"But it is also true that we have to take a harsh decision if we want to find a permanent solution for the opening spot. We have taken a risky decision by keeping two uncapped openers for the Test series, but I think the batting of Tamim Iqbal and Zunaed Siddiqui in the one-day series have prompted our coach to take this challenging decision," he added.

Asked if the coach has become bigger than the selection panel itself, Akram defended Siddons.

"You know each and every coach always picks up one or two players at the beginning of their tenure and I think Jamie wanted to rely on Zunaed. And there is nothing wrong to respect the decision of a coach. But what we must ensure that we don't show impatience to the new guys rather we have to keep faith in them," he opined.

The former national skipper also defended their decision of selecting Javed Omar for the oneday squad.

Sydney, by all accounts a city bubbling with life, has recently been associated with the dead Test. Visiting teams usually come here for the final Test, with the series gone. Don Bradman has a stand named after him in the Sydney Cricket Ground (SCG); as do other legends like Bill O'Reilly and Monty Noble, but there is reason enough to build a new one named Pride. Normally that's the only thing left to play for once the teams land here.

A large section of the bucketseats are painted green but white would be more appropriate, considering how often Australia have applied the whitewash at this venue. England were left pale last

Ricky wary of Bhajji

Ricky Ponting believes he can overcome the persistent threat of Harbhajan Singh despite falling early to the off-spinner in the second innings in Melbourne. Harbhajan has dismissed Ponting six times in seven Tests and will play a crucial role alongside Anil Kumble as India attempt to level the series in Sydney.

Melbourne Cricket Ground (MCG) he hadn't seen enough of Ponting to have a plan for him on this tour, but it is a serious matter for great record in Tests against me," Ponting said of Harbhajan. "He got me first ball last week." The 2001 contest, when Ponting

scored 17 runs and slipped five times against Harbhajan in three Tests, is one of his few international scars, but he is not bothered by the problems against offspin. "It's a long time from that series in India six years ago, where he had the measure of me," Pontingsaid. "But it could be my turn here. It's just a matter of time before I get some runs." Ponting picked up two half-

Harbhajan joked at the centuries against Sri Lanka in November, but was the only Australian batsman to miss out in Melbourne, scoring 4 and 3. "I have got a good record here, I've made early." Australia's captain. "He's got a five hundreds on this ground," he

said. "Hopefully that can be the case this week. It was lean last week, I had almost as many catches as runs. But I had a good net, I'm coming off a couple of hundreds in the ODIs (against New Zealand) and I'm feeling good to go."

The slow start has not convinced India to downgrade the Ponting threat and Kumble remains wary. Kumble knows how potent Harbhajan is against Ponting, but will wait to decide whether to bring him on as soon as the captain enters. "It all depends on what's hap-

pening at that stage," Kumble said. "We understand that Ricky is the key and it's important we get him
