

## Inzaghi warns Ronaldo

Goal-machine Filippo Inzaghi has told fellow AC Milan striker Ronaldo not to make a premature comeback from injury as the Rossoneri gear up to win their first ClubWorld Cup.

"I know what he is going through. I hope he can recover soon. Having one like him, for us, is an extra weapon," Inzaghi said of the 31-year-old Brazilian, whose career has been plagued by injury.

"However, he must only return if he is 100 per cent, and it's fair that he thinks it so," the 34-year-old Italian said on Milan's website.

Ronaldo has missed every training session with the squad since the European Champions League and Super Cup winners arrived Thursday, a week before their first match in the annual tournament of continental champions.

He has played in just one match this season, when he started against Cagliari two weeks ago on his return from a thigh injury. But he picked up a knock to his left calf in training.

"I'm happy to do well as I've been training for a long time without any pain. For my type of game, being physically fit is fundamental," said Inzaghi, who scored a record 63rd goal in European competition when Milan beat Celtic 1-0 in the Champions League last week.

"My objectives are the same as Milan. I hope to win this cup because for this group it would really be the best thing," Inzaghi said of the ClubWorld Cup.

Milan and Argentina's Boca Juniors, who beat the Italian side in the 2003 Intercontinental Cup final, are semifinalists in the tournament with the final here on Sunday.

Both sides won the South American-European Intercontinental Cup three times but never the three-year-old ClubWorld Cup.

## Jose to say no to England

Jose Mourinho would reportedly turn down the chance to be England manager if he was offered the position by the Football Association.

The former Chelsea boss was installed as the bookmakers' favourite to succeed Steve McClaren after he refused to rule himself out of the running for the vacant role last week.

Reports also suggested his agent had held preliminary talks with the FA about taking charge of England.

However, according to Sky Sports News, Mourinho's interest in the position has cooled in the last few days after receiving an offer from a mystery club.

It's believed the 44-year-old has set his sights on a return to club management and even if the FA made him an offer to replace McClaren he would reject it to take up the proposal from the unnamed club.

Italy's World Cup winning coach Marcello Lippi and Fabio Capello are both believed to be in the frame for the England job with the duo expressing an interest in the role.

According to the Daily Mirror and the Daily Telegraph, Lippi has issued a 'come and get me' plea' and FA chief executive Brian Barwick is hoping to talk to him later this week.

A source close to the 59-year-old said: "He is only interested in them going to him direct. He does not have an agent so the only contact would be direct to him."

He believes England has the players and potential to get to the World Cup and do well when they get there."

Meanwhile former Real Madrid, AC Milan and Juventus boss Capello, who has previously expressed his desire to get the job, is also expected to have talks with the FA this week.

## Nasri fit for crunch tie

Defender Ronald Zubar is also back in the squad after recovering from injury and could start at right-back, but forward Salim Arache is missing.



## All to do for Real, L'pool

Liverpool and Real Madrid, with an astonishing 13 European titles between them, face the humiliating prospect of being dumped out of the Champions League on Tuesday.

Liverpool, who have lifted the continental crown five times, are in the most precarious position, having to travel to France where only a Group A win will suffice against 1993 winners Marseille in the Stade Velodrome.

Eight-time champions Real are in a better position. They tackle Lazio at the Bernabau needing only a draw to make the knockout rounds but wary that a heavy defeat could send them heading for the exit from Group C.

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In Group B, Chelsea, who have already made sure of their place in the last 16, welcome struggling Valencia who can only hope to aim for a UEFA Cup place.

Liverpool, runners-up last season and champions for the fifth time as recently as 2005, suffered the worst possible preparation for their trip to the south of France when they were beaten 3-1 by Reading in the Premiership at the weekend.

Both manager Rafael Benitez is confident his team, who have reigned their European campaign with 12 goals in their last two ties, can secure the three points they need.

"We have experience of finals so we will do the same thing we were doing before. It is an important game but the players have experience of those," said Benitez.

"Since I have been here we have been in seven finals. We have won four so we have enough experience and quality in the squad to win."

Both Marseille and Liverpool have seven points, one behind group leaders Porto, but a draw could be enough for the French side to qualify after Eric Gerets' men won the first match between the two at Anfield.

Marseille warmed up for the do-or-die clash with a 2-0 win over Monaco in the French championship.

