

Benazir's killing to leave negative impact on subcontinent

Speakers tell roundtable

The assassination of Benazir Bhutto, former president of Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP), will leave a negative impact on the stability and security of this subcontinent including Bangladesh, said the speakers at a roundtable yesterday.

They said the militants and extremists would be encouraged to expand their network in the neighbouring countries after their 'successful mission' in killing the PPP president.

The speakers urged all con-

cerned to uphold and strengthen democracy to tackle the threat of militancy.

The roundtable was organised by the Workers' Party of Bangladesh (WPB) at its office in the capital.

Presided over by WPB President Rashed Khan Menon, the roundtable was addressed by Awami League presidium member Tofael Ahmed, General Secretary of Communist Party of Bangladesh Mujahidul Islam Selim, Gono Forum presidium member Pankaj Bhattacharya, Ganatantri Party President Nurul Islam, General Secretary of Samyabadi Dal Prof Akmol Hossein, Advisory Editor of Amar Desh Ataus Samad and journalist Harun Habib.

WPB General Secretary Bimal Biswas presented the keynote paper at the roundtable.

Tofael said although the situation in Bangladesh and Pakistan is quite different, we will have to take a lesson from the killing of Benazir.

He said the whole nation is now united against fundamentalism and militancy which was never seen in the past.

"We shall have to utilise this

unified stand of people for the trial of war criminals, otherwise we shall have to pay like Pakistan," he added.

Rashed Khan Menon said religious extremism flourishes where military rule lasts long.

"Though the killing of Benazir is an internal matter of Pakistan, it would greatly affect peace and stability of the subcontinent," he added.

Menon urged the government to lift ban on indoor politics and withdraw emergency from the country to help restore democracy by holding a free and fair election.

Britto Int'l Artists' Workshop begins in Bogra

Shishir Bhattacharjee, president of the trust, in his written statement said Britto has been organising several programmes related to arts both in national and international levels since 2002.

Britto believes artworks of Bangladesh will achieve international standards through these types of programmes.

This workshop will work as a bridge between the art and artists of different countries, he added.

Khush Kabir of Nijera Kori said this workshop will make foreign artists familiar with local art, culture and heritage.

The workshop will round off with an exhibition by the participating artists on January 18.

One beaten to death in Shariatpur

Terrorists beat a young man to death and injured another while they were pasting posters against the gang in Bilashpur area of Jajira upazila yesterday morning.

The deceased was identified as Faruque, 30.

Local sources said the members of Quddus Bahini mercilessly beat up Faruque and Sipon, 25, in the morning, killing Faruque on the spot and critically injuring Sipon.

On information, police rushed to the spot and arrested two suspected Quddus Bahini members -- Sultan Khalifa and Abul Kashem -- in connection with the killing.

Earlier, the law enforcers arrested Quddus Bahini chief Quddus along with his chief aide. The gang was involved in many crimes, including extortion and terrorism in the area.

After the arrest of Quddus, local people distributed leaflets and pasted posters demanding punishment of the gang members.

Faruque and Sipon were pasting posters yesterday for the same demand.

Malaysian cops use water cannon on candlelight protest

Malaysian police used a water cannon to disperse protesters who held a candlelight vigil Saturday against internal security laws being used to hold ethnic Indian activists without trial.

Some 300 people including women and children defied a police ban and attempted to gather at the capital's Independence Square, but were barred by about 100 police including dozens of riot police.

They held a brief vigil, lighting candles and singing rights anthems, before being dispersed by riot police, several carrying tear gas, and backed by a water cannon which was briefly turned on.

The crowd scattered into surrounding streets and were chased down by police officers but no arrests were made, said organisers, who said their cause had been energised by the latest arrests under the Internal Security Act (ISA).

Five members of the Hindu Rights Action Force, which organised a mass rally in November alleging discrimination against ethnic Indians in Malaysia, which is dominated by Muslim Malays, were last month detained under the legislation.

Religious and racial issues are extremely sensitive in multi-racial Malaysia, which experienced deadly race riots in 1969.

Malays make up 60 percent of the population, with ethnic Chinese at 26 percent and Indians at eight percent.

without trial under the law, which dates back to the British colonial era when it was used against Communist insurgents.

"Our presence tonight is to say that this is a law which is unjust," Abolish ISA Movement chairman Syed Ibrahim told reporters, adding that Malaysians of all races and religions were represented at the vigil.

Protesters urged the government to abolish the ISA, which in modern times is more commonly used against alleged Muslim militants.

Ambassador Amin's body arrives tomorrow

Body of Bangladesh Ambassador to France Ruhul Amin will arrive here tomorrow on an Emirates flight.

Amin, 47, passed away in Paris due to brain hemorrhage on January 3.

His first namaz-e-janaza will be held at the foreign ministry on Tuesday at 11:45am and second namaz-e-janaza at Gulshan Azad Mosque after Asr prayers. He will be buried at Mirpur graveyard.

His quikhwani will be held at his apartment 'Charukunja' at 77 Gulshan Avenue in the city after Asr prayers on January 11.

Another report adds: French government will arrange a funeral programme for Ambassador Amin today.

According to the information from the Bangladesh Embassy in Paris, the programme will include Guard of Honour by the members of the three forces, playing of national anthems of both the countries and observing one-minute silence.

Members of the diplomatic corps in Paris have also been invited to attend the programme.

A namaz-e-janaza will be held at the Bangladesh mission in Paris before the funeral programme.

On his sudden demise, French Foreign Minister Bernard Kouchner sent a condolence message through a director of the French Foreign Ministry to the widow of the Ambassador conveying their deep sympathy.

The Chief of Protocol and Head of Asia Division of the French Foreign Office separately expressed their sympathy and condolences to the Bangladesh Embassy in Paris.

On behalf of the French president and the government, Foreign Minister Bernard Kouchner has also written a letter to his Bangladeshi counterpart Iftekhar Ahmed Chowdhury expressing the sincere condolences and sadness.


New poll spells more bad news for Japan govt

Death anniversary




Today is the first death anniversary of Mujibur Rahman, a social worker and owner of the Islamia Book Depot, says a press release.
