## Real ride on Ruud

Ruud van Nistelrooy showed he is much more than just a penalty box predator scoring a brilliant winner to help Real Madrid move seven points clear at the top of the Spanish championship with a 1-0 win at Athletic Bilbao on Saturday.

Dutch international van Nistelrooy curled a fantastic 55th minute winner as champions Real opened up a seven-point gap on Barcelona who are under pressure to beat Deportivo La Coruna on Sunday.

Villarreal are also seven points behind the leaders ahead of their home game against Real Betis on Sunday.

Eleven wins from 15 games makes impressive reading for Real who were again indebted to their goal machine van Nistelrooy.

The Dutch forward was the club's top-scorer last season with 25 goals and he weighed in with his seventh league goal in 12 outings.

In Saturday's early match Valencia stumbled to a 0-0 draw at Osasuna as new coach Ronald Koeman struggles to lift the current gloom around the club.

Out of the Champions League and falling down the league Koeman could be forgiven for regretting his decision to leave PSV Eindhoven in November.

While Barcelona look a soft touch away from home Real look resilient and manager Bernd Schuster is not afraid to make decisions as he showed by keeping Brazilian international Julio Baptista, trying to revive his career at Madrid, was in the starting line-up at the expense of Guti.

Real had won the last four meetings between the two sides but Bilbao was not intimidated and started promisingly.

On the quarter hour mark Raul came close to scoring his ninth goal

of the season but was charged down at the last minute and seconds later Robinho saw a toe-poked effort parried off the line.

Iker Casillas had been a virtual spectator but was called into action after half an hour producing a fine save to deny a goal bound header from Fernando Llorente.

Defender Pepe, a 30 million euro signing from FC Porto in the summer, then appeared to have headed Real in front but the linesman lifted his flag to rule the effort out for offside and prompt jeers from the relieved home fans.

On 55 minutes van Nistelrooy had the ball in the net and there was no chance of offside as brilliantly bent a right-footed shot into the top corner.

Robinho then hit the post for Real who continued to push forward in numbers.

Bilbao fans were frustrated by some refereeing decisions and threw several objects, including a pocket knife, onto the pitch.

Real must now concentrate on

Tuesday's Champions League match with Lazio where they need a draw to progress to the knockout phase.

Valencia are already out of Europe's flagship club competition and are fighting for a UEFA Cup spot when they travel to Chelsea on Tuesday.

One point from nine leaves them down in sixth although Koeman tried to put a brave face on the scoreless draw with Osasuna.

"Neither team created many chances but one positive is that we were much more solid at the back," said Koeman.

"We have to improve going forward but I saw a well-organised team that fought very hard. This is the path we have to follow."

Like his predecessor Quique Sanchez Flores, Koeman is struggling to get the best out of the current crop of players and has reportedly urged the Valencia board to change their rigid wage structure to bring in top quality stars.

## Kaka dismisses Real link

Brazilian playmaker Kaka has brushed aside reports that Real Madrid president Ramon Calderon is making a fresh attempt to prise him away from AC Milan.

"Let's forget it, it's something that does not concern me," the 25-year-old Kaka said on Milan's website about Calderon's plan to travel to Japan and meet Milan president Silvio Berlusconi and vice-president Adriano Galliani.

Milan, the European Champions League winners, and Argentina's Boca Juniors are in Japan to play in the Club World Cup, contested by continental champions.

Calderon was seen likely to convey Real's refusal to consider selling Sergio Ramos to Milan and try again to convince Galliani to name their price for Kaka, who last week won the prestigious French Ballon d'Or award for the player of the year.

Meanwhile, the Japanese sports daily Sankei Sports reported that Kaka has agreed to continue playing for AC Milan until 2012 with a record-matching annual salary of nine million euros (13 million dollars).

The sum equals the basic annual salary paid to fellow Brazilian striker Ronaldinho by Spain's Barcelona, the daily said quoting Milan officials.

