South Africa successfully chased down 185 runs on the fourth day of the second Test to win by seven wickets, levelling the three-match series with West Indies 1-1 at

Newlands on Saturday. Skipper Graeme Smith hit a forceful 85 off 79 balls that included eleven boundaries. The hosts rushed towards their second innings target after they dismissed West Indies for 262 at the stroke of tea.

Their captain Chris Gayle batted with a broken left thumb and shared a last wicket partnership of 70 runs with Shivnarine

Chanderpaul on the fourth day.

Gayle hit 38, with 37 of the runs coming off 29 balls in the last wicket stand before he was caught at long-on off Dale Steyn after hitting four fours and three sixes.

Gayle was struck on the thumb by a delivery from Andre Nel four balls into the first over of the day. After lengthy treatment on the field he retired hurt without adding to his overnight score of one. X-rays showed he had a frac-

tured thumb but he returned to the wicket when his side were nine down and only 114 runs ahead.

Gayle, batting with a runner because of a hamstring injury, swung powerfully whenever the ball was in his range although it was obvious he was in pain.
