm glad that we can play against a big club like Boca Juniors. It's a dream if we can win and face AC Milan after that," he added with a smile.

Etoile striker Amine Chermiti said: "Only God knows whether we can ultimately beat AC Milan or not in the final."

Calf to keep Hargreaves out of Roma tie

England midfielder Owen Hargreaves is set to miss Manchester United's Champions

League date at Roma on Wednesday due to a calf problem.

Hargreaves sustained the injury while warming up ahead of United's 4-1 Premier League win over bottom-of-the-table Derby County here at Old Trafford.

United are already through to the last 32 of European football's premier club competition and their position as group winners is secure regardless of the result in the Italian capital.

United manager Sir Alex Ferguson has already made it clear that a number of squad players will feature against Roma with Michael Carrick, who replaced Hargreaves on Saturday, set to start again while the former Bayern Munich midfielder receives treatment in Manchester.

"Owen strained his calf and we can't take chances at this time of

the year. We had a look at it and we decided to bring Michael in for the Derby game," Ferguson said.

With Roma also through to the knockout phase, Ferguson has confirmed that reserve keeper Tomasz Kuszczak will start in Italy. There will also be rare opportunities for Jonny Evans, Gerard Pique, Chris Eagles and Dong Fangzhuo ahead of United's key league game against arch-rivals Liverpool next weekend.

Ferguson is generally pleased with his side's progress this season and added: "In some games we've played excellently and missed a lot of chances."

"Afterwards you're saying to yourself, 'I hope we don't regret missing these chances' but you have to be satisfied with your level of performance because that's what's important."

"I'll play a completely different team (against Roma). They were difficult conditions against Derby and it was a lot of exertion for the players involved."

"I'll take a lot of the first team squad with me because I need 18 players and some of the young players aren't registered."

The Scot added: "I'll go with a

completely different team and Kuszczak will be in goal. We'll have Evans, Pique, Eagles, Carrick, (Darren) Fletcher, Anderson, (Louis) Saha, Dong and Nani. All of these players will play."

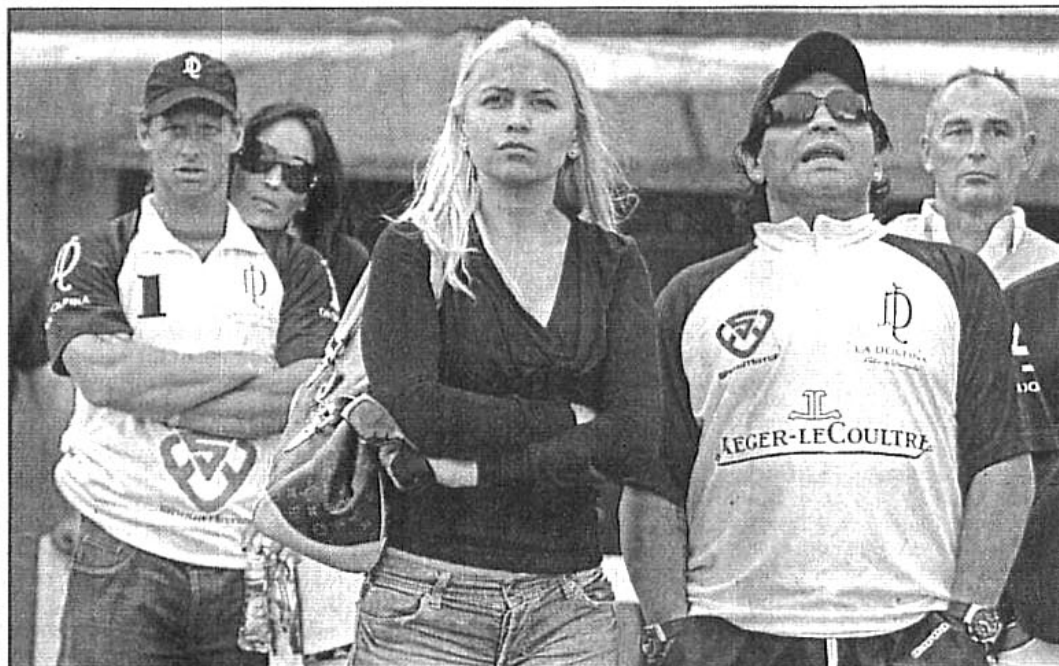
"It's a great opportunity for them. Roma have qualified and it's good for both teams and they will probably play one or two younger players themselves. I'm looking forward to it."

Derby manager Paul Jewell believes a major defensive improvement will be the key to his side kick-starting their season against Middlesbrough next week.

"The goals we're giving away are so elementary and they are basic errors so that's why we are where we are."

"We can't get different players until we get to January and we don't seem to be able to make the right decisions at the right time. Once we go a goal down, the belief just drains out of them."

"We've got to be positive against Middlesbrough next week. I'm still learning about the players and some of them haven't had a look-in yet. I'm still searching for my best team."