The 25-year-old Kaka's annual salary at present is six million euros, the highest in Italian football, the daily said.

## Lazio clinch vital win

Lazio eased their relegation fears and boosted their Champions League morale with a 2-0 win over Catania on Saturday.

Tommaso Rocchi and Goran Pandev were on target in a timely tune-up ahead of their Champions League trip to Real Madrid on Tuesday where they have to win to have any hope of making the knockout round.

"We have nothing left to lose at Real," said Lazio coach Delio Rossi.

"There are teams far stronger than Lazio in the Champions League, but I know full well my lads will not let their heads drop."

Fabrizio Miccoli and Fabio Simeone's stunning goals gave Lazio a 2-0 win over Fiorentina who had to play the final 22 minutes with 10 men after Alessandro Gamberini went off injured and all three substitutions had already

been used.

Fiorentina stay in fifth place in the table, 10 points behind leaders Inter Milan.

Inter's star forward Zlatan Ibrahimovic has tried to calm expectation despite his club's flying start to the season.

Inter entertain Torino on Sunday after a stunning opening to the season that has seen them win 10 and draw four of their 14 league matches.

They have also qualified from their Champions League group with a game to spare and all that despite a midfield injury crisis.

With players such as Patrick Vieira, Luis Figo and Dejan Stankovic already missing, Olivier Dacourt was this week ruled out for the rest of the season.

But such is the strength of Inter's squad that whoever comes in still proves too strong for their opponents, as Lazio found out on Wednesday as they were chopped down 3-0 by a team that included Portugal under-21 international Pele making his first start of the

season.

Only Roma have managed to hang onto Inter's coat tails so far with the likes of Juventus and AC Milan already eight and 16 points adrift of the champions.

But Sweden forward Ibrahimovic is keen to play down expectation and he denied the title race is already boiling down to a shoot-out between Inter and second-placed Roma.

"The title is not yet decided, there are many games left," he said.

"We have to keep winning as we have done up until now. But we have to keep our concentration and play with confidence and that way we'll keep pushing forwards."

The same cannot be said of Roma's trip to lowly but resurgent Livorno, who had a dreadful start to the season but are unbeaten in their last five matches, having won three of them.

Juventus and Udinese will be looking to return to winning ways and boost their own title chances as they entertain Atalanta and Sampdoria respectively.

## MU demolish Derby

Ryan Giggs's 100th league goal saw Manchester United on the way to a 4-1 win against bottom-of-the-table Derby County to keep up the pressure on Premier League leaders Arsenal on Saturday.

Victory at Old Trafford, where Carlos Tevez scored either side of half-time, left second-placed United a point behind the Gunners, who travel to struggling Middlesbrough on Sunday.

Chelsea remained third, two points adrift of United, after a 2-0 win against Sunderland, despite being without star striker Didier Drogba.

Liverpool lost in the league for the first time this season, 3-1 away to Reading but they remain in fourth place.

Portsmouth maintained their impressive form with a sixth successive away win as they beat Aston Villa 3-1, a victory that saw them move up to fifth spot.

Ayegbeni Yakubu's hat-trick helped Everton move level on points with Villa after a 3-0 win at home to Fulham, who haven't won away in 25 league matches.

Meanwhile, Newcastle came from behind to beat Birmingham 2-1 with Habib Baye scoring a last-minute winner.

beyond doubt with a 75th minute penalty after Danny Higginbotham's foul on Alex. Sunderland then saw Liam Miller sent off late on for retaliation.

Reading took the lead against Liverpool in the 17th minute when Jamie Carragher fouled Brynjar Gunnarsson on the edge of the box.

Referee Andre Marriner awarded a penalty, to Liverpool's anger, with Stephen Hunt scoring from the spot.

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## FA denies Jose approach

The FA reacted to the latest slew of newspaper speculation on the identity of the next England manager on Sunday by insisting that no approach had yet been made to any potential candidate.

