

## Nuclear India moves closer to missile defence shield

India announced Friday a final successful test of the surface-to-air Akash missile before starting mass production under an ambitious plan to build a national missile defence shield.

The missile blasted off from the Chandipur-on-Sea testing site, 200 kilometres (125 miles) northeast of Orissa state capital Bhubaneswar and hit an unmanned flying target, defence ministry spokesman Sitanshu Kar told AFP.

"The Akash missile has successfully hit the bull's eye for the fifth time in a row in the past 10 days and the last trial successfully took place today," he said.

The 700-kilogram (1,540-pound) Akash, meaning "sky" in Hindi, can track 100 targets simultaneously with onboard radar, move at 600 metres (yards) a sec-

ond and deliver a 55-kilogram warhead across 27 kilometres (17 miles) in 50 seconds.

"The missile system has been configured to be part of a futuristic network centric operation," the defence ministry said in a separate statement.

Akash will join forces with a radar-based interceptor missile project, which is planned to be ready within three years and provide the national missile defence shield, missile scientists say.

New Delhi government officials report that the Indian-made interceptor missiles have performed better than Patriot air-defence batteries manufactured by US defence group Raytheon.

Friday's final Akash test came a week after India announced plans to increase its nuclear prowess with a ballistic missile capable of hitting targets up to 6,000 kilometres (3,800 miles) away.

## Modi-led BJP wins Gujarat polls

India's main opposition Bharatiya Janata Party yesterday stormed back to power in the western state of Gujarat and its senior leader

Narendra Modi is poised to return as Chief Minister for the third time after the party won the elections to the state legislature.

The Modi-led Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) won 117 seats in the 182-member state legislature, leaving the Congress Party -- which runs the federal government -- trailing with just 59 seats, the commission said on its official website.

Another six seats were picked up by small parties or independent candidates.

The election was held on December 11 and 16.

In the last elections, BJP had

won 127 seats in the 182-strong state assembly while Congress bagged 51 seats. Even before results were officially announced, BJP workers began celebrations at the party's office in Ahmedabad bursting crackers.

BJP spokesperson Ravishankar Prasad said "the victory is the victory of entire BJP of which Modi is the Man of the Match. We are proud of his performance."

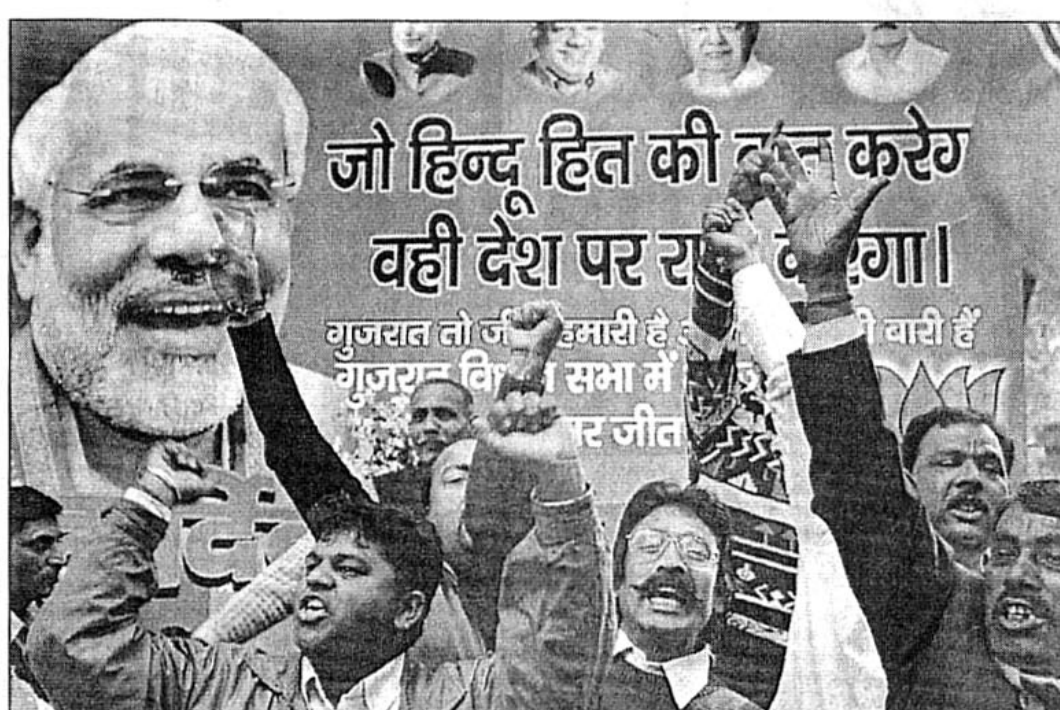
Congress conceded defeat when its spokesman Abhishek Singhvi said "I congratulate Narendra Modi for a remarkable victory. I don't grudge him the victory but the win does not take away the blot of communal riots on him or invalidate all that happened during the riots in 2002 under his Chief Ministership."

