

HOPMAN CUP  
USA win  
fifth title

The United States capitalised on Jelena Jankovic's injury misfortune to beat Serbia 2-1 in the final and win their fourth Hopman Cup in six years here on Friday.

Aided by a one match headstart in the final after Jankovic, battling a right thigh injury, forfeited her singles match, Serena Williams and Mardy Fish claimed the title with a straight sets win in the deciding mixed doubles clash, 7-6 (7/5), 6-2.

That win came after Novak Djokovic had levelled the tie with a three-set win over a brave Fish in the men's singles, 6-2, 6-7 (4/7), 7-6 (7/4).

For the third day in a row a hobbler Jankovic played in a deciding mixed doubles rubber with heavy strapping on her injured right leg, but was third time unlucky for her and Djokovic as they squandered a good start and succumbed to the Americans.

The Serbs looked on track for an upset win when they raced to a 4-1 lead in the first set, but the superior fitness of the Americans started to tell and they worked their way back into the contest.

Djokovic and Jankovic, who is ranked number three in the world, were clearly feeling the effects of their third tie in as many days and the Americans took the first set on a tie-break and then dominated the second set.

Fish sealed the victory with a backhand pass to break the Jankovic serve and end the match after one hour and 25 minutes.

Djokovic received treatment on his shoulder, which has been troubling him all week, after dropping the second set and admitted he considered retiring.

"I wasn't really sure if I was going to be able to continue," he said.

"But whenever you are on the court you want to win and you could see that today."

Realising her body would only last one match, Jankovic had elected to skip the singles and take her chances in the mixed doubles, which in turn relied on Djokovic to keep his end of the deal.

It was the United States' fifth win here overall and Fish's first Hopman Cup success, while Williams teamed up with James Blake to win the title in 2003.

In her two appearances here, Williams is yet to play in a losing rubber.

Hingis banned  
for two years

The International Tennis Federation announced on Friday that former world No.1 Martina Hingis would be banned for two years for failing a doping test.

Hingis tested positive for cocaine on June 29 at Wimbledon and although the Swiss player denied she had taken the drug an independent Anti-Doping Tribunal after a two-day hearing found that she had committed an offence.

The two-year ban is effective from October 1, but the 27-year-old Hingis has already announced her retirement from the sport.

Speculation  
mounts over  
Lehmann

Speculation has mounted over Arsenal goalkeeper Jens Lehmann's possible move to Borussia Dortmund after the German club called a press conference for Friday.

The club's owners have yet to disclose any details concerning the conference, but according to the German press an announcement that the 38-year-old shotstopper will return to the club, where he spent four years between the posts from 1999 to 2003, is very likely.

Club owner, Hans-Joachim Watzke, and his sporting director Michael Zorn fuelled speculation following a trip to London for supposed talks with the player on Thursday, according to the media.

Lehmann, whose contract with the Gunners ends in June, has been out of Arsenal's first team since losing his place to Spaniard Manuel Almunia in September.

And as Germany's first-choice goalkeeper, Lehmann is under pressure to play regular football ahead of this year's European Championships in Austria and Switzerland.

But Arsenal's French coach Arsene Wenger gave no indication that he has agreed to sell his veteran keeper.

Speaking on Thursday ahead of Arsenal's FA Cup third round tie at Burnley this weekend, he told the club's website: "I think Jens Lehmann will be involved."

## Spotlight on Big Sam, Rafa

Sam Allardyce and Rafa Benitez could be forgiven for cursing the FA Cup as two of the Premier League's big guns prepare to put their reputations on the line this weekend.

England's world famous cup competition can be a source of inspiration but for Allardyce's Newcastle and Benitez's Liverpool it represents a potential source of embarrassment.

Newcastle are in the midst of a woeful run that threatens to cost Allardyce his job after just half a season in charge, so the beleaguered boss could do without a tricky trip to in-form Championship club Stoke on Sunday.

A defeat at the Britannia Stadium could be the final straw for Newcastle owner Mike Ashley, who must be concerned by Allardyce's admission that morale among his players is at rock bottom.

"The players are very dejected and disappointed. It has been a massive effort with so many games in such a short period of time," Allardyce said.

"Now it is three defeats on the trot and in terms of confidence that is hugely draining. We cannot keep shooting ourselves in the foot by playing so well and not getting results to go along with it."

Newcastle are fast reaching crisis point and Liverpool won't be too far behind if they lose against League One strugglers Luton on Sunday. It is a tie that has the perfect conditions for an FA Cup giant-killing.

Benitez's side are 12 points behind Arsenal after a run of two league wins in their last six games, while the Spaniard's fractious relationship with Liverpool's American owners has created uncertainty over his long-term future.

Middlesbrough, who face Championship joint-leaders Bristol City at Ashton Gate, are another Premier League team with reason to fear a cup exit.