Some British Sunday papers carried stories saying the FA had spoken to former Chelsea boss Jose Mourinho and that he was in line to replace Steve McClaren, who was sacked last month after England's failure to qualify for Euro 2008.

Others claimed the Portuguese coach, out of work since leaving Chelsea in September, had ruled himself out after receiving a tempting club offer.

FA chief executive Brian Barwick and head of soccer development Trevor Brooking have been charged with making the appointment and FA spokesman Adrian Bevington said they were making progress.

"They've spoken to various leading figures in the game to canvass some opinions. My understanding is that they've concluded that process now and it's a case now of having conversations with individuals," he told BBC radio 5-Live.

"We've been very transparent following the departure of Steve McClaren but there does come a time when we say 'please let us get on with our work privately now'."

"If you picked up the papers last week it was a variety of managers, it was a different story today. I don't want to dissect every story but we are fully on track here. We are making progress; we want to get the manager of the right calibre."

"There is a lot of work going on behind the scenes and if we have spoken to the representatives of one individual it does not mean we are not speaking to others but neither Trevor nor Brian have met with any of the potential candidates yet."

England's next match is a Wembley friendly against Switzerland in February and their next competitive fixture will be in September at the start of the 2010 World Cup qualifying campaign.

"I've seen various managers ruled out on TV and in newspapers but I can assure you we have not ruled anybody out, we have an open mind," he said.

"We haven't got a deadline but when we identify the man there is no reason to not go and get him."

## Rafa focused on Marseille

Rafael Benitez refused to apologize for thinking of Liverpool's make-or-break Champions League clash with Marseille as the Reds slipped to a 3-1 defeat against Reading - their first loss in the Premier League this season.

Benitez took off club captain Steven Gerrard, defender Jamie Carragher and top scorer Fernando Torres because he could not see a way back into the match for his side.

"I wanted to rest my key players because I did not feel we were going to get back in the game at 3-1," Benitez said.

"We had three or four good chances but could not take them so I decided to take off my key players

to give them a rest.

"We tried to change it with different players with pace and fresh legs. The Champions League is important. Marseille is the target now," the Spaniard added.

"Torres had a kick on his ankle so was at risk. He will be okay."

"There are some big games coming up in the next few weeks and I want the players fresh."

An annoyed Benitez said the penalty awarded by referee Andre Marriner for a foul by Carragher which led to Stephen Hunt's spot-kick opening goal for Reading was harsh.

And he added Torres should be equally deserving of a penalty when he tangled with Ibrahima Sonko.

"The penalty given against Jamie was outside the box and you have to ask why the referee did not book him for the penalty. Maybe

because it wasn't a penalty," said Benitez.

"Torres was clearly tripped in the box and it is disappointing when decisions go against you."

Reading were given a controversial penalty in the 16th minute when Carragher was adjudged to have brought down Brynjar Gunnarsson on the edge of the box.

