

Ronaldo keeps MU on track

Two goals from Cristiano Ronaldo helped Manchester United move back to within a point of Premier League leaders Arsenal after a 2-1 win over Everton at Old Trafford on Sunday.

Everton had looked set to extend their unbeaten run to 14 matches but a rash challenge by Steven Pienaar on Ryan Giggs resulted in an 88th-minute penalty that Ronaldo converted to secure all three points.

The Portuguese winger, who has now scored 16 goals in all competitions this season, had given the champions the lead midway through the first-half with Australian midfielder Tim Cahill equalising five minutes later.

It was Ronaldo who broke the deadlock with a superb curling shot created out of nothing in the 22nd minute.

There seemed nowhere for the Portuguese to go when he was confronted by two Everton defenders after collecting Anderson's pass but a neat sidestep created a space and the winger's left-foot shot found the top corner for his tenth league goal of the season.

Everton's outstanding recent run meant they were never likely to lose heart at falling behind to the champions.

And their response was as quick as it was impressive with Pienaar delivering a dipping cross from United's problem right hand flank towards Cahill, who out-jumped Patrice Evra to head the equaliser just five minutes later.

Everton fought well but when they looked set for the draw Pienaar sent United captain Ryan Giggs crashing to the ground inside the visitors area with just three minutes remaining and Ronaldo kept his nerve to clinch the points from the penalty spot.

Carlos backs Becks as skipper

David Beckham's former Real Madrid teammate Roberto Carlos believes new England coach Fabio Capello will name the midfielder as the national captain.

The veteran Brazilian, who played under Capello in both his spells at Real Madrid, insists the Italian was not to blame for Beckham's marginalising at the Bernabeu last season after he revealed his plan to join the Los Angeles Galaxy.

Carlos claims Capello was made to carry the can for a decision which was made above his head - and then made a conscious decision to disobey his employers by recalling the midfielder later in the season.

"There were no bad feelings because he (Beckham) knew it wasn't Capello's fault," Carlos told The Observer newspaper.

"Now, I am sure that Capello will select Beckham for England - 100 per cent sure."

"He will call David and I think he will make him his captain."

Carlos believes Capello will get England winning again - but has warned fans not to expect excitement.

"England need victories, results, and that he will give them," he said in The Observer.

Van Der Vaart fancies Juve

Hamburg's Dutch midfielder Rafael Van der Vaart has said he could imagine playing for Italian giants Juventus and would soon make a decision on where his career will take him.

"I know Juventus are interested in me, they've wanted me since last summer and I can really imagine myself playing for that club," van der Vaart told Saturday's edition of the Bild daily newspaper.

"I'm hesitating on my future but I'll take a decision soon," said the 24-year-old who joined Hamburg in July 2005.

Hamburg, third in the Bundesliga, have offered the Dutchman a two-year extension to his contract which runs until 2010 as well as a salary review.

But van der Vaart seems set on finding another club.

The midfielder saw a possible 22-million-euro move to Valencia rebuffed by Hamburg in the summer.

According to Bild, Juventus were prepared to shell out 17 millions euros for van der Vaart for a five-year deal.

Van der Vaart, who has scored seven goals in 45 games for the Netherlands, has knocked in 26 goals in 59 matches for Hamburg and has a clause in his contract that would allow him to leave the German club in 2009 for an indemnity of 1.5 million euros.

Arsenal test for Milan

Defending champions AC Milan were drawn against Arsenal in the last 16, knockout phase of the Champions League here on Friday.

AC's city rivals Inter, unbeaten and flying high in Serie A, will play Liverpool, whom AC Milan beat 2-1 in last season's final.

Arsenal, who missed out on a favourable seed ranking after finishing second in the qualifying group, will host the Italian club on February 19/20 with the return leg in Milan on March 4/5.

The London club will have their work cut out against Milan, who last week were also crowned world club champions after their 4-2 victory over Boca Juniors in Japan.

Despite standing 22 points behind Italian league leaders Inter, AC Milan also boast the FIFA Player of the Year and European Footballer of the Year in Brazilian playmaker Kaká.