Senior BJP leader Arun Jaitley,

who is credited with the crafting of BJP's election strategy in Gujarat elections, said Modi has secured a "respectful mandate" and that it is a rare election where a party has won on the plank of "good governance and development."

The victory in Gujarat polls is a major shot in the arm of 55-year-old Modi who single-handedly led the BJP campaign fighting anti-incumbency, a united opposition and a revolt to his leadership within a section of his own party.

The campaign for the election was marked by a sharp war of words between Modi and Congress chief Sonia Gandhi who, along with Prime Minister Manmohan Singh, had undertaken extensive electioneering in Gujarat.

## 22 Myanmar people killed in boat accident

At least 22 people from Myanmar, including four boys and seven women, have died after a boat capsized off a small island near the maritime border with Thailand, Thai police said Sunday.

The bodies were discovered floating at sea Saturday off Thailand's Ranong province, 570km south of Bangkok, police said.

Thai police Colonel Teerawat Rattanachai said none of the victims, whose bodies are thought to have floated from the Myanmar side of the border, had any identification, and that others may have been on board the boat when it sank.

## Two dozen killed in Afghan violence

Around two dozen people, including several civilians, were killed in the latest spate of Taliban-linked violence across Afghanistan, authorities said Sunday.

Three civilians, one a woman, were killed when a bomb hit their vehicle in the eastern province of Khost, a troubled region near the Pakistani border, provincial police spokesman Mohammad Yaqob said.

Two other civilians were wounded by the same bomb, which

he said was detonated remotely like many others used in Taliban attacks on security forces.

The Taliban on Saturday shot dead seven men, two of them truck drivers for a Western security firm, who had been kidnapped in the past week, police and a rebel spokesman said.

A Taliban spokesman, Zabihullah Mujahid, said the men -- three policemen, two soldiers and the drivers -- were killed after attempting to escape "from our jail".

Ghazni province police chief Khan Mohammad Mujahid told AFP that three bodies had been recovered.

In their biggest hostage-taking, the Taliban captured 23 South Korean nationals in July in the same province. They killed two of the group of Christian aid workers before releasing the remainder.

The defence ministry said troops killed 10 rebels in the southern province of Kandahar on Friday. Several other militants and four soldiers were wounded, it said.

## Indian police cane girls protesting teacher's killing

Police on Saturday beat schoolgirls with batons in a northern Indian town after the students squatted on a highway to protest the killing of their headmaster, reports said.

The girls, who were caned and dragged by their hair by police in Ferozabad town, were between six and 13 years old, the Press Trust of India reported.

Television stations reported at least three girls fainted after the assault by riot police on some 100 girls, in Ferozabad, a hub of India's glassware industry.

## US recovers some faith in Musharraf

A shaken US government has recovered at least some of its faith in President Pervez Musharraf of Pakistan, believing he still has a chance to promote democracy and defeat terrorism.

Conceding that al-Qaeda has turned its focus from Afghanistan to Pakistan, US officials argue that pushing for democracy is the central Asian Muslim nation's best long-term hope of keeping extremists at bay.

To be sure, top officials say, Musharraf has reversed course since he imposed emergency rule November 3, which prompted both a review of US aid to Pakistan and a broader debate on his status as ally in the war on terror.