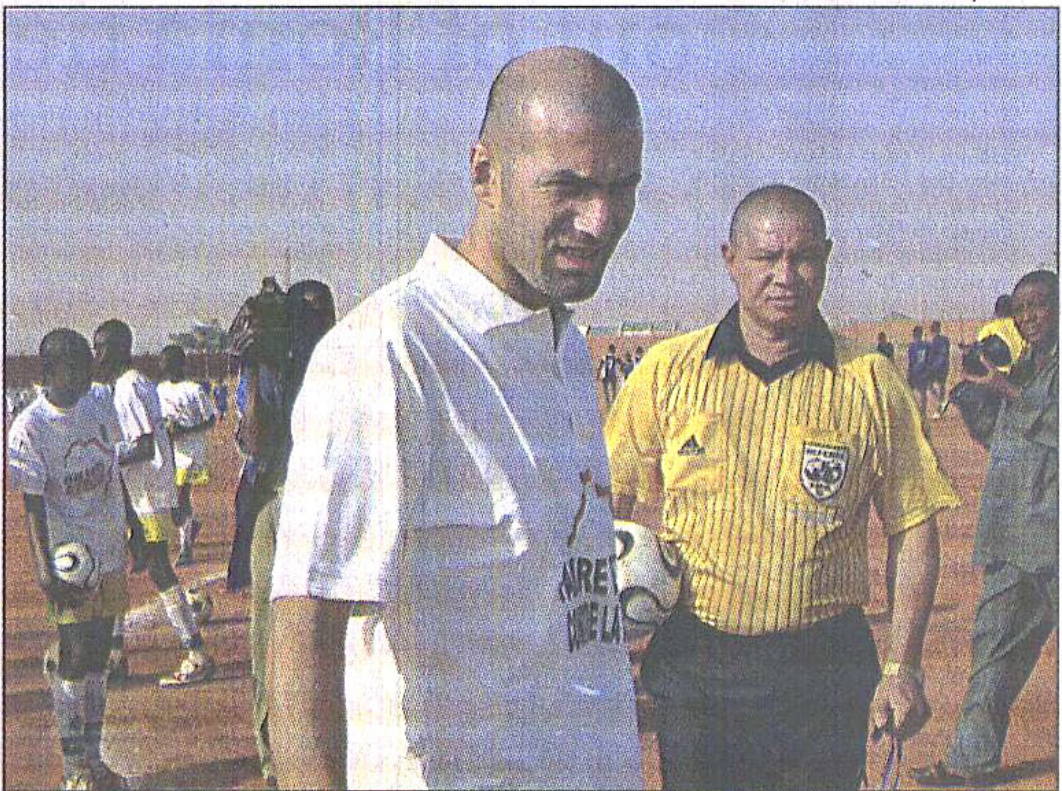
Liverpool got an equaliser just before the half hour mark through talisman Gerrard.

Jose Reina's clearance was knocked on by Torres and Gerrard raced through to plant the ball past Marcus Hahnemann.

Reading regained the lead when Kevin Doyle just got his head to a free-kick from Nicky Shorey.

Then, after Gerrard saw a long-range shot come back off the crossbar, Reading sealed victory in the

## Red card from the bench

There was a strange dismissal in Frankfurt on Saturday when Schalke 04 substitute Carlos Grossmueller earned himself a red card from the bench while still in his tracksuit.

The Uruguay international midfielder charged off the bench and onto the pitch in the 86th minute of his side's 2-2 Bundesliga draw here on Saturday and argued - still wearing his warm-up suit and bib - with Eintracht Frankfurt's Michael Thurk.

After a heated argument, Grossmueller pushed Thurk to the floor and was shown an immediate red card by the referee with the Schalke player not having officially been part of the game.

The 24-year-old, who has won four caps for his country, is likely to pick up a heavy fine from the German Football Association (DFB).

## Verbeek wants Viduka

New Australian coach Pim Verbeek sees convincing Newcastle's Mark Viduka to prolong his international career as a top priority ahead of next February's 2010 World Cup qualifiers.

The Dutchman has taken over the Socceroos and says European-based players are vital to helping Australia overcome Qatar, China and Iraq in their tough World Cup qualifying group.

Verbeek will have to balance the needs of his team against the demands of the European clubs where the majority of Australia's stars play their football.

"When I travel to Sydney on Thursday I will watch as much A-League football as I can because it's these players who will be so impor-

tant to us, especially in the first two games," Verbeek told Sydney's Sun-Herald newspaper.

"But the European players are also absolutely crucial for us and I want to contact Mark Viduka, for one, because I need to know what his thoughts are."

"It's not about the age of players, it's about their quality. He has so much of that and I hope he will stay involved."

Viduka, who led Australia at last year's World Cup and this year's Asian Cup, has been toying with retirement from the international game after 14 years to concentrate on his club career with Newcastle United in England's Premier League.