AC Milan and Arsenal have only met once before - in 1994 in the European Superclub competition, the Italians coming away with a 2-0 aggregate win.

Arsenal managing director Keith Edelman insisted they won't fear the seven-time Champions League winners.

"It's a great match and I'm sure

the fans will be trying to book tickets already," Edelman said.

"Games don't come much bigger than this. I'm sure it will be highly charged and very competitive."

"I think we would have preferred an easier one. We want to win all four competitions and we've got a big enough squad to compete in all of them."

Inter Milan president Massimo Moratti said Liverpool, whom Inter beat in the 1965 semis before going on to lift the European Cup, would not prove an easy test.

"It's interesting because it throws up two teams with lots of tradition: Liverpool have given us great memories," said Moratti in reference to their 1965 triumph over Benfica.

"It will be two difficult matches."

Chelsea apart, the draw was also hard for the three other British

teams in European club football's showpiece tournament.

Celtic will face 2006 winners Barcelona, while Manchester United face six-time French champions Lyon.

Celtic, European Cup winners 40 years ago, have yet to make it past the last 16 of the Champions League and Barcelona captain Carles Puyol all but admitted they had been given a relatively easy draw.

"It's a good draw for us, though Celtic are a very physical side who base most of their play on defence so it will be difficult to score that first goal," said the defender.

"But if you score quickly, everything else becomes easy."

Liverpool, winners in 2005 and losing finalists last season, paid for having finished as a group runner-up with a tricky tie against Inter Milan.

Anfield chief executive Rick Parry expressed confidence that Liverpool could go on another long run in competition this season.

"We stopped a few hearts in the way we qualified. We've done well in recent years and we want to do well again," he said.

"It's a big one but it was going to be big whoever we drew. It's a very long time since we played them."

"They are a very good team and they doing well in the Italian league. It's going to be tough."

showed great spirit. When you are losing 2-0 and then come back to draw it's because the players have pride but we have still got to improve our football," said Valencia coach Ronald Koeman.

The fact remains that Valencia have slipped from being championship contenders at the beginning of November when Koeman took charge to seventh place after going five La Liga games with a win.

Valencia had to dig deep after first-half errors by their third choice goalkeeper Juan Luis Mora left the home side two up at the break.

Diego Milito put Zaragoza in front from the penalty spot after 18 minutes, the Argentine striker's ninth goal of the season, after Mora had brought down Ricardo Oliveira in the area.

Bayern drawn with Aberdeen

Scottish Premier League side Aberdeen have their work cut out in the UEFA Cup knock-out stage after being drawn against 1996 winners Bayern Munich on Friday.

The Dons, who last reached this stage of the competition in 1986, beat the German giants during their successful 1983 Cup Winners' Cup campaign under Sir Alex Ferguson.

And despite a confident 4-0 demolition of FC Copenhagen on Thursday to reach the last 32 the club is under no illusion as to the task that awaits them.

"It's a reward for a fantastic achievement by Jimmy and the players," said former Aberdeen captain and current club board member Willie Miller.

Aberdeen welcome Ottmar Hitzfeld's Bayern at Pittodrie for the first leg on February 13/14 with the return leg in Germany on February 21.

Hitzfeld, though, is confident of a positive outcome and already has one eye on a last 16 encounter.

Ballack backs Lehmann

Germany captain Michael Ballack insisted on Saturday that out-of-favour Arsenal goalkeeper Jens Lehmann will be the right man for the national team at June's Euro 2008 tournament.

The 38-year-old lost his place in Arsenal's first-team in August and has been left on the bench ever since with Gunner's coach Arsene Wenger preferring Spaniard Manuel Almunia.

Lehmann's lack of match time has caused great concern in Germany with the national side among the favourites to win the tournament.

But as far as Chelsea midfielder Ballack, 31, is concerned, Lehmann has to be German coach Joachim Loew's first choice at next June's tournament.

"For me, there is simply no discussion about who should be Germany's goalkeeper," Ballack told.

