Another body recovered

Rescuers took out one more decomposed body from inside the rubble of Rangs Bhaban yesterday which caved in partly December 8, raising the death toll from 8 to 5.

Seven more dead bodies are believed to have been trapped in the debris.

The body was identified as Farid Sheikh, 32, a construction labourer. Rajuk workers retrieved it from the fifth-floor wreckage at around 9:30am.

Rescuers took out the other four bodies on Thursday, when rescue operation began five days after the building imploded. No dead body was recovered Friday.

## Musharraf ends state of emergency

Pakistan President Pervez Musharraf lifted his unpopular state of emergency yesterday, but only after a last-minute move to shore up his powers before general elections three weeks away.

Amid months of political turmoil and the stiffest challenges to his authority since he seized power in a 1999 coup, Musharraf ended emergency rule and restored the constitution, which he suspended on November 3.

His Western backers, notably the United States, had insisted on

an end to the emergency before the elections, hoping to quell a wave of popular discontent in a nuclear-armed country central to the US "war on terror".

But Musharraf still faces accusations that he has effectively rigged the January 8 vote for parliament.

Judges who opposed him have been dismissed and detained, and strict curbs on the media will remain in place.

"The emergency was revoked and the constitution was restored at 1:30pm today," Law Minister Afzal Haider told AFP.

"The lifting of the emergency

will ensure that parliamentary elections are free and fair," Haider said. He called the move a "victory for the people of Pakistan".

Musharraf was to address the nation live on television at 1500 GMT.

The president imposed emergency rule six weeks ago, citing a surge in attacks by Islamic militants as well as what he said was interference by the judiciary in running the country.

1 killed, 12 hurt in filling station collapse

A construction engineer was killed and 12 workers were injured as an under construction concrete canopy of a CNG filling station collapsed on them at Kanchpur of Sonargaon upazila yesterday.

The dead was identified as Suraj Mian, 35, an assistant engineer of a construction firm. His body was pulled out at around 4:30pm. Rescue operation was going on till filing of this report at 7:22pm to ascertain if anyone else is trapped under the rubble.

Witnesses and workers said four columns and the shed of under construction OS Filling Station collapsed at around 12:30pm over

## Draft coal policy finalised

The final draft of the coal policy discourages aggressive development of the country's coal sector and places national bodies into the driving seat to lead the sector by pushing private and foreign investors into the backseat.

Under this policy, private companies will not have sole ownership over any coal mining deal. They must come in as partners with a national coal mining company.

The committee on reviewing coal policy finalised its report on Friday clearing some ambiguities in the policy.

For instance, the committee opted for maintaining the existing

coal development royalty rate against the earlier suggestion to increase the rate.

The 10-member committee agreed not to increase the royalty rate considering the fate of the country's lone coal mine of Barapukuria, which would become bankrupt with the increased rate.

The earlier suggestion was to increase the royalty to over 20 per cent from the existing five to six per cent. A coalmine developer has to pay corporate tax at the rate of 35 per cent in addition to paying the royalty.

The committee however suggested that a committee headed by a state minister or equivalent rank

## Climate deal sealed by US U-turn

UN talks set 2009 deadline for new pact

World climate negotiators set a 2009 deadline yesterday for a landmark treaty to fight global warming after two weeks of intense haggling led to a climbdown by an isolated United States.

UN Secretary General Ban Ki-moon, who flew to the Indonesian island of Bali for a late appeal for flexibility, praised the deal as a "pivotal first step" to confront climate change, "the defining challenge of our time."


Following gruelling all-night talks, the conference of 190 nations

finally launched a process to negotiate a new treaty for when the UN Kyoto Protocol's commitments expire in 2012.

It comes after a year of stark warnings from Nobel-winning scientists, who say millions of people will be at risk of hunger, homelessness and disease by 2100 if temperatures keep rising at current rates.

The United States, the only major industrialised nation to reject the Kyoto treaty, reached a compromise with the European Union to avoid mentioning any