However, they insist, he must pass further tests on the way to and during parliamentary elections he has set for January 8.

"He has been a good ally in the war on terror... (but) it was not a good decision to impose a state of emergency," Secretary of State

Condoleezza Rice told AFP in an exclusive interview last week on Pakistan and other topics.

"He's lifted the state of emergency. He's taken off the (army) uniform. And now I hope that he is going to oversee the return of Pakistan to a civilian-led democratic state," she said.

"They need to have free and fair elections," Rice said, adding that the test does not begin the day of elections but "when opposition can gather" and all media can air views freely.

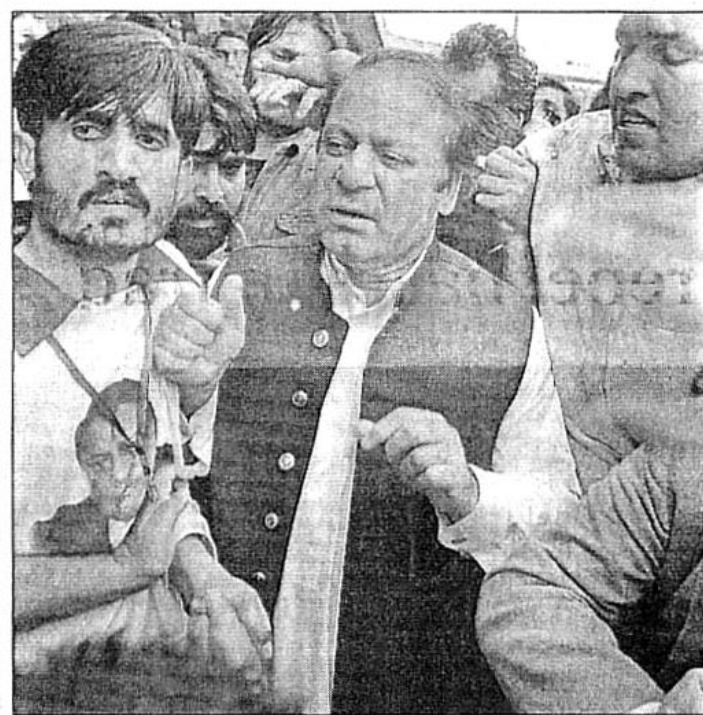

## Lankan army, rebels claim heavy losses in fresh fighting

Tamil rebels and Sri Lankan troops fought fierce battles in the north at the weekend, leaving several people dead or wounded, according to conflicting statements from both sides yesterday.

The rebel Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE) said they resisted a 10-hour military push on Saturday into the district of Mannar, killing at least 17 soldiers and wounding 54.

The guerrillas said they lost three of their fighters. But the defence ministry said the military killed eight Tigers for the loss of one

soldier.

The ministry said troops had smashed a front-line position of the Tigers in Mannar and also captured another base in the adjoining Vavuniya district.

Further north in the Jaffna peninsula, the military in a statement claimed to have killed eight guerrillas on Sunday morning without suffering any casualties. It said three more Tigers had been killed in the same area on Saturday.

The claim of more rebel casualties brings the number of Tamil fighters killed since December 1 to at least 382, according to the defence ministry.

## British hospital treats all Afghan sides

A petite village woman with dark henna on her hands lies wrapped in a blue sheet at the best hospital around -- a British military facility in southern Afghanistan.

Raheema, who puts her age at about 30, was brought here by helicopter in late October with gunshot wounds to her abdomen and chest.

She is one of the lucky Afghan civilians to benefit from world-class health care, at a place where it is not always clear which side the patients are on in the battle for the soul of the war-torn country.

In Raheema's case, she said through an interpreter, her sons

found some bullets in the desert and somehow some of them exploded.

"Our children are uneducated," she said. "They were playing." Helmand province is Afghanistan's opium heartland, an area from which drugs barons extract huge profits -- some of which fund the Taliban -- while villagers live in poverty with little access to decent health care.

But at the British Army Field Hospital at Camp Bastion, a town-like base built out of the vast Afghan desert, Raheema has had the best medical treatment in Afghanistan, perhaps even better than some people could get in Britain.