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## Ronaldinho staying put

Barcelona president Joan Laporta said Sunday that Brazilian superstar Ronaldinho was not for sale and quashed reports that the club was negotiating with English giants Chelsea or European champions AC Milan.

Speaking after Barcelona's 2-1 win over Deportivo La Coruna on Sunday Laporta said: "We are not going to sell Ronaldinho. We are not in contact with Chelsea, Milan or any other team."

"We are counting on Ronaldinho and you could see tonight that he fought like all the rest of the players."

Chelsea, bankrolled by Russian billionaire Roman Abramovich, have been mooted as potential suitors along with Milan who have several of Ronaldinho's Brazilian international teammates in their ranks.

Ronaldinho has cut a forlorn figure this season with the 27-year-old Brazilian, contracted until June 2010, struggling to recapture his form and Barcelona's demanding fans have jeered his idol.

There have been reports that Ronaldinho's penchant for late-night partying is behind his below-par displays although the club have tried to keep a lid on the whole affair.

Ronaldinho, the 2006 Ballon d'Or winner, started for Barca against Deportivo on Sunday and converted a penalty, his sixth goal of the season, as his team moved to within four points of leaders Real Madrid with a 2-1 win at Camp Nou.

## Boro stun Gunners

Middlesbrough inflicted Arsenal's first Premier League defeat of the season with a 2-1 win on Sunday to cut the Gunners' lead over Manchester United at the top of the table to just one point. In the day's other matches, Bolton heaped more misery on second-bottom Wigan with a 3-1 win while Tottenham secured only their third league win of the season, with a 2-1 success against a Manchester City side that finished the game with 10 men after Stephen Ireland was sent off.

Defeat meant Sven-Goran Eriksson's City missed out on the chance to go above Liverpool and

into fourth place in the table while Spurs are now two points clear of the bottom three.

West Ham continued their fine recent form with a 1-0 win away to Blackburn Rovers which left the Londoners 10th as Alan Curbishley celebrated a year in charge with a victory.

Stewart Downing, with a fourth-minute penalty, and Tuncay Sanli, with a close-range strike 16 minutes from time, scored for Middlesbrough at the Riverside.

Tomas Rosicky pulled a goal back in the fifth minute of stoppage time but it was too late for Arsenal.

The result gave Middlesbrough, who started Sunday in the relegation zone, only their third win in the Premiership this season.

Uruguayan international Diego Forlán settled a game full of incident with four sending-offs in 14 minutes.

"It is three vital points," said Atletico manager Javier Aguirre. "Sometime you can't win 4-0 playing beautiful football and you need to fight and get physical."

Villarreal slip to fourth after as the wheels appear to be starting to come off their title bid following a 1-0 defeat by Real Betis.

"Betis did not deserve to take the three points," lamented Villarreal coach Manuel Pellegrini. "We played well against a team that made it a perfect eight home wins in the league."

"We tried everything but it is difficult against a team with ten men behind the ball."

With Thierry Henry still out due to a back complaint Barca coach Rijkaard started with Eto'o, Ronaldinho and Lionel Messi in

attack.

Finishing in the top four looks a tall order for Sevilla although they got back on the right track with a 3-1 win over Real Murcia on Sunday.

Brazilian Luis Fabiano moved into double figures for the season, with a brace (4, 89) and Italian Enzo Maresca converted a 58th minute spot-kick.

Sevilla move ninth but just qualifying for Europe is the aim for the back-to-back UEFA Cup winners although they are still in the Champions League.



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## It's Inter versus the rest

It may be only 15 games into the 38-match Italian season but already fans and media here are branding Inter Milan as unstoppable.

The gap between the champions and second-placed Roma is only five points but already Inter have an air of invincibility about them.

Both coaches of the three main title rivals have been at pains to calm down the fear that the champions will romp away to another Serie A title.

Last season they finished more than 20 points clear of Roma in second while also setting a new record of 17 league wins in a row.

Inter further added to those fears of domination at the San Siro on Sunday by drubbing Torino 4-0 while Roma dropped two points in a 1-1 draw at Livorno.

Third-placed Juventus needed a Pavel Nedved stunner four minutes from full-time to beat Atalanta 1-0 at home to avoid falling further behind than the eight-point gap they already have to Inter.