Arsenal are likely to play several reserves at Burnley so even they can't be certain of success. But Chelsea's home record should insulate them from a shock against west London rivals QPR.

Aston Villa striker Gabriel Agbonlahor admits his side are desperate to finally get the better of Manchester United at Villa Park.

Villa have been knocked out of the cup by United three times in the last six seasons and haven't beaten Sir Alex Ferguson's team since 1999.

Agbonlahor said: "We know we have a poor record against United especially at home, but we've got to go out there, try our hardest to get something from the game."

## Bayern eyeing Mourinho

Bayern Munich president Franz Beckenbauer would welcome Jose Mourinho as the next coach of his club when Ottmar Hitzfeld leaves in the summer.

The former Chelsea and Porto boss is one of the leading candidates to assume control of the Bavarians, although the fact he does not speak German could rule him out of the running.

However, Beckenbauer feels there is enough time for Mourinho to learn the language and be ready to take the reins in six months time.

"He could do a language course between now and the summer, so why not?" Beckenbauer wrote in his column in Germany's Bild newspaper.

"Our club needs a big name. He has got to be a great tactician, have already accumulated experience and have command of the German language."

One man who does have such a CV is Beckenbauer himself, who has already led Bayern and Germany to glory in the 1990s.

However, the 62-year-old will not be putting forward his own candidacy this time.

"The only person I can really rule out of the running is myself," he added.

## Scholes closing on return

Manchester United midfielder Paul Scholes has revealed he is close to a return to action after two months out with a knee problem.

Scholes, 33, has started running again after the lateral ligament injury and believes he could be back by the end of January.

"I've got these next few weeks to get as fit as I can, so hopefully I'll be fresh when I come back," Scholes said.

"It's a couple of months since the operation now and everything seems to be okay. I'm on track to return at the end of January or the start of February."

The former England midfielder has found it hard watching from the sidelines while his teammates competed in the Premier League and Champions League.

"I know that I have to be patient and hopefully I'll be back playing soon."

## Figo denies US link

Inter Milan's former Portugal winger Luis Figo on Thursday distanced himself from a possible transfer window move to the United States, insisting he was concentrating firmly on his current club.

Figo recently admitted he would consider moving to Major League Soccer, with his former international team-mate Maniche, now at Atletico Madrid, rumoured to be transferred to the Italian champions.

But Figo, who almost moved to Saudi Arabia in the last winter transfer window a year ago, insists he is staying put.

"Right now I'm not thinking about this possibility (going to the United States) because I have something else in mind," Italian news agency Ansa quoted Figo as saying from Inter's Dubai training camp.

A police spokeswoman said there had been no arrests and no charges. The spokeswoman said police were investigating criminal damage to a car and also an allegation of assault by a 13-year-old boy.

A spokesman for English League One club Leeds said: "We can confirm that Dennis's vehicle was attacked. The police are investigating the matter and Dennis is cooperating fully with their investigations."

## A Real show beckons

Sunday is the traditional day in the calendar for giving presents in Spain and La Liga leaders Real Madrid will be looking to provide their fans with something special against Real Zaragoza.

The Spanish giants ended 2007 with a confidence-boosting 1-0 win at their bitter rivals Barcelona to extend their lead in the championship race to seven points and they will be looking to start this year in similar fashion.

"There was a great game and seven points is an important advantage but it's too early to start talking about the title," said Real coach Bernd Schuster, well aware that the Spanish season has not yet reached its halfway point.

Against Zaragoza, Schuster could be without one of his stars of Real's recent victories, their Brazilian-born Portuguese international defender Pepe.

Pepe has been particularly impressive in the centre of the defence alongside 2006 World Player of the Year Fabio Cannavaro but Real medical officials said on Thursday that he had still not recovered from a seasonal bout of flu.

If Pepe is unfit then Sergio Ramos may move into the centre of the defence and either Miguel Torres or Michel Salgado could be recalled at right back as Real aim to

defend their 100 percent home record in the league this season.

Gabriel Heinze suffered a thigh strain in Real's 2-1 win over third division Alicante in the Spanish Cup on Wednesday, achieved without a host of first choice players, but the Argentine international is expected to fit for Sunday.

Zaragoza have slipped to ninth after having failed to win a league game since October and coach Victor Fernandez could find himself out of a job on Monday if they notch up another loss.

Two big team worries for Fernandez are whether his first choice goalkeeper Cesar Sanchez - who played five seasons for Madrid and helped them to the 2002 Champions League title - or midfield playmaker Pablo Aimar will be fit after recent injuries.

Barcelona will be hoping to get back on track after their defeat by Real with a good performance at mid-table Real Mallorca on Saturday, although their poor away record in the league this season makes three points far from certain.