Kaka eyes Milan captaincy

FIFA world player of the year Kaka has said he would like to extend his contract with AC Milan until 2013 as well as becoming captain of the Italian giants.

In an interview with Croat newspaper Sportske Novosti, the 25-year-old Brazilian playmaker said: "It's true that we've talked about extending my contract until 2013 and we'll do that as soon as the club invites me to sign."

Kaka, who arrived in Milan in 2003, sees his current contract expire in 2011 and enjoys a salary of around six million euros a year, making him the best-paid player in Italy.

"I want to become captain (of AC Milan) and leave a big impression with this great club," added Kaka, also recently named European Footballer of the Year after starring in Milan's run to the European Champions League title, then the European Super Cup and the recent Club World Cup.

Current club captain Paolo Maldini, 39, will retire at the season's end.

Spurs gift Gunners win

Arsenal's bid to reclaim the Premier League title passed a significant milestone on Saturday when a derby win over Tottenham ensured Arsene Wenger's men will spend Christmas on top of the table.

On a day that saw Liverpool register an impressive 4-1 win over Portsmouth at Anfield, Arsenal beat their north London neighbours 2-1 to pull four points clear of second-placed Manchester United.

Manchester United can cut Arsenal's lead back to a single point on Sunday, when the champions entertain Everton at Old Trafford.

For Tottenham, who have not beaten their neighbours since November 1999, it was another deeply frustrating derby experience, with even Wenger admitting his side had been fortunate to claim maximum points.

Robbie Keane had the chance to put the visitors in front with a 73rd-minute penalty after Dimitar Berbatov had cancelled out Emanuel Adebayor's well-taken opener for Arsenal.

But the Spurs captain's spot-kick was saved by Manuel Almunia

and Arsenal extracted maximum advantage from that reprieve when, three minutes later, substitute Nicklas Bendtner rose unchallenged to head the winner from a Cesc Fabregas corner.

"We had some luck," Wenger confessed. "Almunia saved the penalty and that was the turning point."

Portsmouth arrived at Anfield boasting the best away record in the league.

But Harry Redknapp's men soon found themselves on the back foot as a superb volley by Israeli midfielder Yossi Benayoun was quickly followed by an own goal by Sylvain Distin to put Liverpool two up with barely quarter of an hour gone.

Zimbabwean forward Benjamin Mwaruware fired Portsmouth back into the contest 12 minutes after the break but Fernando Torres guaranteed the win with two late goals to take his tally for his first season in England to 14 goals in all competitions.

"We scored four goals against the team with the best team away record, so that was important for the confidence of everyone," said Reds boss Rafael Benitez.

"The team was playing with passion and intelligence and they are things that it is important to put

together."

Manchester City remain in the top four, just ahead of Liverpool, after a 1-1 draw at Aston Villa. Norwegian striker John Carew earned a point for the home side after Rolando Bianchi had given City the lead after only four minutes.

"He's settling in better and better," City boss Sven-Goran Eriksson said of Bianchi, who has begun to pay back some of the 8.8-million-pound he cost the club with three goals in his last four games.

At the other end of the table, Bolton's revival under Gary Megson gathered pace with a 3-0 home win over Birmingham, courtesy of a first-half strike from El Hadji Diouf and a late double from Nicolas Anelka.

Middlesbrough's attempts to edge away from the relegation zone suffered a setback when a late Scott Parker striker allowed West Ham to claim their fifth away win over the season.

Defender David Wheeler had given Boro the lead five minutes before the break but Dean Ashton quickly equalised for the Hammers and Parker grabbed all three points right at the death.

It was also a tough afternoon for Sunderland, who slipped back into the drop zone after Stephen Hunt's

Totti fires Roma

Sampdoria at the Stadio Olimpico on Saturday and keep them in the Serie A title chase.

Second-placed Roma closed the gap on leaders Inter Milan to just four points ahead of Sunday's eagerly anticipated Milan derby with newly-crowned world champions AC Milan.