Viduka, 32, has only scored six goals in 32 internationals, but he has been prolific in club football with 158 goals in 302 league appearances, going back to 1995.

Verbeek, who coached South

Korea to the semi-finals of last July's Asian Cup, has been appointed largely on his record in Asian football.

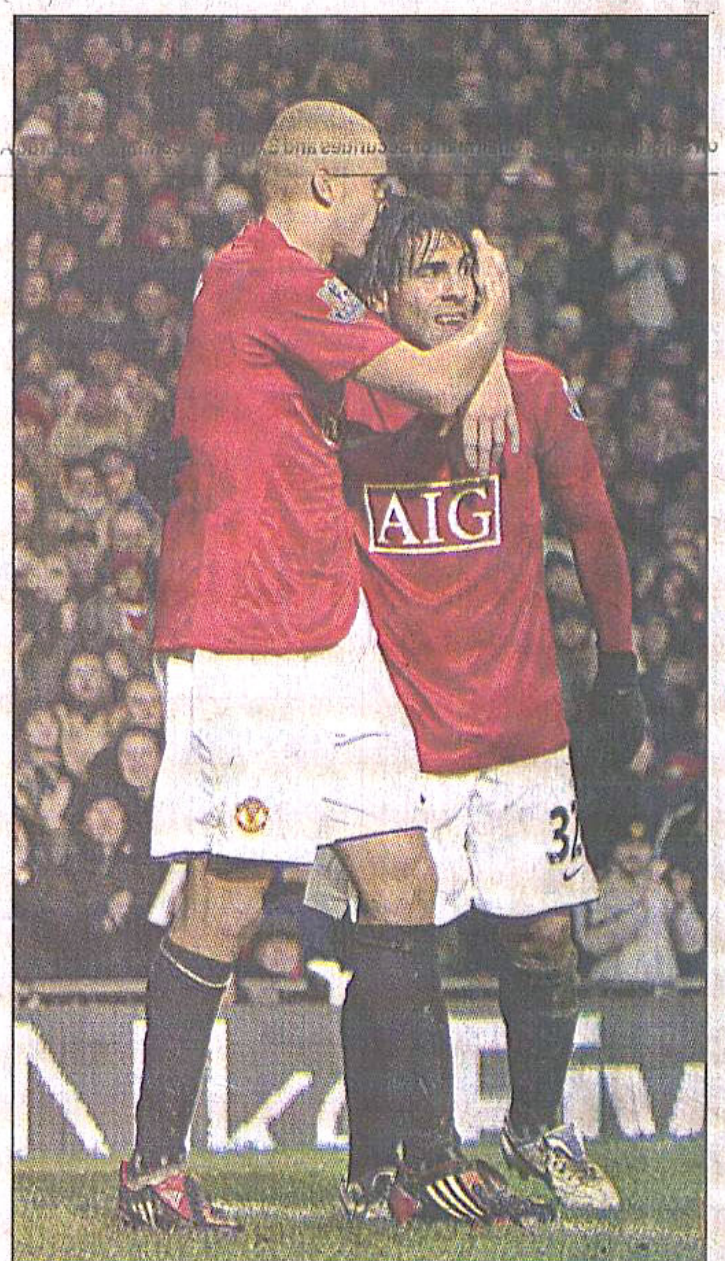
"We are in the hardest World Cup group of all but we must not be afraid. We are good enough to win every game," Verbeek said.

"At the very least we have to win all our home games. That is absolutely vital."

"Fortunately, I know a lot about the countries we are about to face. During my time with South Korea we played against Qatar at the Asian Games and the Olympics."

"Iraq beat us in the semi-finals of the Asian Cup and, of course, also beat Australia, and we also faced them in the Asian Games and a friendly."

"So I am aware of the strengths and weaknesses of both Qatar and Iraq. I have also studied China closely for many years."
