Aga Khan may arrive early next yr

Prince Karim Aga Khan is likely to visit Bangladesh next year, which will mark the Golden Jubilee of his Imamate.

A delegation of Ismaili Community yesterday met with Foreign Affairs Adviser Iftekhar Ahmed Chowdhury and told him that the Aga Khan would visit Bangladesh in the first quarter of 2008.

The delegation led by Habib Hirji, President of the Ismaili Council in Bangladesh, also said that during his visit, Prince Karim Aga Khan would lay the foundation of Aga Khan Academy in Bangladesh.

During the meeting, Hirji also discussed the Ismaili community's role in the post-cyclone relief operations and announced a donation of 50,000 pieces of blankets.

Iftekhar said: "Aga Khan is very highly regarded in this country, and we still fondly recall his visit to Dhaka in 1993. The people of Bangladesh wish him well and would be delighted to see him again on his Golden Jubilee."

AMCH receives Tk 20.72 lakh in November

DCC yet to complete disposal of waste of sacrificial animals

The Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) has been continuing its efforts to remove the wastes of sacrificial animals since the day of Eid-ul-Azha on Friday and it will take more time to complete the task of cleaning the city.

"We are trying our best to make the capital clean by removing all the wastes of the sacrificial animals and we are satisfied with the progress of our task," said DCC Chief Conservancy Officer (CCO) Commander Maksudur-Rahman Chowdhury while talking to The Daily Star.

"Despite our various attempts to make the city dwellers aware

about the cleanliness of the city, they neither obeyed the DCC rules nor followed our request. They slaughtered animals here and there leading to a sorry condition of the capital city," he added.

The CCO said, "In future, we will strengthen our awareness building programme so that the city dwellers follow the DCC rules to keep the city clean."

The DCC mayor and the CCO have also visited the cattle markets and other spots to witness the condition of the city after the Eid.

Earlier, the DCC cancelled Eid holidays of the staffs of conservancy and other departments concerned to carry out cleanliness

drive during the religious festival.

It also deployed about 5000 sweepers, cleaners, labourers and other workers to remove the wastes of sacrificial animals and clean the cattle markets.

The DCC also engaged 160 trucks, 400 containers, nine trawlers, six pray loaders, two trolley-dodgers, 20 dump trucks and 10 water lorries for this purpose.

It allocated around Tk 7.74 lakh in this regard, sources added.

A total of 11 makeshift cattle markets were set up at various places in the city on the occasion of the Eid-ul-Azha and several thousand animals were sacrificed on this occasion.

2 stabbed to death, another shot dead

Two people were stabbed to death and another person was shot dead in and around the capital in separate incidents on Thursday.

The victims are Habibur Rahman, 36, Majibur Rahman, 45, and Monir Hossain, 32.

A gang of muggers stabbed Habib, a cloth trader, and took away his money in Banagram area at around 6:00am when he was going to Narayanganj to buy clothes, Sutrapur police said.

Locals rushed him to Dhaka Medical College and Hospital

where the doctors declared him dead.

On Thursday night, a gang of criminals shot Majibur Rahman dead at Adarshanagar, Lalmaita.

Family members said Majibur was a Ward 5 Juba League leader. But they could not say why he was killed.

In another incident, Monir Hossain, a daylabourer, was stabbed to death at Aganagar Bus Stand of South Keraniganj on Thursday night.

Three murder cases were filed with Sutrapur, Pallabi and South Keraniganj police stations.

'Bangla-Nepal ties on strong footing'

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NICVD fails to cope with growing number of patients

Nurunnahar, 29, was waiting in a long queue at the National Institute of Cardiovascular Diseases (NICVD) in the city with her five-year-old son in her lap, who looks like a boy of two years because of his stunted physical growth.

Doctors of paediatric medicine at the institute advised the boy to undergo a cardiac surgery, which is quite expensive. Yet, his mother had managed the money by selling off their home to save her son's life and had been waiting for a vacant seat at the hospital and the serial number for surgery.

"The boy was released from the department of paediatric medicine a week ago as the doctors said he now needs to undergo surgery. On the other hand, the surgeons told me to go back home and maintain contact with the institution as to when seats will be vacant and the serial number for surgery will be given. But it is not possible for me to come here everyday," said Nurunnahar, who resides in Madaripur.

"Although the hospital authorities gave me a discharge notice a week ago, I am still staying here on the corridor and trying to share the foods served by the hospital for the child," Nurunnahar told this correspondent recently.

"I am not buying foods from outside as I have got only the money needed for the surgery. I had to sell off my home to collect the amount," she said, with tears rolling down her cheeks.

She has been coming to this hospital since 2004 and by this time she has become a destitute, she added.

"When I came here for the first time, I did not know where to go and who I need to approach. Then a man, who I now think is a broker, took me to a doctor who told me to meet him at his clinic at Farmgate. The doctor had been treating the boy since then and I have spent a large amount of money on the treatment. Three years later, the doctor asked me to take my child to the hospital," said Nurunnahar, wife of a daylabourer.

"Nurunnahar is not the only one facing such harassment. Paediatric medicine unit has been set up in 2003 and in most cases children need to go through cardiac surgery (90 percent cases)" said Dr Kamrul Hasan, a paediatric surgeon.

Nearly 50 percent of children with cardiac problems fail to get admitted to this hospital because of seat crisis, he added.

There are many examples where the schedule of a child cardiac surgery is given even a year later, said Dr Zulfikar.

Patients are being deprived of better treatment at this institute due to shortage of manpower and lack of equipments and reagents, he added.

This institute even do not have the system of testing the levels of Homocysteine, hsCRP and other elements in blood; which increases the risk of heart attack, he added.

The National Institute of

Cardiovascular Diseases (NICVD) fails to provide better services and cope with the increasing number of heart patients due to lack of manpower, equipments and proper budgetary allocation.

The record of patients' admission in the hospital points out the need for more government intervention. A total of 24,958 cardiac patients were admitted to the hospital in 2006, up from 21,803 in 2004.

The number of patients admitted to the hospital from January to September this year stands at 22,153, the hospital authorities said.

The hospital has only 250 beds but it is now accommodating around 500 to 600 patients. It also cannot provide enough medicines for the patients. As a result, poor patients have to buy drugs from outside.

"The hospital can supply only 5 to 10 percent of the required medi-

cine to the patients. We can provide drugs free of cost only on the first day," said a physician preferring anonymity.

Talking to The Daily Star, Matin Mia, a retired government official who came to seek treatment here, said, "I have been waiting here for two hours to collect a signature from the Resident Physician (RP) through which I can manage ten tablets worth Tk 50 at a time, although I need medicines worth Tk 1200 every month."

Shudha Rani Kundu, 35, was seen groaning with severe pain in her chest and walking to the X-ray corner.

"The ward boys just brought me down from the 3rd floor and went away. But I don't know where to go for X-ray," said Shudha who came from Madaripur.

"We are quite helpless here. Nobody wants to listen or pay attention to us," she added.