Totti was making his second injury comeback of the season having missed last week's disappointing 0-0 draw at Torino and he proved he was back to his best with a crucial double, the first a cute finish from the penalty spot.

"I wanted to finish 2007 in a big way. I'm happy and I want to thank my teammates who let me take the penalty and set me up at the end," he told Sky Sport.

It was the penalty that never should have been, though, as the referee offered Roma an early Christmas present on 18 minutes.

Centre-back Matteo Ferrari, playing in place of the suspended

Frenchman Philippe Mexes, crumpled into a heap in the box under the slightest of challenges from Stefano Lucchini and the official shockingly pointed to the spot.

Lucchini's bad luck got even worse as he was laughably also booked for his troubles.

That may have been a gift but captain Totti's finish from 12-yards was sublime as he calmly chipped the ball just under the cross-bar as goalkeeper Luca Castellazzi dived to his right.

Just before the hour mark a mistake from Roma full-back Max Tonetto saw Emiliano Bonazzoli set strike-partner Christian Maggio free but Brazilian goalkeeper Doni saved the day for the hosts.

And moments later Lucchini almost fired his side level but he blazed a half-volley over the bar from just four yards out after meeting a Sergio Volpi free-kick at the back post.

Roma came out flying in the second half and Simone Perrotta went close before David Pizarro clattered the bar with a long range effort that Castellazzi got a fingertip to.

Roma were pressing for a second and any hope Sampdoria had of getting back into the match effectively ended when Volpi was

harshly sent-off on 57 minutes.

He tripped Perrotta in full flight but his challenge was neither malicious nor decisive yet, incredibly, a second harsh decision went against the visitors.

Roma pushed forward and Brazilian substitute Alessandro Mancini fired a left-foot cross-shot inches wide of the far post 20 minutes from time.

But in the final five minutes 10-man Sampdoria almost snatched a leveller with Doni saving brilliantly from substitute Andrea Caracciolo and then Hugo Campagnaro firing wildly over the bar from the subsequent corner.

But in the last minute Totti grabbed his second, tapping home after a brilliant run down the right from Marco Cassetti.

It was Totti's first league goals since October 20, although it was also only his second league appearance since then due to injuries.

"It was difficult spending two months on the sidelines because I was playing really well before that," added Totti.

"The championship? It's a marathon, we won't make the same mistakes as last year when we finished 20 points back (from Inter). It will go to the wire."

'Don't expect miracles'

England fans have been warned not to expect miracles from Fabio Capello by the men who appointed the multiple trophy-winning Italian to the so-called 'hardest job in football'.

FA chief executive Brian Barwick described the 61-year-old Capello as a "winner with a capital W" at the formal unveiling of Steve McClaren's successor last Monday.

But both he and director of football development Sir Trevor Brooking are realistic about how far England's stock has fallen and they have ushered in the Capello era with a heavy dose of realism.

"There is no triumphalism," said Barwick.

"Fabio Capello knows he has a

serious job to do. This is a team that has not qualified for the European Championships."

Brooking said: "We are not getting carried away by the thought that suddenly, because we have Fabio, we will become world beaters, because we will not."

"We have not won anything for 40 years. Let us not expect him to suddenly win us two big championships."

"We cannot sit back and think everything is rosy. What we have to do is try to get the best out of that group of players."

Barwick stressed that Capello had a job to do working on the England team's mental attitude "and what happens when the players cross the white line".

"He needs to do a lot of work on the players' confidence, as well as the ability and tactics."

"We have a set of disaffected

supporters. They are fed up with us because we have not qualified for Euro 2008 and because we didn't play especially well during the World Cup."

"People put great store by supporting their country. It is a special thing and it pulls them together."

"We are not just going for a quick-fix. We have a guy who is committed to turning the situation round."

"We also have to turn round the public perception of what we are. They pay a lot of money and come in vast numbers. They are hugely supportive and over the last couple of years we have let them down."

Capello, for all his nine titles and 6.5 million pound annual salary, knows he must impress a different audience now.

He will get his first chance to show what he is capable of on
